11	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MONTANA:
12	Section 1. Section 87-2-723, MCA, is amended to read:
13	*87-2-723. Regulation of special wild buffalo licenses

15	wild buffalo herd moratorium on license sales. (1) The
16	department shall adopt rules regulating special wild buffalo
17	licenses. The rules shall provide for:

- (2) The money collected from drawing and license fees be placed in a special fund to manage and control the buffalo entering Montana from the Yellowstone national herd.
- 8 (3) After [the effective date of this act], a special wild buffalo license may not be sold until the department 10 and any federal agencies responsible for the management of the Yellowstone national park herd have entered into an
- agreement for the long-term management of the herd." 12
- NEW SECTION. Section 2. Effective date -- contingent 13 14 termination. [This act] is effective on passage and approval 15 and terminates October 1, 1993, or on the date of adoption 16 of a long-term management plan that allows the sale of wild 17 buffalo licenses, whichever occurs first.

## STATE OF MONTANA - FISCAL NOTE

In compliance with a written request, there is hereby submitted a Fiscal Note for HB0219, as introduced.

#### DESIRIPTION OF PROPOSED LEGISLATION:

To suspend the sale of special wild buffalo licenses until a long-term management plan has been entered into between the appropriate state and federal agencies.

#### ASSUMPTIONS:

The Department of Fish, Wildlife and Parks does not have enough data to accurately predict the fiscal impact of this bill at this time. Some of the unknown variables are summarized below.

- 1. In the past few years, bison control was primarily accomplished by using sportsmen to harvest the animals. The control action cost more to administer than revenue generated from sale of the licenses (costs of \$272,000 with revenue of \$161,000 over last 3.5 years).
- 2. Last month an interim management plan was adopted by the state that changes the method of bison control. Sportsmen will harvest animals only under conditions outlined in the plan. Montana and the National Park Service will also help control the bison. Therefore, the department's historic cost data cannot be used to predict the future costs.
- 3. Future costs to control bison may increase but could be offset by sale of carcasses and calves.
- 4. A long-range management plan for bison is currently being developed by the state and the National Park Service. There will be some development costs to the department, but neither the required detail of the plan, nor the involvement of the agency is known at this time.
- 5. Therefore, HB0219 will cause no increased costs to the department.
