MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE APPROPRIATIONS SUB-COMMITTEE ON ELECTED OFFICIALS AND HIGHWAYS
February 12, 1983 (Tape 69, Tape 70, Side A)

The meeting of the Appropriations Subcommittee on Elected Officials and Highways was called to order on February 12, 1983, in Room 437 at 8 a.m. by Chairman Joe Quilici.

#### WORK SESSION

### DEPARTMENT OF ADMINISTRATION

#### General Services

Mr. Cliff Roessner said that the schedule before the committee, Exhibit 1, starts with the total program costs and shows the results of the committee's actions on "Personal Services", "Operating Expenses" and "Equipment" reflecting the transfers to the Fish, Wildlife and Parks, with total program costs for FY84 of \$3,111,501 and for FY85 \$3,370,113. The second sheet, Exhibit 2, is a calculation to arrive at the cost which will be divided by the square footage for the agencies. The cost for the two security officers and the security improvements have been taken out. The split has been 80% Revolving Fund and 20% General Fund. Twenty percent of the cost for the General Fund was removed in 1984 and 1985 and in 1984 the security officers and the security improvements were added back to come up with a cost that will be borne by the General Fund, without taking into effect the square footage rate.

There are certain other expenditures that are accounted for in General Services that also aren't taken into account such as the liquor warehouse, Capitol land grant - \$50,000 that is used for repairs and maintenance, the Fish, Wildlife and Parks Building and the Surplus Property Building. Those costs are all subtracted from the total program costs and then divided by the square footage of 718,214 square feet to come up with the rate in each of the years. Rick Morgan has some figures to show the reason for the big jump between 1982 and 1984.

In 1982 the rate was \$2.63 a square foot and in 1983, that went up to \$2.69 a square foot. They were using the fund balance in

that account to take us through 1983. Since we did not have as hard a winter as expected, there probably will be a little more money left in that fund than expected; but if the proper rate had been charged for 1983, the increase is not as significant between 1983 and 1984 as it first appears.

Rick Morgan said they went back and tried to calculate the cost instead of comparing it to the billing rate. Our cost per square foot in 1982 was lower than the billing rate by \$.05 a square It cost us \$2.57 per square foot in 1982. In 1983, we are calculating that the cost is going to be \$2.84 per square foot as opposed to what we are billing or \$2.69 per square foot. are using some of the resources that we accumulated in the previous fiscal year to pay for this fiscal year. If you calculate the percentage increase in the cost, the cost between 1981 and 1982 jumped by a 21% figure in cost to service the buildings. Between 1982 and 1983, that cost jumped 11%; between 1983 and 1984, it is going to jump another 11%; and between 1984 and 1985, it is going to jump another 10%. The reason we are above the over-all inflation rate is, primarily, our utility cost--\$1 million a year out of a \$3 million budget.

Mr. Roessner said part of the increase from \$3,011,055 in FY83 to \$3,064,889 in FY84 was due to the addition of security improvements and the additional administrative officer plus there was \$25,000 charted for the Justice Department's building.

Senator Dover asked why 20% is taken off for General Fund.

Mr. Morgan said we have approximately 220,000 square feet that is unbilled. And the General Fund is in lieu of a fee charge--Hous Chamber, Senate Chambers, the Archives in the Museum, the Old Governor's Mansion on Ewing Street and that comprises 220,000 square feet. If we had 1,058,000 square feet-two divisors equals 20%. Senator Dover said then this warehouse, etc., is something that is not calculated on the other program?

Mr. Morgan said we have a different rate that is lower than the normal square footage rate for warehouse space that we were charging \$1.69 and \$1.74 the previous biennium. Since those buildings cost less to maintain, we factored in a lower rate. The other buildings that we are taking out are buildings that the costs are not all captured by General Services--Fish, Wildlife and Parks Building--they provide some of their own service so we only bill them for our actual costs and that works out to about \$1.90 a square foot. The Surplus Property Building, we are billing them for about one-half the cost under their agreement with the federal government. (Exhibit 3)

Senator Dover made a MOTION to accept the square footage figures on Exhibit 1 and let the OBPP and LFA work out the language and

the FY84 and FY85 General Services Program be approved as amended.

The MOTION was voted on and carried.

#### Board of Investments (Exhibit 4)

Mr. Roessner said that in Personal Services, the Board of Investments had 19 authorized positions. Two of those positions were unfilled during the year so it looks like the LFA's office deleted those two positions. During the initial hearings, Mr. Howeth explained that those two positions had been authorized as a career ladder for their security analysts to go up to portfolio manager. They had a hard time keeping their analysts on board long enough to get them trained to promote them into the portfolio manager positions. They are requesting these positions back.

Senator Dover made a MOTION that we approve 19 FTE's.

Mr. Roessner said there was some discussion whether the grade level was high enough to attract and retain portfolio analysts.

Chairman Quilici asked if they would need a Grade 15?

The reply was yes.

Senator Keating said you have asked for four security analysts at Grade 13 and two portfolio managers at Grade 15 that you haven't been able to fill.

Jim Howeth said they are not asking for any new positions. They just want to retain the positions they have.

Senator Keating asked if they could get people for those positions.

Mr. Howeth said they are all filled currently. Senator Keating said the plan is to move two of them up into the portfolio manager's position and fill the other two with trainees.

Question was called and the MOTION carried.

Mr. Roessner said that within Compensation, the LFA left out \$2,600 in per diem for board members when they come to Helena for their board meetings.

Senator Dover made a MOTION that the \$2,600 for per diem for board meetings be put back in.

The MOTION was voted on and carried.

# Operating Expenses

Mr. Roessner said the main difference was in Contracted Services for data processing costs to convert their whole investment management system to a new package.

Senator Dover made a MOTION that the committee approve the OBPP operating budget.

The MOTION was voted on and carried.

# Equipment

Mr. Roessner said the agency is requesting a \$14,000 word processor. He thought this word processor was one with a high speed printer and could do everything.

Mr. Howeth said they have seventeen employees. They have one secretary who serves as secretary to all the employees and also answers the telephone and is secretary to the Board. We were thinking about asking for a new position—an assistant secretary—but we decided we would ask for a word processor. When the new system is installed, we think we can have some personnel savings in our accounting and clerical department whereby we may not need the word processor. We could move an accounting position into a secretarial position. But we wanted a word processor in case we are not capable of having a vacancy savings under our new computer system.

Senator Keating made a MOTION that the "equipment" OBPP budget for the word processor be approved.

The MOTION was voted on and carried.

Senator Dover made the  $\underline{\text{MOTION}}$  that we accept the Investment program as amended.

The MOTION was voted on and carried.

#### Computer Services (Exhibit 5)

Mr. Roessner stated that on the worksheet it shows a difference in FTE's between OBPP and LFA of 7 employees. We do have the salaries in our budget for 92.45 FTE's. Mike Trevor stated that in some cases personnel is cut by 50% with the use of computers and the work is gotten out on time.

Senator Dover MOVED that we accept the 92.45 FTE's.

The MOTION was voted on and carried.

# Operating Expenses

Chairman Quilici said that the LFA's budget of \$391,506 for FY84 compared to \$406,627.

Mr. Roessner said there was a handout for the issue on equipment. He has been unable to reconcile that figure. He has gone over Mr. Trevor's figures and he would agree with the \$391,506.

Senator Dover made a MOTION that the LFA budget be approved with these differences: Supplies and Materials-OBPP; Travel-OBPP; Rent - increase \$391,506; and Repair and Maintenance - increase the LFA \$155,830 FY84. For FY85 LFA except for supplies and materials - OBPP; Travel - OBPP; Rent - increase \$563,008; Repair and Maintenance - increase \$59,531.

Mr. Roessner said the difference in "Communications" is for additional leased lines in case of expansion.

Mr. Trevor said he tried to come back to the LFA's over-all figure for the "Equipment" issue. There was a rent expenditure, a repair and maintenance expenditure and a communications expenditure plus equipment. It was all referred to as the equipment issue. It did have a figure of \$24,022 in FY84 and \$28,827 in FY85 that needed to be added to the LFA. That would come back to the OBPP budget. We would also take "communications" back to the OBPP.

The MOTION was voted on and carried.

There was some question regarding the repair and maintenance. Mike Trevor said he gave one piece - \$55,830 for FY84. When I finished talking about the equipment issue as presented by the LFA's report, I then called your attention to Point No. 5 of the handout, page 5, that there were also additional amounts of \$83,936 in FY84 and \$88,793 in FY85 which were overlooked because the maintenance of the 3033, the new processor we bought this biennium, was not in the base because it was under warranty in FY82. To simplify that, I am really asking in the "repair and maintenance", area for the amount necessary to bring the LFA up to the OBPP figure and that is \$139,766. You could get that by adding \$55,830 to \$83,936.

Senator Dover MOVED that on "repair and maintenance", we go back to the OBPP for FY84 and FY85.

The MOTION was voted on and carried.

#### Equipment

Chairman Quilici said there was a \$92,000 difference in FY84 and \$64,000 difference in FY85 between the OBPP and the LFA.

Mr. Tevor said this was the model change. We purchased the Model 3033 as a Model N which was missing some of the circuitry that was designed to give the 3033 the full capability and there was a savings at the time we purchased it. With this model change, it is an expensive way to add 15% additional horsepower to our system. The reason it is under "equipment" rather than "rent"--we have purchased that equipment and in order to modify it, we again have to purchase the modification. We can't rent a modification to a CPU or a piece of equipment that you have purchased.

Rep. Lory made a MOTION that the equipment budget of \$685,529 for FY84 and \$651,819 for FY85 be accepted. The MOTION was voted on and carried.

Senator Dover MOVED this budget as amended.

Senator Van Valkenburg said his concern was that Mr. Trevor's organization is a Revolving Account Agency. The Budget Office can come in and, by budget amendment, approve your purchase of new equipment, entering into a lease that lasts for five years. You get into a lease on something while we are gone, and we are pretty well stuck with it at that point.

Mr. Trevor stated that other than the purchase of our CPU, which is a five-year purchase plan which you approved, we do not exceed the 36 months on anything and, practically, all of our agreements, especially the rental-type lease, we renew every July. I don't think any additional language is necessary in that respect.

The MOTION was voted on and carried.

#### Records Management (Exhibit 6)

Chairman Quilici said you have a difference in the FTE's. Mr. Roessner said the difference in the FTE's--they had some people on board that they weren't using. They have requested them back in anticipation of getting some microfilming jobs from the Supreme Court and the Secretary of State's office.

Mr. Trevor said that instead of adding back the 1.5 FTE, they could get along with .5 FTE.

Senator Dover made a MOTION to allow them 10 FTE's.

The MOTION was voted on and carried.

# Operating Expenses

Mr. Roessner said that in operating expenses, the supplies and materials--the difference is mainly in the microfilming projects.

Senator Dover made a MOTION accepting the LFA budget plus \$20,000 in "Supplies and Materials" for FY84 and FY85. The MOTION was voted on and carried.

Senator Van Valkenburg said it was his recollection that regarding "Travel", they needed that money to get out to the universities. He MOVED the full amount on Travel.

The MOTION was voted on and carried.

### Equipment

Mr. Roessner said that in this category, they had requested an increase in "Repair and Maintenance", because some of their equipment was getting a lot of use (cameras, etc.).

Senator Dover MOVED the OBPP budget on "Equipment" be accepted.

Mr. Roessner pointed out that if you cut the budget in the other agencies, it is going to give them incentive to use Records Management and the Computer Services because it turns out to be cheaper than printing all that paper.

Senator Keating qualified that if we are going to cut FTE's, we are going to have to be more dependent on these records.

The MOTION was voted on and carried.

Senator Dover made a MOTION to accept the budget as amended.

The MOTION was voted on and carried.

# Information Systems (Exhibit 7)

There was some discussion as to the difference between 21 FTE's and 10 FTE's. Mr. Roessner said that this is now a Systems Development Bureau. The Information Systems Division program is zeroed out.

Senator Dover made a MOTION that 29 FTE's be accepted.

The MOTION was voted on and carried with Senator Van Valkenburg voting "no".

# Operating Expenses

Chairman Quilici said there is a difference in "Other Expenses" and "Travel".

Mike Trevor said he talked about "Travel" expense needing \$4,372 added in FY84 and in the "Other Expenses" area he needed \$6,400 for registration fees in conjunction with that "Travel". That adds up to about \$10,700. This request is an effort on our part—even though we have a severe cost recovery problem—that the state will see better service if we get people trained.

Senator Dover made a MOTION that the Committee accept the OBPP budget for "Travel". There was some discussion. The MOTION was voted on and carried with Chairman Quilici voting "no".

# Equipment

Chairman Quilici said there is \$1,447 to pay off the principal on a terminal.

Senator Dover made a  $\underline{\texttt{MOTION}}$  that we accept the OBPP budget for "Equipment".

The MOTION was voted on and carried.

Senator Dover made a MOTION that we accept the budget as amended.

The MOTION was voted on and carried.

Mr. Roessner said he would like to raise an issue with the last three budgets that we reviewed that has to do with the funding. They have requested to account for the last three programs within a single account or an accounting entity. The LFA feels that these operations should be segregated into separate accounts in order that we may keep track of them on an account-by-account basis. The agency has requested that they be allowed to combine them into a single account. We feel that we should have the ability to analyze these accounts on our own without having to run to the agency and request information for the three separate

We believe these operations should be segregated into individual accounts.

Senator Dover said that cash flow is a problem and by putting these accounts together, you can keep the amount down.

Mr. Roessner said there is within law, if you are having a cashflow problem, you can make an inter-entity loan between accounts. It states that the entity receiving the loan must certify that there will be sufficient revenue generated within that fiscal year to pay back that loan. We are saying if the revenue isn't

there, then the rates should be raised and let the activity support itself. In other words, let the users of that service pay for it and not let everybody who doesn't use that service pay for it.

Senator Van Valkenburg made a MOTION that we require that there be separate accounts for each of these programs. He said, "It is my hope that the Finance Committee will take a look at Systems Development during the interim and it will make it easier for the Finance Committee to do that if we have it broken out."

Mr. Trevor said in making his presentation he put the single account at the front and stated this represents his priorities. If we are forced to go to three separate accounts, our rates are going to go higher than they would (systems development rate and record management rate) if we are allowed to manage one account. Even if we play around with loans, we are going to have to make the effort to cover those costs uping the rate enough to give us a cash operating balance in three separate accounts versus managing it with one cash operating account and breaking even.

You can't process payroll unless you have the cash in the account.

Senator Keating asked Mr. Roessner if it was possible to permit Computer Services to run it in a single manner for the purposes of cash-flow management, as he describes, but through the marvels of accounting somehow segregate the accounting process for the purposes that Senator Van Valkenburg has expressed?

Mr. Roessner said in the area of accountability, he talked about cost recovery reports which he handed out. Even when these are separate accounts, SBAS is not designed for enterprise accounting. We must see how income and expense compare.

Senator Keating asked if we merge the accounts, we are giving you that money in a single pool to move it wherever you want to within the three systems.

Mr. Trevor said he would have no problem if you would lock us--spending authority-wise--so we can't transfer authority from one sub-program to another. What I want to be able to do is use available cash. If my Systems Development is at a low ebb and Records Management is fine and Computer Services is doing fine, I don't want to have to bother with floating a loan to Systems Development. I want to use available cash to pay expenses.

Senator Dover asked if we do what you want us to do, are you going to come back next time with three pages broken out of are you going to come back with just one of these pages totally everything with a readout of the breakdown of how the cash flow works.

Mr. Trevor said he would be very happy to come back with a break-down of three budgetary sub-program areas.

Senator Keating said he hears Mr. Trevor saying that these three entities each generates a certain amount of receivables. It generates revenue into those accounts. But the accounts receivable are not always transferred at the same time and he has a need for cash flow to cover certain costs in each of them. He is asking for permission to use the cash flow in one to pay payables in another one when that one happens to be long on receivables and short on cash and to be able to move his cash flow freely without having to do the paperwork of floating loans from one to the other. We could have the separate accounting and the separate accounts on SBAS but give him the authority to use the combined cash flow of the three as he needs. By the end of the year, everything should balance out.

Chairman Quilici said that if we would go to one account, he hoped the Committee could put some language in to stipulate and designate that they are separate accounts.

Senator Dover made a <u>SUBSTITUTE MOTION</u> that we go to one accounting system but that Mr. Roessner, Mr. Booker and Mr. Trevor work out boiler plate where each account pays its own way.

Senator Keating said we are blending the accounts and this works against the LFA who wants to track these separate items. Senator Dover said the boiler plate should give him permission to use the combined cash flow within the three services.

Mr. Roessner requested a full financial statement every month for each of the operations.

The SUBSTITUTE MOTION was voted on and carried.

### Mail and Distribution (Exhibit 8)

Senator Van Valkenburg made a MOTION to approve the OBPP budget for the Mail and Distribution Bureau.

Mr. Roessner said in the Rental figure, the LFA increased the square footage at the request of the agency because they are going to have more space in the next biennium than they had in 1982-1983.

Rep. Lory made a <u>SUBSTITUTE MOTION</u> that the Committee approve the OBPP with the exception of Rent and the LFA for Equipment for FY85 which is \$5,200 instead of the \$7,000.

The SUBSTITUTE MOTION was voted on and carried.

Rep. Lory made a  $\underline{\text{MOTION}}$  to approve the budget as amended. The MOTION was voted on and carried.

The meeting adjourned at 9:45 a.m.

# Budget Issues

- 1) Our executive budget request retains two portfolio management FTE's. These positions are vital to the operation to help administer the growth in the investment portfolio.
- 2) Our executive budget request includes \$2,600 per diem (in each year of the biennium) for board members of the Board of Investments. Per diem was omitted from the Fiscal Analyst budget.
- 3) Our executive budget request provides data processing services for additional maintenance and operational costs. These costs result from the conversion of the old investment management system to a new package. Data processing costs of \$5,499 in 1984 are requested.
- 4) The executive budget also includes a modified request for a word processor in FY 84 (cost \$14,410). The word processor would allow more efficient processing of the divisions' market analyses, correspondence, and reports.
- 5) Vacancy savings of 3.5% has been recommended by the Fiscal Analyst in this budget. The total cost based on our executive budget request would be \$18,287 in 1984 and \$18,245 in 1985. This results in a .75 FTE reduction during each year of the biennium.
