

MINUTES OF THE MEETING
STATE ADMINISTRATION COMMITTEE
MONTANA STATE SENATE

March 10, 1987

The thirty-fourth meeting of the Senate State Administration Committee was called to order by Chairman Jack Haffey on March 10, 1987 at 10:00 a.m. in Room 331 of the State Capitol.

ROLL CALL: All committee members were present.

The hearing was opened on House Bill 792.

CONSIDERATION OF HOUSE BILL 792: Representative Norm Wallin, House District 78, Bozeman, was sponsor for the bill entitled, "AN ACT TO PROVIDE FOR THE COMPENSATION AND NECESSARY EXPENSES FOR MEMBERS OF THE MONTANA HEALTH FACILITY AUTHORITY; AMENDING SECTION 90-7-201, MCA; AND PROVIDING AN IMMEDIATE EFFECTIVE DATE." He noted the Health Facility Authority was first enacted into statute in 1983 but the language for meeting the expenses of the members was not clear. He stated that the Department of Commerce wanted more explicit language and amendments were written. A small detail had been overlooked by the House committee and he offered an amendment to clarify that members were entitled to \$50 per day plus the costs of travel and lodging. (EXHIBIT 1) He added this expense money does not come from general fund but from fees the authority charges when they do a review of a health facility.

PROPONENTS: Carolyn Doering, from the Department of Commerce, noted the fee for these expenses is included in the 1988-89 budget and urged concurrence.

OPPONENTS: There were none.

QUESTIONS ON HOUSE BILL 792: Senator Lynch asked if the expense allowance was the same as is allowed for other state employees and was told that it was.

Rep. Wallin then CLOSED on House Bill 792.

EXECUTIVE ACTION ON HOUSE BILL 792: Senator Lynch MOVED THE AMENDMENT PROPOSED BE ADOPTED. Senator Hofman seconded the motion. The motion carried unanimously. Senator Lynch MOVED THAT HOUSE BILL 792 BE CONCURRED IN AS AMENDED. Senator Harding seconded the motion. The motion carried unanimously. Senator Hofman will carry the bill on the Senate floor.

The hearing was opened on House Bill 755.

CONSIDERATION OF HOUSE BILL 755: Representative John Cobb, House District 42, Augusta, was sponsor for the bill entitled,

"AN ACT TO PERMANENTLY ALLOW AGENCIES TO GRANT EMPLOYEE INCENTIVE AWARDS UP TO A \$3,000 MAXIMUM; AMENDING SECTION 2-18-1106, MCA; AND PROVIDING AN IMMEDIATE EFFECTIVE DATE." He noted the incentive program was first started in 1972 and since that time the state has saved \$487,000 as a result of cost saving measures that have been suggested by employees. In the last special session the award amount had been temporarily raised from \$1,500 to \$3,000 to see if more response would be received and it was very successful. This bill would make the temporary measure permanent. The language would also state that the award "shall be 10%" so there would be no question as to what the amount of the reward would be.

PROPOSERS: Debbie Flenti, Program Coordinator for the Incentive Awards Program of the Department of Administration, testified on some of the statistics. She distributed a report to the committee members. (EXHIBIT 2)

OPPOSERS: There were none.

QUESTIONS ON HOUSE BILL 755: Senator Hofman asked if the bill would apply to department heads and was told there is a criterion that if this is a major part of their position they were not eligible but they could still submit ideas and offer suggestions for another department and qualify.

The hearing was CLOSED by Rep. Cobb on House Bill 755.

EXECUTIVE ACTION ON HOUSE BILL 755: Senator Harding MOVED THAT HOUSE BILL 755 BE CONCURRED IN. Senator Hofman seconded the motion. The motion carried unanimously. Senator Vaughn will carry the bill on the Senate floor.

The hearing was opened on House Bill 747.

CONSIDERATION OF HOUSE BILL 747: Representative Bud Gould, House District 61, was sponsor for this bill entitled, "AN ACT DIRECTING THE SECRETARY OF STATE TO ASSURE POLLING PLACE AND VOTING ACCESSIBILITY FOR HANDICAPPED AND ELDERLY VOTERS; GRANTING RULEMAKING AUTHORITY; ESTABLISHING PROCEDURES FOR DETERMINING VOTING PLACE ACCESSIBILITY; PROVIDING HANDICAPPED AND ELDERLY VOTERS AN ALTERNATIVE MEANS FOR CASTING A BALLOT ON ELECTION DAY IF THEIR POLLING PLACE IS INACCESSIBLE; AND AMENDING SECTIONS 13-2-601, 13-3-112, AND 13-13-211, MCA." He noted the measure follows federal law closely.

PROPOSERS: Larry Akey, Chief Deputy of the Secretary of State, noted the proposal does follow federal statutes very closely with two exceptions that are not in federal law. This proposal would not require that rural precincts (those with 200 or fewer electors) would have to come into compliance immediately with

handicapped and elderly accessibility regulations. There is also a definition for "technically accessible but usable." This would apply to those polling places that do not meet the technical standards but which have been deemed usable by a committee consisting of physically challenged and elderly individuals working in conjunction with election officials. He felt this was important for Montana to provide access to the extent that is feasible and still not create a situation where in some situations all of the electors would be inconvenienced because it was impossible to find a place that met the strict standards of federal requirements. He noted there is a provision in these cases where one might use curbside voting, voting by absentee ballot or possibly a reassignment to a polling place that is accessible.

Mary Ryan, representing the Montana Senior Citizen's Association, and who is also a handicapped individual, shared her experiences as a member of a task force to conduct a survey of polling places in the Helena area to determine accessibility of polling places for the handicapped. She stated they found some that were completely inaccessible. She urged passage of the bill for the consideration of the handicapped and physically challenged.

Tom Ryan, from Helena, supported the proposal. He noted he first became aware of the problems the handicapped individuals face when he tried to find ways to get his wife to the polls. He urged support.

Ron Brown, Great Falls, supported the bill for reasons of accessibility for the handicapped like himself who would like guaranteed reasonable access to the polling places. He related his experiences trying to access the polls in his home town. He felt the bill was economically feasible and urged passage of the bill. (EXHIBIT 4)

Jane Reed Benson, from the Governor's Committee on Employment of the Disabled, heartily endorsed the proposal because it reflects the basic right of every voter in the state to be able to vote.

Rich Brown, from the Montana Disabled Veterans, urged support for the proposal and thanked the Secretary of State's office for allowing them to participate in the drafting of the language.

Sam Ryan, of Helena, who was a member of the Task Force that surveyed the polling places noted he saw for himself how very difficult some of the voting places are for the handicapped to access.

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Ted Soltis, representing Montana Common Cause, stated they believe that people should have adequate access to polling places and endorsed the proposal.

Greg Jackson, representing the Montana Clerk and Recorder's Association, stated they were on record as being in support of this proposal.

Charles Briggs, State Aging Coordinator for the Governor's Council on Aging, stated they were in support of the bill.

OPPONENTS: There were none.


QUESTIONS ON HOUSE BILL 747: There were none.

STATE EMPLOYEE
INCENTIVE AWARDS PROGRAM
LEGISLATIVE REPORT
AS OF 1/31/87

The State Employee Incentive Awards Program has been in operation since April, 1982. In this time, state employees have submitted 410 suggestion applications. 372 of these have been fully evaluated. There have been 326 denied awards for various reasons and 44 successful suggestions resulting in an estimated \$487,877 first year savings. 36 applications are still in various stages of the evaluation process. The figures reported are cumulative totals since program inception.

Suggestions are being received by employees of various state agencies with the larger agencies generating the greatest number of ideas. (Highways, S.R.S., and Revenue.)

The ideas being submitted tend to impact various state agencies. One in six ideas submitted impacts more than one state agency. 119 ideas were submitted which require judgment or implementation by the Department of Administration. Many of these also impact more than one state agency.

Since the program began in April, 1982, Governor Schwinden has presented awards to 49 different employees for 44 award-winning ideas (5 were shared). In total, \$11,369 was awarded, which averages \$232 per recipient. 11.9% of those ideas evaluated have resulted in awards and, more importantly, cost savings to the state.

The total amount of first year savings generated by these 44 ideas has been estimated at \$486,677. Average savings per evaluated suggestion is \$1,308, while average savings per award-winning suggestion is \$11,060. Despite these benefits, costs to administer the program are relatively negligible (10% of cumulative costs savings). Award amounts represented only 2.3% of cumulative cost savings.

* Costs include personal service, printing, and mailing costs which were absorbed by respective agency budgets.

All costs have been absorbed by the respective agency budgets. Personnel service costs include salaries and benefits. Operating costs mainly consist of travel, printing, and mailing expenses. It is expected that future personal services costs will depend on the number of suggestions evaluated and also on the increases to salaries and benefits.

The cumulative savings realized in the first year (\$487,877) less all absorbed program costs (\$59,304) represent the net benefit of the program to date (\$428,573).

Accessibility -- a word with many connotations. With regards to HB 747 however, it means that gimps like me will be guaranteed reasonable access to a polling place on election day. Now - just a few short years ago, that accessibility was the furthest thing from my mind. If necessary, I would have walked to the top of Roger's Pass to vote. Now, however, I cannot do it and am getting less able to with each passing year - along with several thousand other elderly and disabled. Incidentally -- only our bodies become elderly and disabled. Mentally, we are still in our forties. At least I am. All that is wrong with most of us is: 'The mind is willing but the body is not'. That gets a little hairy once in awhile. Sure - some are in worse shape than others but all any of us are asking for is -- remove a few of the barricades so we can more easily practice one of our most precious basic rights. The right to vote!!

For about a year now I have been talking to many different people about this voter accessibility act. The first response of a few, of course, was the tremendous cost involved of tearing down and rebuilding entire structures and what have you. But then, after I explained what the act was REALLY saying, they, in turn, would start saying things like, "Hey -- you're right. There is another way into where I vote. It's longer but it wouldn't take much to fix it.". And there you have the core of HB 747. There usually IS another way when you stop and think and that is what section five (5) is all about. People thinking about how to solve the problems. Most of which are really quite simple and do not cost an arm and a leg.

For example. Let me take you in to where I and my wife vote - the ^{Lowell} ~~Langston~~ School in Great Falls. Here we go; I pull into the disabled parking zone, get out, walk up the driveway onto the sidewalk then turn and walk up the wheelchair ramp which has a problem. There is no handrailing for someone alone in a wheelchair. This can easily be fixed with a few boards, a good handyman with a few tools, nails and some paint. Now I go through the door. Another problem for that person in a wheelchair. It is real heavy and hard to push open against that heavy-duty door closer. Even for me. For someone alone in a wheelchair though, it is impossible. Two solutions for this.

One -- Use a wrench or screwdriver to relieve the tension in the door closer on election day or simply prop it open. Two -- There is no school on election day any more so maybe the Boy Scouts would be delighted to goof around and open that door for the needy. Okeh -- I'm through the door. Now we take a couple steps, turn and face that long - long ~~KXXXXX~~ EMPTY hallway. My wife and I look at each other and grimace as neither of us can walk very far at one time and there is not a chair in sight to stop and rest in. Why? I have never seen a school yet that did not have a few extra folding chairs around somewhere. But - we came to vote and vote we will if we have to end up crawling. And believe me; No matter how disabled or frail we may ever become, we WILL vote at our polling place if there is any possible way. X That is my main point and there are many, many more who feel the same.

To sum up, passing this bill is economically feasible and will return the voting duty of many people back to being a pleasure instead of a pain in the rear. After all, we crips and elderly are reasonable people. We realize we cannot have the world on a platter and probably would not want it anyway. It's too big of a mess.

Therefore, I strongly urge this committee to unanimously pass HB 747 and make it fly.
