

MINUTES OF THE MEETING
TAXATION COMMITTEE
50TH LEGISLATIVE SESSION
HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

January 20, 1987

The meeting of the Taxation Committee was called to order by Chairman Ramirez on January 20, 1987, at 9 a.m. in Room 312B of the State Capitol.

ROLL CALL: All members were present. Also present was Dave Bohyer, Researcher, Legislative Council.

CONSIDERATION OF HOUSE BILL NO. 193: Rep. Dennis Nathe, House District #19, sponsor of HB 193, said the bill would continue the six mill levy to fund higher education, by submitting the issue to a vote of the people. He said the Legislature has the power to impose the levy, but it has always been submitted to voters.

PROPOSERS: Jack Noble, Deputy Commissioner of Management and Fiscal Affairs, Montana University System, stated his support of the six mill levy and read from a prepared statement in support of the bill. (Exhibits #1 and #2)

Carroll Krause, Commissioner of Higher Education, recommended that the Committee approve HB 193.

Terry Minnow, Montana Federation of Teachers, stated her support of the bill.

Eric Feaver, Montana Education Association, stated his support of the bill.

Jamie Zinc, Associated Students, Montana State University asked the Committee not to cut education and to support HB 193.

Hal Stearns, representing himself, said a substantial portion of the University System budget is funded by the six mill levy, and asked the Committee to support the bill.

Matthew Thiel, Associated Students, University of Montana, asked the Committee to support HB 193.

Betty Jean Wood, American Association of University Women, stated her support of the bill.

OPPOSERS: There were no opposers of HB 193.

QUESTIONS ON HOUSE BILL NO. 193: Rep. Raney asked what portion of the levy is personal property tax. Carroll Krause replied that he was not certain.

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Rep. Ream asked what current income is from the levy. Jack Noble replied revenue collections have dropped from \$14 million to about \$11.5 million annually.

CLOSING: Rep. Nathe said he hoped the Committee would give the public a chance to vote on the levy and closed without further comment.

EXECUTIVE SESSION: Chairman Ramirez advised the Committee the gas tax increase bill would be heard on Thursday, January 22, 1987, along with a bill to fund the reconstruction trust fund from coal tax bonds funds.

He commented that the Committee might want to delay action on HB 193 until they have a better picture of property tax relief, since some bills would eliminate all statewide and county mill levies.

DISPOSITION OF HOUSE BILL NO. 148: Rep. Williams made a motion to TABLE HB 148. The motion CARRIED unanimously.

ADJOURNMENT: There being no further business before the Committee, the meeting was adjourned at 9:30 a.m.

SUBJECT: Testimony in Support of H.B. 193 - 6 Mill Levy

The property tax referendum for the support of the university system has been a key part of our revenue base since 1920. Prior to the 1972 Constitution, the levy could only be assessed by passage of a statewide referendum. The 1977 legislature chose to retain the referendum even though it wasn't required by law and the legislature was empowered to levy the tax. The 1978 referendum passed by a two to one margin even though the election was conducted during a national climate of property tax revolt. (i.e., Howard Jarvis' Referendum in California.)

The revenue from the levy provides Montana's six campuses with the following support.

Even though the revenue raised is expected to decline in the next two years, the 6 mill levy is vital to the support of our university operation. If, for instance, we were to make up the equivalent amount through tuition charges we would have to almost double the current tuition rates.

Until passage of the 1972 constitution, the legislature was prohibited from imposing an additional mill levy unless the people approved it under terms of Article 12, Section 9 of the 1889 Montana Constitution. Currently, however, according to the state constitution, Article VIII, Section 1, "Taxes shall be levied by general laws for public purposes" and the legislature has a great deal more latitude in taxation as provided in Title 15, Chapter 10, MCA. This means that the Fiftieth Legislature may approve a university system mill levy without submitting it to a vote of the people.
