Where a traveling salesman takes orders for groceries and provisions for a foreign firm and such orders are filled by the foreign firm who sends the goods to the purchaser, such salesman and firm are protected by the interstate commerce laws and the state law relating to itinerant vendors does not apply.

Dear Sir:

I am in receipt of your letter of the 11th inst., submitting an opinion given by you to the deputy sheriff of your county, in which you hold that a traveling salesman for a Chicago firm who carries with him samples and takes orders for groceries and provisions, is not an itinerant vendor under the law of the State of Montana, the orders being filled by the Chicago firm who sends the goods ordered to the purchaser. This is a matter which seems to come clearly within the interstate commerce laws under the Federal Constitution and your opinion thereon is affirmed.
