MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE JOINT APPROPRIATIONS SUBCOMMITTEE ON NATURAL RESOURCES
January 15, 1981

The meeting was called to order by CHAIRMAN STOBIE. Roll call was taken with all members but SENATOR STIMATZ present.

BOB ROBINSON, Fiscal Analyst, presented the handouts provided by the Department of Business Regulation. One was the Functional Organizational Chart (EXHIBIT A), also a chart showing the FTE's from the year 1975 through 1981 (EXHIBIT B). The comparison of the Legislative Fiscal Analyst and Executive Budgets for this Department was also distributed to the subcommittee (EXHIBIT C).

GARY BUCHANAN, Acting Director of the Business Regulation Department gave an overview of their budget request (EXHIBIT D) after introducting his staff, Isabelle Pistelak, Administrator of Centralized Services Division, Dick Disney, Administrator of Consumer Protection Division, Les Alke, Administrator of the Financial Division, and Bill Ross, Administrator of Milk Control. He drew attention to the reorganizational plan and their withdrawal of a request of two new FTE's in the amount of \$26,000.00 in 1982 and \$28,000.00 in 1983. He then referred to each Division in part.

Discussion was held and SENATOR BOYLAN suggested that consolidation with Consumer Council might be looked into.

SENATOR SMITH asked Mr. BUCHANAN if these Departments could live within their budget requests. Mr. Buchanan stated that they could and that they could fulfill the duties mandated by state law.

MRS. PISTEIAK presented CENTRALIZED SERVICE program.

Under WEIGHTS AND MEASURES the increases in wages were discussed as they feel they are losing people because of low salaries. That a Grade 10 is making about \$11,911.00 per year, highest paid Grade 11 is \$13,476.00 per year.

Under Supplies, Materials and Communciations the executive budget is considerably higher than LFA. It was explained that the Executive budget had included the \$5,000 for training. It was also stated that they still have a vacancy in Great Falls. They cannot afford to hire more people at this time but also cannot live up to the law if they cannot afford to put their people on the road. It was suggested by SENATOR SMITH that 12% inflation factor may not be enough for gasoline and supplies.

They reverted \$1,985,57 last year but this may have been due to one man being off work for surgery.

FINANCIAL DIVISION. In regards to the bank examiners, all fees revert to the General Fund. That there is a Bill up to increase the cost of examining to the banks. Bank Examiners generate about \$123,000.00 and spend approximately \$350,000.00 to \$400,000.00.

LES ALKE, Administrator presented the FINANCIAL DIVISION (EXHIBIT C, pg. 3) and (EXHIBIT E).

Mr. ALKE stated that the turnover is a problem as they have only retained three out of the fifteen examiners they had in Electronic data processing is progressing so rapidly their examiners are required to go to school. Since 1973 they have never had a year without a reversion and never asked Banks do not mind paying fees for examination for a supplemental. but will not go along with the fees going into the general fund. It was also brought out that frequent examination is done by the Federal government. The collection for the General Fund from Bank Examiners the first half of the year in 1980 was \$309,994.00. Bank Examiners start at Grade 12 and go on to Grade 13, 14 and 15. The top payed examiner is \$20,070.00. This department can move people from grade to grade where some state agencies can only move steps.

Under OTHER EXPENSES the difference between the LFA and Executive Budget is \$25 to \$35 a day for training.

MILK CONTROL was presented by Bill Ross. He referred to handout (EXHIBIT F AND G). He stated he was requesting an increase in travel for 1982 and 1983. Requesting \$8,986.20 for 1982 and \$9,611.20 for 1983. The reason being that the travel expenses for 1980 was not an accurate base for 1982 and 1983 in that they had one auditor sick and two missing from the staff for 2.75 months.

EXHIBIT F is a budget request for milk testing equipment totaling \$1,169.00

In reference to the butterfat testing (EXHIBIT H), it was remarked that this test was done by this division about four times a year and should be tested about once a month.

Milk Control collected in fees in 1980, the amount of \$249,266.18 which is 4 cents per 100 weight from the producer, 8 cents auditing, and 1 cent per 100 weight butterfat testing.

SENATOR BOYLAN was excused to go to another meeting.

CONSUMER AFFAIRS DIVISION presented a handout (EXHIBIT I) showing the total number of complaints that came through their office in 1979 and 1980. Dick Disney, Administrator of this department stated that they were short two staff members and they will be rehired. This department hired an investigator that investigates private colleges in state and out of state schools that solicit Montana students. These colleges must get a license.

Soliciting agents must also have a license. When a school closes, the student does get his or her money back as these schools must be bonded for this purpose.


The Reorganization Bill was discussed.

#### BUDGET REQUEST OVERVIEW

We will address "operations" and "equipment" during this presentation due to the fact salaries will be addressed by the Legislature in a "Pay Bill" at a later date.

As we understand it, the "salaries" will be projected by the computer based upon each employees Grade and Step and the adjustments to our budget request will be made at that time..

#### CENTRALIZED SERVICES

The Committee is requested to approve the Executive recommendations for Centralized Services. Included in the FY 82 operational request is a figure of \$6,500 to cover the Departments audit costs. Total Operations: \$27,245 FY 82 and \$22,885 FY 83.

Due to the ongoing reorganization of the Department of Business Regulation, the Department of Community Affairs, and the Department of Professional & Occupational Licensing into one Department - namely - the Department of Commerce -, it might be well to wait until a later date to consider funding for this program.

#### WEIGHTS & MEASURES

In order to comply with the Governor's wishes, this program has chosen to relinquish its request for an Investigator. The total request for the Investigator is reflected in the Executive Recommendation - \$26,000 FY 82 and \$28,000 FY 83.

We do <u>not</u> want to imply that the position is not vitally needed, but after careful review of the total program it was felt that we could not cut into current level operations and still have an effective program operation.

We do however, support the approved modification for training Weights & Measures Personnel.

With these adjustments we are requesting the following:

Operations \$98,552 FY 82 and \$111,857 in FY 83.

Equipment: We are requesting \$39,750 in FY 82 which is \$5,000 over the Executive recommendation due to the fact that a truck purchased this year was under estimated in this amount. We feel this increase is justified based on current history.

#### FINANCIAL DIVISION

We support the Executive Budget with the following exception:

Increase Operations in FY 82 to \$136,854 and to \$156,053 in FY 83 to provide training for Examiners.

#### MILK CONTROL (Earmarked Revenue)

Again, we support the Executive recommendations with the following adjustment to travel. (See attachment which will be handed out to the Committee).

We are requesting an additional \$9,014 in FY 82 and \$9,611 in FY 83 24,446 bringing our Operational request up to \$84,518 in FY 82 and \$94,201 in FY 83, to allow funding for a motor pool car for the Compliance Officer. This would allow he/she to collect more than double the amount of samples that he is presently obtaining.

It would appear that the request for Equipment was inadvertently omitted from the Executive Budget. This figure should be \$1,169 for each year of the biennium. (See attached Form B - 3100).

#### CONSUMER AFFAIRS

Again, in order to comply with the Governor's wishes, this program has chosen to relinquish its request for an Investigator. The total request for the Investigator is reflected in the Executive Recommendations - \$24,467 FY 82 and \$24,447 in FY 83.

We do <u>not</u> want to imply that the position is not vitally needed but after careful review of the total program it was felt that we could not cut into current level operations and still have an effective program operation.

This Committee is requested to approve the Executive Operating recommendation of \$18,473 in FY 82 and \$20,174 in FY 83.

It appears that the funding source and expenditures have been eliminated from the LFA figures. It is not "Safe" to assume that the Auto Manufacturing activity will be moved to the Department of Justice at this time.

#### MILK CONTROL DIVISION

Budget Amendment for Travel in FY 1982 and FY 1983.

The total additional money requested for travel by the Milk Control Division is \$9.014.32 for FY 1982 and \$9,611.21 for FY 1983.

The 1980 travel history is not an accurate base for updating future travel costs in FY 1982 and FY 1983 budget. The Milk Control Division had three auditor positions vacant for an average of 2.75 months in 1980. The cost to keep three auditors in a travel status for those 2.75 months is \$4,751.82 for FY 1982 and \$4,864.33 for FY 1983.

Our Milk Testing Program needs an additional \$4,262.50 in Travel for FY 1982 and \$4,746.88 in FY 1983.

The calculations for FY 1982 were determined as follows:

19,375 miles X = \$0.22 per mile = \$4,262.50

The calculations for FY 1983 were determined as follows:

19,375 miles X \$0.245 per mile = \$4,746.88

Our Compliance Officer currently travels to an area in a State vehicle, then he rides out to each farm with the farm to plant bulk milk tank driver.

By using a State vehicle to drive to each farm the Compliance Officer would incur an additional 19,375 miles, but he would more than double the number of samples obtained.

NOTE: Per Diem costs were estimated by using a current average cost per week and inflating those costs fifteen percent (15%) for FY 1982 and FY 1983.

Mileage costs were estimated by using the current cost of vehicle actually used and inflating those costs by \$0.025 per mile per year.

Butterfat Testing Program

Department of <u>Business Regulation</u> <u>Department of Livestock</u>

Submitted by Carolyn Doering

Senate Bill 373, passed by the 45th Legislative Session ... "requires the testing of milk by the Department of Business Regulation to determine the value of raw milk." In other words, the Milk Control Board was given authority to hire 3 FTE to implement a program whereby the butterfat content in raw milk supplied by a producer is tested and compared to the butterfat test run by the processing plant - thus assuring the producer he is being paid fairly based on the processing plant butterfat test. There have been cases where there has been a discrepancy and a dollar amount correction made. The Department was also authorized to levy an assessment on licensed producers to administer this program. The assessment was set at 2¢ per hundredweight on the total volume of milk sold by the producer.

The Department implemented the program on July 1, 1977. Three positions were authorized. (Two of which remained vacant (milk sampler, lab tech.) and were deleted via the hiring freeze by the 46th Legislature.) A \$16,000 piece of equipment for testing milk was purchased and placed in the milk laboratory in Bozeman where employees of the Milk and Egg Bureau, Department of Livestock run the butterfat tests and log results for the Milk Control Board. The laboratory is reimbursed monthly on the number of tests processed (estimate of 20¢ per test).

#### Problem:

The process the Department of Business Regulation is going through for testing butterfat content is a direct duplication of the testing of butterfat content by the Department of Livestock. Below are noted some comparisons:

Business Regulation employs 1 milk sampler.
 Livestock employs 5 milk samplers.

Each milk producer is sampled every 6 weeks by Livestock - Business Regulation averages 4 - 5 weeks. Each department sends samples to the laboratory an average of twice a week. The lab spends approximately 2 to 3 hours per week on samples from Business Regulation.

- 2. It is not unusual to have milk samplers from Livestock and Business Regulation at a given dairy on the same day or 2 to 3 days apart.
- 3. Samples are taken oftentimes from the same tank, on the same day, by each department.
- 4. Livestocks test are on a 36 hour turnaround due to the bacteria tests also being run on each sample.

Business Regulations tests are sometimes 4 - 5 days due to the time of the week samples are sent to the lab.

During FY 79 3,380 samples were tested for Business Regulation.
 3,566 samples were tested for Livestock.

#### 6. Butterfat reports:

Business Regulation -

Butterfat content is calculated - a copy of the report goes to Milk Control each week. They, in turn, compare their report to that of the processing plant whose report is the basis for payment to the producer.

Livestock -

Butterfat content is calculated per statute. A report is sent each week to the Milk and Egg Bureau and to the producer whose milk was sampled.

The processing plant is required to hold butterfat samples for 14 days - subject to retest by the Department of Livestock.

7. Dairy Herd Inc. which is a voluntary program to which producers may belong, also has people testing individual cows for butterfat. The producers pay Business Regulation per sample.

#### Recommendation:

Should the Milk Control Board continue to exist after the next session -

Eliminate the milk sampling position from Business Regulation. Employees of the livestock laboratory would continue butterfat testing on samples taken during routine work of the Department of Livestock. Results would be sent weekly to Milk Control Board as they are now, where they would continue monitoring butterfat content for producers. Some reimbursement should go to the lab for time involved in preparing a separate report for the Milk Control Board. Milk Control would not be charged for running the actual test. Assessment to the producer could possibly be lowered.

Should the Milk Control Board go down the tubes during the next session -

The Department of Livestock will continue monitoring butterfat content as specified in their law. Since results go to the Milk and Egg Bureau and producer on a weekly basis, the producer has every opportunity to discover any discrepacy between the official state test and that test upon which he was paid.

Note the attached sections (in some instances partial sections) from the statutes pertaining to milk under the Department of Livestock. It seems to me Livestock covers it all pretty well.

It is possible the Milk and Egg Bureau could end up being a referee between the producer and processor if the Milk Control Board goes under but their law gives them the authority to impose penalties under Title 81-22-417. Purchase of the Milk Testing equipment by the Department of Livestock could also be a consideration. Butterfat testing can be accomplished by the previous method used however the time involved in the test is reduced from 1/2 hour to approximately 1 1/2 minutes per test.

#### Department of Livestock Statutes:

81-22-302 - A person purchasing or sampling milk or cream for manufacture, sale or shipment and paying for the milk or cream on the basis of the <u>butterfat</u>, protein, solids, or other compound components contained in the milk or cream as determined by <u>official test</u>, when receiving the milk or cream, shall take a sample of the milk or cream.

Samples taken ... shall show:

Person from whom the purchase or sample taken Weight Results of Analysis Date of Sampling Amount Paid

81-22-302(2) - All samples on which payment for butterfat ... is based shall be kept and suitably preserved by the purchaser for 14 days - ... subject to retest by the department.

81-22-417 - Penalty for offering to manufacture, sell or expose for sale or exchange ... commodity containing less butterfat or other ingredients than required by this chapter.

81-22-418 - Posting prices of butterfat required.

81-22-503 - Records made available to department. Persons buying milk or cream on basis of butterfat ... shall make available to the department (upon request) records showing:

Amount Sold or Purchased Price Per Pound Amount Paid Sampling Period Etc.

81-22-602 - Deceit in grade, measure or test of milk - ... or make any false or inaccurate statement or otherwide deceive or defraud a producer or other person concerning the weight, measure, butterfat content, or other component content of milk or cream. Department may revoke license (misdemeanor).
