- MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE HOUSE AGRICULTURE, LIVESTOCK AND IRRIGATION SUBCOMMITTEE, MARCH 2, 1983
- The meeting was called to order by Chairman Roush, on Wednesday, March 2, 1983 at 12:30pm in Room 129, State Capitol. All subcommittee members were present.
- MR. JOHN MACMASTER, Legislative Council, explained changes made in the rough draft of the Committee resolution (exhibit).
- REP. ERNST asked if Section 7 could also apply to federal taxes. Mr. MacMaster replied the study could include rates for various groups.
- REP. ERNST moved the information be included in the bill on page 2, line 7. Rep. Lybeck seconded the motion which was unanimously approved by subcommittee members.
- MR. WILL BROOKE, Montana Stock Growers and Wool Growers Associations, told the Subcommittee he questioned the addition of Section 10, page 3, since he was not sure why it was to be included in the study. Chairman Roush advised those with agricultural interests in his district were concerned with disparities between land for various uses and fees charged. Rep. Holliday concurred with Rep. Roush.
- MR. BROOKE commented the matter is esentially a study in itself as it is such a large issue. Rep. Lybeck said there would be more time to gather information to be made available to the public, if the issue were included in the study.
- MRS. JO BRUNNER, Women Involved in Farm Economics, said many agricultural organizations had requested an interim study on leasing and when the bills were killed, the Department of Revenue promised to study the situation.
- REP. JACOBSEN told the Committee differences in rates should be expanded upon. Chairman Roush replied too much involvement in lease fees would overshadow the original purpose of the resolution.
- REP. HOLLIDAY asked Mr. Brooke if he would prefer other language in Section 10 or that it be dropped. Mr. Brooke replied Section 10 needed more direction.
- REP. ERNST told the Subcommittee the section should remain, adding the legislative process could deal with the issue.

REP. LYBECK commented the study should be a random sampling of issues, with all aspects considered. Rep. Hanson advised him the Montana Stockgrowers had completed a study on the matter.

REP. LYBECK moved the Subcommittee approve the changes made to the committee draft. Rep. Hanson seconded the motion, which was unanimously approved.

The meeting was adjourned at 1:50pm.
