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
Hacise Bill NO. 440 Minulan 1 INTRODUCED BY Southworth 2 3 A BILL FOR AN ACT ENTITLED: "AN ACT PROHIBITING THE 4 5 ISSUANCE OF SPECIAL PERMITS FOR TRIPLE TRAILERS BY THE DEPARTMENT OF HIGH WAYS: AND AMENDING SECTION 61-10-124, 6 7 MCA." 8

9 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MONTANA:

Section 1. Section 61-10-124, MCA, is amended to read: "61-10-124. Special permits -- fee -- cranes. (1) As used in this section, "crane" means a self-propelled single-unit vehicle consisting of not more than four axles and used for raising, shifting, and lowering heavy weights by means of a projecting swinging arm.

(2) Except as provided in subsections (3)(b), (3)(d), 16 17 and (6), in addition to the regular registration and gross 18 vehicle weight fees, a fee of \$10 for each trip permit and a fee of \$75 for each term permit issued for size and weight 19 20 in excess of that specified in 61-10-101 through 61-10-110 must be paid for all movements under special permits on the 21 22 public highways under the jurisdiction of the department of 23 highways.

(3) (a) Except as provided in subsections (3)(b),
(3)(d), and (6), term or blanket permits may not be issued



for an overwidth vehicle, combination of vehicles, load, or 1 2 other thing in excess of 15 feet; an overlength vehicle, combination of vehicles, load, object, or other thing in 3 4 excess of 95 feet; and an overheight vehicle, combination of 5 vehicles, load, or other thing in excess of 14 feet, or of a 6 limit determined by the department, A vehicle, combination 7 of vehicles, load, or other thing in excess of these 8 dimensions is limited to trip permits. Special permits for 9 vehicle combinations of more than two trailers or more than 10 two units designed for or used to carry a load are not 11 permitted except as provided in subsection (6). Special permits for vehicle combinations may specify and special 12 13 permits under subsection (6) must specify highway routing and otherwise limit or prescribe conditions of operation of 14 15 the vehicle or combination, including but not limited to 16 required equipment, speed, stability, operational procedures, and insurance. 17

(b) A term permit may be issued to a dealer in
implements of husbandry and self-propelled machinery for an
overwidth or overlength vehicle referred to in subsection
(3)(a). The fee for this permit is \$75. This permit covers a
period of 1 year and expires on December 31 of each year
with no grace period.

(c) With payment of the appropriate gross weight fee
required by 61-10-203 and with payment of the fee prescribed

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in subsection (2), allowable gross weight of a five-axle
 combination logging vehicle is 80,000 pounds.

3 (d) A term permit may be issued for any combination of vehicles that exceeds 95 feet in length but does not exceed 4 100 feet in length, except a truck-trailer-trailer or--a 5 truck--tractor-semitrailer-trailer-trailer combination, for 6 travel only on highways that are part of the federal-aid 7 interstate system, as defined in 60-1-103, or on other 8 highways within a 2-mile radius of an interchange on the 9 interstate system in order to obtain necessary services or 10 to load or unload at a terminal. When a terminal is beyond 11 a 2-mile radius, the department may authorize travel between 12 the terminal and the interchange. The fee for this permit 13 14 is \$125.

(4) Except as provided in subsection (3)(b), a permit 15 may not be issued for a period of time greater than the 16 period for which the GVW license is valid as provided in 17 this title, including grace periods allowed by this title. 18 Owners of vehicles licensed in other jurisdictions may, at 19 the discretion of the department of highways, purchase 20 permits to expire with their registration. A license 21 required by the state governs the issuance of a special 22 23 permit.

(5) The owner or operator of a grane with a grossvehicle weight of less than 80,000 pounds may purchase a

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1 30-day special permit for overweight if the crane has a 2 current special mobile equipment identification plate and if 3 the department of highways has approved the configuration of 4 the crane through a weight analysis completed within the 5 same calendar year. The permit is not transferable, and the 6 fee for the permit is \$200.

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7 (6) The department may issue special permits to the
8 operating company for a truck-trailer-trailer or--truck
9 tractor-semitrailer-trailer combination of vehicles
10 under the following conditions:

11 (a) the combination may be operated only on highways 12 that are part of the federal-aid interstate system as 13 defined in 60-1-103 and within a 2-mile radius of an 14 interchange on the interstate system on other highways only 15 in order to obtain necessary services or to load or unload 16 at a terminal. When a terminal is beyond a 2-mile radius, the department may authorize travel between the terminal and 17 18 the interchange.

(b) a combination of vehicles powered by a cab-over (tilt cab) type truck-tractor or a truck may not exceed overall length of 105 feet, inclusive of front and rear bumpers and overhang;

(c) a combination of vehicles powered by a conventional
truck-tractor may not exceed overall length of 110 feet,
inclusive of front and rear bumpers and overhang;

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(d) no individual cargo unit of the combination may
 exceed 28 1/2 feet in length and 102 inches in width;

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3 (e) gross weight fees under 61-10-203 must be paid on
4 the truck or truck tractor for the declared registered gross
5 weight of the special vehicle combination, but not to exceed
6 the formula in 61-10-107;

7 (f) the combination must have a restricted route permit
8 under 61-10-107(3) and a special overlength permit issued at
9 a fee of \$200 for a term permit or \$20 for each trip permit;
10 (g) travel of the combination may be restricted to
11 specific routes, hours of operation, specific days, or
12 seasonal periods; and

13 (h) the department may enforce any other restrictions
14 determined by the department to be necessary. The permit is
15 not transferable, and the fee for the permit is \$200.

16 (7) A permit may not be issued for a truck

17 tractor-semitrailer-trailer-trailer combination."

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# STATE OF MONTANA - FISCAL NOTE

## Form BD-15

In compliance with a written request, there is hereby submitted a Fiscal Note for HB0440, as introduced.

#### DESCRIPTION OF PROPOSED LEGISLATION:

An act prohibiting the issuance of special permits for triple trailers by the department of highways; and amending section 61-10-124, MCA.

### ASSUMPTIONS:

- 1. Companies which purchase special triple permits are generally engaged exclusively in triple trailer operations. Approximately 303 special permits for triple trailer operations are issued each year at \$200 per permit.
- 2. The special triples permit issued to single trip operators will be discontinued. Approximately 1,409 single trip operators purchase special triple trailer permits at \$20 per permit.
- 3. Restricted route-load permits issued for exceeding 80,000 pounds will no longer be necessary for triple trailer operations. Restricted route-load permits cost \$100 per year. Approximately 303 companies are engaged in triple trailer operations and purchase the restricted route-load permits.
- 4. Companies operating triple trailer operations will reduce their average, licensed weight from 118,000 pounds to the legal weight of 80,000 pounds. Consequently, G.V.W. fees for each of the 303 companies engaged in triple trailer operations will decrease \$1,244.50 per company.
- 5. Current law is represented by the executive budget recommendation for GVW fees which are deposited in the highway state special revenue fund.

#### LONG-RANGE EFFECTS OF PROPOSED LEGISLATION:

Any reduction in GVW fees will accelerate the depletion of the highway state special revenue fund.

#### **TECHNICAL NOTES:**

Section 1(3)(d) and Section 6 would prohibit one type of triple trailer operation but allow another type to continue operating. Although truck-tractor-semitrailer-trailer-trailer combinations will be prohibited, truck-trailer-trailer combinations may continue to operate.
