

MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE HOUSE STATE ADMINISTRATION
COMMITTEE
January 28, 1983

VICE CHAIRMAN HELEN O'CONNELL called the meeting to order at 9:00 a.m. in Room 129 of the Capitol. All members were present except CHAIRMAN JOE BRAND, who was excused.

HOUSE BILL 329

REPRESENTATIVE JOHN SHONTZ, sponsor of House Bill 329, described a measure for "truth in advertising." He said it would make it against the law to say something untrue about a candidate in a political campaign. He said it was an attempt to address abuse of the campaign and electoral system.

VICE CHAIRMAN HELEN O'CONNELL CALLED FOR STATEMENTS BY OPPONENTS OF HOUSE BILL 329, THERE BEING NO FURTHER PROPONENTS OF HOUSE BILL 329.

Margaret Davis, president of the Montana League of Women Voters, said her group was neither for nor against the measure. She asked that testimony be held open until all opponents could testify on the measure.

Vice Chairman O'Connell noted that some opponents were not yet ready for the hearing on House Bill 329. She asked the sponsor if he would prefer to answer questions now, or when all opponents were present. Representative Shontz asked to keep the testimony open.

REAPPORTIONMENT

REPRESENTATIVE JERRY DRISCOLL, Chairman of the subcommittee dealing with reapportionment issues, presented a subcommittee report (attached).

Representative Driscoll noted that with regard to concern for the Hill-Blaine County line, the subcommittee recommends keeping the present House districts intact. With regard to the preference for House district pairings in Great Falls, Representative Driscoll noted that the reapportionment commission recommended pairing of these districts; O and P, Q and R, and S and N. Representative Driscoll said the subcommittee recommends pairing these districts; N and O, P and R, and Q and S.

REPRESENTATIVE GLENN MUELLER asked the rationale for the recommendation. Legislative Researcher Anne Brodsky said it was to preserve the rural nature of districts N and O.

REPRESENTATIVE JOHN PHILLIPS, from the Great Falls area, said the change would not make much difference. He said the changes were in the interests of SENATOR PAT GOODOVER who wished to reform the old Senate district he used to represent.

REPRESENTATIVE PAUL PISTORIA asked Phillips' impression of Goodover's plan. Phillips said "I'm done in anyway, but I favor the commission's plan."

VICE CHAIRMAN O'CONNELL NOTED THAT OPPONENTS TO HOUSE BILL 329 HAD RETURNED TO THE HEARING ROOM, AND SHE RECEIVED PERMISSION FROM THE COMMITTEE TO TEMPORARILY ABANDON WORK ON REAPPORTIONMENT TO RETURN TO THE HEARING PROCESS ON HOUSE BILL 329.

Wes Krawczyk, representing the Montana Chapter of the American Civil Liberties Union, spoke against House Bill 329. He said it constitutes prior restraint of free speech and is unconstitutional. He said it would have a "chilling effect" on constitutional rights. He also said it was too complicated.

Representative Shontz, in closing, disputed that the measure would restrain free speech. He said it would merely assess a penalty when free speech is false. He said the concept of responsibility for false speech is recognized in libel laws.

Representative Mueller said that the ACLU had said he had voted for only one bill correctly. Representative Mueller said this was not clear. He called it "a value judgment of what is 'true'." Representative Shontz said if this were technically correct, this legislation would not apply to such a case. Representative Shontz cited the Williams-Melcher campaign of 1982, wherein he said there was a "deliberate misrepresentation" by one candidate. Representative Mueller said the measure would "open a can of worms." He said it would amount to a "wide open free-for-all for attorneys."

REPRESENTATIVE JOE HAMMOND asked who would administer the legislation. Representative Shontz said it would be administered by the districts.

REPRESENTATIVE KATHLEEN McBRIDE said the bill did not address the case of a candidate who may knowingly misrepresent his own position.

REPRESENTATIVE WALTER SALES said "we all know these voting record things are bologna--they are manipulated."

REPRESENTATIVE FRANCIS BARDANOUVE asked how the measure would affect first amendment freedom of press guarantees. Krawczyk said the penalties would result in intimidation.

REPRESENTATIVE BRENT BLISS said the bill would amount to making a person who brought an unsuccessful charge under the legislation himself guilty of an untrue statement.

REPRESENTATIVE JOE BRAND said that his experience showed him that this legislation would not be valuable. He said a "full blown hearing on charges a few sessions ago accomplished zero." He asked what is to be accomplished here. Representative Shontz said "somebody is going to think twice about saying something false."

THERE BEING NO FURTHER STATEMENTS BY OPPONENTS OR QUESTIONS FROM COMMITTEE MEMBERS, VICE CHAIRMAN O'CONNELL CLOSED THE HEARING ON HOUSE BILL 329.

EXECUTIVE SESSION

HOUSE BILL 329

Representative Mueller MOVED House Bill 329 DO NOT PASS, Representative John Ryan seconded.

Representative Mueller said the bill was an attempt to legislate morals, which cannot be done. He said the smart thing to do about false statements is to ignore them because they open up a can of worms.

Representative Joe Hammond said he likes the intent of the bill, but it has a lot of loopholes.

Representative Jerry Driscoll said researchers on both sides of the political questions are smart enough to go after only the "little guy." He said such victims would not be able to afford court action.

The question being called, the Mueller motion carried by voice vote. Representative Bardanouve voting "no."

HOUSE BILL 231

Vice Chairman O'Connell called for action on House Bill 231 by calling on Representative Joe Brand, who introduced amendments to House Bill 231, to take care of vested rights already in existence. He said a second option under the bill would be to present to members after they have vested rights of ten years, they have the option of taking pension.

Representative Brand introduced Lawrence Nachtsheim, Administrator of the Public Employees' Retirement Division, who distributed a handout entitled "Unified Firefighter's System" which listed 13 Montana cities and towns with current wages those from June 1982 and salary differences. Nachtsheim called the proposed amendments mechanical.

Representative Bardanoue asked what the bill would accomplish. Nachtsheim said it would clean up the method in which the law defines supplemental pensions, and the clean up would be done in line with the Attorney General's opinions.

Representative Mueller asked what the amendments do. He asked what if the city of Anaconda goes out of business.

Vern Erickson, representing the Montana Firefighter's Association, said the amendments would adjust the pension fund so that pensions paid on the average of all city's confirmed firefighter's salary.

Representative Mueller asked who pays to keep the system going when Anaconda goes out of business. Representative Brand said "that's why we have the statewide fire plan." He said it covers cities, towns and employees.

Representative Sales MOVED House Bill 231 be amended, Representative Driscoll seconded. The question being called, the Sales motion carried by unanimous voice vote. House Bill 231 was amended.

Representative Driscoll MOVED House Bill 231 DO PASS AS AMENDED, Representative Hammond seconded. The question being called, the Driscoll motion carried by unanimous voice vote. House Bill 231 was recommended out do pass as amended.

VICE CHAIRMAN O'CONNELL TOOK THE COMMITTEE FROM EXECUTIVE SESSION AND RETURNED IT TO THE HEARING STAGE ON REAPPORTIONMENT MATTERS.

REAPPORTIONMENT

Representative Driscoll continued explanations of his subcommittee report. He said the subcommittee adopted the so-called "red plan" for Senate districting. He said some talk of pairing House districts 66 and 67 into one Senate district does not work. He also noted that districts 49 and 50 were not paired. He said that 49 was paired with district 48, the west valley of the Helena valley.

Chairman Joe Brand spoke about the problems with Senate districts. He said no one favors the red plan. He said the ideal plan is to match districts 49 and 68. Legislative Researcher Ann Brodsky said in order to get that, districts 66 and 67 must go together. Chairman Brand said that most everyone agrees that by putting 66 and 67 together, that will take care of problems most everywhere else. He said one Senate district may have to be hurt, but who's going to be hurt the least. He said the reapportionment commission agrees that joining districts 49 and 50 is worse than joining districts 66 and 67. Chairman Brand spoke against joining districts 49 and 48, saying his district was not compatible with western Lewis & Clark County. Chairman Brand spoke his opposition to the subcommittee recommendation.

Representative Driscoll MOVED to reject item #1 on the subcommittee report (the red plan for pairing Senate districts in western Montana). Representative Mueller seconded. The question being called, the Driscoll motion carried by unanimous voice vote.

Chairman Brand MOVED adoption for the green plan for pairing of Senate districts in western Montana. Representative Sales seconded. Chairman Brand withdrew his motion.

REPRESENTATIVE CHET SOLBERG said that Chairman Brand's second choice for pairing of Senate districts was best. Representative Mueller said the green plan was best but not politically practical.

Chairman Brand MOVED to accept Brand's second choice for pairing of Senate districts in western Montana. Representative Mueller seconded.

Representative McBride stated her opposition to Brand's second choice. She said she was not consulted, and the plan would modify Senate districts in Butte. In her words, "it was popped on me." The question being called, the Brand motion passed by voice vote. Voting "no" were Representatives Hand, Driscoll and McBride.

Returning to discussion of the Hill-Blaine County line question, REPRESENTATIVE DUANE COMPTON MOVED to reject the subcommittee recommendation, item two on the subcommittee report. Representative Hammond seconded. Representative Compton said it doesn't follow the county line for the 16B plan. He said the problem is in the Dodson area.

Representative Solberg said "none of us are too acquainted with it." He said he sought such change because he believed it was in the interests of Havre. He said he agreed with Representative Compton's motion.

The question being called, the Compton motion carried by unanimous voice vote.

Turning to item #3 on the subcommittee report, Bighorn County, Representative Driscoll noted that the recommendation by the subcommittee would move 190 people from House district 100 to House district 99. He said that would enable the districts to be more equitable and still stay within the 5 percent deviation figure.

Representative Mueller MOVED to approve the subcommittee recommendation, Representative Compton seconded. The question being called, the Mueller motion carried by unanimous voice vote.

Turning to Senator Goodover's request, item #4 on the subcommittee report, Representative Driscoll noted that the subcommittee recommendation was to go along with Senator Goodover's request.

Representative O'Connell MOVED not to accept the subcommittee recommendation, Representative Pistoria seconded.

Representative O'Connell said the subcommittee recommendation would disturb everything else and is not workable. Representative Sales said "we went for it because it was thought it would keep the rural and urban districts each together."

The question being called, the O'Connell motion carried by a 10 to 7 roll call vote.

Representative Sales MOVED to accept the subcommittee report plan as amended, Representative Compton seconded.

Representative Solberg noted that the reworking of districting in northeastern Montana was not completed. He asked that recommendations regarding northeastern Montana be neither accepted nor rejected.

Representative McBride stated that she was disturbed about the moving of House districts in her area (Butte) that need not be moved. She said "nobody knew of it."

The question being called, the Sales motion carried by voice vote. Voting "no" were Representatives Hand, Bliss, Driscoll, Phillips, McBride, and Holliday.

REPRESENTATIVE MUELLER MOVED FOR ADJOURNMENT, WHICH WAS CONCURRED IN BY THE COMMITTEE. THE MEETING WAS DECLARED ADJOURNED.



(1) If a city voluntarily terminates its contributions in the plan or significantly reduces the number of full-paid firefighters it employs to a degree that, in the board's opinion, inadequately funds the accrued or accruing benefits of plan members, the board shall request as part of the actuarial valuation required in 19-13-504 an actuarial investigation of the funding status of the city.

(2) Based on the actuarial investigation, the board may request and the city shall pay annually an amount needed to provide adequate funding for the city. This amount must be in addition to any other contributions required by the retirement act.

(3) Six years after the actuarial investigation is conducted, a city making payments as provided in subsection (2) may request the board to review the city's funding status relative to the annual payments. As a result of the review, the board may adjust the payments."

Insert: "(3) If after a member retires, the city that last employed him no longer employs a full-paid firefighter, the member's or his beneficiary's allowance under subsections (1) and (2) must be adjusted on the basis of the average monthly compensation paid to all newly confirmed full-paid firefighters, as provided each year in the budgets of those cities that participate in the plan and employ a full-paid firefighter.

(4) If the employment of a vested member hired before July 1, 1981, is involuntarily discontinued before he reaches age 50 because of the termination of employment of all full-paid firefighters in the city that employed him, his service retirement allowance provided in 19-3-704(1)(b) and his spouse's or dependent child's survivorship allowance provided in 19-13-902(1) may not be less than:

(a) if the member has completed 20 years or more of service, one-half the average monthly compensation paid to all newly confirmed, full-paid firefighters, as provided each year in the budgets of those cities that participate in the plan and employ a full-paid firefighter; or

(b) if the member has completed more than 10 but less than 20 years of service, 28 of the average monthly compensation paid to all newly confirmed, full-paid firefighters, as provided each year in the budgets of those cities that participate in the plan and employ a full-paid firefighter, for each year of the member's service.

(5) In lieu of the benefit adjustment provided in subsection (4), a member may elect to receive an early retirement allowance beginning upon termination of employment that is the actuarial equivalent of the accrued portion of the service retirement allowance that would have been payable to him beginning at age 50.

NEW SECTION. Section 4. Codification instruction.

Section 1 is intended to be codified as an integral part of Title 19, chapter 13, and the provisions of Title 19, chapter 13, apply to section 1."

SUBCOMMITTEE REPORT

Mr. Chairman:

Your subcommittee on reapportionment, having had under consideration various questions and objections raised to the tentative report of the Districting and Apportionment Commission, recommends the House State Administration Committee adopt these recommendations to the Commission:

1. That the so-called "Red Plan" for pairing of Senate Districts in Western Montana be adopted. A copy of the Red Plan is attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference.
2. That the Hill/Blaine county line dividing present house districts be maintained.
3. That with regard to Big Horn County, Enumeration District 3027 be split along a county road that runs east-west from the Big Horn River to Highway 47, thus putting 190 people within recommended House District 100 into recommended House District 99, and more equally apportioning the population between the districts.
4. That Senator Goodover's preference for pairing house districts into senate districts within Great Falls be adopted.
5. The subcommittee further notes that the full committee has previously adopted a favorable recommendation about Reps. Ellison's and Yardley's proposals concerning reapportionment in the immediate Livingston area.




STREET MAP OF

(4) If the employment of a vested member hired before July 1, 1981, is involuntarily discontinued before he reaches age 50 because of the termination of employment of all full-paid firefighters in the city that employed him, his service retirement allowance provided in 19-3-704(1)(b) and his spouse's or dependent child's survivorship allowance provided in 19-13-902(1) may not be less than:

(a) if the member has completed 20 years or more of service, one-half the average monthly compensation paid to all newly confirmed, full-paid firefighters, as provided each year in the budgets of those cities that participate in the plan and employ full-paid firefighters; or

(b) if the member has completed more than 10 but less than 20 years of service, 2% of the average monthly compensation paid to all newly confirmed, full-paid firefighters, as provided each year in the budgets of those cities that participate in the plan and employ full-paid firefighters, for each year of the member's service.


(5) In lieu of the benefit adjustment provided in subsection (4), a member may elect to receive an early retirement allowance beginning upon termination of employment that is the actuarial equivalent of the accrued portion of the service retirement allowance that would have been payable to him beginning at age 50.
