

MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE STATE ADMINISTRATION COMMITTEE
June 23, 1982

The meeting of the State Administration Committee was called to order by Chairman Jerry Feda on June 23, 1982 at 1:30 p.m. in room 436 of the State Capitol Building. Roll call was taken and all members were present.

HOUSE BILL 13

EXHIBIT A, "An act directing the Legislative Council to contract, within existing appropriations, with an independent consultant to prepare an estimate of the costs of renovating the old Montana State Prison; requiring the council to submit the report to the 48th Legislature; and providing an immediate effective date", was presented by REP. ELLERD.

REP. ELLERD stated that the Council has \$200,000 that does not revert back until July 1, 1982, and \$5,000.00 to \$7,000.00 could be used for this study. He also stated that he believes the figure of \$6,200,000 to renovate is too high and that this study would allow the legislature to present their facts to the people.

There being no other proponents or opponents at this time, the chairman opened the meeting up to question.

REPRESENTATIVE BRIGGS questioned where and from what capacity the museum that now occupies the old prison receives returns up to \$60,000 per year and asked if the car exhibit is separate from the museum.

REPRESENTATIVE ELLERD answered that he believed the car and museum were separate.

REPRESENTATIVE BRAND came into the meeting late and asked to have permission to speak as a proponent for House Bill 13. He stated that he would like to have another architect's or other professional opinions. He felt that the Council was frantically trying to do something before this special session but was notified too late.

REPRESENTATIVE McBRIDE asked what they expected the cost of the study to be.

REPRESENTATIVE ELLERD stated that the earlier requirements were between three and five thousand dollars (\$3,000 to \$5,000) but the \$7,500 is to be sure there will be enough.

REPRESENTATIVE DUSSAULT asked if they did not sell the prison to the City of Deer Lodge.

REPRESENTATIVE BRAND stated that they sold the prison to the City of Deer Lodge for \$1.00 but that he believes that it could be returned and that the mayor of Deer Lodge will back this but that his priority is having the maximum security out

at the other facility.

REPRESENTATIVE BRIGGS questioned the remark of the architect in that he stated the figure quoted was not guaranteed.

REPRESENTATIVE FEDA stated that these are estimates and not bids.

REPRESENTATIVE FAGG testified as an architect himself and remarked on the figures quoted, and said that they were under the gun and moved fast but that most architects use the figures handed them. He said that remodeling estimates are hard to do.

REPRESENTATIVE KANDUCH asked if they have ever heard of a historical society giving back a building after receiving it.

REPRESENTATIVE FAGG said that he does not know of any other case.

REPRESENTATIVE KROPP asked about the standards of the cells in the old cells.

CARROLL SOUTH, Director of the Department of Institutions, stated that the old prison does not have dayroom space and the cells will not meet standards.

REPRESENTATIVE ELLERD closed on H. B. 13 by saying that he would prefer H.B. 11 because he does not like to ask for money out of the legislature.

The meeting was opened into EXECUTIVE SESSION.

MOTION was made by REPRESENTATIVE MUELLER that HOUSE BILL 9 be tabled. EXHIBIT B

Question was asked by REPRESENTATIVE DUSSAULT the reason for tabling this bill.

REPRESENTATIVE MUELLER stated that after hearing testimony about the condition of the prison being gutted and not meeting standards, besides being over 70 years old, he felt it would be the answer.

A SUBSTITUTE MOTION of DO NOT PASS was made by REPRESENTATIVE DUSSAULT. Motion was SECONDED. MOTION PASSED with REPRESENTATIVES PISTORIA, SOLBERG, SMITH and PHILLIPS voting NO.

ACTION ON HOUSE BILL 9 - DO NOT PASS.

MOTION was made by REPRESENTATIVE DUSSAULT that HOUSE BILL 4 (EXHIBIT C), DO NOT PASS, Motion seconded and question was called. MOTION PASSED. REPRESENTATIVE PISTORIA voted NO.

ACTION ON HOUSE BILL 4 - DO NOT PASS

MOTION that HOUSE BILL 13, (EXHIBIT A) DO NOT PASS was made by REPRESENTATIVE DUSSAULT. Motion was seconded and question was called. MOTION PASSED with REPRESENTATIVES PISTORIA, SOLBERG and GOULD voting NO.

ACTION ON HOUSE BILL 13 - DO NOT PASS

Discussion was held as to whether killing this bill would kill the issue. Ms. Dowling, legislative council, said that a committee could reject the study and another could choose to continue it.

REPRESENTATIVE PHILLIPS MOVED HOUSE BILL 3, (EXHIBIT D), be TABLED. Discussion was held.

REPRESENTATIVE FEDA stated that he would not support an institution that is not needed or acceptable and feels there needs to be left a choice to choose from after the study.

REPRESENTATIVE KANDUCH said that he was impressed with Glasgow but feels that if minimum security people are put into Glasgow there would be no one left to work the farm.

REPRESENTATIVE O'CONNELL made a SUBSTITUTE MOTION that HOUSE BILL 3 DO PASS. Motion was seconded by REPRESENTATIVE HOLLIDAY.

More discussion was held as to the negative and positive results of separating minimum and maximum prisoners. REPRESENTATIVE BRIGGS questioned whether maximum security needed more space or did minimum security.

Question was called on the motion of HOUSE BILL 3, DO PASS. Roll call vote was taken and tallied as follows:

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QUESTION was called on the original motion that H.B. 3 be tabled. MOTION PASSED.

ACTION ON H.B. 3 - TABLED

A ten minute recess was called and the meeting reopened.

HOUSE BILL 11 was presented by REPRESENTATIVE SPILKER by saying that 'the governor has either done the worst thing in the world to us or the best thing in the world to us -- we have had to focus in on one thing'. She stated that in doing this thinking it has created more questions than answers. EXHIBIT E

REPRESENTATIVE SPILKER remarked that after the disturbance at the prison in March the Governor recommended more minimum security, then he changed asking for more maximum security. She stated that she too has changed her thinking as she secured more information.

REPRESENTATIVE SPILKER presented her amendments to the committee. (EXHIBIT E-1)

REPRESENTATIVE SPILKER stated that the fact finding committee would give the committee and the people of Montana the facts and answers to their questions. She asked the committee to give this bill consideration.

REPRESENTATIVE and SPEAKER OF THE HOUSE, BOB MARKS, stated his support of this bill and its amendments. He stated that there are a number of things the task force could compile so the next legislation could take some positive action.

REPRESENTATIVE ELLERD spoke in favor of H.B. 11 and suggested an amendment that would require the committee to go through the Legislative Council to obtain an independent cost estimate for the cost of renovating the old prison. Basically the amendment would leave the task force do what was proposed in House Bill 13.

REPRESENTATIVE BRAND spoke in favor of Representative Ellerd's amendment saying all the options will have to be considered then.

OPPONENTS were called.

DAVE LEWIS, Director of Budget and Planning said that this issue has been under study since 1958 and that maybe the legislature was given too much information, more than could be simulated.

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REPRESENTATIVE MENAHAN said that he thinks people are tired of seeing the Legislature come in and recess without making a decision.

HANK RISLEY, warden of the state prison, said that they have a problem in the prison and stated "that if you do not do something, you are part of the problem".

CARROLL SOUTH, Director of the Department of Institutions, said they have 285 inmates in a place designed for 192. Crime against persons has jumped from 40% to 50%.

REPRESENTATIVE PISTORIA said that he opposes this bill and asked if this bill passes, will it stop all action at the prison.

REPRESENTATIVE SPILKER said that there are other bills that will take action.

The question was asked to REPRESENTATIVE MARKS if he believes there are more maximum security people than before and if getting ready the sooner the better wouldn't be best.

REPRESENTATIVE MARKS answered yes to both questions, but said that there could be other better solutions that are not mentioned in the proposal of the administration such as prerelease centers, training and dependency programs.

REPRESENTATIVE MARKS stated that some of the hard core criminals are there because they worked hard at it, not one act, but two or three brought them back. With the right programs, this may not have happened.

REPRESENTATIVE MC BRIDE asked REPRESENTATIVE SPILKER when she would see this information to be available.

REPRESENTATIVE SPILKER said that the major amount of work should be compiled before election.

REPRESENTATIVE SPILKER closed on House Bill 11 and said that there has been 40 some bills drafted and to say by passing this bill we have done nothing would be erroneous. She said that she believed they would have to add 50 FTEs. Even if the Governor's biggest bill was passed it would do nothing immediately.

The Hearing on House Bill 11 closed.

The Meeting was reopened for EXECUTIVE SESSION.

REPRESENTATIVE SPILKER MOVED HOUSE BILL 11 DO PASS. REPRESENTATIVE MUELLER seconded the motion.

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REPRESENTATIVE SPILKER MOVED the Amendments to H.B. 11, motion was seconded. MOTION PASSED.

REPRESENTATIVE PHILLIPS MOVED REPRESENTATIVE ELLERD's amendment but due to the fact that the committee would be required to go through the legislative council for the independent cost estimate for renovating the old prison the motion was withdrawn.

REPRESENTATIVE PHILLIPS MOVED that HOUSE BILL 11 DO PASS AS AMENDED. REPRESENTATIVE MUELLER seconded the motion.

Discussion was held by the committee and again overcrowding, counseling and the need to do something immediately was discussed.

QUESTION was called on HOUSE BILL 11. A roll call vote was taken.

12 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MONTANA:

13 Section 1. Capital repairs to old prison — cost
14 estimate. (1) The legislative council shall, within existing
15 appropriations, contract with an independent consultant to
16 prepare a report estimating the costs of capital repairs
17 necessary to enable the old Montana state prison, built in
18 1870, to be used for incarcerating maximum security inmates.
19 (2) The report must be prepared by December 1, 1982,
20 and the legislative council shall submit the report to the
21 48th legislature.

22 Section 2. Effective date. This act is effective on
23 passage and approval.

HB BILL NO. 9
INTRODUCED BY David - Collier

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MONTANA:
2 Section 1. Definitions. For the purposes of this act,
3 unless otherwise stated, the following definitions apply:
4 (1) "Capital project" means acquisition of land or
5 improvements, planning, capital construction, renovation,
6 furnishing, or major repair projects authorized in this act.
7 (2) "BPICA" means account number 06142 in the bond
8 proceeds and insurance clearance fund; "FPRM" means federal
9 and private revenue account; "ERA" means earmarked revenue
10 account; and "other appropriated funds" means money other
11 than general fund or BPICA money that accrues under
12 provisions of law to an agency indicated herein.
13 (3) "Old prison" means the Montana territorial and
14 state prison including all of blocks 52, 53, 62, 63, 66, and
15 67 of the original townsite to the city of Deer Lodge,
16 Powell County, Montana.
17 Section 2. Termination of lease. The department of
18 state lands shall enter into negotiations with the city of
19 Deer Lodge to terminate the lease between the state of
20 Montana and the city of Deer Lodge concerning the old
21 prison.
22 Section 3. Use of old prison. (1) The old prison shall be
23 used primarily for maximum security inmates. The warden
24 of the Montana state prison may determine, for security
25 reasons, which prisoners are to be incarcerated in the old

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1 prison.

2 (2) The old prison shall meet the minimum physical
3 plant standards for existing adult facilities as promulgated
4 by the Commission on Accreditation for Corrections of the
5 American Correctional Association.

6 Section 4. Severability. If a part of this act is
7 invalid, all valid parts that are severable from the invalid
8 part remain in effect. If a part of this act is invalid in
9 one or more of its applications, the part remains in effect.
10 In all valid applications that are severable from the
11 invalid applications.

12 Section 5. General fund appropriation. There is
13 appropriated from the general fund to account number 06142
14 in the bond proceeds and insurance clearance fund \$4.5
15 million to be used to support the project provided for in
16 section 6.

17 Section 6. Planning and capital projects
18 appropriation. There is appropriated from the BPICA to the
19 director of the department of administration:

20 DEPARTMENT OF INSTITUTIONS

21 Planning, renovation, and capital projects
22 enabling the old prison to house
23 maximum security inmates \$4.5 million

24 Section 7. Effective date. This act is effective on
25 passage and approval.

11 Section 1. Section 53-30-101, MCA, is amended to read:
12 "53-30-101. Location and function of prison. The
13 institution institutions at Deer Lodge and Glasgow comprise
14 the state prisons and--as--its The prison's primary
15 function provides is to provide facilities for the custody,
16 treatment, training, and rehabilitation of adult criminal
17 offenders."

18 NEW SECTION. Section 2. Appropriation. There is
19 appropriated to the department of institutions \$3,216,000
20 from the general fund for the establishment of a men's
21 correctional and prison industries facility to be located at
22 the Valley Industrial Park, Glasgow, Montana.
23 NEW SECTION. Section 3. Effective date. This act is
24 effective on passage and approval.

INTRODUCED BILL

House Bill No. 11 S.S. # 2
SPICKER, House of Representatives

1 INTRODUCED BY SPICKER, House of Representatives
2 WHEREAS, the Governor assured the Montana Church Women
3 United that alternatives to the women's correctional
4 facility at Warm Springs would be considered, but such
5 alternatives have not been addressed in any of the
6 Governor's proposals for this special session of the
7 Legislature; and
8 WHEREAS, the Governor has appointed an independent
9 Prison Alternatives Committee to prepare recommendations on
10 alternative correctional programs for Montana, and the
11 committee has yet to complete its work; and
12 WHEREAS, an analysis of the Governor's proposals by the
13 Legislative Fiscal Analyst has brought forth discrepancies
14 that are unaccounted for at this time; and
15 WHEREAS, the Legislature desires that, given the
16 potentially dangerous nature of their jobs, the warden and
17 staff of the Montana State Prison be in complete control of
18 their institution without unnecessarily endangering
19 themselves; and
20 WHEREAS, the Legislature desires to avoid possible
21 judicial intervention into conditions at the Montana State
22 Prison by addressing any problems in an informed and timely
23 manner; and
24 WHEREAS, the Legislature hears the demands of the
25 people of Montana for swift and sure punishment of convicted

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1 criminals in a manner insuring the safety and protection of
2 the people of Montana; and
3 WHEREAS, the Legislature also recognizes its
4 responsibility to provide opportunities for the
5 rehabilitation, reformation, and training of inmates in
6 order to reduce recidivism and produce productive members of
7 society; and
8 WHEREAS, the Legislature supports the following
9 concepts:
10 (1) secure incarceration for dangerous offenders;
11 (2) actual work experience and vocational and
12 on-the-job training for inmates, which instill in them the
13 work ethic;
14 (3) educational opportunities for inmates desiring to
15 avail themselves of such opportunities;
16 (4) alcohol and drug abuse counseling for inmates; and
17 (5) cooperation between agencies of state government
18 and the university system for the utilization of staff and
19 services that may be beneficial for the inmates of the
20 prison and society in general; and
21 WHEREAS, the people of Montana have had only limited
22 opportunity to be heard in a structured and productive
23 hearing process for purposes of expressing their concerns
24 and expectations for Montana's correctional system.
25 THEREFORE, it is the intent of this act that a special

1 select committee of the Legislature be created to develop a
2 plan of action on corrections for presentation to the 48th
3 Legislature.
4
5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MONTANA:
6 Section 1. Special select committee on corrections --
7 establishment -- organization. (1) There is established a
8 12-member special select committee on corrections.
9 (2) The committee shall be appointed in the following
10 manner:
11 (a) The speaker of the house, after consultation with
12 the house majority and minority leaders, shall appoint six
13 members to serve on the committee. No more than three house
14 members of the committee may be from the same party. At
15 least one person in a leadership position from each party
16 shall be appointed to the committee by the speaker of the
17 house.
18 (b) The president of the senate, after consultation
19 with the committee on committees of the senate, shall
20 appoint six members to serve on the committee. No more than
21 three senate members of the committee may be from the same
22 party. At least one person in a leadership position from
23 each party shall be appointed to the committee by the
24 president of the senate.
25 (3) Committee members shall elect a chairman and

1 vice-chairman.

2 (4) Committee members are entitled to compensation and
3 expenses as provided in 5-2-302.

4 Section 2. Special select committee function. (1) The
5 special select committee on corrections shall develop a plan
6 of action and recommend policies for consideration by the
7 48th legislature in order that a comprehensive and coherent
8 correctional policy may be developed for Montana.

9 (2) In formulating its plan of action and in preparing
10 its recommendations, the committee shall:

11 (a) solicit wide public participation and hold public
12 hearings on correctional issues;
13 (b) review the proposals and considerations of past
14 legislative and administration planning and study groups in
15 order to resolve inconsistencies and establish areas of
16 agreement;

17 (c) utilize outside agencies, individuals, and
18 consultants as the committee considers necessary; and
19 (d) obtain independent cost estimates for any
20 alternative capital projects the committee may recommend.

21 Section 3. Use of consultants. The legislative
22 council, upon request from the special select committee,
23 shall retain such consultants as required by the committee.

24 Section 4. Committee staff. The legislative council,
25 legislative fiscal analyst, and legislative auditor shall

1 provide staffing and assistance to the committee as the
2 committee requires. The legislative council shall assist the
3 committee in preparing its reports and recommendations as
4 provided in Title 5.

5 Section 5. Appropriation. There is appropriated
6 \$_____ from the general fund to the legislative council
7 for the purposes of assisting the special select committee
8 on corrections as provided in sections 3 and 4.

9 Section 6. Effective date -- termination. This act is
10 effective on passage and approval and terminates January 1,
11 1983.

Section 2. Expansion required to be authorized. No existing capital project may be expanded beyond the scope of the project as approved by the 47th legislature unless the capital project expansion is authorized by an approved budget amendment.

Section 3. Severability. If a part of this act is invalid, all valid parts that are severable from the invalid part remain in effect. If a part of this act is invalid in one or more of its applications, the part remains in effect in all valid applications that are severable from the invalid applications.

Section 4. Totals not appropriations. The totals shown in this act are for informational purposes only and are not appropriations.

Section 5. General fund appropriation. There is appropriated from the general fund to account number 06142 in the bond proceeds and insurance clearance fund \$9,605,780 to be used to support the project provided for below.

Section 6. Prison construction appropriation. The following money is appropriated from the bond proceeds and insurance clearance fund to the director of the department of administration:
