#### MINUTES OF MEETING SENATE JUDICIARY COMMITTEE March 3, 1983

The thirty-fourth meeting of the Senate Judiciary Committee was called to order by Chairman Jean A. Turnage on March 3, 1983 at 10:05 a.m. in Room 325, State Capitol.

ROLL CALL: All members were present.

CONSIDERATION OF HOUSE BILL 433: Representative Mueller, sponsor, advised that the major purpose of this bill is to save counties money. Under the provisions of HB433 a prospective juror could not be disqualified from serving on a jury solely by firtue of the fact that he is a depositor of funds with a financial institution. This is particularly a problem in those areas which are so small that they have few banks. Representative Mueller informed the Committee of a case in Libby and Livingston which resulted in additional expenses to the counties when the majority of the jurors could not be selected because of their relationship with a bank. He also advised that Marc Racicot had testified in favor of this bill before the House committee.

There being no proponents, no opponents, and no questions from the Committee, Representative Mueller closed by stating this is essentially a housekeeping change which would alleviate problems and cause a savings of money to counties.

CONSIDERATION OF HOUSE BILL 481: Representative Phillips, sponsor, advised that this bill would give the U.S. Customs Service and Immigration and Naturalization Services the power to make arrests in Montana for violations of Montana law. The officers employed by these divisions are federal officers, but currently the statutes do not give them the authority to make arrests while on duty.

PROPONENTS: Donald Myhra, District Director of the U.S. Customs Service for the Great Falls District, testified in favor of the bill and submitted his written testimony (see attached Exhibit "A").

Paul Hayes, representing the U.S. Immigration and Naturalization Service, testified in favor of the bill. He stated that all officers receive extensive training in criminal and civil law, along with law enforcement training, and are therefore qualified to make arrests (see attached statement marked as Exhibit "B").

John Scully, representing the Montana Sheriff and Peace Officer's Association, voiced his support for this legislation.

There being no further proponents, and no opponents, the hearing was opened to questions from the Committee.

The Committee questioned if the officers now have the power to detain a person. They were advised that the officers do not and that it is now necessary for them to "play a game" of continuing to process a persons entry into the country in order to detain the person at the border until an officer with the power to arrest can arrive. It was noted that this is a severe problem in those places where the law enforcement must come from hundreds of miles away.

Senator Galt questioned if the officers now have the power to arrest for violations of federal law and was advised that they do.

Senator Berg questioned if the officers themselves are in support of this bill and he was advised that they are. It was noted that Sheriff O'Reilly was present and favored the bill.

There being no further questions, the hearing was closed.

CONSIDERATION OF HOUSE BILL 417: Representative Metcalf advised that he was sponsoring this bill at the request of the Board of Pharmacists. It is their feeling that the list of controlled substances contained in state law should be updated to conform with controlled substances listed in the Code of Federal Regulation.

PROPONENTS: Warren Amole, representing the State Board of Pharmacists, testified in favor of the bill and submitted his written testimony (see attached Exhibit "C"). He especially encouarged the adoption of HB417 as many drug possession cases use the defense that the Board has delegated its authority to schedule drugs to the federal government.

There being no further proponents and no opponents, the hearing was opened to questions from the Committee.

Senator Halligan questioned why the list of controlled substances was not automatically updated. He was advised that the Administrative Code Committee stated this could not be done and the current lists have not been updated since 1973.

Senator Mazurek questioned if any convictions had been overturned since we do not have the updated list in our statutes. He was advised that none have been, but this defense keeps arising.

Counsel advised the Committee that the Supreme Court has found that the legislature cannot delegate authority to adopt federal regulation as they may be amended from time to time.

There being no further discussion, the hearing was closed.

ACTION ON HOUSE BILL 481: The Committee agreed that federal officers have a practical problem. Senator Mazurek questioned if we risk potential liability to the state by enacting this law. The Committee felt the liability would be on the officer. Counsel advised that conceivably the officer already has the power to make an arrest. The Committee felt the enactment of HB481 would eliminate any question of the officer's authority. Senator Daniels moved HB481 BE CONCURRED IN. This motion carried with Senators Berg and Crippen voting in opposition.

CONSIDERATION OF HOUSE BILL 130: Representative Stobie, sponsor, turned the hearing over to the witnesses to present their material supporting this bill.

Sheriff Chuck O'Reilly of Lewis and Clark County and PROPONENTS: also representative for the Montana Sheriff and Peace Officer's Association, read a letter from the Criminal Investigation Bureau of the Department of Justice which enumerated the reasons for passage of this bill (see attached Exhibit "D"). currently a wide-spread problem with the sale of look-alike drugs through the mail. Sheriff O'Reilly displayed immitation cross-tops and black beauties, along with mail-order advertisements promoting these drugs (see Exhibit "E"). The urgent problem with these drugs is that they are popular among the junior high and grade school children. Since they are not as potent as their controlled counterparts, the children take two and three times as many to obtain the same effects. When they are then introduced to the real drug, they continue taking two and three times as many which consequently causes severe overdoses and sometimes death.

Nick Rotering, an attorney for the Department of Institutions, supported the bill from a treatment standpoint. He emphasized the need to control these types of drugs as abuses of these drugs can be very dangerous.

Jerry Loendark, representing the Montana Medical Association, advised that he has worked with many young people who take these types of substances and strongly urged the Committee to give the bill favorable consideration.

Vern Sloulin, representing the State Department of Health, testified in favor of the bill and advised that 36 states currently have laws relating to look-alike drugs. He advised that the F.D.A. strongly encourages each state to adopt their own laws relating to these drugs.

There being no further proponents, and no opponents, the hearing was opened to questions from the Committee.

Senator Berg questioned if the passage of this bill would prevent the mail-order companies from advertising. Mr. Sloulin stated that the states who have laws against look-alike drugs have been able to stops the ads. It was also noted that page 5 of the bill lists a penalty for advertising.

Sheriff O'Reilly further advised the Committee that an additional danger with these drugs is that the black beauties are sometimes laced with strychnine.

Senator Crippen asked Representative Stobie why the House had deleted the language that the drugs could be possessed for research purposes. Representative Stobie believed that this was covered in another section of the statutes. Senator Crippen also inquired why the word "possession" had been stricken. He was advised that this would make the law too strict for middle school children and that the major intent of the bill is to deter possession for sale purposes and advertising.

Senator Mazurek felt the fine should be raised to \$50,000 so as to be consistent with other drug law penalties.

There being no further discussion, the hearing was closed.

FURTHER CONSIDERATION OF HOUSE BILL 589: Senator Daniels advised the Committee that he had misunderstood the intent of HB589 and would therefore like to have it returned to the Committee for reconsideration. The Committee acknowledged this request.

ACTION ON HOUSE BILL 417: The Committee felt they were ready to consider executive action on this bill. Senator Berg moved HB417 BE CONCURRED IN. This motion carried unanimously.

ACTION ON HOUSE BILL 433: The Committee could see the problems the smaller jurisdictions have in selecting jurors when there are so few banks in the community. Senator Brown moved HB433 BE CONCURRED IN. This motion carried with Senator Daniels voting in opposition.

ACTION ON HOUSE BILL 130: Counsel advised the Committee that there is a need to include a subsection (3) in the bill which would define person as including a corporation in order to apply the penalties to corporations under 45-2-311. Senator Galt moved to adopt the amendment as above proposed. This motion carried unanimously. Senator Mazurek felt that in order to be consistent with other drug penalties, the fine should be increased from \$25,000 to \$50,000. He moved that this increase should be inserted on page 3, line 21 and page 4, line 19. Senator Mazurek also thought the stricken portion of the bill relating to a presumption in favor of deferred sentences for minors should be reinserted. These motions carried unanimously. Senator Mazurek then moved that HB130 BE CONCURRED IN AS AMENDED. This motion carried unanimously.

ADJOURN: There being no further business before the Committee, the meeting was adjourned at 11:07 a.m.

STATEMENT: MONTANA PEACE OFFICER STATUS

TO: CHAIRMAN & COMMITTEE MEMBERS, SENATE JUDICIARY COMMITTEE

On behalf of the United States Customs Service I am happy to have this opportunity to express my concern and interest in attaining Senate passage and final enactment of legislation to establish Peace Officer status in Montana for United States Customs and Immigration and Naturalization Service officers when they are on duty.

The primary need for passage of this legislation is to eliminate the gap which is now present in coordinated enforcement efforts among U.S. Customs and INS, state and local enforcement agencies in the State of Montana. That gap or breakdown is due to the fact that our officers do not have the authority to legally detain, hold, or arrest a wanted person even though there is reasonable cause to believe that a local or state warrant for arrest exists.

Basically this creates a really bad situation potentially resulting in one or the other of the following:

- Our officer detains the wanted party without actual authority,
   leaving the officer open to later litigation action (civil suits)
   or
- 2. The wanted person is released to "hit the road".

The passage of Montana Peace Officer status for Customs and INS officers is long overdue and becomes more critical as our Treasury Enforcement Communications System (TECS) data base grows.

We presently have 15 border ports and stations in Montana where arriving persons are processed. Further, we have 7 other inland locations, airports and ports of entry, where arriving persons are processed.

This Bill is an act updating the list of controlled substances. There are two main reasons why the Board of Pharmacists is requesting the passage of this Bill.

Number one is to have the drugs listed in the various schedules to conform with the listing in the Code of Federal Regulations. In the present statutes (referred to on page 1 of the Bill) most drugs are listed consecutively in paragraphs. This makes it difficult to locate a specific drug. You will notice that the format in this Bill names the drugs in list form. This will be helpful to anyone who has need to use the list. It will also make it easier to add, delete, or change drugs in the future.

Number two is that although the Board is given the authority to schedule, reschedule or delete a "controlled substance" (50-32-203 MCA), it has been recommended by the Attorney General's office and others that the Board support a bill in each session of the Legislature that reflects any revisions that may have occurred in the two year interval between legislative sessions. This Bill will help to eliminate any discrepancy between the statutory schedules of controlled substances and administrative rules.

In addition, whenever a drug possession case goes to court that involves a drug that has been scheduled by the Board but not by the Legislature, the defendant uses the defense that the Board has delegated its authority to

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this defense ploy but this Bill would eliminate this possibility. The pterent language could be constitued, as an unauthorized nine population legislative authority.

The Board of Pharmacists recommends the passage of this Bill.

In regard to our conversation regarding "look alike" drugs and the ever increasing problem we are having with them in Helena and Lewis and Clark County, we have put together the following information.

As members of the American-Canadian Drug Enforcement Task Force, we ve had occasion to discuss this problem with officers from different eas of Montana, North Dakota and Canada. All are experiencing similar problems with the appearance of these look alike drugs.

We have included advertisements taken from different tabloids and magazines available in Montana. The large color ad from Mid South Pharmaceutical Inc. was received through the mail by a respectable Helena resident who did not request such information.

Most of the stimulant-type pills contain ephedrine sulfate, caffeine or pther non-controlled stimulants which are designed to give the effect of amphetamines or "speed". The analgesics or "downers" usually have Doxylamine succinate or salicylamid, again non-controlled, non prescription drugs designed to give the effect of controlled depressant-type drugs.


The price of these look alikes are stated in the advertisements, but on the streets, in the Helena area, the "Black Beauties" a stimulant are selling for three dollars each, while the cross-tops, a stimulant, are selling for about twenty-five cents each.

We find these two particular look alikes to be very popular with high school and junior high students. These youngsters believe that they are buying real amphetamines. It is not unusual for a person to take three or four of these look alikes to gain a desired effect.

The real danger is when one of these users happens upon genuine amphetamines or depressants. If either of these are taken in any quantity it can result in serious health problems or even death.

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


