MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE JOINT APPROPRIATIONS SUB-COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION January 23, 1981

The Executive Session meeting was called to order by Chairman Donaldson at 8:05 a.m. on Friday, January 23, 1981, in room 104, Capitol Bldg., Helena, Montana.

All members were present including Fiscal Analyst, BRUCE SHIVELY.

The first item discussed was the Historical Society modifications. BRUCE SHIVELY gave a briefing on the Museum upgrade. The LFA does not recommend this modification. TOM CROSSER gave the budget office's recommendation.

DR. BOB ARCHIBALD gave the Historical Society's priority as being the museum and magazine.

Roll call was taken, and a motion passed with two Representatives opposing; REP. THOFT and REP. BENGTSON.

TOM CROSSER discussed the Microfiling Program. Neither the LFA nor the executive budget office are recommending this program.

REP. BENGTSON moved to accept both recommendations and not approve the funding for the Microfilming request.
MOTION PASSED UNANIMOUSLY.

Discussion was held regarding the heritage program as revised. (EXHIBIT A) cutbacks were made and the new request is for \$127,973 for the biennium.

SENATOR HAFFEY moved that the committee fund (2) two positions, a Curator and a Cataloguer for the museum. The cost of this modification by expenditure catagory is:

The total cost of this modification will be funded by the general fund.

BRUCE SHIVELY gave a handout with regards to the Historical Society's current level funding. (EXHIBIT B) MR. SHIVELY discussed the LFA'S recommendation in comparison to the Budget

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Office's recommendation. TOM CROSSER also noted that his recommendations include costs within the contracted services.

The first item is the Administration Program. TOM CROSSER explained that the Budget Office's recommendation has audit costs included in the Contracted Services amounting to \$2,020 for FY 82 and \$6,104 for FY 83. This is not included in the LFA recommendation. This would change the LFA's recommendation for contracted services to \$24,228 for FY 82 and \$30,089 for FY 83. It was decided to postpone this item.

The second item is the Library Program. BRUCE SHIVELY stated that the LFA recommendation does not include the 9% salary increase.

Discussion was held.

REP. BENGTSON moved that the committee accept the executive recommendation for the Library Program for the amount of \$110,315 for FY 82 and \$111,393 for FY 83. MOTION PASSED UNANIMOUSLY.

Discussion was held regarding the Wall Niche funding for \$250.00.

REPRESENTATIVE THOFT moved that the Historical Society absorb the \$250. for the WallNiche project. MOTION PASSED UNANIMOUSLY.

The third item is the Museum Program. TOM CROSSER discussed the Budget Office's recommendation and the differences in comparison to the LFA's recommendation. He allowed an exception was for supplies and Materials. BRUCE SHIVELY didn't feel that it was necessary and therefore did not include it. REP. BENGTSON moved that the committee accept the LFA'S recommendation for the Museum Program for \$104,102 for FY 82 and \$104,608 for FY 83. MOTION PASSED UNANIMOUSLY.

The fourth item discussed is the Magazine Program.

SENATOR HAFFEY moved to accept the LFA'S recommendation for the Magazine Program for \$158,809 for FY 82 and \$166,528 for FY 83. MOTION PASSED UNANIMOUSLY.

The fifth item is the Merchandising Program. BRUCE SHIVELY pointed out that there is a difference in contracted services. TOM CROSSER explained that it is because he has added in audit costs of \$1,222 for FY 82 and \$3,649 for FY 83. The LFA does not have a recommendation for equipment.

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LINDA GAMBLE, Business Manager for the Historical Society, mentioned that neither recommendation includes \$20,000 the transfer authority which she felt should be included in the appropriations, in order to facilitate the transfer of \$20,000 earmarked revenue from the Merchandising Program to the Museum Program.

SENATOR NELSON moved that the committee accept the LFA recommendation for the Merchandising Program for \$285,617 for FY 82, which includes \$20,000 for transfer authority and \$291,919 for FY 83, which includes \$20,000 for transfer authority. MOTION PASSED UNANIMOUSLY.

The sixth item discussed is the Historic Sites. TOM CROSSER explained how he developed the cost for travel.

CHAIRMAN DONALDSON requested that the LFA and Budget Office get together to arrive with travel cost and look at it again.

REP. BENGTSON moved to accept the LFA's recommendation for the Historic Sites with the exception of travel costs and audit costs added on. MOTION PASSED UNANIMOUSLY.

The seventh item is the Archives Program. BRUCE SHIVELY gave the LFA's recommendation. TOM CROSSER stated that the exception he made was for equipment.

REP. BENGTSON moved that the committee accept the Executive recommendation for \$139,177 for FY 82 and \$140,058 for FY 83 for the Archives Program. MOTION PASSED UNANIMOUSLY. End of Historical Society.

BRUCE SHIVELY gave a handout in regards to the School for the Deaf and Blind. (EXHIBIT C) He gave the LFA recommendation for the current level funding. The difference with the contracted services is the audit cost. The first item discussed is the Administration Program. REP. BENGTSON moved that the committee accept the LFA recommendation for the Administration program for \$171,291 for FY 82 and \$172,697 for FY 83 and audit costs to be added to that. MOTION PASSED UNANIMOUSLY.

The second item is for General Services. BRUCE SHIVELY explained the differences between the LFA and the Budget Office's recommendation for supplies and material.

SENATOR JACOBSON moved that the committee accept the Executive Budget's recommendation for the General Services for \$219,528

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for FY 82 and \$233,517 FY 83 with an adjustment to be made for utilities. MOTION PASSED UNANIMOUSLY.

The third item discussed is Student Services. The difference between the LFA and the Executive is that the LFA used a 3% vacany savings and the Executive does not include that.

BOB DEMMING requested that a line item be applied to travel so that there would be a reversion clause.

REP. BENGTSON moved that the committee accept the executive budget recommendation with a line item on travel.

REP. BENGTSON WITHDREW HER MOTION.

REP. THOFT moved that the committee accepts the LFA recommendation and simply change to the Executive Recommendation of 41,400 in FY 82 and 47,600 in FY 83 and simply change the travel and not line item it.

SENATOR JACOBSON, made a substitute motion that the executive recommendation for supplies and materials be moved into the LFA's recommendation. MOTION PASSED WITH REP. THOFT opposing. Meeting recessed at 11:30

Meeting reconvened at 1:05 in Room 104. The fourth program is Education. Discussion was held on the catch up of the teacher's salaries to the Great Falls school teacher's salaries.

REP. BENGTON asked who the bargaining unit is for the School for the Deaf and Blind teachers.

BOB DEMMING replied that the Montana Federation of Teacher's is the bargaining unit for the teachers at the school for the Deaf and Blind and the Montana Education Association is the bargaining unit for the Great Falls teachers.

Both recommendations were given. (EXHIBIT D) Discussion was held.

REP. BENGTSON moved that the committee accept the LFA recommendation for the biennium for the Education Program.

SENATOR HAFFEY amended the motion to use the executive's recommendation for the travel. MOTION PASSED with REP. THOFT OPPOSING.

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SENATOR HAFFEY also AMENDED the motion to use the executive's recommendation for the equipment. MOTION DEFEATED with SENATOR HAFFEY affirmative.

BOB DEMMING requested funding for two items. The TITLE VI-C Program and the Vocational Education Program. The TITLE VI-C program would cost \$26,176 per year to operate.

REP. BENGTSON moved that the committee appropriate from the General Funds for the TITLE VI-C program \$26,176 per year for the Biennium and \$80,000 from Federal Funds. MOTION PASSED UNANIMOUSLY.

Discussion was held in regard to the Vocational Education Program. The request is for two FTE'S. This would be \$31,756 for FY 82 and \$31,911 for FY 83.

REP. BENGTSON moved to disallow this request for funding for the Vocational Education program. MOTION DEFEATED with two, REP. BENGTSON and REP. THOFT affirmative.

SENATOR NELSON moved that the committee allow funding for the Vocational Education Program. MOTION PASSED with two, REP. BENGTSON and REP. THOFT opposing.

Meeting adjourned at 2:15 p.m.

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### GOVERNOR'S HERITAGE PROJECT

The Society proposes to develop four projects which will serve to enhance a statewide awareness of Montana's heritage through art and history. The Society's enabling legislation empowers it "to promote the study of Montana history by lectures and publications; to generally foster and encourage the fine arts and cultural activities in Montana; to receive for and on behalf of the State by donation or otherwise, art objects of any kind and description and to exhibit and circulate such objects in Montana and elsewhere". To accomplish this objective, the Society proposes the following program:

- l. A traveling exhibition of mixed media art which will consist of the work of living Montana artists. All working artists will be invited to submit work. Pieces to be included in the exhibition will be selected by jurors. The exhibition will travel statewide to any institution able to provide adequate public space and security. One exhibition will be produced each year of the biennium. These exhibitions will be the only instances of "all Montana art exhibitions" and they will give Montana's artists badly needed public exposure and will give citizens an opportunity to appreciate the finest Montana can offer. Each year one piece from the exhibition will be given a "Governor's Purchase Award" and will be added to the State art collection.
- 2. The Society proposes to prepare "Jack Daw" packets on topics such as exploration, the fur trade, homesteading, ranching, mining, lumbering and transportation for use as a curriculum supplement in junior high schools. These packets will contain

facsimilies of documents, photographs, drawings and explanatory material pertinent to each topic. These materials will satisfy a need for teaching materials on Montana social studies and will make the Society's resources, which are unique, substantial and available no where else, available to schools. These resources have been collected and preserved so that they can be used in such an educational manner.

- Roadside History Booklet This booklet will satisfy a need identified by both the Montana Historical Society and the Travel Promotion Unit. History, for many, happened in school or in books. Seldom do we really relate events to places which we see. We propose to develop a booklet which will relate the history of our state to places which we see. The Roadside History will contain notes on historical events and historic sites encountered along major and secondary Montana highways. Where possible, the booklet will also contain photographs or illustrations of significant events which occurred in the area described. The Travel Promotion Unit has surprising statistics gathered in a recent survey which suggest that potential tourists do not think of Montana as having significant historical or cultural attractions. This booklet will enhance our own appreciation of our state and will encourage exploration of it and it also will serve as a powerful tool for attracting outside visitors and encouraging them to stay and explore.
- 4. Oral history complements the written records which the Society has long collected and preserved. The Society, and many

other organizations across the state, have begun projects to record memories on tape. The Society and the Montana Oral History Association conducted a survey one year ago to identify oral history projects in Montana. We propose to use the Society oral history collections, and those from other areas, as the basis for a series of radio public service spots and a booklet. The booklet and the broadcasts, which the Inter-Mountain Network will carry, will use the personal memories of Montanans to provide information on the lives and experiences of people which have contributed to the making of Montana. The booklet and broadcasts will also stimulate an interest in, and an awareness for, the need to preserve memories as a personal and integral part of our heritage.
