MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE HOUSE AGRICULTURE, LIVESTOCK AND IRRIGATION COMMITTEE, JANUARY 21, 1983

The meeting was called to order by Chairman Jacobsen on Friday, January 21, 1983 at 12:30pm in Room 129, State Capitol. All members were present with the exception of Rep. Jensen, who was absent, and Rep. Roush, who was excused.

#### HEARINGS

HOUSE BILL 258. REP. GERRY DEVLIN, District 52, Prairie County, testified as sponsor of the bill to control the entry of diseased livestock into the State. He told the Committee present administrative rules were subject to challenge and although a disease-free state could not be accomplished intirely, the bill was the best attempt to do so.

#### PROPONENTS

MRS. JO BRUNNER, Women Involved in Farm Economics stated her support of the bill in prepared testimony (exhibit).

DR. JAMES GLOSSER, Department of Livestock said the Department requested the bill to amend a recently implemented statute pertaining to the permit system. He advised the Committee the Department had to rely upon administrative rules four years ago during a scabies outbreak and said all decisions he makes as State Veterinarian are based on exports, adding Montana tends to be a brucellosis-free state. Dr. Glosser told the Committee the bill would allow Montana to work directly with the state from which the disease originated, rather than applying for special dispensation in Washington, D.C., adding the State would be in a better position to remove the accreditation of a veterinarian who falsifies animal health documents. He said the penalty for such falsification would be a fine from \$50 to \$500 and up to six months confinement. The federal penalty is \$1000 to \$1500, he said, asking the Committee to give the bill favorable consideration.

MR. MONS TIEGEN, Montana Stockgrowers and Montana Cowbelles Associations told the Committee scabies is present in Idaho now, which only reinforces the need for this legislation in Montana.

REP. RAY LYBECK, District 16, testified as a representative of the Montana Cattlemen's Association and stated his support of the bill.

MR. WILL BROOKE, Montana Woolgrowers Association and MRS. NORRIS COLE, stated their support of the bill.

### OPPONENTS

There were no opponents of the bill.

### QUESTIONS

CHAIRMAN JACOBSEN asked Dr. Glosser if the bill would change present rules to statutes, to which Dr. Glosser replied it would.

REP. SCHULTZ told the Committee he believes a statement of intent is necessary. Dr. Glosser told him there is no problem with legislative intent, adding the matter had been discussed with the Legislative Council staff attorney who drafted the bill.

REP. ELLERD asked if a permit would be required for all livestock entering the State. Dr. Glosser said a telephonic permit would be required in addition to technical judgment of tests in the originating state.

REP. SCHULTZ asked how Section 1. (7) related to statute. Dr. Glosser said waivers for health certificates would be available in certain instances where, for example, livestock were originating two miles from the Montana border. He advised the Committee the permit would never be waived, adding all cattle have a blanket permit, even when brought to market.

IN CLOSING, Rep. Devlin said the bill would clean up the livestock industry and promote a free flow of cattle from the State.

#### EXECUTIVE SESSION

HOUSE BILL 258. REP. SCHULTZ moved the bill Do Pass. The motion was seconded by Rep. Ryan and unanimously approved by the Committee.

REP. RYAN moved the bill be put on the Consent Calender. Rep. Lybeck seconded the motion, which failed, with Rep. Ernst voting no.

HOUSE BILL 113. REP. SPEATH moved the bill Do Pass.

REP. BENGSTON said she was concerned with the cost of research involved in grant requests. Chairman Jacobsen explained testimony from the hearing in response.

REP. KOEHNKE told the Committee he was concerned with services in all agencies going to user fees.

REP. SPEATH told the Committee in this instance, the livestock industry has not been charged, only those making inquiries which require research, such as students, historians or the curious.

REP. HANSON seconded the motion made by Rep. Spaeth that the bill Do Pass. The bill was given unanimous committee approval.

HOUSE BILL 127. REP. HOLLIDAY moved the bill Do Pass and then moved the proposed amendments to the bill be approved. Rep. Schultz seconded the motion.

REP. SPAETH said the title would have to be amended, with which Legislative Council Attorney John MacMaster agreed.

REP. HOLLIDAY restated her motion to include the title. The motion was seconded by Rep. Schultz and unanimously approved by the Committee.

REP. HOLLIDAY moved the bill Do Pass as Amended. Rep. Bengston seconded the motion, which was unanimously approved.

The meeting was adjourned at 1:10pm.

Mr. Chairman, members of the committee, for the record, myname is Jo Brunner and I represent the Women Involved in FArm Economics Organization. Mr. Chairman, our organization strongly supports House Bill 258.

For years the state of Montana, both our livestock officials, our livestock organizations, our ranch and farm families, have worked diligently toward eradicating the costly and heartbreaking diseases from our livestockherds. Not too long ago our women heard people from the Department of Livestock tell us that our state could be considered as brucellosis free as is humanly possible. And our people in our livestockcommunities should be very proud of this accomplishment. I guess if you have never seen or experienced the heartbreaking, and costly loss of a complete herd of cattle, you might not understand our enthusiasim over such news. I can remember when whole herds of dairy cattle were lost to disease.

But today things are a little gloomier than they were yesterday. And perhaps if you do not remember when brucellosis was a terrible problem to our livestock people, you won't understand that I doubt I could have felt worse had I been told that there was a small pox out break, instead of the sad fact of one rancher who did not, would not----vaccinate his herd; that somehow or other cattle were imported from a state that was not brucellosis free; that these two herds were mixed, and now nearly a year later, out of a herd of 129 cows, so far 37 are bangers-so far that is it is the far -- several have aborted--so far. And what of the neighboring herds??? Are they all vacinated? I guess we can imaging any number of problems that may come out of this one instance---but needless to say, today, even more than yesterday or the day before---W.I.F.E. concurs with HB 258 and urges your passage of that bill. Thank you.
