

MINUTES OF THE MEETING
NATURAL RESOURCES
MONTANA STATE SENATE

March 17, 1977

The twenty-eighth meeting of the Natural Resources Committee was called to order by Senator Elmer Flynn, Chairman, at 9:30 a. m. on the above date in Room 405 of the State Capitol Building.

ROLL CALL: Upon roll call all members were present.

CONSIDERATION OF HB 604: An Act relating to reclamation of mining lands.

At this time, Senator Flynn stated, that the Hearing on HB 604 would be taken up but that it would be continued until Tuesday, March 22, 1977 at 9:30 a. m.

Representative Arthur Sheldon, of District 22 and Chief Sponsor of HB 604, distributed marked copies of HB 604 to the Committee members. He explained to the Committee members that the yellow markings represented material deleted from the bill and the blue marks are the actual changes left in the bill. The bill was explained page by page. He stated that he would close the hearing next Tuesday at the continuation of the hearing. (See Attachment #1.)

Debbie Schmidt, of the Legislative Council, passed out proposed amendments to HB 604. Representative Sheldon said he was offering these amendments to be considered when the Committee takes action on the bill. (See Attachment #2.)

There were no other proponents present.

At this time, the opponents were heard.

Mr. Gary Preston, representing himself and Alder Gulch Mining Association, stated that he was extremely opposed to this bill for a number of reasons. The bill has already been so watered down I wonder if it shouldn't be washed down the sink. This bill was written by a particular group which does not represent the mentality of the Montana people. Every miner here today is not only faced with the state law but is faced with the Federal Law which is identical. You can't live with more than one set of identical laws. As a Field Archeologist I know that nature restores lands. Nature is constantly in movement. What the environmentalists want us to do is accelerate this. The Environmental Information Center foisted this bill into here. The miners were never contacted. How many laws are we going to have to

cover the same thing over and over. They are not representing the people - they are representing pressure groups. The reasonable thing to do is to kill this bill. (See Attachment #3.)

Representative Sheldon stated, that he resented the statement that the bill was foisted on to him. When I introduce a bill I do so with my eyes open. The Environmental Information Center is not here to defend themselves.

Mr. Steve Williams, representing the Anaconda Company, stated that his group work and live here during the Session and that they would reserve their remarks until next Tuesday as they would like to hear the proponents too. He thought the people who had traveled a long distance should be heard today.

Mr. Gene Phillips also stated that he would reserve his testimony until next Tuesday at the continuation of the hearing on HB 604.

Mr. James D. Mulryan, Manager of Mining for the Cyprus Industrial Minerals Company in Ennis, Montana, stated that he can't come back and that a letter was left with the Secretary. (See Attachment # 4 & 5.)

Mr. Donald E. Jenkins, representing Placer Amex Inc., Whitehall, Montana, stated that he opposes the bill on the basis of over-regulation of the industry. I don't know where we stand. I recommend that you kill this bill.

Mr. Edward Schietlin, representing the Alter Gulch Mill, and a mining engineer, stated that the State Land Board came up with new regulations and I have been for three years commended on our reclamation projects. The bill has been so watered down that it has lost its bite and isn't doing what it is intended to do. I would like you to kill the bill and wait until the next Legislature and wait for a law that incorporates these other things. I hope and pray that you will kill the bill.

Representative Robert Marks, representing District 80 in Jefferson County, stated that historically in 1860 the development of our county depended on mining. It is extremely important to be very careful about the kind of environmental legislation passed here. I am worried about our mineral balance. We are going to be a mineral poor country. My concern is on Page 7 with regard to solution mining. I am not sure that that is one of the things you would want in the bill. It could be amended to include geothermal exploration or the whole thing taken out. I would like to have you draw your attention to that section. Particularly, I would certainly urge you to take a very careful look at it before you pass it.

Mr. Neil Lynch, representing the Montana Mining Association, stated that he would like to reserve his remarks until he has a chance

to hear the proponents. He stated that he objected to the hearing being split like this. He said that some of the proponents were seen in the hall.

Senator Flynn, at this time, stated that if the proponents were in the hall to bring them in.

Mr. Lynch said, they were gone.

Representative Sheldon stated, that Mr. Leo Berry of the State Land Department, is out of the state and is one of the proponents to be heard.

Senator Flynn said, this wasn't split so that the proponents could be heard last. The bill was already posted so we thought as a courtesy we would start the hearing.

At this time, Mr. Lynch asked for a show of hands of all those opposed to the bill.

Mr. John Lewis, of Jefferson County, representing himself and other small miners and the Elk Horn Mining Company, stated that he wanted to go on record as being diametrically opposed to this bill. It is restrictive and prohibitive to the small miner. The small miner brings mining into Montana. They act as a bird dog. I think this bill will serve to drive a lot of industry out of Montana. The paperwork involved could get so voluminous that we would have to have another office.

Barbara Bird, representing herself and family and the Franklin Mine, stated that her husband, son, and herself were the third largest producer of lead in the state. Now we can hardly turn a wheel, We are filling out papers and nobody can fill them out right. All we want to do is get on our ground and work.

Mr. P. J. Reynolds, White Sulphur Springs, Montana miner, representing the ultra-small miner, stated that in the rest of his life he won't disturb two more acres of land. This law may be directed to Anaconda Company or Colstrip yet I am caught in this wave. All I want to do is go up there and make a few bucks in the summer. Last summer I must have had 150 tourists stop at my place. I received 15 Christmas Cards saying that was the highlight of their trip to Montana.

Mr. Thomas A. Dale, of Pfizer Inc. at Dillon, Montana, said, somebody jumped in with both feet and this bill was totally revised. At the Hearing in the House we were told we would be notified if any changes were made in this bill. I don't know if anyone ever received this. I made a phone call everyday to Helena. I would like to go on record as opposing this bill.

Senator Flynn explained, that it is confusing to keep up with amendments proposed in a bill.

Senator Smith asked, these are all of the things taken out of the bill.

Representative Sheldon replied, yes, sir.

Senator Smith added, and these amendments are put back in the bill.

Representative Sheldon said, the amendments are to correct printing of the bill when it left the House.

Senator Manley asked, it is my understanding the Hearing will be continued on Tuesday.

Senator Flynn replied, yes.

Senator Manley asked, there will be some more proponents here.

Senator Flynn replied, opponents too,

Senator Jergeson asked, how many of the small miners do more than 36,500 tons of material per year.

Mr. Schietlin replied, my mill will have about 100 to 150 ton a day.

Senator Jergeson said, SB 442 changes that.

Mr. Schietlin said, that would be better because three months of the year we can't mine at all.

Senator Manley stated, it was proposed so you could mine the total and wouldn't have to do tons a day.

Senator Roskie said, actually all it is is Section 50-1209 of the law. It puts it back and adds a new paragraph.

Representative Sheldon said, that's all and removes the word "developing".

Senator Flynn asked, is this a standard definition of solution mining.

Mr. Preston replied, it is not a standard definition.

Representative Nathe, of District 1, stated that in Saskatchewan they basically use oil field technology.

At this time, Representative Sheldon announced, that on next Tuesday a hearing will be held in the House at 8:00 a. m. on extending the moratorium on solution mining. Any member of the Committee who would like to attend is invited.

Senator Jergeson wondered, about all those in excess of 36,000 ton a year.

Mr. Lynch replied, there are over 900 permits and there isn't one of them that doesn't feel that sometime in the future they will be included in this act.

Mr. Schietlin stated, that the way the law reads it is 100 ton a day of material. It doesn't say 100 ton of ore.

Senator Jergeson said, I know in this act the language says it is 100 ton of material a day but SB 442 changes that.

At this time, Senator Flynn announced, that the Hearing on HB 604 would be continued on Tuesday, March 22, 1977 at 9:30 a. m.

CONSIDERATION OF HB 484: An Act, which shall be known as the "Montana Rangeland Resources Mct", to be administered by the Department of Natural Resources and Conservation; establishing the Montana Rangeland Resources Advisory Committee to promote the coordination of activities intended to maintain and enhance the rangeland resources of the State of Montana.

Representative Dennis Nathe, representing District 1, and Chief Sponsor of the Bill, presented the proposed amendments to HB 484. Amendments were explained page by page. (See Attachment #6.)

Senator Flynn stated, that this bill has had a full hearing in Agriculture Committee so I see no reason to go through a full hearing.

Senator Roskie stated, that Pete Jackson, Dennis, and Tom Hager, Representative Nathe and himself, have met and this seems to be needed in the line of intent and makes it a more workable solution.

DISPOSITION OF HB 484: Motion was made by Senator Smith and seconded by Senator Jergeson that the Committee accept the proposed amendments to HB 484. Motion carried unanimously.

Motion was then made by Senator Smith and seconded by Senator Dover that HB 484 AS AMENDED BE CONCURRED IN. Motion carried unanimously. (See Attached Standing Committee Report.)

ADJOURNMENT: There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 11:05 a. m.



"50-1209. Reclamation plan -- accomplishment of specific activities. (a) The reclamation plan shall provide that reclamation activities, particularly those relating to control of erosion, shall, to the extent feasible, be conducted simultaneously with mining and in any case shall be initiated promptly after completion or abandonment of mining on those portions of the mine complex that will not be subject to further disturbance by the mining operation. In the absence of an order by the board providing a longer period, the plan shall provide that reclamation activities shall be completed not more than two (2) years after completion or abandonment of mining on said portion of mine complex.

(b) In the absence of emergency or suddenly threatened or existing catastrophe, an operator may not depart from an approved plan without having previously obtained from the department written approval of his proposed change.

(c) Provision shall be made to avoid accumulation of stagnant water in the mined area which may serve as a host or breeding ground for mosquitoes or other disease-bearing or noxious insect life.

(d) All final grading shall be made with nonnoxious, nonflammable, noncombustible solids unless approval has been granted by the board for a supervised sanitary fill.

(e) Where mining has left an open pit exceeding two (2) acres of surface area, and composition of the floor and/or walls of which pit are likely to cause formation of acid, toxic, or otherwise pollutive solutions (hereinafter "objectionable effluents") on exposure to moisture, the reclamation plan must include provisions which adequately provide for:

(1) Insulation of all faces from moisture of water contact by covering to a depth of two (2) feet or more with material or fill not susceptible itself to generation of such objectionable effluents; or

(2) Processing of any such objectionable effluents in the pit before their being allowed to flow or be pumped out of it to reduce toxic or other objectionable ratios

Sir:

After the meeting with the local BLM Office the 9th of March here in Butte, in which they put forward these proposed new set of rules, along with the suggested changes. While it was not a public meeting to formulate changes, but rather one to explain the rules, EIT, there was strong protest by the mining people to these new rules.

I as one of the major opponents to the present set of proposed rules, now in this letter, will put down in part in writing what I said at that meeting.

First, all miners that I know, want good rules and regulations, ones that the R E A L citizen can understand, and put to use. The present day mining man wants to be able to reclaim all disturbed areas as far as it is possible. Thus, in a small way, we have a common view.

Second, the small miner finds himself bound in at all sides by changes in laws rules and regulation at an almost daily rate. It is an impossible task for the large corporations to work these out, so how in heaven can the small miner possibly keep up and conform?

Third, These rules were proposed in an office in Washington, or some remote area without even coming to these affected first and asking for input and ideas.

Thus, with such a background, I hope you can and do understand the belligerent attitude on our part.

If the objective of this new set of regulations was truly by the intent of the BLM not to unduly hinder location, entry and operations of the small miner, then it would have been done in a different manner! The BLM would have first made contact with the small miner through mining associations, and in an individual basis. This in rather the bureaucratic manner that came forth. Now, I hope we can back up the whole matter, and start anew.

First, I simply do not know what has happened to our country, as the taxpayer no longer has much of a voice. We have built up such an unmeasurable sized self perpetuation bureaucratic system, that it has become totally insensitive to the public. We are now working on a single issue, but one that will prove to us here the reality of living in a country of the people, by the people, and for the people. I am afraid that my hopes are fading very fast.

Dear Senator Flynn:

I am writing this letter to express opposition to H.B. 604, both on behalf of my employer and myself. The mineral industry is presently operating under the provisions of the so-called Hard Rock Mining Law, and as far as we are concerned, we can see no reason to confuse the issue by amending that law so soon after it was enacted. We feel the Hard Rock Law really hasn't been on the books long enough for weaknesses to show up. Why can't we let the law be tried for a while before rushing into changes?

It appears that the final version of H.B. 604 that was passed by the House of Representatives, was basically aimed at a couple of specific problems, namely, solution mining and the ASARCO operation near Troy, which, because of the "grandfather" provisions of the bill is not covered by the provisions of the bill. We feel that legislation should not be written that will affect the entire industry, if specific cases are the real target.

For the record, we feel that H.B. 604 was pushed through the House without due deliberation. The original bill was so drastically revised when it was presented to the House Natural Resources Committee, that most of us who had appeared to oppose the bill didn't know for sure what the revised bill said. These revisions were made orally at that hearing, and there were not even printed copies available for the members of the Committee, let alone for the public attending the hearing, whether they intended to testify or not. The bill was supposed to be referred to a sub-committee, then brought before the whole committee, and then reported to the House if the Committee acted favorably. We expected we would hear further on this bill's progress through the House, but the next thing we heard was that it passed on the third reading! There was no opportunity for interested parties to obtain copies of the revised bill so we could make our comments known to the House. I have advised the Speaker of the House and several members of the House, as well as some Senators,


Dear Senator Flynn:

Referring to the THIRD READING of H.B. 604 which is assumed to be the final version of the bill approved by the House of Representatives, we respectfully submit the following comments:

- 1) Page 4 - lines 6 and 7 - "When it is shown that continued operation will not resume". We believe that this should read "when it is shown by the operator that continued operation will not resume". Our reason for this is that in many instances operations must be temporarily suspended due to economics and later due to changes in technology, mine equipment, etc. operations can be resumed which produce a satisfactory profit.
- 2) Page 5 - line 18 - "reasonable proximity". The word "reasonable" needs to be defined as it could be interpreted to be 50 miles, 100 miles or any other figure.

We were quite pleased to see the many changes made in the third reading as compared to the first reading but feel the methods used to get this bill past the House were quite objectionable and unfair to those engaged in the mining industry. My immediate supervisor, Mr. James Mulryan, has outlined these objections in a letter which will be presented to your committee at the hearing scheduled for March 17, 1977.
