5	A BILL FOR AN ACT ENTITLED: "AN ACT INCREASING FROM \$24 TO
6	\$30 THE AUTHORIZED REIMBURSEMENT OF LODGING EXPENSES FOR
7	ELECTED STATE OFFICIALS, APPOINTED MEMBERS OF BOARDS,
8	COMMISSIONS, OR COUNCILS, DEPARTMENT DIRECTORS, AND ALL
9	OTHER STATE EMPLOYEES TRAVELING ON BUSINESS WITHIN THE
10	STATE; AMENDING SECTION 2-18-501, MCA; AND PROVIDING AN
11	EFFECTIVE DATE."

13	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MONTANA:
14	Section 1. Section 2-18-501, MCA, is amended to read:
15	"2-18-501. Meals, lodging, and transportation of
16	persons in state service. Every elected official, appointed
17	members of boards, commissions, or councils, department
18	directors, and all other state employees shall be reimbursed
19	for meals and lodging while away from the person's
20	designated headquarters and engaged in official state
21	business in accordance with the following provisions:
22	(1) For travel within the state of Montana, the
23	following provisions apply:

24 (a) The governor shall be authorized actual and25 necessary expenses not to exceed \$55 per day.

1 (b) All other elected state officials, appointed 2 members of boards, commissions, or councils, department 3 directors, and all other state employees shall be authorized 4 the actual cost of lodging, not exceeding \$24 \$30 per day, and taxes on the allowable cost of lodging, except as 5 provided in subsection (3), plus \$3 for the morning meal, 5 7 \$3.50 for the midday meal, and \$8 for the evening meal. All claims for lodging expense reimbursement allowed under this 8 9 section must be documented by an appropriate receipt.

10 (2) For travel out of the state of Montana, the 11 following provisions apply:

12 (a) The governor shall be authorized the actual cost of13 lodging in addition to a meal allowance not to exceed \$3014 per day.

15 (b) All other elected state officials, appointed 16 members of boards, commissions, or councils, department 17 directors, and all other state employees shall be authorized 18 the actual cost of lodging, not exceeding \$50 per day, 19 except as provided in subsection (3), plus \$4 for the morning meal, \$6.50 for the midday meal, and \$12 for the 20 21 evening meal, All claims for the lodging expense 22 reimbursement allowed under this subsection must be documented by an appropriate receipt. 23

24 (3) All other elected state officials, appointed25 members of boards, commissions, or councils, department

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directors, and all other state employees shall be authorized
 the actual cost of lodging when traveling in the normal
 course of their duties to certain designated areas. The
 department of administration shall designate those areas
 where the actual cost of lodging shall be reimbursed.

6 (4) For travel to a foreign country, the following7 provisions apply:

(a) All elected state officials, appointed members of 8 9 boards, commissions, councils, department directors, and all other state employees must be reimbursed for the cost of 10 meals and lodging within the rates established by the 11 department of administration when traveling in the normal 12 course of their duties to designated areas. The department 13 shall use the United States department of state maximum 14 travel per diem allowances for foreign areas in establishing 15 16 the rates.

17 (b) All claims for meals and lodging reimbursement
18 allowed under this subsection (4) must be documented by an
19 appropriate receipt.

(5) When other than commercial, nonreceiptable lodging facilities are utilized by a state employee while conducting official state business in a travel status, the amount of \$12 will be authorized for lodging expenses for each day in which travel involves an overnight stay in lieu of the amount authorized in subsection (1)(b) or (2)(b) above. However, when overnight accommodations are provided at the
 expense of any government entity, no reimbursement may be
 claimed for lodging.

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4 (6) The actual cost of reasonable transportation 5 expenses and other necessary business expenses incurred by a 6 state official or employee while in an official travel 7 status shall be subject to reimbursement.

8 (7) The provisions of this section shall not be9 construed as affecting the validity of 5-2-301.

10 (8) The department of administration shall prescribe 11 rules necessary to effectively administer this section for 12 state government.

13 (9) All commercial air travel shall be by the least

14 expensive class service available."

15 NEW SECTION. Section 2. Effective date. [This act] is

16 effective July 1, 1991.

In compliance with a written request, there is hereby submitted a Fiscal Note for HB0170, as introduced.

DESCRIPTION OF PROPOSED LEGISLATION:

An act amending 2-18-501, MCA, to increase from \$24 to \$30 the authorized reimbursement of lodging expenses for elected state officials, appointed members of boards, commissions, or councils, department directors, and all other state employees traveling on business within the state.

ASSUMPTIONS:

- 1. Current law is represented by the actual FY90 expenditures and funding for all state agencies including higher education. Expenditure and funding projections reflect in-state lodging reimbursements only.
- 2. The level of in-state lodging expenses which occurred in FY90 is representative of FY92 and FY93. The current law outof-state lodging reimbursement rate is not affected by this proposed change.
- 3. Actual lodging expenses for in-state travel would increase to \$30 per day if the state reimbursement rate were increased to that level.
- 4. The accommodations tax will continue at 4%.
- 5. The accommodations tax collections related to state government travel will continue to be deposited to the general fund.
- 6. The expenditures are based on FY90 expenditure and funding. If no appropriation is made then agencies will be required to travel less and/or transfer authority from other categories of expenditure.
