# MINUTES OF THE MEETING BUSINESS & INDUSTRY COMMITTEE MONTANA STATE SENATE

### March 12, 1979

The meeting of the Business and Industry Committee was called to order by Chairman Frank Hazelbaker on the above date in Room 404 of the State Capitol Building at 10:00 a.m.

ROLL CALL: All members were present.

HOUSE BILL 14: Representative Dennis Nathe, sponsor of HB 14, explained the bill to the Committee. This bill, by request of the Public Service Commission, exempts the transportation of materials solely for purposes of land excavation or fill from motor carrier regulation by that agency.

PROPONENTS OF HOUSE BILL 14: Mr. Wayne Budt, representing the Public Service Commission, stated they support HB 14. His comments are written on the testimony form.

Mr. Bill Opitz, of the Public Service Commission, stated they are in support of HB 14. The industry is getting along fine without regulation.

Mr. Larry Huss, lobbyist for the Montana Contractors Association and the Montana Motor Carriers Association, stated they are in support of HB 14. Mr. Huss offered two amendments to HB 14. These amendments are attached to the minutes.

There were no other proponents or opponents present at the hearing on House Bill 14.

There was a question and answer period after which Chairman Hazelbaker closed the hearing on HB 14.

DISPOSITION OF HOUSE BILL 14: Senator Dover moved the amendments proposed for HB 14 be adopted. The Committee voted unanimously to adopt the proposed amendments to HB 14.

Senator Dover moved that HB 14 Do Pass as amended. The Committee voted unanimously that HOUSE BILL 14 BE CONCURRED IN AS SO AMENDED.

Senator Dover will carry House Bill 14 on the floor.

HOUSE BILL 424: Representative Dan Yardley, sponsor of HB 424, explained the bill to the Committee. This bill generally revises the laws relating to television districts.

There were no other proponents or opponents of HB 424 present at the hearing.

Senator Dover suggested that HB 424 be checked with SB 73 to see if they mesh.

Chairman Hazelbaker appointed a subcommittee of Senators Hager, Blaylock, and Kolstad to work with Bob Pyfer on the bill.

Chairman Hazelbaker closed the hearing on House Bill 424.

HOUSE BILL 452: Representative Thomas Conroy, sponsor of HB 452, explained the bill to the Committee. This bill validates any certificate of environmental compatibility and public need issued under the Major Facility Siting Act 1) for an electric generating facility after an administrative hearing that was commenced prior to January 1, 1979, and 2) that has been declared invalid by the Montana Supreme Court due to procedural deficiencies.

Representative Conroy stated that the purpose of this bill is to find out why Colstrip 3 and 4 aren't being built. Representative Conroy distributed copies of second corrected third reading of House Bill 452. These are attached to the minutes.

PROPONENTS OF HOUSE BILL 452: Mr. John Ross from Butte, Montana, representing Colstrip 3 & 4 participants, explained the bill further to the Committee. Mr. Ross stated they are concerned with energy costs. They are doing everything they can to see that Colstrip 3 & 4 commences this spring. House Bill 452 is a bill to help see that this is being done. Mr. Ross stated that HB 452 focuses on procedural deficiencies. Mr. Ross further stated that Colstrip 3 & 4 would not be exempt from the Siting Act. He also told the Committee that some opponents have raised legal arguments to HB 452, but if they were to shy away from every legal threat they would never have filed for the project, and they are confident the bill is wholly proper and constitutional. Mr. Ross stated that HB 452 is a curative statute, and the courts have held that curative statutes are constitutional. Mr. Ross conlouded his testimony by urging a Do Pass on House Bill 452.

Mr. Robert McColly from Hinsdale, Montana, representing Central Montana Electric G & T. He stated they are in support of HB 452. Mr. McColly's printed statement is attached to the minutes.

Mr. Joe Crosswhite from Columbia Falls, Montana, representing the Operating Engineers and WETA, stated they are in support of HB 452. Mr. Crosswhite told the Committee that HB 452 was a very important bill to them. They feel that Colstrip 3 & 4 are needed and there should not be a lot of litigation. They endorse a Do Pass on HB 452.

Mr. Gene Phillips from Kalispell, Montana, representing Pacific Power and Light, stated they are in support of HB 452. They feel the need for Colstrip 3 & 4 is critical. They have had a large energy growth and a big demand for energy, and it is important that they are able to meet the increasing load demand.

- Mr. Phillips told the Committee that one of the causes of the large energy demand is that 91% of single family homes in the Kalispell area are electrically heated. New energy resources are essential if they are going to continue to meet the needs of their customers He further stated that HB 452 does not invalidate the Siting Act, and he urged that the Committee would Concur In HB 452.
- Mr. F. H. Boles of Helena, representing Montana Chamber of Commerce, spoke in support of HB 452.
- Mr. Russell Williams of Butte, Montana, representing I.B.E.W., stated they are in support of HB 452.
- Mr. Ray Wayrynen, Helena, Montana, representing the Montana State Council of Building and Construction Trades, stated they support HB 452. Mr. Wayrynen's testimony is attached to the minutes.
- Mr. Ed Nelson, Helena, Montana, representing the Montana Taxpayers Association, stated they are in support of HB 452. Mr. Nelson told the Committee that without the energy base you can't have a strong economic base.
- Mr. Mitch Mihailovich, representing the Montana State Building Trades, stated they support HB 452.
- Mr. Ray Loveridge of Colstrip, Montana, representing Montana People for Progress, stated they support HB 452 and urged the bill's passage. Mr. Loveridge's testimony is attached to the minutes.
- Mr. Wilbur Anderson from Dillon, Montana, representing Vigilante Electric Cooperative, stated they have experienced a great load growth of electricity used. Most of this growth is due to irrigation load on ranches and farms in the area. They feel that the most critical need they have is to supply an adequate power supply for their people. He further stated that plants and power are critically needed in Montana. These plants will not violate the state and federal laws which issued the licenses stated Mr. Anderson. He urged passage of HB 452.
- Mr. Peter Jackson of Helena, Montana, representing WETA, stated they are in support of HB 452. They feel they can meet the standards for air and water quality. He stated that electricity is the only logical source of power in Montana, and Colstrip 3 and 4 would mean a great deal to Montana's economy. He referred to the magazine, "Irrigation Age" to stress the importance of electric power.
- Mr. Darold Bauer from Billings, Montana, representing the Billings Area Chamber of Commerce, stated they are in support of HB 452.
- Mr. William T. Nordeen from Sandpoint, Idaho, representing Northern Lights, Inc., stated they face power shortages and delays are costing money. They feel five or six years is enough time in which to study the project. They urge passage of HB 452.

Mr. Thomas Herzig of Helena, Montana, representing the Montana Chapter of the National Electrical Contractors Association, stated they support HB 452. Mr. Herzig's testimony is attached to the minutes.

OPPONENTS OF HOUSE BILL 452: Ms. Dawn North of Helena, representing the League of Women Voters, stated they are in opposition to HB 452. Ms. North's testimony is attached to the minutes.

Mr. Wallace D. McRae from Forsyth, Montana, representing Rosebud Protective Association and himself, stated they are in opposition to HB 452. He further stated they desire what is correct and fair. He told the Committee that this is an important piece of legislation for citizen groups. A citizens group cannot constantly be litigating these things as corporates are able to do. Mr. McRae told the Committee they have seen their area go from a rural area to an urban area. He does not recommend the passage of this piece of legislation. He feels it would deprive citizens of a judicial review.

Mr. Pat Smith of Helena, Montana, representing the Northern Plains Resource Council, stated they are in opposition to HB 452. Mr. Smith submitted printed testimony from Mr. Bill Mackay, Jr. from Roscoe, Montana, representing the Northern Plains Resource Council. This testimony is attached to the minutes.

Mr. Smith stated they feel that HB 452 is special interest legislation They view Colstrip 3 and 4 as a threat to agricultural operations. They feel that HB 452 is the wrong way to resolve the issue.

Mr. Tom Schneider of Helena, representing himself, stated he is in opposition to HB 452.

Mr. Ted Doney of Helena, representing the Department of Natural Resources, stated they do not support nor oppose the bill, but the state executive branch does not agree that the energy from these plants is needed. They are opposing the construction of Colstrip 3 and 4. He views the bill as a result of frustration with the long delay in building Colstrip 3 and 4. He does feel there are some defects in the Siting Act which should be remedied. He feels that whatever form the bill passes in it will probably go to court. He feels the bill will be challenged. He further stated that this bill has the potential of delaying Colstrip 3 and 4. Mr. Doney stated there are some amendments which should be allowed, and he supports Representative Conroy's amendments. The amendments would probably put the bill in the best shape it can get in he told the Committee.

Mr. Mike Dahlem of Helena, representing the University of Montana, stated they oppose HB 452. They oppose any attempt to weaken the Siting Act or the process of judicial reveiw.

Mr. Alan Sweetbaum from Great Falls, Montana, representing Montana's Power to the People, stated they are concerned with high utility costs. They urge a No Pass on HB 452.

Mr. Tom Berning from Great Falls, Montana, representing Montana's Power to the People, stated they are in opposition to HB 452.

Ms. Gail Stoltz of Helena, Montana, representing Montana Human Resources Development Councils Directors Association, stated they are in opposition to HB 452. Her statement is written on the testimony form and is attached to the minutes.

Representative Conroy made closing remarks to the Committee. He believes the Siting Act was a stoppage act--not a siting act. He does not feel HB 452 is a Montana Power play. He stated that if the bill goes to court, he is willing to take that chance.

There was a question and answer period from the Committee.

Senator Dover asked Tom Berning if they had any answers to the supply of energy. Mr. Berning stated they did not have the answers to this question.

Senator Goodover told the Committee they already have the research done for solar power, but costs would be too high. He stated it is too expensive to provide what the people need at this time.

Senator Blaylock asked Mr. McColly if plants were violating airquality standards. Mr. McColly referred the question to Mr. Ross. Mr. Ross stated that Colstrip 3 and 4 would be monitored.

Senator Regan stated she does not believe the bill defines procedural deficiencies.

Chairman Hazelbaker closed the hearing on House Bill 452.

HOUSE BILL 570: Mr. Dick Disney from the Department of Business Regulation, explained the bill to the Committee for Representative Menahan, sponsor of HB 570. Representative Menahan was unable to be present at the hearing. This bill requires that new motor vehicle dealers be licensed also with the Department of Business Regulation.

PROPONENTS OF HOUSE BILL 570: Mr. Jerry Raunig of Helena, representing the Montana Automobile Dealers Association, stated they support HB 570. Mr. Raunig offered two amendments to HB 570. These proposed amendments are attached to the minutes. The amendments strike \$20 and insert \$15 on page 2, line 12 and page 3, line 2.

There was a question and answer period from the Committee.

Senator Goodover questioned the funding of the bill.

Mr. Disney stated that currently no funding was available. The \$15 goes into the general fund.

Chairman Hazelbaker closed the hearing on House Bill 570.

HOUSE BILL 599: Mr. John Northey from the Legislative Auditor's office explained the bill to the Committee in the absence of Representative Ellerd, sponsor of HB 599. This bill reestablishes for 6 years the office of Investment Commissioner in the State Auditor's office which would otherwise terminate on July 1, 1979, under the "sunset law".

PROPONENTS OF HOUSE BILL 599: Mr. R. G. Tucker from the State Auditor's Office stated they are in support of HB 599.

There were no other proponents or opponents to HB 599 present at the hearing.

There was a question and answer period from the Committee.

Senator Regan wondered if a statement of intent was necessary. Staff Attorney Bob Pyfer stated that a statement of intent would be necessary.

Chairman Hazelbaker asked Mr. Northey to prepare a statement of intent. Mr. Northey told the Committee he would have the statement of intent prepared for their executive session on Tuesday, March 13.

ADJOURN: There being no further business, the meeting adjourned at 12:30 p.m.

SECTION 1. THERE IS A NEW MCA SECTION THAT READS:

BY VALIDATING, RATIFYING, AND APPROVING any certificate of environmental compatibility and public need WHICH-HAS-BEEN issued by the board of natural resources and conservation for SUCH electric generating facilities and associated facilities, that have been the subject of an administrative hearing that commenced prior to January 1, 1979,

AND WHICH IS BEGLARED INVALID BY THE HONTANA SUPREME COURT DUE TO PROCEDURAL DEFICIENCIES IN THE HEARING PROCESS: so that no further

administrative or judicial proceedings before agencies or courts of the state under the Montana Major Facility Siting Act are required FOR PROCEDURAL REASONS prior to commencement of construction of such facilities and associated facilities. It is also the purpose of (this act) to require any applicant who has received a certificate of environmental compatibility and public need issued by the board of natural resources and conservation for electric generating facilities and associated facilities that have been the subject of an administrative hearing the commenced prior to January 1, 1979, to fully comply with the terms and conditions of such certificate AS ISSUED OR AS AMENDED PURSUANT TO THE AMENDMENT PROCEDURES OF THE MONTANA MAJOR FACILITY

Section 2. Section 75-20-202, MCA, is amended to read:
"75-20-202. Exemptions. (1) This chapter does not
apply to a facility over which an agency of the federal government has exclusive jurisdiction.

- (2) A certificate is not required under this chapter for a facility under diligent onsite physical construction or in operation on January 1, 1973.
- (3) (a) Notwithstanding the provisions of this chapter, as amended, and any other state law to the contrary, a certificate of environmental compatibility and public need under the provisions of this chapter; as amended is not required for the construction of electric generating facilities and associated facilities; including transmission

lines, which have been the subject of administrative hearings commenced prior to January 1, 1979, under this chapter:

ANY CERTIFICATE OF ENVIRONMENTAL COMPATIBILITY AND PUBLIC NEED FOR ELECTRIC GENERATING FACILITIES AND ASSOCIATED FACILITIES WHICH HAS BEEN ISSUED BY THE BOARD OF NATURAL RESOURCES AND CONSERVATION FOLLOWING AN ADMINISTRATIVE HEARING WHICH THAT COMMENCED PRIOR TO JANUARY 1, 1979, UNDER THIS CHAPTER, IS AND WHICH MAY BE AFFECTED BY ANY IS BEGLARED BY THE MONTANA SUPREME COURT TO BE INVALID BY REASON OF PROCEDURAL DEFECTS DEFECT IN THE HEARING PROCESS, IS VALIDATED, RATIFIED, AND APPROVED.

- (b) The operation of such electric generating facilities
  and associated facilities, including transmission lines, shall comply
  with applicable state and federal laws, regulations, standards, and
  implementation plans for air and water quality and permits issued
  pursuant to them. THE OPERATION OF SUCH ELECTRIC GENERATING FACILITIES

  AND ASSOCIATED FACILITIES SHALL COMPLY WITH APPLICABLE STATE AND
  FEDERAL LAWS, REGULATIONS, STANDARDS, AND IMPLEMENTATION PLANS FOR
  AIR AND WATER QUALITY AND PERMITS ISSUED PURSUANT TO THEM. THE

  CONSTRUCTION AND OPERATION OF SUCH ELECTRIC GENERATING FACILITIES

  AND ASSOCIATED FACILITIES SHALL COMPLY WITH THE TERMS AND

  CONDITIONS OF SUCH CERTIFICATE AS ORIGINALLY ISSUED OR AS AMENDED PURSUANT
  TO THE AMENDMENT PROCEDURES OF THE MONTANA MAJOR FACILITY SITING ACT.
- (3) (4) The board may adopt reasonable rules establishing exemptions from this chapter for the relocation, reconstruction, or upgrading of a facility that would otherwise be covered by this chapter and that is unlikely to have a significant environmental impact

by reason of length, size, location, available space or right-of way, or construction methods."

Statement Favoring Passage of HB 452 to Allow Construction of Colstrip Units 3 & 4. For Presentation at Hearing to be Held March 12, 1979 in The Capital Building, Helena, Montana.

My name is Robert McColly, and I live at Hinsdale, Montana. I have been a cattle and wheat rancher in that area for the past 33 years. I am Vice President of Valley Electric Cooperative at Glasgow. I am also President of the Central Montana Electric Generation & Transmission Cooperative, a federation of 15 individual rural electric distribution cooperatives with an office at 928 Broadwater Avenue in Billings, and I present this statement on their behalf. Please accept my sincere thanks for allowing us to present our views on HB 452.

Central Montana Electric G & T, which I will hereafter refer to as the G & T, provides electricity to more than 42,000 Montana rural citizens sprawled across approximately 100,000 square miles of Central Montana.

The G & T's job is to find and contract for an adquate, assured, and long term supply of wholesale electric power to take care of the immediate and future needs of its member rural electric utilites. Individually, or collectively as a G & T, these rural electrics have never owned their own generation plants because of the huge amounts of capital needed to provide a plant large enough to produce low cost electricity.

Instead, these rural electrics have always bought their power from the Bureau of Reclamation, the Bonneville Power Administration, and the Montana Power Company, -- and they have always been a reliable source of adequate power. However, recent court decisions, and federal policy changes have converted our power supply picture into a jigsaw puzzle.

#### Central Montana Electric Generation & Transmission Coggerative, Inc.

The Bureau of Reclamation has announced that they have no authority to build any additional power dams, nor can they buy firm power to fulfill the growing needs of our rural electric customers. The Bonneville Power Administration is in a similar situation and has advised all of their customers that delays which have occurred in the construction of regional generating projects will result in energy shortages for all rural electrics in western Montana.

So, we find ourselves in the peculiar situation where the Federal government who has been generating about 65 per cent of our total needs has told us that all increases in electric power must be generated by some one else! This leaves the G & T asking our 35% supplier, The Montana Power Company, to step in and provide generating capacity for 100% of our growth needs.

What are the growth needs of our members? Historically, our member's loads have doubled every ten years. We've heard lots of talk that this will level off, but the load growth forecasts made last year show that the doubling trend has modified only slightly. Irrigation pumps are consuming large amounts of power and energy. Coversions from propone and fuel oil to electricity are coming on every day within all classes of consumers. New homes, and light industry in rural areas are increasingly going all electric. Yellowstone Valley Electric Cooperative, serving rural areas around Billings, is doubling in load every FIVE years!

What does this mean to you and me? It means that every day the rural people of Montana are going to their electric meters and voting for more power.

Even if construction is started today, we are going to have shortages of power in 81, 82 & 83 due to delays already encountered. And when the shortage comes, it will be the family farmer and ranchers and other working class people who will get hurt. The affluent will still have power at whatever price.

STATEMENT FAVORING COLSTRIP UNITS 3 & 4.....

I've heard claims of being denied due process. When the shortage comes, so also will come rationing, and then who will get due process? There is no way that rationing can be totally fair - even for a few.

I like to compare the Colstrip 3 & 4 situation to the Alaska Pipeline. As you no doubt remember, construction of that critically needed facility was held up for a ridiculous number of years by innumerable studies, hearings, reviews, lawsuits, and injunctions, --- until the cost had more than doubled. Finally, -- disgusted with the never ending delays, and alarmed by our growing dependence on foreign oil, Congress passed a law saying build the Alaskan pipeline -- and they did!!!

Legislative authority to construct 3 & 4, will <u>not</u> give Montana Power Company a license to operate these plants below standards. During operations, they must meet all State and Federal emission standards. If they do not, they will be shut down!!

We have abundant coal in Montana. Are we going to blacken the snow and air in our towns, cities, and rural communities by burning coal in our basements to heat our homes? - or are we going to burn coal at Colstrip under controlled conditions, and convert it to electricity -- the cleanest, most useful and versatile fuel known to man?

We've had too many years of hearings and dialogue. Everyone's had their say, and the majority still vote yes -- "Lets build 3 & 4".

I AM RAY WAYRYNEN AND I APPEAR HERE TODAY ON DEHALF OF THE MONTANA STATE COUNCIL OF BUILDING AND CONSTRUCTION TRADES AND IN SUPPORT OF HOUSE BILL 452., IF PASSAGE OF THIS LEGISLATION WILL EXPEDITE THE CONSTRUCTION OF THE COLSTRIP 3 AND 4 GENERATING UNITS THEN WE URGE YOUR PROMPT APPROVAL.

UNDERSTANDABLY WE ARE INTERESTED IN THE HUNDREDS OF CONSTRUCTION JOBS THIS PROJECT WILL CREATE AS WELL AS THE SEVERAL HUNDRED PERMANENT JOBS THAT WILL RESULT FROM THE COMPLETION OF COLSTRIP 3 AND 4.

WE OF THE BUILDING TRADES JOIN ALL MONTANANS IN THEIR DEEP CONCERN FOR OUR ENVIRONMENTAL BUT WE ARE SATISFIED THAT THE ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION LAWS ARE ADEQUATE TO INSURE THAT POLLUTION WILL BE MINIMAL, AND THAT DISTURBED LANDS WILL BE PROPERLY RECLAIMED.

WE ARE ALSO CONCERNED AND ALARMED OVER ANY POSSIBILITY OF ELECTRIC ENERGY SHORTAGE THAT MIGHT RESULT IN FREQUENT POWER OUTAGES. -- LIKE IT OR NOT - - OUR SOCIETY BECOME SO DEPENDENT ON ELECTRICAL ENERGY THAT WE CAN SCARSELY EXIST IN OUR PRESENT LIVING STANDARDS IF OUR ENERGY NEEDS REACH EMERGENCY STATUS. WE ALL KNOW THE FEELING OF HELPLESSNESS AND DESPAIR WHEN A POWER OUTAGE OCCUP EVEN FOR A RELATIVELY SHORT TIME. THE NORMAL ROUTINE OF OUR LIVES ARE COMPLETED DISRUPTED. You have not failed us, we did not fully participate in the system, there have been many articles in the paper on lobbiest activities. some critical, some constructive, but let us never fail to recognize the true value of the lobbying system. 

The League of Nomen Voters of Montana strongly supports fontano's Major Facilities Siting Act. The act gives strong environmental protections and assures that resource development will proceed in an orderly fashion.

We realize there are problems with the Major Macilities Siting Act. These problems are addressed by other bills before this legislature. The 452, however, does not address these problems. Instead it seeks to have the legislature nullify part of a judicial decision before that decision has even been made. This goes against our long established American system of checks and balances of power between the various branches of government.

Passage of MB 452 would set a precedent of exemption. If the legislature interferes with the process this session, the possibility of legislative relief from siting act provisions will overshadow any future decisions made under the act.

We feel HB 452 will create many more problems than it will solve, and we urge you to kill the bill.

Testimony of the Northern Plains Resource Council on HB 452 presented by Bill Mackay, Jr., NPRC Chairman

March 12, 1979--Senate Business & Industry Committee

For the record my name is W. R. Mackay, Jr. I am a rancher from Roscoe, Montana, and I am chairman of the Northern Plains Resource Council, for whom I am speaking today.

From conversations I have had with various signers of this bill, the strongest feeling I got was the urge to end all the delay with the Colstrip project. We share that feeling; NPRC is made up of ranchers and farmers with limited budgets. We would likewise like to see this issue resolved as soon as possible.

I would like to point out, however, that the Colstrip issue is in the State Supreme Court today because the Montana Power Company and the four Pacific Northwest utilities wanted it there. District Court Judge Bennett issued his decision on March 3, 1978. The delay that has taken place since that time is a direct result of the utilities' litigation, not ours. NPRC did not appeal the Bennett decision, the Colstrip utilities did. I submit that if the utilities had taken Judge Bennett's advice and gone back to the Board and reheard those areas in which error was found, the issue may very well have been settled by now.

As much as we appreciate the need for an expeditious decision, we appreciate and respect even more the laws and judicial process of this state. From our point of view, HB 452 is a conspicuous attempt by the Montana Power Company and its associated utilities to by-pass the laws and judicial process of this state by special interest legislation. Although the Montana Supreme Court, at the request of the Colstrip utilities, is expected to rule any day on the Colstrip matter, the utilities have now decided they do not want to wait for the Supreme Court decision that they requested.

Our organization is made up of ranchers and farmers, many of whom live near the proposed power plants or transmission lines. We do view Colstrip 3 and 4 as a threat to our agricultural operations and for that reason have opposed the construction. But we are doing is legally. We are following the rules. We are exercising our legal and constitutional rights as citizens. And now we are here before this committee testifying against a bill that takes our legal rights away. We do not think it's right. We've worked hard, paid our dues, and are waiting for a decision from the Supreme Court. We don't know if the decision is going to be for or against us. Judge Bennett, in his decision, said that we were right. HB 452 says, in

Mackay Testimony House Bill 452 Page two

effect, that neither we, nor the citizens of Montana, are entitled to a decision from the Montana Supreme Court. The net result is that no one will ever know if Judge Bennett was right or wrong. Our right to judicial review will be revoked.

In our opinion, the purpose of this hearing is not to debate the merits or demerits of Colstrip 3 and 4; instead, our purpose is to explain the reasons we believe HB 452 is the wrong way to resolve the issue. In addition to making a mockery of the Major Facility Siting Act, the bill establishes a dangerous precedent for Montana. Should this bill pass, it will open the door for every industrial concern that wants to build large industrial facilities in Montana to walk into the Legislature and also request an exemption from Montana's laws and judicial system.

With the Bonneville Power Administration and the Pacific North-west states pushing hard for federal legislation to make Montana the electricity producer for their region, we feel it would be disasterous for Montana to establish a precedent that certain coal-fired power plants receive preferential treatment under the law. A recent BPA publication\*\* identified the need for approximately 210,000 megawatts of electricity from Montana and Wyoming coal fields by the year 2020. That is the equivalent of 150 Colstrip Units 3 and 4. How many of these utilities will be requesting preferential treatment from the Siting Act or the judicial process? Are we to convene in Helena every two years to decide which power plants to grant preferential treatment to? How does one decide which ones should get preferential treatment and which ones should not?

We also point out that the reason Colstrip 3 and 4 are not under construction is not because of the lawsuit before the Montana Supreme Court, but because the power plants cannot meet the Class 1 air quality standards in the area. Passage of HB 452 does not insure immediate construction. Construction of the plants cannot begin until the federal air quality issue is settled.

In conclusion, we view HB 452 as a slap in the face to those who believe in the laws and judicial process that regulate development. Its effect would be to evade and negate the judicial review of the Colstrip project. It establishes a dangerous precedent for the future, and we fear it may represent a return to the days of Montana's past when the large corporate interests controlled the state. For these reasons we recommend that the committee give this bill a "do not pass."

Dear Senator Hazelbaker and Committee Members,

Common Cause/Montana, a citizens' lobby for open and accountable government has no official position on the construction of Colstrip Generating Units 3 and 4. We do try to encourage, however, general standards of legislative conduct which maximize public information and participation and which minimize abilities of certain special interests to dominate the legislative processes.

It is this issue which needs to be addressed when considering House Bill 452. In simple terms, House Bill 452 grants special privileges to one large and politically powerful corporation. It directly interferes with the Montana Major Facility Siting Act solely for the purpose of benefiting the Montana Power Company, a utility not unknown for its political dominance in certain state issues.

As this legislation was written to shortcircuit the Facility Siting Act to benefit one major corporation, it would be difficult to find a clearer and more definitive piece of special interest legislation. We urge you to consider House Bill 452 in this light and to give it the scrutiny it deserves.
