MINUTES OF THE MEETING LONG-RANGE PLANNING SUBCOMMITTEE MONTANA STATE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

February 11, 1985

The meeting of the Long-Range Planning Subcommittee was called to order by Chairman Robert Thoft on February 11, 1985 at 8:04 a.m. in Room 420 of the State Capitol.

ROLL CALL: All members were present, except Senator Van Valkenburg who was excused.

EXECUTIVE ACTION

MONTANA ARTS COUNCIL, CULTURAL AND AESTHETIC PROJECTS: Carolyn Ennis (47:B:009), Chairman, Cultural and Aesthetic Project Advisory Committee presented the committee with the new funding recommendations for cultural and aesthetic projects (EXHIBIT 1). She said the advisory committee followed recommendations of the subcommittee when revising the funding list. The Helena Civic Center is funded at \$25,000 with a matching requirement and the Montana Play Creation Project is funded at \$10,000, rather than \$24,300. Ms. Ennis said in an effort to maintain equitable treatment for the applicants who went through the review process, the advisory committee is recommending the priorities remain the same. The three additional projects, St. Mary's Mission, Oral History and Folklifeare to be funded from the money which was made available by subcommittee action on Friday, February 1, 1985. \$122,700 was made available for funding when the following projects were either recommended to receive no funding or reduced funding: 1) the Fox Theatre, reduced funding; 2) Helena Civic Center, reduced funding; 3) Logon, no funding; 4) Stanley Howard, no funding; 5) Powell County Museum, no funding; and 6) Montana Play Creation, reduced funding. Since two of the three modified projects cannot be fully funded, from the \$122,700, the advisory committee recommends any reverted funds be given to the Oral History and Folklife projects to complete their funding in the later stages.

Ms. Ennis said the advisory committee still is not totally clear about the local support for St. Mary's Mission. She said the advisory committee also has strong feelings against funding portions of state agency budgets from the Coal Tax Fund.

Senator Fuller (47:B:113) asked if the advisory committee is expecting to get about \$40,000 in revertions to fully fund the Oral History and Folklife projects. Ms. Ennis said yes, based on the amount that has been reverted in the past and the fact that some project funding is contingent upon matching funds. Senator Fuller asked if the money does not revert, will the projects just stop. Ms. Ennis said the agencies feel they can raise funds or alter their programs to compensate for lost funding, if they are given adequate notice. Projects will not be chopped off at an incomplete stage. Senator Fuller asked if St. Mary's Mission funding is dependent on revertions. Ms. Ennis said no, it will be fully funded from the \$122,700.

Senator Fuller (47:B:162) moved that the subcommittee accept all funding recommendations for Cultural and Aesthetic projects, as submitted by the advisory committee, with contingencies outlined.

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Chairman Thoft (47:B:164) asked Mr. Pratt to discuss Challenge Grants with the committee prior to taking action on Senator Fuller's motion.

Bill Pratt (47:A:168), Organizational Services Director, Montana Arts Council explained the language the council is proposing to be placed in the appropriations bill on Challege Grants (EXHIBIT 2).

Representative Ernst (46:B:191) said putting 20 to 25 percent of the total grant funds available into Challege Grants might be hard to justify. Mr. Pratt said the subcommittee gave the council no guidelines on this and it did not want to put a specific dollar amount down, so it put in the percentage range. David Nelson (47:A:204), Director, Montana Arts Council said basically the council feels the Challege Grants will compete with the capital expenditure category. Mr. Pratt said currently the capital expenditure category uses around 30 percent of the total funds available and there was some discussion that this percentage is too high. The Challege Grants will be based on a percentage of the total Coal Tax funds available for grants.

Representative Bardanouve (47:B:218) moved the subcommittee adopt the proposed language for Challenge Grants to be written into the appropriations bill. Representative Ernst asked if the second page of the exhibit is to become a part of the appropriations bill. Mr. Pratt said the second page was not intended to be put into the appropriations bill. Chairman Thoft said the second page is just a policy statement. Senator Fuller said he thought the committee should adopt the proposed language and express support for the policy statement outlined on page two of the handout. The motion passed unanimously.

Chairman Thoft (47:B:244) said he is concerned that local and county governments are not supporting cultural and aesthetic projects through the mill levy. Mr. Pratt said he and Carleen Lassise, Accountant, Montana Arts Council have talked with Madalyn Quinlan about this and the council recommends that all municipal facilities, applying for grants, use or explore the use of a county mill levy. David Nelson said he feels the policy issue should apply to applicants who have received funding and did not have the support of a mill levy the first time. These applicants need to apply for a levy prior to receiving funding a second time.

Chairman Thoft (47:B:290) suggested Mr. Nelson and Madalyn Quinlan get together to work on the appropriate language on the mill levy issue for the appropriations bill.

Senator Fuller (47:B:294) said the Senate has passed a bill which deals with a fair mill levy and the 15 mill multi-purpose levy. This bill can affect the museum mill. He also said he does not think approval of projects should be dependent on whether or not the project has a local mill. Some projects have a tremendous amount of community support and none of it is in the form of a mill levy. He said he is reluctant to mandate such support.

Senator William Yellowtail (47:B:310) said Senate Bill 76, if passed and

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signed, will consolidate all special permissive mill levies. Senator Fuller said it will put these special levies into a multi-purpose fund, if the county opts for this, then many different groups including museums and art centers will compete for their share of the 15 mill multi-purpose fund.

Chairman Thoft (47:B:340) called the committee's attention to Senator Fuller's motion to accept the funding recommendations of the advisory committee. Madalyn Quinlan, Staff Analyst, Legislative Fiscal Analyst Office asked if the advisory committee's recommendation to fully fund the Oral History Project and the Folklife Project should be clarified in the motion. Senator Fuller (47:A:368) added to his motion by saying the balance needed to fully fund the Oral History and Folklife projects, at recommended levels, is to come from reverted funds. The motion passed unanimously.

CAPITAL CONSTRUCTION PROGRAM: Madalyn Quinlan gave committee members information on the Capital Construction Program (EXHIBIT 3), the Renewable Resource Development Program and the Water Development Program to be heard this week (EXHIBIT 4).

Madalyn Quinlan (47:B:496) gave committee members information on the project proposal for the Department of State Lands (EXHIBIT 5).

Next she (48:A:038) went through the Capital Construction handout (See Exhibit 3) and told members which projects have been approved for funding and which ones need to be acted upon. On page 1, all projects except B2 are approved. On page 2, items B6 through F6, except for C3, are approved and item H2 is approved. Senator Fuller (48:A:078) said he would like to hold item C3, Publications and Graphics Division, until Senator Van Valkenburg is present, since they both have concerns about this project.

The committee discussed the projects on page 2 which have not been approved for funding (48:A:081 through 48:A:289). During the discussion Tom O'Connell (48:A:175), Chief, Facility Planning Bureau, Architecture and Engineering Division, Department of Administration gave members information about parking improvements on 8th Avenue and Montana Avenue (EXHIBIT 6). Representative Bardanouve had requested this information at an earlier meeting (1-18-85). Senator Fuller (48:A:290) moved the committee approve funding for the parking improvements South of the Capitol building. He withdrew this motion when he realized the project had already been approved for funding at an earlier date.

<u>Department of Institutions</u>: Chairman Thoft (48:A:343) suggested the committee delay action on the Forensic Unit and the Boulder River School and Hospital.

Representative Ernst (48:A:369) moved the committee approve funding for all capital construction projects for the Department of Institutions except, the Forensic Unit at Warm Springs and the remodeling of the Boulder River School and Hospital. The motion passed unanimously.

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Department of Fish, Wildlife and Parks: Chairman Thoft (48:A:397) asked that item K7, concerning relocation of the sign shop, on page 3 be considered at a later date, after he has met with the department about the prison doing the department's signs.

Discussion followed concerning projects funded from the Resource Indemnity Trust (RIT) interest earnings (48:A:462 through 48:A:493). Chairman Thoft (48:A:495) suggested the committee take action on these projects at a later date. Projects to be funded from the RIT interest earnings are: K9, Kl3, Kl4, Kl6, Kl8, Kl9, K20, K21 and K22.

Discussion on projects funded from the Coal Tax Trust were discussed next (48:A:520 through 48:A:684). Senator Fuller (48:A:686) asked that projects from the Coal Tax Trust be considered at a later date also. These projects are: Kl0, Kl1, Kl2 and Kl5.

Senator Fuller (48:B:030) moved the committee tentatively approve funding for all capital construction projects for the Department of Fish, Wildlife and Parks, except those which are funded from the RIT interest earnings and the Coal Tax Trust. The motion passed unanimously.

Department of Administration, Legal Issue Concerning Brick Repair on Johnson/Wilson Halls: Michael Young (48:B:048), Administrator, Insurance and Legal Division, Department of Administration said the testimony the committee is about to hear concerns potential litigation on the condition of bricks on Johnson and Wilson Halls on the Montana State University campus. Chairman Thoft (48:B:052) asked if the committee would like to close the meeting to the public. Members present agreed to close the meeting. The tape recorder was not used at this time and the Chairman asked the secretary not to include this in the minutes.

There being no further business before the subcommittee, after Mr. Young's testimony, the meeting was adjourned at 10:30 a.m.

BUILDING PROGRAM REQUESTS DEPARTMENT OF STATE LANDS 1985-1987 BIENNIUM

The Department of State Lands has requested \$263,183 for the biennium to carry out four projects. We understand that our projects did not have a high enough priority to be funded from available funds.

The Department of State Lands asks that this committee consider a request of \$44,000. This request would allow the Department to replace fire-crew quarters at two of our fire stations. These quarters are currently excess federal property house trailers which were pretty well worn out when we received them from the federal government. These trailers are exceptionally dangerous due to outdated wiring and the rapid flammability of mobile homes.

With the assistance of the Swan River Youth Camp carpentry crew handling the woodworking and commercial contractors handling plumbing and wiring, we estimate the crew quarters can be replaced for \$44,000.
