

MINUTES OF THE MEETING
STATE ADMINISTRATION COMMITTEE
50TH LEGISLATIVE SESSION
HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

January 9, 1987

The meeting of the State Administration Committee was called to order by Chairman Sales on January 9, 1987, at 9:00 a.m. in Room 437 of the State Capitol.

ROLL CALL: All committee members were present.

CONSIDERATION OF HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 3: Rep. Swift, House District #3 and sponsor of the bill stated the resolution has been introduced because of some unsettled questions we have in the U.S. today due to the present world situation. There is no question that the Soviet Union has exploited our peace initiatives in the U.S. to its own advantage and this has given it some of the means to increase its worldwide aggression. There is reason to believe this will cause further impacts in eastern Europe, the Middle East and other areas. In many instances there has been an unwillingness on the part of the Soviets to recognize and live by international law. We need to stand up to the Soviet Union and assist those other nations that wish to carry on their own idealistic governments and function as they are presently. He asked that this bill be resolved by the Senate and the House of Representatives of the state of Montana so the U.S. Congress will adopt a national strategy of peace through strength. Congress needs to know that the people of Montana want to show that they are united in their efforts to achieve peace through strength. We want to achieve some military and technological balance with the Soviets; we want to create a strategic defense against a nuclear attack or any other attack against our citizens. We want to continue by non-military means to hold back the growth of communism. We cannot achieve this alone but if we adopt a national strategy of peace through strength, we may be able to achieve what we are after. If the committee agrees to this resolution, the Secretary of State will send this resolution to the Montana congressional delegation.

PROPOSERS: Hal Manson representing the American Legion, strongly supports this resolution so that the representatives in Washington are made aware that the people of Montana are concerned about the strength of our country and its ability to hold at bay any aggressive country. He feels that if our country is strong, it will not be attacked by a strong aggressor. The American Legion strongly urges consideration of this resolution for passage.

OPPOSERS: Sherm Janke, a Bozeman resident, spoke in strong opposition. He stated that the resolution asks the committee to accept some undocumented assertions and to resolve to achieve some issues and objectives

which are unrealistic and unachievable, specifically absolute military superiority over the Soviet Union that has lost its meaning in the nuclear age. Likewise, the resolution asks achievement of a strategic defense against nuclear weapons which is also not achievable. He felt the resolution provided for absolutely no allowance for the evolutionary trends within the Soviet Union; it has changed and that needs to be recognized. He said the resolution asks for the reestablishment of effective security and intelligence capabilities but does not explain what that means. True patriotism sometimes means that you pick a lover's quarrel with your country. He is picking a lover's quarrel with this resolution because of his patriotism for the U.S. He urged consideration of an attitude of reconciliation or working together with the Soviet Union and of getting away from the whole idea of confrontation which is implicit in this resolution.

Bonnie Evans, chairperson of the Peace Legislative Coalition, felt this resolution tends to undercut our present administration and our president's attempts at negotiation and reconciliation with the Soviet Union.

Eleanor Wend, Lobbyist for the Peace Legislative Coalition, opposed HJR 3 and feels that strength through peace should be the vital theme of this legislative session. She felt a resolution is needed which is premised on a strong economy, and stated HJR 3 is a prescription for a never-ending arms race into annihilation.

John Ortwein, Director of the Montana Catholic Conference, submitted testimony (Exhibit #1), and urged a "no" vote on HJR 3.

Wilbur Raymond, representing the Montana Rainbow Coalition, said he understood the ultimate goal of the resolution but felt the goal of peace did not need to be tied to a continued arms race which jeopardizes our whole economy. This legislature should not go on record as supporting the arms race.

John Fisher spoke on behalf of himself even though he is pastor of the First Baptist Church in Helena. He stated that he appreciated that the U.S. is a country and culture that is entwined with christian values but is in agreement with those who say that pursuing an initiative of peace through strength is a vote for annihilation.

Chet Kinsey, combat veteran and past chairman of the Montana Low Income Coalition was concerned that this resolution would endorse spending more money on the military and less on human problems.

Ken Moore, Pastor of the First Christian Church in Helena, hoped the resolution would be defeated and that a substitute resolution could be

found to reflect the peace-loving citizens of Montana.

DISCUSSION ON HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 3: Rep. Whalen expressed concern that the language on page 2, section 1, subsection (c) could be a violation in asking the legislature to ask the federal government to violate the Antiballistic Missile Treaty. Rep. Swift responded that the subsection reads further "at least as well as the Soviets defend their citizens" and that was his intent. He further stated that members of Congress could define and determine that question and that his resolution is only a message for our people to consider. Rep. Moore expressed concern that the language on page 2, lines 5 and 6 were contradictory to the language on page 2, lines 16 and 17. Rep. Swift responded that the intent is that we maintain what we have and not allow our technology to be watered down to where we would be subject to someone else's aggression and control. He reiterated that his resolution is intended to be a message to our congressional people and the experts can take it from there.

The discussion was closed on HJR 3 by Rep. Swift.

CONSIDERATION OF HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 2: Rep. Rapp-Svrcek, House District #51, sponsor of the bill, stated this was a very straightforward resolution urging cooperation between the U.S. and the governments of Vietnam and Laos in resolving the status of Americans still missing and unaccounted for. An amendment was submitted (Exhibit #2) calling for the POW flag to be flown at the state capitol as a symbol of Montana's commitment to resolving this issue.

PROPONENTS: Rich Brown, Administrator for the Montana Veterans Affairs Division and past department commander of the Disabled American Veterans urged support for this resolution and submitted a list of individuals from Montana who are still unaccounted for (Exhibit #3).

Bonnie Evans, Montana Peace Coalition, expressed support.

OPPONENTS: None

DISCUSSION ON HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 2: Rep. Fritz asked if the POW flag would be flown over the capitol forever if the POW issue is never resolved. Rep. Rapp-Svrcek responded that the committee could decide if the flag would fly on specific occasions or for a specific period of time. Rep. Nelson inquired what the POW flag looked like and Mr. Brown responded that it is a black flag with white lettering that says MIA-POW. Mr. Brown suggested that September 19, which is National MIA-POW Recognition Day, might be an excellent opportunity to fly the flag.

The discussion was closed on HJR 2 by Rep. Rapp-Svrcek.

CONSIDERATION OF HOUSE BILL NO. 15: Rep. Fritz, House District #56, sponsor of the bill, stated that the federal government has designated Martin Luther King Day as the third Monday in January to be an official holiday. He hopes Montana will follow suit and designate the third Monday in January as a state holiday. He further stated that holidays are moments when we pause to reflect upon the history and meaning of our country. The Afro-American presence and Martin Luther King are a vital part of that history and culture, and he feels it is appropriate to commemorate both the man and the movement.

PROPOSERS: Terri Minow, representing the Montana Federation of Teachers and the Montana Federation of State Employees spoke in support of the holiday. She said it was also a good year for the state to increase a benefit when it appears there is a lack of funds for other benefits and pay increases. She urged the committee's consideration for do pass.

Nadlean Jensen, Executive Director of the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees Council 9 AFL-CIO supported the bill mainly because of what Martin Luther King stood for and his contribution to civil rights not only for blacks but for women as well.

Alan Thompson, counselor at the University of Montana, felt passing HB 15 would give us an opportunity to tell the people of Montana and the citizens of the U.S. that we consider the lives of all Americans to be important. It would also create the opportunity for educating the young people about the diversity of black culture.

Eleanor Wend, Legislative Peace Coalition, strongly supported the bill as Martin Luther King is the person who symbolizes the spirit of reconciliation.

Bill Lang, representing the Montana Historical Society, felt the state has not sufficiently recognized the ethnic background of many people who developed the state. He stated the importance of recognizing blacks and the black presence in Montana in some way as many blacks have been progressive members of several Montana communities. He felt this bill appeared to be a good way to do this.

OPPOSERS: Gordon Morris, Executive Director of the Montana Association of Counties, distributed a handout to all committee members (Exhibit #4). His opposition is not socio-economic in nature in regard to Martin Luther King. However, from the standpoint of practicality, the fiscal note (Exhibit #5) does not accurately reflect the full implication of declaring Martin Luther King a legal state holiday. One holiday costs the state approximately \$1,563,000.00 without considering overtime and fringe benefits. He felt we had to come to grips with the realities of the dollar implications.

Carol Mosher, representing the Montana Cattle Women, expressed opposition to the bill because of the costs involved. This is not the way to "up" productivity in our country.

DISCUSSION ON HOUSE BILL NO. 15: Rep. Cody asked Rep. Fritz how many states have recognized Martin Luther King's birthday as a state holiday and he responded that he was not sure. Vice Chairman Phillips asked Mr. Gordon if his figures as outlined on Exhibit #4 included the school system and Mr. Gordon responded that the figures, in terms of state employees, included the system of higher education but not public education grades 8-12 or municipal employees working for cities and towns in Montana. The figures were computed on the basis of the 14,000 plus FTEs of state employees in the state capitol and in the institutions of higher education, and the 6,000 county employees. Rep. Roth asked Rep. Fritz if there was a way to recognize this holiday without it being an official costing money holiday. Rep. Fritz had no problem with recognizing one of the most significant people in American history but could not justify the cost. Rep. Roth stated his suggestion would be a happy medium solution to this situation. Rep. Whalen asked visitor Carol Mosher if it was her position that in honoring people who have contributed to our country and culture that they should only be honored in a way in which there is no cost involved, and she responded in the affirmative. Rep. Cody asked Rep. Fritz that since Washington and Lincoln are both recognized at the federal level in one holiday as President's Day, wouldn't he be receptive to the idea of consolidating the holidays on the state level. Rep. Fritz responded that all of the holiday bills should be considered in a subcommittee to achieve some balance.

The discussion was closed by Rep. Fritz on HB 15 by stating that Martin Luther King brought about many changes in the history of 20th Century America.

CONSIDERATION OF HOUSE BILL NO. 43: Chairman Sales requested Vice Chairman Phillips to chair the hearing. Rep. Sales, House District #76, sponsor of the bill, stated he appreciated the necessity of creating holidays to show appreciation for our ethnic backgrounds and is concerned about singling out one day as a legal holiday honoring one ethnic group. Within 15-20 years, the Hispanic and Asian populations will exceed the black population. In order not to discriminate against any ethnic group, he hoped the committee would consider honoring all ethnic backgrounds on one day.

PROPOSERS: None

OPPOSERS: Nadiean Jensen, AFL-CIO, stated if Rep. Sales wanted to switch some holidays around, that was fine; however, she felt legal holidays should be total holidays for the people of Montana.

Gordon Morris, Montana Association of Counties, said he wanted to go on record in support of Rep. Fritz' suggestion that a subcommittee be assigned to review this bill in conjunction with the Martin Luther King Day bill. Since there are no fiscal implications with HB 43, he supports it.


DISCUSSION ON HOUSE BILL NO. 43: Rep. Whalen asked Rep. Sales if he had any objections to an amendment striking line 14 on page 1 and changing it to Martin Luther King Day. Rep. Sales said "yes" since he felt that appreciation should be shown to all ethnic backgrounds that make up our country and was concerned about singling out any one particular individual. Rep. Moore reminded Rep. Sales that Martin Luther King worked for women as well as blacks and women now comprise more than half the population of this country. She felt that fact alone should necessitate Martin Luther King's birthday being a legal state holiday in Montana. Rep. Fritz asked Rep. Sales if he was eliminating Columbus Day for fiscal balancing reasons. Rep. Sales responded "yes" without discrediting the contribution of Columbus to our country. He acknowledged that Columbus Day is also a federal and bank holiday. However, costs certainly have to be considered, and he expressed the hope that the subcommittee would be able to come up with an acceptable solution. Rep. Sales appointed Reps. Nelson, Holliday and Peterson to the subcommittee with Rep. Nelson to chair. Unanimous agreement.

The discussion was closed on HB 43 and the executive action began at 10:18 a.m.

DISPOSITION OF HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 3: Rep. O'Connell moved DO NOT PASS and Rep. Moore seconded the motion. Rep. Whalen expressed concern with the language of the resolution regarding the request to Congress to violate the ABM Treaty. The DO NOT PASS motion roll call vote was 9-9, and the resolution died on a tie vote.

DISPOSITION OF HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 2: Rep. Jenkins moved that the resolution be amended to provide that the POW flag will be flown at the state Capitol on September 19 each year. Rep. Campbell seconded the motion. The amendment was adopted by unanimous vote. Rep. O'Connell moved DO PASS AS AMENDED which was seconded by Rep. Jenkins.

ADJOURNMENT: There being no further business to come before this committee, the hearing was adjourned at 10:25 a.m.



Montana Catholic Conference

CHAIRMAN SALES AND MEMBERS OF THE HOUSE STATE ADMINISTRATION COMMITTEE:

My name is John Ortwein. I am here today as the director of the Montana Catholic Conference. The Montana Catholic Conference serves as the liaison between the two Roman Catholic Bishops of Montana in matters of public concern.

The headline in the January 2, 1987, Great Falls Tribune read, "Plan would build arms, chop farms...." The article went on to explain that President Reagan's new budget would propose \$1.8 trillion in military spending in the next five years but would slash federal farm aid by more than half and sharply curtail the growth of many other domestic programs over the same period-- programs such as food stamps, child nutrition programs and welfare for the poorest of the poor.

A still largely incomprehensible arms buildup has not produced its promised accord with the Soviet Union, only further division.

Pope Paul VI in his statement to the United Nations of 1976 said, "The arms race is one of the greatest curses on the human race; it is to be condemned as a danger, an act of aggression against the poor, and a folly which does not provide the security it promises."

In, "The Challenge to Peace: God's Promise and Our Response" the Pastoral Letter on War and Peace issued by the National Conference of Catholic Bishops in 1983 it is stated: We support the efforts to achieve deep cuts in the arsenals of both superpowers. We urge new efforts to prevent the spread of nuclear weapons in the world and to control the conventional arms race.

Pope John Paul II in his World Day of Peace to the World issued January 1, 1987, stated, "All states have the responsibility for world peace, and this peace cannot be ensured until a security based on arms is gradually replaced with a security based on the solidarity of the human family."

The Second Vatican Council opened its evaluation of modern warfare with the statement: "The whole human race faces a moment of supreme crisis in its advance toward maturity."

I urge a "no" vote on House Joint Resolution 3.

50TH LEGISLATURE

If employees normally are not expected to work on a holiday the costs can be calculated in lost productivity based on the number of employees times the wage rate times the number of hours.

The level of service and productivity is reduced but the annual dollar cost has not been decreased.

However, if employees are normally expected to work on a holiday, i.e. firemen, sheriffs, deputies, other emergency staff, etc, the cost of one holiday per employee amounts to an increase of approximately one fifth of the average weekly salary.
