MINUTES OF THE MEETING EDUCATION AND CULTURAL RESOURCES COMMITTEE MONTANA STATE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

January 21, 1985

The Education and Cultural Resources Committee meeting was called to order January 21, 1985 by Chairman Dan Harrington at 3:15 p.m. in Room 312-3 of the State Capitol.

ROLL CALL: All members were present, with the exception of Roland Kennerly.

Chairman Harrington introduced Mr. Bob Stockton from the Office of Public Instruction who showed the Committee two video tape programs concerning the Foundation Funding Program and permissive budgeting.

After viewing the two instructional films, Chairman Harrington opened the hearing on H.B. 129.

CONSIDERATION OF H.B. 129: Sponsor Les Kitselman, District #95, explained that the bill was an extension of work done last year. It calls for the equal sharing of the local impact and education trust fund account by post-secondary vocational technical centers and adult basic education programs. The reason being that there is larger demand for classes and space. Rep. Kitselman said these educational centers are a definite asset to each community.

PROPONENTS: Jim Reno from the Billings Public Schools and representing Montana Adult Education stepped forward and said that adult basic education serves those 16 and over who are no longer attending school. These students may include high school drop-outs, displaced homemakers, battered spouses, and layed off workers who wish to review and upgrade their basic reading, writing, and arithmetic skills. Mr. Reno pointed out that there are 30 such facilities across the state and passed to the Committee Exhibit 1 giving total students, impact, and needs. He relayed that there is a two week waiting list for math classes at present and teaching positions have been dropped due to lack of funds.

Bill Shupe, 1984 President of the Montana Adult Education Association and a teacher at Helena Adult Learning Center, spoke in favor of H.B. 129. He said 30% of Montana's adult population, 20 years old and older, do not possess a high school diploma and need essential skills to suceed or survive. (See Exhibit 2)

Mr. Patrick O'Leary, Superintendent of the Helena Adult Learning Center relayed that covering the present needs of the Center is quite a task and urged support of this bill.

There being no opponents to this bill, Chairman Harrington called for questions and discussion from the Committee.

DISCUSSION OF H.B. 129: Rep. Sands posed the question of what is the budget figures for the State for these programs, to which Bill Cuneen from the Office of Public Instruction answered that there were three sources of funds. The Federal grant stands at \$250,000, the State appropriation is \$149,000 and the local input is generated by a one mil levy. The appropriated funding level last year was \$500,000. In answer to Rep. Peck's question of how the funds are divided between vo-tech and adult basic ed., Mr. Christiansen from the Office of Public Instruction answered that 82% goes to vo-tech (\$626,000) and 18% goes to adult basic ed. (\$140,000). Rep. Eudaily asked about the number of students educated to which Mr. Christiansen replied that there are 5,000 in adult basic ed. and 3,600 in vo-tech.

Rep. Kitselman made closing remarks pointing out that monies used by vo-tech are used for remedial services which is charged back under ANB by the State. Using these figures, Rep. Kitselman pointed out that it would be roughly \$16,000 for each of the 30 centers throughout the state.

There being no further questions or discussion, the hearing on H.B. 129 was closed.

CONSIDERATION OF H.B. 194: Representative Francis Koehnke, District #32, introduced this bill to Committee members saying that it affects 11 county high schools throughout the state. The law reads presently that the trustees of a county high school need 20% of the population's signatures on a petition before having a bond election. Rep. Koehnke felt the law was outdated and this bill would give the trustees a choice of whether to go directly to the county commissioners or have petition signing.

PROPONENTS: Floyd Larkin of Powell County High School in Deer Lodge spoke in favor of this bill as the method would then coincide with the elementary schools, whose law was changed in 1975.

John Ryan, Superintendent of Broadwater County High School in Townsend, spoke favorably of the bill as the board of trustees found a great misunderstanding in the community as to why a petition had to be signed. People thought they were voting for the bond issue, which was not the case. He stated that it was a very time consuming and difficult job.

Ann Rauser, Chairperson of the Board of Trustees from Broadwater County High School in Townsend reiterated support of the bill as it is an unnecessary burden on the Board.

Bill Anderson speaking for the Office of Public Instruction voiced support of the bill.

Chip Erdmann from the Montana School Board Association spoke for the bill as it would make consistent the county high schools with other school districts and does not take any of their power away.

Charles Plymale from the Board of Trustees of Broadwater County High School spoke about the handicap of having a petition signed and not realizing that it wasn't good after a certain time period and having to re-do it.

There being no opponents to the bill, Chairman Harrington called for questions and discussions.

DISCUSSION OF H.B. 194: Discussion ensued regarding the basis of designating a high school as "county" as brought out by Rep. Sands and answered by Bill Anderson with the O.P.I. Mr. Anderson said in the beginning they were set up separately and there has been some discussion to unifying them, but the process is lengthy.

Rep. Koehnke closed the hearing on this bill by saying that he could see nothing detrimental in its content.

ACTION ON H.B. 194: Rep. Hammond moved, Rep. Brandewie seconded, that House Bill 194 DO PASS. The motion carried unanimously by voice vote.

ACTION ON H.B. 144: Rep. Mercer made a motion that H.B. 144 be amended as follows:

TESTIMONY

PROPONENT

Mr. Chairman and Members of the Committee:

My name is Bill Shupe and I've been a teacher at the Helena Adult Learning Center for the past twelve years. I'm also the past President of the Montana Adult Education Association.

At a time when excellence in education is a national priority and when the trend in the job market is toward increasingly technological jobs, fully 30 percent of Montana's adult population (20 years of age and older) do not possess a high school diploma. Functional illiteracy seems to be growing. A report issued in recent weeks by the Library of Congress expressed grave concern over this problem. But Montana's Adult Learning Centers have had reductions in staff at the same time demand for services has grown.

I strongly urge your support for this bill, House Bill 129. For people without the basic skills of a high school equivalency or external diploma, institutions like the university and vo-tech systems or the good-paying technical jobs are not possible. From electronics to word processing, to modern day-to-day life, basic reading and math are essential skills needed to succeed, or even survive. The 30 plus adult learning centers provide the opportunity to learn these skills. This bill will provide undereducated adults throughout the State of Montana the opportunity to achieve the basic skill knowledge needed for success.
