- MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE HOUSE AGRICULTURE, LIVESTOCK AND IRRIGATION SUBCOMMITTEE, FEBRUARY 16, 1983
- The meeting was called to order by Chairman Roush, on Wednesday, February 16, 1983 at 8:30pm in Room 129, State Capitol. All subcommittee members were present.
- REP. SPAETH said he wondered what the percentage ratio was between Subchapter S corporations and profit agricultural holdings of land in Montana.
- REP. ROUSH read the rough draft of the proposed joint resolution (exhibit), adding Montana citizens are concerned with non-profit corporations and profit religious organizations and their land holdings in the State. He requested input from subcommittee members and told them the situation in Montana is serious.
- MR. JOHN CARTER, Legislative Council Attorney, told the Subcommittee Rep. Spaeth was concerned with language on page 2, paragraph 1, which would expand the study to include other corporations, specifically Subchapter S.
- MR. TERRY MURPHY, Montana Farmers Union said the language could be contrued to mean a list of such corporations would be required by the study.
- MR. CARTER commented Rep. Spaeth did not want family-held Subchapter S corporations included in the study.
- REP. ERNST asked if this information were presently on file.
- REP. HOLLIDAY commented she was concerned with (7).
- REP. LYBECK asked if there were religious entities within the state which are enjoying tax breaks.
- MR. GEORGE RATH, roundup, Montana, told the Subcomittee he thought it would be wise to delve into federal taxation practices in this matter and said some Subchapter S corporations are now converting to regular corporate status.
- REP. ROUSH suggested the Subcommittee eliminate "energy" on page 2, line 21 of the draft.
- MR. HOWARD LORD, Phillipsburg, Montana, asked who would complete the interim study. Rep. Roush replied appointments would be made from the House and Senate who would work with the Legislative Council.

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REP. ERNST said there might be a problem with priorities in obtaining tax information. Mr. Murphy asked if gross figures obtained from the Department of Revenue.

MR. COREY JOHNSON, Busby, Montana, suggested lines 15-17, page 1 of the draft be stricken as they appear to violate constitutional rights.

MR. PAT UNDERWOOD, Montana Farm Bureau, told the Subcommittee language may be needed with regard to individual rights to privacy.

MR. CARTER advised language in the draft would be finalized and presented to subcommittee members on Thursday, February 17, 1983.

MR. JOHNSON commented he thought language on page 1, line 18 was excellent in summing up the purpose of the resolution.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:45pm
