MINUTES OF THE MEETING TAXATION COMMITTEE 49TH LEGISLATURE SPECIAL SESSION III HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

June 25, 1986 P.M.

The fifth meeting of the taxation committee was called to order in room 312-1 of the capitol at 4:08 p.m. by chairman Gerry Devlin.

ROLL CALL: All members were present with the exception of Representative Iverson, who was excused.

EXECUTIVE SESSION

DISPOSITION OF HOUSE BILL 44: Chairman Devlin noted that, because there were some unanswered questions, they would not take action on this bill today, but would leave it until tomorrow.

DISPOSTION OF HOUSE BILL 35: Representative Keenan moved that this bill DO PASS. Representative Raney moved to amend this bill as per the proposed amendments in exhibit 1. He advised that this would only affect mining claims that are barren with no residential, commercial or recreational and were just being held as mining claims.

Representative Sands indicated that it was not appropriate to tax all other property at fair market value and then value this property at the price paid by the United States. He suggested that the way to solve the problem was to require that the property be valued at fair market value, but it is basically not occupied and would be valued at the same rate as agricultural grazing land and then they dropped the 50% rate to 30% and it was calculated that this would basically be the same taxable value and it would not result in a tax increase across the board, but understandably, these are rough calculations.

John LaFaver, director of the department of revenue, advised that the bill is more workable with the amendments, but they could still have two pieces of

land side by side, one is a mining claim and one is not, neither are being extensively used, and one would pay a small fraction of tax as compared to the other.

Representative Ellison commented that you can't determine what the use of land might be in the future and it is the same with him - the whole ranch might be suitable for recreation and maybe when he retires, he will sell it to a developer, but you can't determine what he will do in the future.

Representative Cohen stated that they appreciate their concerns and they tried to address those concerns, but if it turns out that this is not workable, in six months they can come back in here and let the committee know and they can adjust it then.

Representative Sands made a substitute motion to add on page 2, line 14 the words that apply on amendment #7 "or if the surface is being used for other than mining purposes and has a separate and independent value for such other purpose".

A vote was taken on the substitute motion and it carried unanimously.

A vote was taken on the original motion and it passed unanimously.

Representative Keenan moved that the bill DO PASS AS AMENDED. The motion carried unanimously.

DISPOSITION OF HOUSE BILL 45: Chairman Devlin distributed exhibit 2 to the committee. Representative Williams moved that this bill DO PASS.

Representative Harp noted that this is a new form of funding the public service commission.

Representative Raney indicated that he had a basic problem with this as the railroads are going to be hit as a regulated carrier, but not the trucking industry.

Representative Harp explained that the trucking industry pays for a stamp for each cab and that money goes into the general fund and in the trucking industry, there is a lot of deregulation going on and he felt that the trucking industry is paying its fair share.

Representative Sands stated that he opposed this bill and he did not think they had to select the worst kind of a tax increase as this is \$1.5 million that is directly passed on to the consumer and it is the epitome of an earmarked account and not only earmarked for the public service commission, but is collected from the very people they are regulating.

Representative Sands moved to amend this bill on page 5, line 12 by strking the words, "section 4 of this" and said that if they have a special session to deal with the budget crisis, they should not pass such a broad scaled bill.

A vote was taken on the motion and the amendment was adopted with 12 voting for it and 7 against. See roll call vote #1.

Mr. Bohyer noted that on page 3, line 1, the word, "must" should be "may". Representative Harp moved this amendment. The motion carried with Representative Asay voting no.

A vote was taken on the DO PASS AS AMENDED motion and the motion carried with $\overline{11}$ voting age and 7 voting no. See roll call vote #2.

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DISPOSITION OF HOUSE BILL 34: Representative Switzer moved that this bill DO PASS. Representative Williams made a substitute motion that this bill DO NOT PASS.

Representative Asay indicated that he felt that some corrections need to be made in the assessment of property, but he did not think that ten years is the answer. He moved to TABLE this bill.

A vote was taken on the motion and it passed with 13 voting for the motion and 6 voting against it. See roll call vote #3.

ADJOURNMENT: There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 5:00 p.m.
