MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE APPROPRIATIONS COMMITTEE March 26, 1983

The Appropriations Committee met at 1:45 p.m. on March 26, 1983, in Room 104, with Chairman Francis Bardanouve presiding. Representative Shontz was absent. All other members were present. Judy Rippingale, Legislative Fiscal Analyst, was also present. HOUSE BILLS 114, 161, 187, 624, 692, 758, and 759 were heard. No EXECUTIVE ACTION was taken.

HOUSE BILL 114: A BILL FOR AN ACT ENTITLED: "AN ACT TO PROVIDE TRAINING FOR FAMILY PRACTICE RESIDENT PHYSICIANS; LIMITING USE OF FUNDS; APPROPRIATING FUNDS; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE."

Representative MANUEL introduced the bill and explained its duties.

Proponents:

MARSHALL COOK, Montana Family Practice Program, voiced his support and provided a fact sheet (Exhibit 1).

DR. JOHN DRYNAN, Director of the Department of Health and Environmental Sciences, voiced his support for this bill.

J. T. LOENDORF, Montana Medical Association, voiced his support for this bill.

KEN RUTLEDGE, Montana Medical Association, voiced his support for this bill.

Opponents: None.

Discussion: None.

The hearing was closed to further testimony.

HOUSE BILL 759: A BILL FOR AN ACT ENTITLED: "A BILL APPROPRIATING MONEY TO THE DEPARTMENT OF INSTITUTIONS FOR AN INCREASE OF 25 IN THE AVERAGE DAILY POPULATION OF THE WARM SPRINGS STATE HOSPITAL; PROVIDING FOR A REVERSION OF FUNDING ON A PRO RATA BASIS."

Representative MENAHAN introduced this bill. He said there is a serious staffing problem at that institution and the legislature must do something about it.

Proponents:

BILL GOSNELL, representing the Office of Budget and Program Planning, voiced his support for this bill and outlined the budget approved by the subcommittee. The subcommittee increased the average daily population from 340 to 350 but he felt this bill would allow more flexibility should the population increase more than 350.

Representative NANCY KEENAN, House District #89, voiced her support for this bill. She felt the state should pay more attention to treatment than merely housing.

Opponents: None.

Discussion:

Representative MENAHAN noted that patients admitted to Warm Springs sometimes have to wait up to three weeks before they are seen by the physician and there have been a lot of complaints in this regard.

The hearing was closed to further testimony.

HOUSE BILL 187: A BILL FOR AN ACT ENTITLED: "AN ACT TO APPROPRIATE \$2 MILLION TO THE DEPARTMENT OF SOCIAL AND REHABILITATION SERVICES FOR EXISTING AREA COUNCILS ON AGING AS PROVIDED IN SECTION 53-5-101, MCA."

Representative MENAHAN introduced this bill which would fund in-home services for senior citizens through the Council on Aging. Representative BARDANOUVE said this committee has held a number of hearings on this bill already for people who came on the wrong days.

Proponents:

NORM HJELM from Great Falls voiced his support for this bill and presented written testimony from Elsie Latham of the Montana Senior Citizens Association who could not be present at the hearing (Exhibit 2). He handed out a census of residents of Montana broken down by age group (Exhibit 3). He said senior citizens make up a good portion of Montana's population and their needs should be fulfilled. Mr. HJELM said senior citizens are much happier if they can live in their own homes and not nursing homes.

AGNES CROW, Senior Helping Hands in Billings, voiced her support and provided written testimony (Exhibit 4). She also presented testimony from Bea Ann Leary (Exhibit 5).

JOHN LAFAVER, Director of the Department of Social and Rehabilitation Services (SRS), voiced his support for this bill.

RITA ALBANO, a Missoula nursing home ombudsman, voiced her support and presented a document which outlined the cost of health care throughout Montana (Exhibit 6).

MATT BASARABA, representing the Missoula chapter of the Montana Senior Citizens Association, voiced his support for this bill.

ROSCOE CANON of Great Falls voiced his support because he said these people want to take care of themselves instead of having to be placed in nursing homes.

Opponents: None.

Discussion:

Representative BENGTSON asked how this money would be allocated. Mr. LAFAVER said proposals are submitted and the Department chooses

the most meritorious proposals that would fit into the appropriation limit.

The hearing was closed to further testimony.

HOUSE BILL 161: A BILL FOR AN ACT ENTITLED: "AN ACT TO APPROPRIATE MONEY TO THE DEPARTMENT OF COMMERCE TO FUND THE POSITION OF STATE WEED CONTROL COORDINATOR."

Representative ERNST introduced this bill.

Proponents:

Representative THOFT voiced his support for this bill.

Opponents: None.

Discussion: None.

The hearing was closed to further testimony.

HOUSE BILL 692: A BILL FOR AN ACT ENTITLED: "AN ACT TO APPROPRIATE \$45,000 FOR ADMINISTRATION AND OPERATION OF THE FLATHEAD BASIN COMMISSION."

Senator JEAN TURNAGE, Senate District #13, presented this bill to the committee. This commission would be comprised of 15 members, some of which work for state departments that deal with environmental issues and one representative from Alberta, Canada. The commission would monitor the environment of the Flathead Basin. Most of the members are ex-officio and are not paid. This appropriation would provide meeting per diem. The state Forest Division in Kalispell has offered office space.

Proponents: None.

Opponents: None.

Discussion:

Representative CONNELLY noted that the Cabin Creek mining operation will be starting up soon and this commission would be needed to preserve the environment of that area.

The hearing was closed to further testimony.

HOUSE BILL 758: A BILL FOR AN ACT ENTITLED: "AN ACT REVISING THE COUNTY POOR FUND MATCHING GRANT-IN-AID PROGRAM BY PROVIDING THAT CERTAIN EXPENSES ARE REASONABLE AND NECESSARY POOR FUND EXPENDITURES FOR PURPOSES OF THE MATCHING GRANT-IN-AID PROGRAM AND MAKING THESE PROVISIONS RETROACTIVE TO JULY 1, 1982; DEFINING "INDIGENT PERSON" AND MEDICAL SERVICES" FOR POOR FUND PURPOSES; MAKING THE COUNTY POOR FUND MATCHING GRANT-IN-AID PROGRAM A PERMANENT PROGRAM; APPROPRIATING

MONEY FOR THE CURRENT FISCAL YEAR TO FUND EXPENDITURES AUTHORIZED BY THIS ACT; AMENDING SECTIONS 1 AND 2, CHAPTER 11, SPECIAL LAWS OF 1981; REPEALING SECTION 4, CHAPTER 11, SPECIAL LAWS OF 1981, AND PROVIDING AN IMMEDIATE EFFECTIVE DATE AND APPLICABILITY DATE."

Representative TONI BERGENE, House District #36, introduced this bill. She presented proposed amendments (Exhibit 7) and explained what this bill would do. Currently, Grant-in-Aid money cannot be used for legal services or workfare programs. This bill allows that money to be spent for these services, which tend to be very costly to larger counties.

Proponents:

DARRYL MEYER, lobbyist for Cascade County and Missoula County, voiced his support. He read a letter from Harold McLaughlin, Director of the Cascade County Public Welfare Office (Exhibit 8). He then presented a letter from the Missoula County Commissioners (Exhibit 9). This would be a one time expenditure and, if it is not appropriated, the counties don't know where they will come up with the money to pay these costs.

There was some discussion regarding the workfare program. The unions opposed this bill at first but negotiations are going much more smoothly now.

Opponents:

JOHN LAFAVER, Director of SRS, voiced his opposition to this bill. He said HB 898 addresses the Grant-in-Aid program. If both bills pass, they will address the same issue but will conflict and he felt HB 898 had more to offer.

Discussion:

Representative WALDRON noted that Missoula County has a law suit pending for administrative costs. Mr. LAFAVER said it was intended that the workfare program savings would offset the administrative costs. He further stated that deputy county attorney's salaries should not be paid through the Grant-in-Aid funds.

The hearing was closed to further testimony.

HOUSE BILL 624: A BILL FOR AN ACT ENTITLED: "AN ACT ALLOWING CERTAIN ELDERLY CITIZENS TO DEFER CERTAIN PROPERTY TAXES; PROVIDING AN INTEREST RATE FOR DEFERRED TAXES; PROVIDING FOR ADMINISTRATION AND ENFORCEMENT; PROVIDING PENTALTIES; PROVIDING AN APPROPRIATION; AND PROVIDING AN IMMEDIATE EFFECTIVE DATE."

Representative KATHLEEN MCBRIDE, House District #85, introduced this bill. Legislation passed last session changed senior citizens' property tax rates from a flat rate to a sliding fee based on income. These people do not have increases in income but their taxes were raised which put a great burden on them. This bill would allow elderly citizens to apply for this program and, if eligible, the state would

put a lien on the property. The state would then pay the local property taxes so there would not be a burden on local governments. When the property was sold or the person no longer met the eligibility criteria, the lien would be paid off. This would allow senior citizens to stay in their homes and, at the same time, the local governments would not lose their tax money.

Proponents: None.

Opponents: None.

Discussion:

Representative MCBRIDE explained that this bill is limited to senior citizens to see if this kind of program will work. If it proves to be successful, the bill can be increased to serve a larger group.

There was some discussion on how this bill relates to a bill passed earlier this session. The eligibility criteria in this bill limits it to lower income senior citizens. This bill also includes mobile homes.




- 1. The Montana Family Practice Satellite Unit Program, Inc. is a non-profit, tax exempt corporation with a board of directors representing the medical and hospital communities as well as the executive branch of state government.
- 2. The Montana Family Practice Training Program is community based, community hospital/physician sponsored program.
- 3. As of January 1, 1983, five communities are involved with the training of family practice residents. These communities are: Choteau, Havre, Helena, Sidney and Wolf Point.
- 4. The family practice residents are second and/or third year residents from various family practice residency training programs throughout the United States. These residents are licensed physicians in their respective states and are provided with a temporary license while training in the state of Montana. Fourteen residents will receive one month training within the state between August, 1982 and August, 1983.
- 5. At present there are eighty accredited family practice residency training programs that have expressed a desire to participate in the Montana program.
- 6. The cost for training one resident for one month will average \$3,000.00. The sponsoring hospitals are providing the cost of training. The sponsoring hospitals from the above five communities will be able to train at least twenty-two residents between July, 1983 and June, 1984. The cost will be approximately \$66,000.
- 7. The Family Practice Training Program is requesting \$135,000 for the 1985 biennium to support the program. These funds will not directly support the residency training activities of participating hospitals, but will cover the costs of coordinating and administering the placement of residents from various residency programs across the nation to the participating Montana hospitals.
- 8. The Montana Family Practice Training Program is not associated with other state medical educational programs, i.e.: WAMI, WICHE, The University of Washington or Montana University System.

9. A look to the future:

- a. There are 304 physicians in the state that practice family medicine (family practice physicians).
- b. The average age of this group of physicians is 50.
- c. 68 physicians in this group are between 50 and 59 years of age.
- d. 82 physicians in this group are over 60 years of age.

TESTIMONY OF ELSIE LATHAM, MEMBER OF THE BOARD OF THE MONTANA SENIOR CITIZENS ASSOCIATION IN FAVOR OF HOUSE BILL 187

My name is Elsie Latham and I am here to speak for House Bill 187 concerning home health care. I am part of a delegation of 12 members of Montana Senior Citizens Association who came by bus from Great Falls and Cascade. I would like the delegation to stand.

To gain an idea of the number of seniors in Montana, I have included a copy of the 1980 Census data containing the number of senior citizens in each district. In Cascade County, there are 11,310 seniors over the age of 60 according to the census. This should help the committee to comprehend the potential numbers of seniors needing in-home health care.

The Great Falls MSCA chapter goes on record as supporting House Bill 187 for the following reasons:

- (1) It has the broad-based support of all the senior groups throughout the state,
- (2) It is cost-effective and can help reduce the Medicaid budget of which Montana pays 37%,
- (3) It maintains the individual as a taxpayer, protecting the tax base.
- (4) Senior Citizens are much happier remaining in their own environment.

Yellowstone County Council On Aging, The Senior Helping Hands Program and the Visting Nurse Service have coordinated efforts to serve not only Yellowstone County but also serve Carbon, Big Horn Golden Valley, Musselshell, Stillwater and Sweetgrass Cos. with H.B. 217 Funds. With the \$35,838 we had in 1982-83 2 year period we have had 83 different clients with 4050 vists, average vist 2 Hours,

I can assure you all these patients were not eligible for monies from Medicare, Medicaid or Private Insurance and the Patient Themselves have very little money as most of them had exhausted their funds on Medical Care.for the services they received under H.B. 217 also none of them we were aware of were eligible for S.R.S. Home Attendence Services.

The Services given these clientsvaried but were given by well train-Homemaker Home Heath Aides . The clients recived Personal care where needed, Light Cleaning , Laundry , some meal Prepration and patient sitting.

Let me give you a few cases we have served.

Case A; A lady in a rural County had several surgeries on her back and ended up with a medal rod in her back, which took her body quite a while to accept, so for about six months she had to have a brace on before she could get out of bed and taken off before going to bed. As there was no family available we had a Homemaker Home Health Aide go in and do the back care, some light cleaning , laundy and shopping this way she was able to remain at home. She is now able to cre for her self.

Another sample of a case is case 8.

A couple in Mid 90's that the Daughter has been caring for when her husband became an invalid needing her full time so again in a rural area we were able to send help in 2 times a day to get the frail little Lady up for the day fix their breakfast and lunch, straighten up, make beds and some days do laundry. Then she would go back in late afternoon to fix dinner and do dishes give Lady her bath and help her in bed. The Daughters husband is some better now so we only help this couple 2 times a week now.

Many other cases are very simular such as case 3.

A 95 year old couple that are so frail that dishes are very hard for them and this couple is an example of coordination of family and several programs as they receive Meals on Wheels, A Nurse visits them once a month then our Homemaker Home Health Aide goes in 2 times a week to help with baths and light cleaning. The family takes care of the shopping, setting out medications, garbage and heavy cleaning. I just wish I could take you to see this lovely couple.

Many other cases are very simular with persons receiving help being mainly in 70 to 100 year group with long term illness or just frail and no longer eligible for Medicare in have helped many of them with very little money as medical bills have eaten up their life savings.

Along with patients 11 women in seven counties have received training in Personal Care, understanding the Aging Process and problems of caring for frail elderly in the home as this care does differ from hospitals and nursing homes, All the Supervising and training and Adminstrative work for the HB 217 funds has been donated from other Program funds.

In summary I would like to remind you that the Senior Population prefer to remain at home as long as they do not require 24 hour care where they are independent and happy. The last figure I saw

on persons in Nursing Homes said of the 4 to 5% Of the elderly that are currently in Nursing Homes 45% of them with a little help at home could have remained at home. I feel that the 83 in my 7 County Area plus the 1,475 in the rest of the state that this \$ 250,000. in the past 2 years has been well spent.

Ten to Twelve Dollars one or 2 times a week is also Cost effective as the same persons could have been \$40 to \$60 a day in Nursing Homes.

Please remember not all the Seniors in the State will need this service but there are more than the 1558 Seniors that have been served by this grant that do need help and we need to remember these are the beautiful people that have made our state and nation the most wonderful place in world to live in .

Committee Members:

In 1981 the Yellowstone County Council on Aging, Inc. in Billings was very pleased when the State Legislature passed H.B. 217 to assist the Seniors in Montana with in home services; now you are looking at H.B. 187 with the same intentions.

We saw this as an opportunity to renew a coordinated service in a seven county and one reservation vicinity for in home health services. Through contracts with the Yellowstone City County Health Department and the Senior Helping Hands this has been accomplished for Carbon, Big Horn, Golden Valley, Musselshell, Stillwater, Sweetgrass, Yellowstone Counties and the Crow Reservation.

The Senior Helping Hands Program has hired homemaker health aides who reside in these counties. These aides are supervised by nurses from the City County Health Department. The nurse will make a visit and determine the needs and then the aide goes in as needed to provide the services. These services may include light housekeeping, preparing an evening meal, shopping assistance and bathing.

Over the past $1\frac{1}{2}$ years we have provided services to 83 different individuals for a total of 4,050 visits. Approximately 45 clients were served in Big Horn, Carbon, Golden Valley, Musselshell, Stillwater, Sweetgrass Counties and on the Crow Reservation. These people would not have had these services without this program and this funding.

These services are important. They allow these Seniors to stay in their homes and remain independent. For many the other option is a nursing care facility and a lack of freedom and independence.

I would request that you consider the needs and dignity of those in our society who physically need our assistance.

Dear Darryl:

We understand House Eill 758 will be considered by the House Appropriations Committee on Saturday, March 23 at 1:00 p.m. I will be unable to attend the hearing because of prior committments which will have me out of state on Saturday.

H.B. 758 proposes a number of things including a re-enactment of matching grants-in-aid for Welfare administration provided for by the 1st Special Session in 1981. That part of the bill (re-enactment of matching grants) should be deleted since H.B. 798 (McBride's) will provide another mechanism for state assumption of county deficits.

Part (2) of Section 1 of H.B. 758 contains definitions which are also unnecessary in view of McBride's bill.

Our greatest concern is that current law be amended retroactively to 7/1/92 to clearly specify the following expenditures as reasonable and necessary and is found in Section 2, part (b) of H.B. 758:

<u>Legal Services</u> relating to county welfare cases provided by the County Attorney's office or by a contracted attorney authorized by the board of county commissioners.

Interest on Registered Poor Fund Warrants; and

Administrative and Supervisory Costs of Operating the Work Program.

Legal Services are provided to our department by a deputy County Attorney hired for that purpose and whose services are used exclusively by our department. We have funded a position in whole or in part for the past 5 years. If we did not fund such a position, the County Attorney could not give our needs the high priority required and we would be dependent on the availability of other staff. Prior to having our own position, we experienced a seriour lack of continuity, lengthy delays because of lack of availability and no service to provide training, consultation, representation with challenges brought by the public through administrative appeals and litigation. We feel we can demonstrate that the position has been cost effective on the basis of recoveries made by the services of the attorney and successful defense against appeals.

Interest on Registered Warrants is a cost we incur because we do not have cash to satisfy our legal obligations. The department is dependent on property taxes to pay its bills and the major portion of revenues are received in November and May in the form of property tax payments. Cascade County is in its third year of Poor Fund

deficit. State grant-in-aid rules forces the the county to begin the fiscal year with a zero or negative cash balance by requiring that all revenues be expended before a grant-in-aid is allowed. We began this fiscal year with a cash deficit of \$49,000 and have incurred costs at an average of \$200,000 per month. Since we did not have revenue to pay those costs, it was necessary to register warrants and that entails payment of interest. We will be in a deficit position during eight or nine months of this fiscal year.

Work Program administration expenses occur because we are required to have a work program to qualify for state matching grant-in-aid funds. In Cascade County, we have between 200 and 300 General Assistance clients who must work for their benefits. The number of hours they are required to work ranges from 40 to 120 per month. We have an average of 60 participants working on any given day at 21 public and private locations in the community. The responsibility of developing job sites, scheduling workers, transporting workers, negotiating continuously with labor organizations, dealing with job related conflicts, job injuries, keeping records and making reports are all responsibilities essential to a successful Workfare program. Our regular staff has neither the time nor ability to perform those duties and in Cascade County we have employed an individual as Work Program Administrator.

The cost for the foregoing three areas of need in Cascade County will be from \$100,000 to \$120,000 in this fiscal year. Anticipated expenditures will be about

\$35,000 for Legal services consisting of the travel, salary and benefits of a Deputy County Attorney.

\$53,000 for Interest on Registered Warrants.

\$20,000 for salary, benefits and travel of Work Program Administrator.

In addition to Cascade County, we are aware that at least Missoula and Silver Bow Counties are also incurring some or all of these areas of expenditure. We would estimate a maximum statewide need of \$300,000 to \$400,000 for those costs in fiscal year 1983 on a retroactive basis. We feel that is a relatively small portion of the total grant-in-aid authorization the Department of SRS has received for the current fiscal year.

Dear Representative Bardanouve and Other Committee Members:

We are writing to offer strong support for HB-758, which would mandate that the Department of Social and Rehabilitation Services reimburse counties for poor fund expenditures which they had erroneously decided do not qualify under HB-13, passed in the 1981 Spcial Session.

All counties that budgeted for Workfare administration, registered warrants and deputy county attorneys out of the poor fund, did so in the belief that they were required by State Law to pay for these services out of the poor fund, and indeed there was no other way for them to be paid. For SRS, through its rule-making authority, to mandate that statutory welfare costs could not be reimbursed by them under the grants-in-aid provisions of HB-13 we believe was a grievous and costly injustice. Passage of this bill will help to ensure that in the future, SRS respects the will of the Legislature and makes its rules in a more rational and responsive fashion.
