MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE APPROPRIATIONS COMMITTEE March 26, 1983

The Appropriations Committee met at 8:10 a.m. on March 26, 1983, in Room 104, with Representative Rex Manuel chairing the meeting. Judy Rippingale, Legislative Fiscal Analyst, was also present. Representative Shontz was absent. All other members were present. HOUSE BILLS 23, 815, 903, and 911 were heard. No EXECUTIVE ACTION was taken.

(Tape 10: Track 1:0430) HOUSE BILL 911: A BILL A BILL FOR AN ACT ENTITLED: "AN ACT TO APPROPRIATE \$419,520 TO THE DEPARTMENT OF SOCIAL AND REHABILITATION SERVICES FOR INCREASING STATE SUPPLEMENTS TO CERTAIN ELIGIBLE SUPPLEMENTAL SECURITY INCOME RECIPIENTS RECEIVING PERSONAL CARE."

Representative STELLA JEAN HANSEN, House District #96, introduced this bill and presented the committee with a breakdown of the costs and distribution (Exhibit 1). This would increase the supplemental payments to residents of personal care homes.

Proponents:

JEAN JOHNSTON voiced her support and presented the committee with a cost analysis of state supplemental payments in Missoula County (Exhibit 2). She felt personal care homes provided the same services offered by nursing homes, hospitals, and state hospitals, but at a lower cost.

KEN DANIELS, owner of Hawthorne House personal care home, voiced his support for this bill. Mr. DANIELS explained that this bill would not put more people in personal care homes but would provide those residents in personal care homes with adequate supplemental funding to continue to live in these homes. He felt there is a tramatic shock to people who are forced to move from their own homes or personal care homes to nursing homes, sometimes even death. people have worked and saved all of their lives and one medical bill could wipe out their entire savings. The people served by this bill do not have the means to get more money and need supplemental funding.

CHRIS WOODWARD voiced her support and explained that the 27 people receiving supplemental funding are in her program. She ensures that these people are adequately placed in personal care homes. She felt this supplemental service is necessary.

Opponents:

ROSE SKOOGE, Montana Health Care Association, voiced her concern for this bill. Her first concern was for the safety and welfare of the clientele. She felt, if this bill does pass, paragraph 2a should be removed. She felt SB 446 precludes personal care from being offered in that setting because it is not adequate to offer the kind of care Secondly, she opposed the financial aspects of the bill. She felt the increase would go to the providers and not the clients. Ms. SKOOGE said she has seen this committee limit increases for other providers to 4% or 6% and this bill provides more than that kind of percentage to the provider.

JOHN LAFAVER, Director of the Department of Social and Rehabilitation Services (SRS), voiced his opposition to this bill. He felt the bill was a good idea if we had the money but he said the bill does not request enough money to do what it sets out to do. He is in favor of the concept and he hoped that someday we would have the money to expand personal care structures in the state.

Discussion:

Representative HANSON said the bill is based on 100 beds: 27 in Missoula, some in Libby and Bozeman, and the beds that will be in Twin Bridges when that facility is remodeled. This money is being spent now with the County Poor Fund, which will be broke July 1. After that, the people in these personal care homes will have to go to nursing homes and the state will end up paying for them there.

Representative WINSLOW asked if these people are receiving supplemental income now from SRS. Ms. JOHNSTON said they are receiving a state supplement now in addition to their supplemental security income and money from the County Poor Fund. This bill would increase the present state supplement from \$104 to \$256.

The hearing was closed to further testimony.

HOUSE BILL 815: A BILL FOR AN ACT ENTITLED: "AN ACT REQUIRING IDENTIFICATION OF AND PREPARATION OF A PLAN FOR ACQUISITION OF ABANDONED RAILROAD RIGHTS-OF-WAY; APPROPRIATING \$78,500 FROM THE GENERAL FUND; AND PROVIDING AN IMMEDIATE EFFECTIVE DATE."

Representative JAY FABREGA, House District #44, introduced this bill. He presented a breakdown of the request (Exhibit 3) and noted that the Department of Commerce felt a grade 13 FTE would be needed to administer the program.

Proponents:

VIGGO ANDERSON, President of the Montana Citizens' Freight Association and Director of the Montana Grain Growers Association, voiced his support for this bill and provided written testimony (Exhibit 4). He felt it was important for the state to look at these abandoned rights-of-way but he thought the appropriation figure could be pared a little.

TERRY MURPHY, Montana Farmers Union, supported the bill and said this bill is badly needed.

Opponents: None.

Discussion:

Representative FABREGA felt the Department of Commerce might be able to fit this into the "Build Montana" program. He said someone should at least be authorized to look into this issue.

HOUSE BILL 903: A BILL FOR AN ACT ENTITLED: "AN ACT TO APPROPRIATE FUNDS TO THE DEPARTMENT OF STATE LANDS TO RECTIFY ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACTS CAUSED BY MINING IN THE STILLWATER-BOULDER RIVER COMPLEX; AND PROVIDING AN IMMEDIATE EFFECTIVE DATE."

Representative HARRISON FAGG, House District #63, introduced this bill. He showed slides of the area which was once the site of one of the largest hard-rock mining areas in the United States. This is a beautiful area but the spoils left by the mining and the erosion is an eyesore. The open mine shafts present a potential danger. There have been attempts to reclaim this area for over 25 years.

This is the start of the Stillwater drainage which is the start of the Yellowstone River which is the start of the Missouri River which then flows into the Mississippi. The erosion will eventually cause acid to run into the rivers and will then get into our drinking water. These areas are also spawning grounds for fish which will die when the acid content becomes too high.

Representative FAGG said this is the kind of project the Resource Indemnity Trust was established for but those funds have been misused and there is only \$250,000 left. He would ask that this committee appropriate that money to fund a beginning for this reclamation project.

Proponents:

MARC LEDBETTER, Northern Plains Resource Council, voiced his support for this bill. He said there is a lot of surface damage as well as damage to surface water and ground water. He reiterated Rep. Fagg's statement that the Resource Indemnity Trust Fund money should be used for projects such as this.

KEN KNUDSON, Montana Wildlife Federation, voiced his support. He said a lot of preliminary work has been done on this project. All that is needed now is the money to set the wheels in motion.

Opponents: None.

Discussion:

Representative FAGG said, even if this committee could appropriate a small amount to get this project started, it would be better than not dealing with it at all. He reiterated that there will be serious side effects if nothing is done.

DENNIS HEMMER, acting director of the Department of State Lands, said this mine is on the priority list for federal mine reclamation funds but is a non-coal project and would have to be declared a serious health hazard to be put before any coal projects.

The hearing was closed to further testimony.

Minutes of the meeting of the Appropriations Committee March 26, 1983

HOUSE BILL 23: A BILL FOR AN ACT ENTITLED: "A BILL PROVIDING AN AD HOC COST OF LIVING INCREASE IN SERVICE AND DISABILITY RETIREMENT ALLOWANCES AND SUVIVORSHIP ALLOWANCES FOR MEMBERS OF THE PUBLIC EMPLOYEES' RETIREMENT SYSTEM AND THEIR BENEFICIARIES; PROVIDING FUNDING FOR THE BENEFIT INCREASE THROUGH EMPLOYER CONTRIBUTIONS; AMENDING SECTION 19-3-801, MCA; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE."

Representative HAL HARPER, House District #30, introduced this bill. This bill would provide a \$2 increase in the first year for people who retired before July 1, 1981, and \$1 increase for people who retired between July 1, 1981, but before July 1, 1983. This is not an ongoing appropriation. He presented information on the county contribution (Exhibit 5).

Proponents:

JOE ROBERTS, Montana Association of Montana Retired Public Employees, voiced his support and said his testimony would be concurred with by the Montana Public Employees Association. This bill has already been decreased 59% from the original bill and the fiscal note needs to be updated to show that decrease. Inflation is the major problem facing retirees. Our retirement system has no way of dealing with inflation once the retirement benefits are set. Public employees who retire now will be taken care of because retirement will be based on salary but employees who retired ten years ago are not adequately covered.

JIM SEHEENA, retiree from the Department of Highways, urged the committee to support this bill. Energy and medical costs are the biggest problem facing retirees.

TOM RYAN, Montana Senior Citizens Association, voiced his support.

JERRY BAUERMAN voiced his support and said, if this bill is not passed, the retiree without clout will go by the wayside.

Opponents: None.

Discussion:

Representative HARPER said this is the only chance these people have to get adequate retirement benefits.

LARRY NACHSHEIM, Public Employees Retirement System, explained the breakdown of the appropriation between the state's contribution and the political subdivisions.

The hearing was closed to further testimony.

The meeting was recessed until the House adjourned.

- 1) 27 residents in Missoula County's four personal care homes are currently receiving state supplemental payments.
- 2) Average payment per month \cdot \$94.425 Total payment per month \times 27 = \$2,549.50
- 3) If the state supplement is increased to \$255.70 to cover the cost of personal care placement (\$540.00/mo. with \$40.00 personal care money returned to the resident).

- 6) Per month it is \$3,298.43 less costly to maintain 27 people in personal care settings as opposed to nursing homes. Savings per year would be \$39,581.16.

If someone is receiving less than \$348.30 social security and is in a personal care home, they %111 can receive the difference in the form of a supplement.

In 4 personal care homes in Missoula County, 27 adults are receiving state supplements for room, board and care received in the home.

\$2,549.50 is the total personal care home supplement for the 27 people per month 94.425 is the average monthly supplement per person

If the personal care home supplement were increased so that providers would receive \$500.00 per month and the client \$40.00, the following would be the amounts of supplements for these same 27 people: (Remember that a client uses his own resources first)

\$6,645.40 total personal care home supplement for these 27 people per month 246.125 average monthly supplement per person

If these same 27 people were in a nursing home (due to lack of money to pay personal care home providers and a demonstrated need for supportive environment) at \$1200.00 per month, they would turn all of their income over to the nursing home for care and still receive \$40.00. The cost to Medicaid would average \$1,052.25 per month per client. (Remember people do not receive SSI in a nursing home if they have another source of income that is greater than \$25.00 per month.)

 $\frac{x.35}{5.9,943.83}$ would be the total monthly cost for the 27 people in a nursing home medicaid nursing home reimbursement is on a 35/65 state federal match cost per month to the state general fund for these 27 people in a nursing home

The difference between the cost to state for these 27 people in a nursing home and these 27 people in a personal care home with providers being paid \$500.00 per month is \$39, 581.16 per year. For-people-who-need-personal-eare-homes The savings potential for-personal-eare for funding people at a personal care home rather than waiting until they need nursing home care is great.

COST ANALYSIS OF STATE SUPPLEMENTAL PAYMENTS IN MISSOULA COUNTY MARCH, 1983

- 1. There are approximately 85 personal care home residents in Missoula County. 27 of these residents receive some state supplement. This supplement is added to their income to help cover the cost of personal care services. The current state supplement is \$104 per month. An increase of \$152 per month is necessary in order to assure continued funding of these residents in personal care homes.
- 2. If the state supplement is increased by \$152 to cover the cost of personal care placement (\$540/month with \$40.00 personal care needs money returned to resident):

\$246.125 average payment per month

x 27 residents
\$6,645.40 total monthly supplement payment
(increase of \$4104 over current
state supplement)

3. If these residents were placed in nursing homes at an average monthly charge of \$1200, and their incomes (minus \$40.00 personal care needs money) were turned over to pay for their care:

\$1,052.269 Average monthly charge to Medicaid $\frac{x}{27}$ \$28,411.00 Total Medicaid charge per month $\frac{x.35}{59,943.83}$ State share of Medicaid cost

4. Cost to state for these 27 to reside in nursing homes is

\$9,943.83 - per month -6,645.40 - cost to state for personal care supplement \$3,298.43 - state savings

- 5. Per month it is \$3,298.43 less costly to the state to maintain 27 people in personal care settings as opposed to nursing homes. Savings for the state per year would be \$39,581.16.
- 6. The people who are in personal care are there because they need supportive care. They will need that care whether or not the state chooses to fund it adequately. Since taxpayers' money is involved the money should be spent as cost effectively as possible. This means funding all levels of care adequately so as to avoid misuse/overuse of the higher costing facilities (nursing homes, hospitals, Warm Springs).

Concerning H B 815 which directs the executive department to study abandoned railroad branch lines and report back to the legislature any rights-of-way or easments it feels should be preserved in the public interest:

Over 400 miles of railroad branch lines in the state are either being considered for abandonment or have been abandoned. This is in addition to the abandoned Milwaukee right-of-way.

New utility and transportation corridors are required from time to time. These corridors are very expensive to establish and very disruptive to the affected areas. Thus the state of Washington has seen fit to preserve all of the abandoned portions of the Milwaukee Road right-of-way (main line) in that state.

The manner in which a rail-banking bill was killed in the 1981 legislature apparently prevents the executive department from negotiating for any right-of-way or easment aquisition.

One of the railroads in the state is reportedly considering whether to turn over margional branch lines to the state with the idea that a private operator might wish to continue operation.

The Montana Citizens Freight Rate Association and its associated members and organizations believe that the state should carefully examine and evaluate the future potential of all abandoned or relinquished rail right-of-way in the state.
