The meeting of the Business and Industry Committee was called to order at 1:30 p.m. by REP. JAY FABREGA, CHAIRMAN, on Wednesday, June 23, 1982 in the Capitol Building, Helena, Montana.

ROLL CALL was taken and all members were present except for REP. AARON ANDREASON who was excused.

GREG PETESCH from the Legislative Council distributed a BILL SUMMARY for SENATE BILL 1. (EXHIBIT A)

SENATOR JEAN TURNAGE introduced SENATE BILL 1 (EXHIBIT B) He pointed out on page four that they had stricken "shall" and inserted "may".

PROPONENTS

SENATOR ALLEN KOLSTAD proposed an amendment to Senate Bill 1 to read as follows: Page 5, following line 4 and lettered "D" to read "Able bodied persons admitted into the state prison as an adult offender shall be required to perform work provided for by the Department of Institutions".

CURT CHISHOLM, Deputy Director of the Department of Institutions suggested an amendment. (EXHIBIT C) He also suggested some language in effect that would appropriate \$26,325. to be used for basic research.

OPPONENTS

JIM MURRY, Executive Secretary for the AFL-CIO stated that their concern is that there are not enough safeguards to protect the contracts the state has with various unions. He also went on to say that the Legislature is moving in an area that would exploit prison inmates as a cheap labor source.

NADINE JENSEN from the AFL-CIO, gave her testimony.

SENATOR TURNAGE suggested to amend on page 5, line 6 after program to insert "and shall report to the Legislature and recommend its continuing plans in implementing this program".

REP. HAL HARPER questioned the intent of this legislation, that if it is not to compete then what would be wrong with a simple statement in the bill saying that "it will compete, but not on the level that it will bother anyone".

SENATOR TURNAGE stated that if you put a statement like that in there, you may as well kill the bill. This program will compete but not on the level that it will bother anyone.

Page Two

REP. JAY FABREGA asked Mr. Murry what they do with a production of a vocational industrial type operation if they can not dispose of it.

MR. MURRY stated that if the economy gets better, there will be a laxation in the area of prison industries and products being marketed. Unions have no problem with the prison industries as they are now.

REP. DARRYL MEYER asked if tests are given to get into an apprenticeship program.

MR. MURRY said yes, there is a test given.

HEARINGS were then closed on SB1.

REP. TOM ASAY gave his introduction on HJR1. (EXHIBIT D) See suggested amendment (EXHIBIT E).

REP. BOB PAVLOVICH asked where they will get the money to make restitution.

REP. ASAY stated that provisions will have to be made for better compensation to the prisoners.

REP. LES KITSELMAN stated that if SBl passes, the training programs will pay more to the prisoners and that is where the money will come from.

REP. HAL HARPER asked if this legislation is passed, are they doing anything practical.

CURT CHISHOLM stated that the wage scale relative to the inmates working not just normal job assignments is limited by the appropriation they have and the administrative discretion of the wording. They can pay up to a dollar a day.

Page Three

CURT CHISHOLM continued to say that it is not reasonable to expect the inmates to pay restitution on that sort of wage. Unless we get into cooperatives like other states that are in programs where the inmates can make a good salary while incarcerated. They really cannot make restitution on what they make.

HEARINGS were closed on HJR1.

REP. MICHAEL KEEDY introduced HB18. This bill will provide funding for an additional three educators.

PROPONENTS

CURT CHISHOLM spoke in favor of this bill.

PAT WARNECKE, Associate Warden for the Montana State Prison stated that they have three teachers who serve the whole population. They teach six classes a day. There are 110 people in academic classrooms. They need special education teachers to reach those inmates who cannot be reached now. There is a problem with overcrowding.

MARGARET DAVIS gave her testimony.

REP. JOHN VINCENT asked if REP. KEEDY is not an advocate of rehabilitation, whether he is coming before this committee asking them to act on a bill that won't work.

REP. KEEDY stated that he did not know if it would work, but if we make those efforts on a serious scale and it proves futile, then he would have to agree that the only way to address it is to warehouse people.

REP. DAVID O'HARA asked what level of teaching they were thinking of.

REP. KEEDY stated that he had in mind two remedial teachers plus a special education teacher.

Page Four

REP. KEN ROBBINS asked if those who choose to be educated are criticized and if they need to be segregated.

MR. WARNECKE did not think there would be that problem.

REP. NORM WALLIN asked if he were to evaluate the two programs, which would be the most effective.

MR. WARNECKE stated that SBl sounded like a good idea, but there are some reservations and questions they have. Such as, how would it be administrated and would the teachers be theirs or on contract.

REP. FABREGA informed Mr. Warnecke that Mr. John Board from the Montana Education Association had suggested a possibility of contracting the Deer Lodge School District. We can put out the guidelines by the state but we cannot compel third parties to participate in it so we should stay away from that. We cannot make it contingent upon a contractual agreement.

HEARINGS were then closed and the Committee went into EXECUTIVE SESSION.

REP. JOHN VINCENT made a MOTION that HB18 DO PASS.

REP. JAMES SCHULTZ SECONDED the motion.

MOTION PASSED UNANIMOUSLY.

HEARINGS were opened on HB19.

REP. RALPH EUDAILY introduced HB19.

PROPONENTS

JUDY JOHNSON, Assistant Superintendent of the Office of Public Instruction gave testimony.

OPPONENTS

REP. FABREGA asked if there was any reaction to this sort of an evaluation.

Page Five

CURT CHISHOLM stated that they support REP. KEEDY'S bill and hope for some cooperation from the Office of Public Instruction. They do support the bill concept and the amount of money it would take to do this sort of study.

HEARINGS were closed and the Committee went into EXECUTIVE SESSION.

REP. ORVAL ELLISON made a MOTION that HB19 DO PASS.

REP. NORM WALLIN SECONDED the motion.

Discussion was held.

MOTION PASSED with two OPPOSING: REP. BOB PAVLOVICH and REP. HAL HARPER.

BILL SUMMARIES

Senate Bill 1 establishes a vocational industries program at the Montana State Prison separate from the general institutional industries program. The program is intended to provide training and job skills involving all types of personal property including crops and livestock. The end products would be available for all state and local governmental entities except that ranch products could be sold on the open market. The program is not required to be self-supporting. Participation in the program by inmates would entitle them to earn a good time allowance of up to 15 days per month. Wages may be paid to inmates commensurate with their production function. The inmates are not employees and do not have the rights of public or private employees. The department of institutions is authorized to adopt rules implementing the program.

HJR 1 encourages the creation of innovative prison using the talents and ideas inmates. of The resolution proposes that profits earned by inmates from such enterprises be used for restitution to crime victims. Once such enterprises are established, judges are encouraged to greater use of restitution requirements in sentencing.
