EXECUTIVE SESSION OF SELECT COMMITTEE ON

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT - MARCH 26, 1983

CHAIRMAN VINCENT called the meeting to order at 7:45 a.m. in Room 224A. Representatives Fabrega, Fagg, Hansen, Neuman and Vinger were absent.

VINCENT opened meeting with discussion of proposed Statement of Intent to House Bill 1. ASAY asked if it was necessary to include language pertaining to prevailing wage and asked if that wage was that easy to determine. HARPER replied that the prevailing wage is usually figured on a two-, three-, or four-county area - areas that are close together economically, and is usually close to the minimum wage.

VINCENT said he thought the purpose of the Statement of Intent is to reflect the context of the Initiative, and that it was okay the way it was written.

METCALF moved adoption of the STATEMENT OF INTENT.

Motion carried unanimously.

VINCENT brought up proposed addition to Statement of Intent on behalf of local government. Gary Buchanan, Director of the Department of Commerce, defined local economic development organizations.

ASAY moved the proposed addition to the STATEMENT OF INTENT do not pass.

Motion carried. SCHYE and VINCENT voted against.

VINCENT brought members' attention to list of specific statutory language drafted by Department of Commerce referencing each code authorizing the Department to do work outlined in bill. Buchanan commented that he thought this language specifies each program in the bill and strengthens it.

METCALF moved the amendments drafted by the Department of Commerce.

Motion carried unanimously.

Greg Petesch, Legislative Researcher, asked the Committee's permission to rewrite amendments in proper form, to which Chairman Vincent agreed.

HARPER left to attend another committee meeting.

DISPOSITION OF HOUSE BILL 1

VINCENT explained his proposed amendments which were to take \$80,000 out of both the Assistance to Local Development Organizations and the Montana Product Promotion and International Export Assistance programs, and \$90,000 out of Travel and Tourism Promotion. This totals \$250,000, which he further proposed to put back into the bill for University Business Management Development Program to be funded at this amount. This program was deleted by the Appropriations Committee.

METCALF commented that he was going to resist any motion to amend House BIll 1 because he thinks the bill should be acted on the way it was passed out of the Appropriations Committee.

VINCENT moved the amendments.

Motion failed. METCALF, ASAY, HARRINGTON and RAMIREZ voting nay; DARKO, SCHYE, NEUMAN, and VINCENT voting aye.

HARPER had left his vote before leaving to attend another committee meeting, which was inadvertently not recorded above. METCALF moved to reconsider VINCENT'S amendments in order to record HARPER'S vote.

Motion carried, with HARPER voting aye, $\underline{5}$ voted aye - $\underline{4}$ voted nay.

METCALF moved the following amendment, to correct a clerical error in the bill.

Motion carried unanimously.

RAMIREZ proposed to amend the line item appropriation for Assistance to Local Development as he felt one-half of a million dollars was excessive for grants. He thinks \$100,000 per year for grants is ample. RAMIREZ moved to amend:

HANSEN arrived - 8:40 a.m.

Gary Buchanan, Director of the Department of Commerce, spoke against the motion because he thinks it would restrict effectiveness of programs.

Motion failed. METCALF, HARRINGTON, DARKO, HANSEN, SCHYE, HARPER, and VINCENT voting nay; ASAY, RAMIREZ and NEUMAN voting aye. $\frac{7}{2}$ voted nay - $\frac{3}{2}$ voted aye.

RAMIREZ moved to eliminate the Governor's Council on Economic Development.

Motion failed. METCALF, HARRINGTON, DARKO, HANSEN, NEUMAN, SCHYE, VINCENT and HARPER voting nay; ASAY and RAMIREZ voting age. 8 voted nay - 2 voted age.

RAMIREZ moved to eliminate the Montana Economic Reporting and Forecasting System.

Motion failed. METCALF, HARRINGTON, DARKO, HANSEN, NEUMAN, SCHYE, VINCENT and HARPER voting nay; ASAY and RAMIREZ voting aye. 8 voted nay - 2 voted aye.

RAMIREZ moved to reduce appropriation for Travel and Tourism Promotion.

Motion failed. METCALF, HARRINGTON, DARKO, HANSEN, SCHYE, VINCENT and HARPER voting nay; ASAY, RAMIREZ and NEUMAN voting aye. 7 voted nay - 3 voted aye.

HARRINGTON moved that House Bill 1, AS AMENDED, DO PASS.

Motion carried. METCALF, HARRINGTON, DARKO, HANSEN, NEUMAN, SCHYE, VINCENT and HARPER voting aye; ASAY and RAMIREZ voting nay. 8 voted aye - 2 voted nay.

Meeting was adjourned at 8:58 a.m.

STATEMENT OF INTENT

HOUSE BILL 1

"It is the intent of the legislature that all programs, councils, and committees authorized under (this act) shall give special attention and consideration to those sectors of the economy and businesses which:

- enhance local ownership and control of businesses by Montana residents;
- provide jobs that will be substantially filled by current Montana residents as opposed to providing jobs that will be filled by nonresidents coming into the state to fill such jobs;
- maintain and improve a clean and healthful environment,
 with emphasis on conservation, renewable resources, and
 alternative energy production;
- benefit small- and medium-sized businesses as defined by rules adopted by the economic development board;
- encourage or benefit the processing, refining, marketing, and innovative use and promotion of Montana's agricultural products;
 - pay the prevailing wage for that occupation; and
- have demonstrable affirmative action plans for employing veterans, women, minorities, and handicapped people.

All committees and councils authorized or funded by [this act] shall hold public hearings across the state to explain their activities and listen to the concerns of the local citizenry. Prior public notice is required for all regular meetings, reports, etc.

The councils, conmittees and programs established in [this act] shall reflect a balance of varying economic perspectives, actively investigate and seek out innovative economic development programs, and offer a diverse array of options and strategies for public comment before adopting recommendations.

It is the intent of the legislature that the Governor's Council on Economic Development will be created according to the provisions of 2-15-122, and that the council shall contain representatives from the following sectors of the economy; natural resources extraction and processing industries, small business, tourism, equiculture, education, conservationists, public interest, financial, professional, economic development, and organized labor. With regard to representatives of small particular emphasis shall be given to manufacturing enterprises, businesses established around the general preferences listed below, and businesses with non-traditional ownership individuals, in particular women, low-income, and minorities. STATEMENT OF INTENT - HB 1

IT IS THE INTENT OF THE LEGISLATURE THAT TECHNICAL AND/OR MONETARY
ASSISTANCE TO LOCAL ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT ORGANIZATIONS FROM THE
APPROPRIATION IN THIS BILL BE MADE ONLY UPON VERIFICATION BY THE
DEPARTMENT OF COMMERCE THAT THE LOCAL ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT ORGANIZATION
SEEKING ASSISTANCE IS:

- 1) IN VOLUNTARY COMPLIANCE WITH MONTANA'S OPEN MEETING LAW.
- 2) MAKING ITS FINANCIAL RECORDS AVAILABLE FOR PUBLIC INSPECTION.
- 3) PROMULGATING EFFECTIVE MEASURES TO FULLY DISCLOSE REAL OR POSSIBLE CONFLICTS OF INTEREST ON THE PART OF ITS OFFICERS, MEMBERS AND PERSONNEL.
- 4) ENCOURAGING PUBLIC AWARENESS AND DISCUSSION OF ITS ACTIVITIES, INCLUDING OPPORTUNITIES FOR PUBLIC PARTICIPATION AND COMMENT.
