

MINUTES OF THE MEETING
FINANCE AND CLAIMS COMMITTEE
MONTANA STATE SENATE

April 12, 1985

The 18th meeting of the Senate Finance and Claims Committee met on the above date in room 108 of the State Capitol. The meeting was called to order by Chairman Regan following roll call. The meeting was called to order at 9:02 a.m.

ROLL CALL: All members present.

CONSIDERATION OF HOUSE BILL 206: Representative Bardanouve said this is an innocuous little bill which was put in at the request of the Office of Budget and Program Planning. It has one little problem in the bill. On page 3, line 6 the Vocational Education Funds. There are funds that will have to be returned to the Federal Government because local governments should not be making up their fiscal effort.

There were no other proponents, no opponents, and Senator Regan asked if there were questions from the committee.

Senator Jacobson: This goes back 8 or 10 years. It is very very old. It started out to be several million dollars and was negotiated down to \$40,000 and if you cut that--I think you are punishing people, some of which aren't even there. The problem has been cleared up and we are lucky to come out of it with this amount. I think we ought to just pay it. This was the decision of the subcommittee.

Senator Aklestad: I have a little concern even with the payback. I wonder why just pay it. It seems to me it should still be the problem of the high school.

Senator Regan: There are vo-ed funds, \$750,000 each biennium sitting there in the Department of Education and they could pay it and save the general fund the \$40,000.

Senator Bengtson: We have appropriated \$1½ million to vo-ed and not an extra dime. I just don't think there is any money there.

Senator Regan: There is \$6 million and \$8 million through A&B. The \$750,000 each year was, in the beginning, an equipment fund for more expensive equipment.

DISPOSITION OF HOUSE BILL 206: Motion by Senator Manning that House Bill 206 be concurred in. Voted, passed, unanimous. Senator Jacobson to carry the bill on the floor.

CONSIDERATION OF HOUSE BILL 320: Senator Regan reminded the committee that this bill is an act to appropriate \$20,000 for the '87 biennium to study family unification facilities at

the prison. I think they were going to try to raise some money and needed the spending authority.

DISPOSITION OF HOUSE BILL 320: Motion by Senator Christiaens that House Bill 320 be concurred in. The funding there will be coming from private organizations and others and this is necessary before it comes into place.

Senator Smith: I think all of us have experienced what happens when we start with a program like this and 2 or 4 years later it is all money coming out of the general fund, only the amount is much larger.

Senator Bengtson: I would support the motion. I think it has to be studied before it comes into place. It is not a general appropriation. We found when going through institutions they are starting this at Mountain View and it is family visits. We are talking about rehabilitating people and they find it is working very well. Parents came and stayed with them. It is a positive approach.

Question was called, Voted, Passed, Senators Smith, Stimatz, Aklestad and Boylan voting no. Senator Christiaens will carry the bill on the floor.

Senator Story asked if this was a part of the Governor's budget. It is not something new.

Senator Regan: They are already in the Governor's budget.

Senator Story: I would like the LFA to give us the totals every day.

DISPOSITION OF HOUSE BILL 344: Senator Regan said this bill would provide training for the family practice resident physician and would be \$100,000 general fund over the biennium.

Motion by Senator Jacobson that House Bill 344 be concurred in.

Senator Himsl: This is the program which has been going on for about 8 years and only placed 2 people in all that time at the Hardin and Big Timber areas. The amount of the budget is not very big and it appears that it really is not doing that much.

Senator Hammond: 2 placements in 8 years.

Senator Regan: I believe we started this program in 1983. I started under the Old West Commission before that.

Senator Keating: This group said give us \$35,000 for two years and we won't be back for any money after that. They said everything would be in place in 2 years and that was 2 years ago. We picked up \$70,000 to go for 2 years. I don't think it is cost effective. We will have too many doctors before too long anyway.

Senator Lane: In the rural areas it might be the only way we will get any rural doctors.

Senator Hammond: I have been involved in two places to bring doctors into local areas. It is a tough situation and those can come in from larger cities which have no problem. These are general practioners and they are hard to get. It is tough for them to have to travel 50 or 60 miles in case of an emergency. The toughest problem is to get the wife to stay.

Senator Manning: I am in support of the motion. I know from acquaintences in small counties that they do suffer from a lack of doctors.

Senator Smith: I come from a rural area and I will not support the bill. Neither Culbertson or other areas have been helped by this program. We need to keep the hospital there.

Senator Himsl: You have to admit it has not worked. I have lived in those small counties and I sympathize with the problem.

Senator Jacobson: I think when you ask about how many who had been placed they were talking about over the past biennium. This is a small part of the program. The hospital is paying the salaries and transportation and have the family to come in. The state is only paying \$50,000 for some of the administration of the program. I think the program is spreading and they are getting into more of Eastern Montana than before. Senator Keating is correct -- they said last time they would get it off the ground and they haven't. It is helpful. As a teaching training program in the hospitals because we don't have residency programs. I am in support of it.

Senator Smith: It is going to take \$100,000 out of the general fund that has not been in the budget before. I think we have to think about where we are going to get the money from and what taxes they are going to take when you throw the budget out of whack.

Senator Himsl: These are additions to the general fund expenditure. It is very easy to be sympathetic and we have to establish some priorities as we go through this. When we end up we will have a problem.

Senator Haffey: I appreciate what Senator Himsl is telling us and I couldn't agree more. I also hear Senator Smith. On this program it is part of what the House has contemplated in the balanced budget they have sent over to us. Is that true?

Senator Regan: Yes.

Senator Jacobson: Yes.

Senator Story: These bills are over and above what the Governor's budget said it would be.

Senator Hammond: These bills we have had long before 500.

Senator Regan: These have been considered as probably being passed. I would like to ask Judy to address this.

Judy Rippingale: We don't have a precise amount. Staff is working on finding out what bills are here and what are dead. I think there are some bills that were on the table for negotiation and were not on the list. I will make a list and get it to you on every bill we have gotten.

Senator Regan: I have some figures in my office. We would be in real trouble if we passed everything.

Motion to concur in 344 by Jacobson was voted, tie vote, vote remains in committee tabled.

DISPOSITION OF HOUSE BILL 14: Motion by Senator Gage to amend page 5, line 11 to read 50th legislature instead of 52nd. Voted, passed, unanimous vote.

Motion by Senator Bengtson on line 6, page 3 to delete "2" and insert "1". Voted, passed, unanimous.

Motion by Senator Gage that House Bill 14 as amended be concurred in.

Senator Aklestad: What was the discussion on this? Was anything accomplished prior to last year when not much was accomplished?

Senator Smith: I would say we have accomplished something. Fort Peck has now filed the water compact commission. It would bring the tribes together and you have accomplished a lot. A great stride in just that area alone.

Senator Bengtson: One of the things that came out was that and Gary Kimple was here. There are 7 nations in Montana and someone in our Legislature should know the complexity of the problem and have some expertise.

Question was called, motion to concur as amended was voted, passed, unanimous. Senator Gage will carry the bill.

DISPOSITION OF HOUSE BILL 667: Motion by Senator Bengtson that we concur in HB 667. For the reason that the federal regulations to be used in Montana have caused a lot of problems. Hamilton last week. This is a small fund to recommend. It won't be co-ed and it is quite a nice arrangement. A separate building that is not being used at the present time. It has support by the counties and the Board of Crime Control. The counties will have to contribute.

Senator Keating: This is general fund money. Are the users going to reimburse?

Senator Regan: \$60.53 per day.

Senator Keating: Will the users make up for the \$180,000 appropriation?

Senator Bengtson: That is paying for the teachers, etc. It is experimental and will be paid by per diem. There is some remodeling in there and the general fund money.

Senator Hims1: I would have to disagree with the effectiveness. It will only handle 8. There is no way that it will meet the federal standards any more than what we have in our counties. I can understand why Lewis and Clark would want it. What about the utilization of the rest of the state? 8 units. Only an evaluation program. They will want them for only 5 days.

Senator Keating: In our subcommittee when we were hearing the Board of Crime Control budget one of the problems included in the outlying districts is the detention of youth because the counties don't have the facilities or the personnel to handle them for more than 5 days. The only ones coming here would be those held for more than 5 days. In some areas they put them in foster homes, etc. I think this will be effective for most of the counties in the Eastern part of the state. This would be a general fund appropriation for those people for a particular problem. I think the occupancy rate would be sufficient to justify the expense.

Senator Haffey: My understanding was that the plan was rather to get the occupancy and the 60 bucks a day was to recover the operating cost plus the teacher, etc. Not to recover the general fund money put in for start up.

Curt Chisolm, Dept. of Institutions said that is our conclusion. There would be 1/10 received in 1 year if the occupancy rate stays up.

Senator Manning: The Juvenile Board of the Crime Control Board. There was testimony from counties. If they were to do this in each county it would cost a lot of dollars to every county. If they don't do something they will wind up in law suits. I support the motion.

QUESTION was called, Bengtson's motion to concur was voted, passed, Senator's Hims1, Boylan, Aklestad voting no. Senator Bengtson will carry the bill.

DISPOSITION OF HOUSE BILL 684: The claim of vision quest in the matter of James Romero. MOTION by Senator Gage that we concur in House Bill 684. Voted, passed, Senators Story, Smith and Hammond voting no.

DISPOSITION OF HOUSE BILL 873: The centennial office and staff.

Senator Regan: I have a question for Mrs. Ripplingale. My question is whether or not we have enough money in the junk vehicle disposal account and whether we can borrow the money

from that account. We have taken \$½ million out.

Judy Rippingale: According to our calculations whether there may be some problem. The Crime Victim Account has enough money to fund the program now. That is why it was used first. I have seen some reports from some people in the Department of Health saying there is enough money and it depends a lot on what else happens in that account.

Senator Jacobson: Did you also take into account there is the LUST (Leaky underground storage tank) and another one to come out of this too?

Judy Rippingale: Yes. We do not think the cash flow will have a problem. Our calculations show over \$735,000. To transfer \$5,000 to the general fund and revert enough to make this money --if there is any problem making the loan --it would not make an impact.

Senator Regan: Where did it come from?

Senator Keating: Is the crime funds compensation money invested?

Judy Rippingale: Yes. The interest has been going to general fund. It will be correct.

Senator Keating: How much interest is lost?

Senator Regan: Approximately 10%. Therefore, if this is taken out it could result in 10% interest here over each year. Based on the testimony they would take money out--money only as needed and hope they would not need very much.

Senator Keating: The maximum would be \$2300 a year if they took the whole thing.

Senator Smith: The question comes to my mind. Do they recognize this is only a loan and must be paid back?

Senator Regan: I think it is clearly stated it is a loan.

Senator Aklestad: It is an executive plan effort. Why don't we take it out of the Governor's budget?

Senator Gage: Page 5, line 24 indicates funds prior to July 1, 1987. If we changed that to funds generated from the centennial activities that extends it if after that they could still repay the loan from whatever they get after that.

Senator Hims1: Has anyone checked the junk vehicle thing. The hazardous waste came out of that.

Senator Regan: Yes. It would seem better to amend the bill back to the original.

Senator Hims1: I am surprised there is a surplus. I would think it was depleted.

Judy Rippingale: When you started the program it was 18% of the Highway fund and they started to flow in. It took a number of years to build the program up.

Senator Bengtson: MOTION by Senator Bengtson that we accept the original language on page 5 to put it back into the other fund.

Voted, passed.

Motion by Senator Bengtson that House Bill 873 be concurred in as amended.

Senator Aklestad: I am wondering. Did I understand Senator Bengtson's motion? Wasn't Senator Gage trying to effect the date if they did not pay?

Substitute motion by Senator Gage saying to strike 1987 and put in June 30, 1991.

Senator Regan: Do you mean then that the account is not due on line 20. That is the date due. It seems to me if you want to see that the money gets in.

Senator Gage withdrew his substitute motion and back to his original motion to be concurred in.

Senator Keating: I am wondering in reading the date if it could be interpreted as not before June 30, 1987 -- if any funds not received after that date would not be paid.

Senator Regan: If the legislature saw a pot of money and they cannot spend it without authorization, we would say pay it up!

Senator Keating: The centennial is not subject to legislative action.

Senator Regan: You are appropriating money to the Centennial Office under the centennial office--Curt, how do you handle this?

Curt Nichols: It is under the office of the Lieutenant Governor.

Judy Rippingale: On page 5 under appropriation. Section 7, line 14. They are appropriated--. They are treating it as a part of the Lieutenant Governor's office and as appropriated from the legislature.

Senator Gage: I think it has to be paid by the time-----.
Question was called.

Question was called on the Bengtson motion to accept the original language and put it back in the bill. Voted, passed, unanimous.

Page 2, line 14	46,830 G.F.	Deficit in District Court costs because there was no employee turnover and vacancy savings for the pay plan costs. Also, there was the cost associated with four new judges.
Page 2, line 16	18,779 G.F.	Additional cost of a legal secretary needed to meet the workload and reduce bottleneck.
GOVERNOR'S OFFICE		
Page 2, line 19	20,000 G.F.	To provide immediate funding for an investigative study of the cabin creek mine in Canada. Recommendations will be made to the U.S. State Department. These are start up funds and will be replaced when federal funds are received.
SECRETARY OF STATE		
Page 2, line 21	85,000 G.F.	Additional computer processing charges for the corporate licensing system exceeding development estimates.
STATE AUDITOR		
Page 2, line 24	26,029 G.F.	To cover the extraordinary costs of a number of employees retiring at the same time.
PUBLIC INSTRUCTION		
Page 3, line 2	2,745 G.F.	Because of a transfer of G.F. to FY 84 for school lunch match this additional G.F. is needed for the FY 85 school lunch match.
Page 3, line 4	9,618 G.F.	To comply with an audit exception in the school lunch match for FY 83. Should have been \$673,789 instead of \$664,171.
Page 3, line 6	40,414 G.F.	To refund the federal government for the 1976 audit of Vocational Education funds. Based upon local agencies failure to maintain fiscal effort.
Page 3, line 8	41,000 G.F.	This has to do with the sex discrimination suit regarding girls basketball. This amount is the Office of Public Instruction's share of the settlement between them and the Montana High School Association vs. Ridgeway. The total request is \$130,000, OPI - \$41,000, MHSA - \$41,000, 3 school districts - \$48,000.

JUSTICE

Page 3, line 13 217,000 G.F. For Indian jurisdiction legal fees in excess of amounts appropriated for the 85 biennium. Supplemental allowed in HB 447. This involves the Crow coal case where millions are in trust. The additional costs are expert witnesses and other legal fees.

Page 3, line 15 489,752 S.S. To use highway state special funds for inadequate funding of the Highway Patrol Pay Plan. Vacancy savings were not adequate. Personal services are funded by state special revenue and operations by the general fund. Savings in the general fund could not be transferred to the highway state special fund to offset pay plan costs because transfers between funds is not allowed.

PUBLIC SERVICE

Page 3, line 19 5,767 G.F.
5,767 F.F. To pay the contract with the National Bureau of Standards for technical assistance in the investigation of the MPC's natural gas pipeline between Morel Junction and Cut Bank. The purpose is to monitor the MPC demonstration of the integrity of the line.

Page 3, line 24 20,000 G.F. To allow the Public Service Commission to participate in the FERC dockets regarding Montana/Dakota utilities gas purchasing policies which may affect Montana Power gas rates.

STATE LIBRARY

Page 4, line 5 33,329 G.F. To pay for the settlement in the Crabtree hiring court case. Handicap preference found to be absolute. In addition, \$10,815 will be covered from the Library operations budget.

STATE LANDS

Page 4, line 11 2,896,992 G.F. To pay for fire suppression costs which occurred in FY 84 and FY 85. Originally requested \$3,999,089.

LIVESTOCK

Page 4, line 13 8,000 G.F. To cover a deficit in FY 85 rabies program caused by the need for additional funds in FY 84 for the increased number of rabies cases.

Page 4, line 16	8,000 G.F.	To meet the additional costs associated with the four sanitarians classification appeal from grade 12's to 14's. (As approved by subcommittee, requested \$14,366.)
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AGRICULTURE

Page 4, line 18	37,312 F.F.	To provide authority to expend federal funds (EPA) available for completion of the endrin pesticide project. This is the study of the effects of endrin on wild birds, such as ducks, etc.
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COMMERCE

Page 4, line 23	253,144 G.F.	To cover litigation costs regarding the abandonment of the Geraldine - Denton branch line (\$196,489) and the McCarty Farms-Staggers 229 cases which charges that BN has levied unreasonable rate structures.
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Page 5, line 2	20,804 G.F.	To correct the intent of HB 447 and make the Hard Rock Board's appropriation clearly a biennial appropriation. This allows a reverted amount in FY 84 to be used in FY 85. This is needed because start up costs were less in FY 84 and a biennial appropriation was expected.
