#### MINUTES OF THE MEETING STATE ADMINISTRATION COMMITTEE MONTANA STATE SENATE

#### February 18, 1981

The thirtieth meeting of the Senate State Administration Committee was called to order by Senator Pete Story, Chairman, on the above date, in room 442 of the State Capitol Building at 10 a.m.

ROLL CALL: All members were present except Senator Kolstad.

#### CONSIDERATION OF SENATE BILL NO. 419:

AN ACT TO PROVIDE FOR APPOINTMENT BY THE SUPREME COURT OF A CHIEF JUDGE IN EACH MULTIJUDGE DISTRICT: TO REQUIRE A CHIEF JUDGE TO DIRECT THE OPERATIONS OF THE DISTRICT: AND TO PROVIDE AN INCREASED ANNUAL SALARY FOR A CHIEF JUDGE.

Senator Chet Blaylock sponsored this bill and said it applies to all multi-judge judicial districts. This bill will help the whole state, and he pointed out that salaries have been increased so that Montana could attract judges. He enclosed an amendment, explained it, and told the committee this will make chief administrative judges answerable to the state of Montana.

<u>PROPONENTS</u>: Mike Abley, from the Supreme Court, stated the chief judge can act with statutory authority with this bill.

Margaret Davis, League of Women Voters, supported and stated they are for better services throughout the state of Montana.

#### **OPPONENTS:** None.

Questions: Sen. Ryan asked about the elected people being assigned by the Supreme Court. Sen. Blaylock said the Supreme Court will have to handle these problems.

Senator Ryan fears the amendment gives laissez-faire to hired administrators to do the work for the judges who are receiving a higher salary.

Mike Abley said there may be additional staffing and that the interest was not to let the hired staff abuse it.

Sen. Blaylock said they do have to report to the chief judge the power to appoint someone to be a good administrative judge. Senator Story stated it is a question of philosophy; Sen. Blaylock agreed.

Sen. Towe asked about the necessity of departments. Mr. Abley commented that it depends more on the judge than the department. Sen. Towe defined department for the committee.

Sen. Hammond asked if the reorganization would provide more pressure to get the job done. Sen. Blaylock said yes, citing complaints as before in his opening.

Sen. Hammond asked if the bill would give the Supreme Court the authority to appoint someone. The answer was yes; the chief justice must report the status of that multi-judicial district.

Sen. Towe asked about an assumption of the bill that the appointment cannot be revoked, that it would be lifetime. Sen. Blaylock said the chief judge could change the appoint-ment; but Sen. Story pointed out the bill does not state this.

There was some further discussion, and the hearing was closed.

#### CONSIDERATION OF SENATE BILL 464:

AN ACT TO PROVIDE FOR THE INCLUSION OF CANDIDATE INFORMATION IN THE VOTER INFORMATION PAMPHLET REGARDING BALLOT ISSUES.

Sen. Dorothy Eck, sponsor, stated this is a voter-service bill, providing for the voters an information pamphlet that the secretary of state prepares and has sent to every registered voter and also includes information on the candidates. She enclosed a pamphlet "Voters and Candidates". This bill will provide for those voters who wait till the last minute to pay attention to the election, she stated, and these pamphlets will be available even at the polls. She said there is a question of the cost, estimates being about \$60,000, which is double the cost from last year but doubles the interest received from the public. She pointed out page 2, section 3 and 4 indicating that the funding in these section will take care of the cost.

**PROPONENTS:** Alan Robertson stated the intent was to be only for the general election, not the primary.

Margaret Davis, LWV, stated it takes over their duties. She asked the committee to replace educational background with party affiliation and also not to specify how much space the candidate is entitled. Page 3 February 18, 1981 Minutes of the State Administration Committee

Proponent Mike O'Malley, Common Cause; Carole Brass, CLC, supported the bill.

**OPPONENTS:** None.

Questions from the committee: Sen. Towe asked Sen. Eck about the cost and she replied they had asked for a fiscal note but had not yet received it. Mr. Robertson answered they expect it to be about \$125,000.

Sen. Eck closed by saying it is a good bipartisan function.

#### CONSIDERATION OF SENATE BILL 455:

AN ACT REQUIRING NOTIFICATON OF NONPROFIT CORPORATIONS OF EXPIRATION OF THEIR CORPORATE EXISTENCE; PROVIDING FOR THE REINSTATEMENT OF EXPIRED NONPROFIT CORPORATIONS; AND PROVIDING EFFECTIVE DATE.

Senator Jan Johnson, Missoula, sponsored the bill which requires the secretary of state to notify non-profit corporations of expiration of corporate existence.

<u>PROPONENTS:</u> Alan Robertson gave examples of corporations and pointed out that notice and method of becoming reinstated are given to profit organizations, so non profit should also be entitled to it. He enclosed an amendment. He also stated that the cost could be cut by dropping the certified or registered letter.

**OPPONENTS:** None.

In closing Sen. Johnson submitted an amendment.

ACTION ON SENATE BILL 455: Sen. Hafferman moved the bill DO PASS, AS AMENDED; motion carried with Sen. Ryan voting No.

#### CONSIDERATION OF SENATE BILL 424:

AN ACT TO PROVIDE FOR SENATE CONFIRMATION OF MEMBERS OF THE BOARDS OF COUNTY PRINTING, DENTISTRY, OSTEOPATHIC PHYSICIANS, PODIATRY EXAMINERS, PHARMACISTS, NURSING, NURSING HOME ADMINISTRATORS, OPTOMETRISTS, CHIROPRACTORS, RADIOLOGIC TECHNOLOGISTS, SPEECH PATHOLOGISTS AND AUDIOLOGISTS, HEARING AID DISPENSERS, PSYCHO-LOGISTS, VETERINARIANS, BARBERS, COSMETOLOGISTS, MASSAGE THERAPISTS, PHYSICAL THERAPY EXAMINERS... PROPONENTS: Scott Seacatt, Legislative Audit Committee, representing the sponsor, Rep. Himsl, stated this bill would add credibility to the board appointments; submitted an enclosure.

OPPONENTS: None.

Questions from the committee consisted of few regarding the board appointments.

ACTION ON SENATE BILL 424: Sen. Towe moved that it DO PASS; discussion; roll call vote resulting in passing the bill.

ACTION ON SENATE BILL 419: Sen. Hafferman moved it DO PASS, AS AMENDED; majority passed with a negative vote by Sen. Ryan. It was recalled and revoted on again the next day. Chairman Story gave the schedule for the remaining days this week to meet transmittal deadline, Feb. 20, for bills to be out of committee.

Strike: subsections (a) through (e) in their entirety

Insert: "(a) in cooperation with the other district court judges, prepare and submit budgets for operation of the district court to the appropriate public officials;

(b) equalize the workload of all district court judges within the judicial district;

(c) establish appropriate schedules and administrative rules to insure prompt and efficient servicing of all judicial business in the district;

(d) employ and assign staff and secretarial personnel where appropriate;

(e) perform such miscellaneous administrative duties as necessary or advisible in misdiscretion to insure a unitary and functioning district court operation in the judicial district; and

(f) submit an annual report to the supreme court on or before March 1 of each year covering the status and condition of the district court in the judicial district, its needs, and problem areas."

#### OFFICE OF THE LEGISLATIVE AUDITOR SUNSET POSITION PAPER #1

#### RE: SENATE CONFIRMATION OF BOARD APPOINTMENTS

Constitutional or statutory provisions in many states require appointments to public office or to certain designated offices to be approved or confirmed by some body other than the appointing power. The Montana constitution specifically provides in Article 6, section 8(2):

"The Governor shall appoint, subject to confirmation by the Senate, all officers provided for in this constitution or by law, whose appointment or election is not otherwise provided for."

Some of the statutes creating Montana's licensing, regulatory, and advisory boards specifically provide for Senate confirmation of all the appointees. However, the majority of appointments are not subject to Senate confirmation, as is indicated in Appendix A.

The confirmation process allows a public hearing and exposure of the individual appointee to the general public for review of qualifications. While the confirmation process has been determined not to be a usurpation of the executive power to appoint, it does provide a veto power in the legislature as a check on gubernatorial appointments. (63 Am. Jur. 2nd, public officers and employees, sections 110-113.)

#### ISSUE:

Should all appointments to state licensing, regulatory, and advisory boards be subject to Senate confirmation?
