MINUTES OF THE MEETING HUMAN SERVICES SUBCOMMITTEE MONTANA STATE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

April 12, 1985

Priorities for People-Restoration Project (PFP-RP)

Priorities for People, in conjunction with the Department of Social and Rehabilitation Services (SRS), will propose certain restorations or add-backs to the SRS portion of the General Appropriations Bill (HB 500). These are initiatives developed originally in the PFP process. A list of the proposed restorations follows.

- 1. Restoration of \$100,000 in general fund for the Vocational Rehabilitation Extended Employment program. This funding will serve ten (10) individuals over the biennium. There are currently 100 persons on the waiting list. Funding for this program has not been increased since 1974, and the waiting list has grown and stabilized. The goal of this program is to move disabled persons into independent living and employment is sheltered workshops.
- 2. Restoration of \$250,000 in general funds to establish a program of services to Special Disabled Populations. There are currently over 5000 disabled individuals who are not eligible for any disabled services, due the nature and cause of their disability. Many are victims of automobile accidents with resulting brain stem injury. HB 798 authorized receipt of approximately \$96,000 in Federal Funds. Amendments will be proposed to authorize general fund appropriations. Funding of \$250,000 will be requested.
- 3. Restoration of additional slots in the SRS Home and Community Based Services Program (the Medicaid Waiver). Current funding in HB 500 allows for 90 slots in the Medicaid Waiver program. 200 slots for the biennium will require additional general funds in the amount of \$447,000. The current appropriation is \$400,000. A range of home and community based services—are provided to the elderly and disabled through the program, as a less costly alternative to nursing home care.
- 4. Restoration of \$250,000 in the SRS In-Home Services Program. This program provides the supplementary services not covered through the Medicaid Waiver program, including personal care, household and yard chores, in-home delivered meals, etc.

- 5. Restoration of an adequate number of Child Social Workers. An additional \$123,471 is requested. This will allow and additional eight (8) Social Workers to be pohased in over the biennium, and bring the total number of Social Workers from 24 to 32. Caseworkers provide intensive counselling and case management to abused and neglected kids.
- 6. Restoration of two(2) FTEs for SRS/Disabled Services Division. Restoration of these two positions will require an additional \$107,000. These positions were deleted during full House consideration of HB 500.
- 7. Restoration of an adequate and fully funded General Assistance program. NOTE: the PFP Lobby Group supports this restoration. SRS does not support this restoration.
- 8. Restoration of a PFP initiative, through a revenue measure (HB 651), to provide inpatient treatment for indigent youth. These youth are currently receiving no treatment; there are only five beds currently available in the state, through Hilltop Recvovery in Havre. Funding will be available to local communities through SRS/Community Services Div. on a match(80:20) basis,

The Department of Health and Environmental Sciences feels that if fee funds were used to fund the program, the cost of billing and collection would have an adverse effect on the intent of the program. The Department of Health and Environmental Sciences feels that the X-ray inspection program is to protect public health and safety and is more appropriate to be funded from General Fund rather than imposing fees.
