

MINUTES OF THE MEETING

The meeting of the Long Range Planning Subcommittee was called to order by Chairman Rep. Robert Thoft on January 12, 1987 at 8:00 a.m., in Room 202B of the State Capitol.

CULTURAL AND AESTHETIC PROJECTS

Grant #245 Center for Public Vision
Centennial Minutes: (008)

Tom Cook, Coordinator of the Center for Public Vision, said "Centennial Minutes" will be an innovative series of 60 second public service announcements (P.S.A.'s), reaching Montana's statewide commercial and public television audience throughout our Centennial year of 1989. Chairman Thoft asked Mr. Cook about the progress of the Center's previous grant. The Citizen Review Committee had made the statement that they were not kept up to date on the progress of the project. Mr. Cook said his group had sent in reports every six months, which was the required amount. Mr. Cook told the Long Range Planning Subcommittee the Centennial Minutes project has tripled in size and presented a progress report to the Long Range Planning Subcommittee on the previous project (Exhibit 1).

Montana Ballet Company
Staff Expansion and Pas De Deux Tour: (283)

Anne Bates, Director of the Montana Ballet Company, presented the Long Range Planning Subcommittee with two pamphlets on the company (Exhibit 2). Joan Lakin, Business Manager, Montana Ballet Company, said the company requests a grant to expand its current staff from a half time director to a full time director, full time assistant director and a half time bookkeeper/secretary. The grant would also provide a statewide Pas De Deux Tour. The company has been in existence since 1982 and provides access to classical ballet training as well as preparation for a professional career. Ms. Bates showed a segment of the Nut Cracker Ballet, one of the company's productions. The company has toured Livingston, Billings, and Gardiner. In 1987, they will tour six communities in Montana. Local sponsors cover the ballet company's traveling expenses.

Grant #177 Great Falls Symphony
Grant #178 Great Falls Symphony: (534)


Carolyn Valacich, President of the Great Falls symphony, spoke for grant #177 and grant #178 at the same time. Ms. Valacich said the purpose of grant #177 is to present cultural events of high professional quality to isolated communities and audiences throughout the state, perform in the Great Falls symphony, and provide leadership in the orchestra's string section, thereby raising the caliber of its performance. Ms. Valicich said the Symphony performs in at least 25 different schools per year, and each year visits five new communities. The Symphony charges \$100 per 60 minute demonstration at schools, and \$100-\$500 at non-profit organizations. Sen. Van Valkenburg asked if symphonies in the state could pool their monies to make a better performance. Bill Pratt, Montana Arts Association, said it would cost more to run one large organization than three or four small organizations, and the need is great for high-quality symphonies.

Ms. Valicich said the Citizen Review Committee recommended funding for grant #178. They would like funding for their challenge grant because the Great Falls Symphony Association has adopted a permanent trust fund to receive and administer bequests, estates, insurance, memorials, and other assets to be used for unique and special projects. The trust fund shall create a capital base of \$280,000 to support the levels of excellence and services expected of the Great Falls Symphony Association. The interest accumulated from the Endowment will finance new activities as well as sustain current program levels. Chairman Thoft asked Ms. Valicich if the in-kind contribution money was part of the endowment. Ms. Valicich said no, that the money helps set up the endowment.

Grant #226 Montana Association of Symphony Orchestra
Statewide Arts Leadership Conference: 9:B:000

M.A. Roberts of the Montana Association of Symphony Orchestras said the statewide conference provides leadership training for arts organizations including, but not limited to, symphony orchestra and chorale organizations, art centers or galleries, and non-profit theatres or museums. Ms. Roberts said the conference would teach the participants how to raise funds, build an audience, and give them useful tools to become self-sufficient.
