Description of Proposed Legislation:


Senate Bill 1 establishes a vocational industries program at the Montana State Prison.

Comment:

No dollar estimate can be made for SB1. Because the bill addresses a wide range of possible programs and the disparity of costs associated with these programs, no estimate is possible until specific programs are formulated. For example, an auto mechanics program would require additional facilities and major equipment investments for operations, while furniture repair already has a facility and equipment.

SB1 states that the program is not self-supporting. Before the cost of subsidizing it can be determined, the following is required:

1. the type of vocational program;
2. the level of demand for the service or product; and
3. the number of inmates participating.

A statement of intent is required for this bill in that it delegates authority to the department of administration to adopt rules in subsection (7) (a) of section 1. (1) In adopting rules implementing the prison vocational industries program, the department should include:

- (a) guidelines and procedures for contracting with vocational education entities;
- (b) rules governing inmate participation;
- (c) rules governing the calculation and payment of inmate wages, including maintaining savings accounts for inmates to be released to them upon release from the institution;
- (d) price lists for the cost of products and services;
- (e) rules outlining criteria for developing a vocational industry program.

(2) The legislature intends that this program will not compete in any significant way with Montana businesses established and operating prior to the program, and will not displace workers covered by a collective bargaining agreement.
