MEETING MINUTES HUMAN SERVICES SUBCOMMITTEE JANUARY 7, 1987

(3a:000) The meeting of the human services subcommittee was called to order by Chairman Cal Winslow on January 7, 1987 at 8:05 a.m. in room 108 of the state Capitol building.

ROLL CALL: All members were present.

Don Espelin, chief of the Preventive Health Bureau, continued with prepared testimony of programs in this bureau. Covered were: Health Promotion and Education, Montana Sexually Transmitted Disease Program, Immunization Program, Montana AIDS Project, Rape/Crisis, and End Stage Renal Disease (exhibit 5, 1/6/87).

(3a:374) Sen Himsl inquired if a full accountability evaluation was done on the Rape Crisis Grant. Ray Hoffman, administrator of the Financial Management Division, replied this was done through expenditure reports from forensic labs and purchase of service from other programs.

(3a:450) Drew Dawson, chief of the Emergency Medical Services Bureau, read prepared testimony on this bureau, which is responsible for the development of a statewide emergency medical services system (exhibit 1).

At 8:40, Chairman Winslow excused himself, and Sen Himsl conducted the remainder of the meeting.

(3b:134) Dale Taliaferro, bureau chief of the Health Planning Bureau, covered a prepared statement on the functions of this bureau, including the Certificate of Need Program (exhibit 2). In response to a question by Sen Himsl, he stated he did not think the lack of a Certificate of Need Program would jeopardize Medicare/Medicaid funds under the federal 1122 law.

(3b:315) The Licensing and Certification Bureau testimony was presented by Jacqueline McKnight, bureau chief (exhibit 3, 4, 5, 6). There was a general discussion about funding and the requested additional 9.5 FTE. In response to a question by Sen Harding, Ms. McKnight stated that home health agencies include hospital and county agencies. Ray Hoffman clarified the three (3) functions of the bureau as follows: state licensor (100% state responsibility), medicaid certification (percentage funding) and medicare certification (100% federal funding). The licensing and certification teams do all three (3) of these functions.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 9:35. (end 4a:051)

EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES BUREAU

Mr. Chairman, and members of the committee. I am Drew Dawson, Chief of the Emergency Medical Services Bureau.

The Emergency Medical Services Bureau is responsible for the development of a statewide emergency medical services system and works with a variety of personnel and agencies including ambulance services, Quick Response Units, Fire Departments, Law Enforcement Agencies and other volunteer and paid providers.

We are very proud of the considerable progress made in improving Montana's Emergency Medical Services System. This certainly has been a joint effort with the many extremely dedicated EMS providers in Montana. There are many folks in each of your home communities who dedicate numerous volunteer ours to improving your local emergency medical services system. Our job is provide every bit of assistance we can to make the jobs of your local EMS providers a little bit easier and to assure that they receive updated, quality training.

Among the highlights of our activities during the past blennium are the following:

In compliance with statutory requirements we annually inspected, and re-inspected as necessary, each of Montana's ambulance service and investigated complaints. There are 110 ambulance services in Montana with 226 vehicles.

We conducted programs for local EMS personnel to provide training in scheduling, collection, insurance, maintenance and other matters pertaining to ambulance operations. This was particularly important to volunteer providers to assure they take maximum advantage of all sources of third party reimbursement.

We conducted numerous programs to train local EMS persons to coordinate First Responder and EMT training programs and

also to improve their ability to teach practical skills. Since we are unable to provide direct training to all EMS providers in Montana, these persons return to their home communities to provide EMS instruction. This "train the trainers" approach is the most cost effective method of assuring quality training programs are provided. Refresher training is provided to these persons to keep them up to date on recent EMS training and treatment procedures.

We assisted with the conduct of statewide educational conferences for EMS personnel. With two conferences per year, each conference is attended by about 300-400 emergency medical services providers.

We certified (by written and practical examination), in cooperation with the Board of Medical Examiners, approximately 250 EMTs each year (with an increase in the pass rate for the EMT practical examination to about 90%). Approximately 500 EMTs are recertified each year. We also conduct training programs for those persons who administer the examination to assure it is administered in a fair and reliable fashion.

The number of EMTs on board ambulances in Montana is now approaching 50% and is increasing as we continue to improve the availability of EMT training. We have worked to improve the accessibility of EMT training and continuing education to rural areas of Montana including the improved use of audio-visual technology.

We developed and printed a number of publications to assist with local EMS instruction. These include banks of test questions, continuing education programs, practical skills scenarios and other educational tools.

We certified approximately 400 First Responders each year.

We managed the Montana Poison Control System in cooperation with the Rocky Mountain Poison Center in Denver with about 10,000 cases per year. This amounts to 27 calls per day of which 84% are actual poisoning emergencies.

We conducted statewide public information and education activities regarding emergency medical services and poison control including radio spots, television spots, informational packets for local EMS personnel and other activities.

Technical assistance was provided to local training programs and local EMS systems regarding training, ambulance operations, communications, and evaluation.

In a joint program between the Montana Law Enforcement Academy and the EMS Bureau, all new law enforcement officers trained in Montana will be trained as medical First Responders. The Montana Highway Patrol and the EMS Bureau have cooperated in updating the First Responder training of all Montana Highway Patrolmen.

A training and certification program was initiated for EMT-Defibrillation technicians with approximately 120 persons certified to date. EMT-D training involves approximately 16 hours of additional training beyond EMT and allows EMTs to defibrillate (electrically shock) persons whose heart has stopped. We are very proud of this program since it can provide substantially increased chances of survival to patients in cardiac arrest without a great deal of expense. We have been very careful to assure excellent medical control and review of all cases. Since the rules were adopted for the program in June, 1986, we now have EMT-Defibrillation services operational in Kalispell, Missoula and Helena with several others soon to begin operation. There have been 126 EMT-D's certified. We are particularly pleased that, in each of the services now operational, they involve a joint effort between the ambulance service and the fire

departments. This is an excellent example of the cooperative relationship among a variety of public safety providers to ultimately improve the survival of the patient. This program was developed in close cooperation with the Board of Medical Examiners and the Montana Medical Association.

Six two-day Advanced Trauma Life Support (ATLS) courses were conducted in which 96 rural physicians were trained in acute trauma care. The EMS Bureau provides for the coordination of the program; however, the actual expenses are paid by the tuition fees of the physician.

The EMS Bureau with the cooperation of practicing emergency nurses developed and helped to implement the Montana Emergency Nurse Education program, a modular training program for rural hospital nurses.

The proposed budget for the 88-89 biennium remains, essentially, at the FY 86 current level budget. With a reduction of 1.15 FTE's, there is a decrease in personnel costs. There is a slight increase in contracted services to accommodate increased contract costs with the Rocky Mountain Poison Center in Denver. Training activities constitute, by far, the greatest portion of the EMS Bureau budget.

The amount requested to be authorized for state special revenue is increased. This authorization allows us to accept and expend student fees for the EMT certification program at all levels (Basic EMT, EMT-Defibrillation, EMT-Intermediate and EMT-Paramedic) and for the selling of limited training supplies and materials. There is no state or federal funding involved with this. If the funds are not received, they are not expended.

The Emergency Medical Services Advisory Council of the Department, chaired Senator Judy Jacobson, is working on the development of an updated state emergency medical services plan. This plan will evaluate each of our current activities and make recommendations for any modifications of

programs, laws, rules and/or finances. During the next six (6) months, the plan will be taken "on the road" for the solicitation of public and provider input and comments. During the next two years there will be extensive coordination with a variety of organizations and agencies to assure comprehensive recommendations to the next legislative session.

Most of the activities provided by the EMS Bureau are a direct benefit to local EMS providers many of whom are volunteers.

HEALTH PLANNING BUREAU, DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND ENVIRONMENTAL SCIENCES, TESTIMONY FOR THE APPROPRIATIONS JOINT SUBCOMMITTEE ON HUMAN SERVICES

Mr. Chairman and Members of the Subcommittee, my name is Dale Taliaferro. I am Bureau Chief of the Health Planning Bureau. The Health Planning Bureau has written the State Health Plan and other planning and policy papers on health and health costs; collected, analyzed and distributed data on health facilities and services; and administered the State's Certificate of Need program for capital expenditures for health services.

During 1985, the Certificate of Need program reviewed 52 applications covering a proposed 20 million dollars in health care capital expenditures. In the past few years, we have averaged 44 applications per year with about 45 million dollars in proposed expenditures. Approvals average 40 per year and about 40 million dollars in expenditures.

Federal funds for health planning were discontinued during FY '87, and the Department currently has a request in for supplemental funds to continue the program at a reduced level through FY '87.

The proposed budget only includes planning activities directly related to the Certificate of Need program. Based on evidence that discontinuation of the program would result in excessive expansion of health care facilities and services, the Department is proposing a bill to renew the State Certificate of Need law which is scheduled to terminate at the end of June, 1987. The bill would extend the law for two years after which time it could be renewed, modified, or discontinued based on developments in health care financing and Federal regulation.

The budget reduces FTE's from 9.00 to 4.75 and contains an associated reduction in operating expenses. The proposed Certificate of Need bill would establish a fee for processing applications that would recover approximately the amount of increase in General Fund budget over the 1986 base year.

Chairman Winslow, Senators and Representatives, I am Jacqueline McKnight, Chief of the Licensing and Certification Bureau.

The Bureau is responsible for monitoring the operation, maintenance, design and construction of various health care facilities and services—hospitals, long-term care facilities (i.e., skilled nursing, intermediate and personal care nomes), home health agencies, laboratories, out-patient physical or speech therapists, renal dialysis units, ambulatory surgical centers, swing beds, mental health and retardation treatment centers, and chemical dependency treatment centers.

The Bureau has legal authority to issue licenses, grant Medicaid certification, and recommend Medicare certification for facilities and services that meet the regulations. It has the legal responsibility to promulgate and revise licensing regulations, to investigate and act upon citizen complaints, and to revoke the license or certification of any facility or service which falls below minimum standards and jeopardizes the health or safety of the patients or clients.

The surveyor and supervisory staff provides continuing consultation services to all providers and information to the public and government and private agencies.

The Bureau is conducting unannounced annual surveys of all providers consistent with State licensure statutes and Federal directives.

A number of factors have increased the workload for surveys beyond all previous predictions. Hospitals, because of low occupancy, have been diversifying by converting beds to long-term care, developing swing beds and home health agencies. Most other types of providers are also expanding. Please see Attachment No. 1 which indicates an increase from 236 facilities in August, 1984 to 353 facilities

estimated for 1987. Attachment No. 2 indicates an increase in surveys and complaint investigations from 430 in 1984 to an estimate of 850 in 1987. This number includes full surveys, follow-up surveys to evaluate correction of deficiencies noted and an increase in Bureau responsibility for abuse and care complaint investigations due to the closure of the Medicaid Fraud Bureau. See Attachment No. 3.


QUALITY OF CARE IS NOW THE FOCAL POINT OF THE SURVEY PROCESS.

"Outcome of Care" surveys in nursing homes have impacted the surveyor hours required to conduct a survey. This new Long Term Care Survey, instituted in July, 1986, requires the surveyors to meet every resident in nursing homes and intermediate care facilities. After the tour of the facility and meeting all of the residents, 20 per cent of them are selected for indepth review of the medical record, resident interview, and interview of all staff responsible for their care. Surveyors also observe food preparation and services as well as three meals. They also observe at least two medication preparations and passes.

We are now doing home visits to clients of home health agencies to evaluate the quality of care and client satisfaction. Our goal is to visit at least five clients of 27 per cent of our home health agencies.

Effective September 15, 1986, new Conditions of Participation were finalized for hospitals, which brings in a "Quality Assurance Condition" we are now surveying.

Because of all this, the Bureau has been having staffing problems. Please see Attachments No. 4 and No. 5, which represents the Federal view of the severity of our staffing problem and the comparison of our staffing to other states within the region. Attachment No. 6 shows the amount of administrative and supervisory time spent surveying. See Attachment No. 7 for computation of survey hours.



The Department is requesting 9.5 additional F.T.E.'s, three and one-half of whom are already working. The six surveyors we are currently recruiting will not be of immediate assistance. It takes one year to fully train a surveyor. New surveyors begin to contribute to the workload in approximately three months after employment.

We are currently six months behind in our survey work and have had to extend 31 time-limited agreements (60 days maximum extensions by Federal regulation) for nursing homes. Failure to conduct these surveys puts us in a breach of agreement with the Federal government and jeopardizes the Federal Financial Participation in Medicaid reimbursement.





Your budget requests for Fiscal Year 1986 covering the Medicare and Medicaid survey workloads have been reviewed and discussed with members of your staff. Some changes of the request were necessary, and are outlined below.

Medicare Budget:

The enclosed budget approval form approves total Medicare funding of \$337,403, with \$214,704 allocated to non-long term care (LTC) activities, and \$122,699 allocated to LTC activities. Approved positions include 14 professional employees and 5 clerical employees. Full time equivalents (FTEs) of 5.17 were assigned to Medicare non-LTC activities, and 2.53 FTEs to LTC activities. Vacancies which occur during the fiscal year should not be filled without prior written notice. Also, out-of-State travel, generally related to surveyor training, will require advance approval by this office.

Medicaid Budget:

The Federal share of your Medicaid budget has been approved in the amount of \$130,959. Approved positions include 13 professional employees and 5 clerical employees, with a total of 4.57 FTEs.

As you are aware, the Medicaid budget is approved in this manner for overall planning purposes. Since the quarterly grant awards are the basis for actual funding of the Medicaid portion of your budget, some variance from this approval is expected during the fiscal year. Actual funding available will be determined by your quarterly estimate of expenses and the previous quarter's expenditures reported. Should additional Medicaid funding be necessary later in the fiscal year, the quarterly estimates will need to be increased.

Explanation of Changes:

No changes were made to your Medicare budget.

The amount of the Federal share of your Medicaid budget was reduced by \$5,447. This reduction was made because on your request, indirect costs were

divided at 75% Federal and 25% State, whereas they should be divided on a 50% basis.

Comments:

I would be interested in more detail on your comment about FSES surveys and why you feel this system should be eliminated.

Regional analysis and comparison with other States indicates that your agency staff should be increased by as much as 4 full time equivalents. Lack of staff, and thus, inadequate time to perform functions, impacts on quality. Consideration should be given to obtaining State authorization to increase your surveyor staff.

We appreciate your continued cooperation with the Health Care Financing Administration, and look forward to working with you during the new fiscal year. If there are any questions concerning these approvals, please call us.

This letter is intended to clarify the comment in our budget approval letter of September 9, 1985 concerning the need to increase your survey agency staff by as much as four full-time equivalents. These four full-time equivalents (FTEs) would be in addition to the two surveyors hired in July 1985.

In reviewing the budget requests from the six States in Region VIII, a comparison of workload per FTE was made. It was determined that workload per FTE in Montana greatly exceeded the workload per FTE in all other States. The survey units per FTE in Montana was 56.6 versus the regional average of workload per FTE of 36.25 with a range from 26.7 to 56.6. The survey workload per FTE in the State with the heaviest workload per FTE next to Montana was 41.4 In order for Montana to lower the workload per FTE to the level of 41.4, four additional FTEs would be required.

As a note of explanation, a survey unit in this comparison was 10 onsite surveyor hours, thus weighting the surveys of different types of providers and suppliers according to the amount of onsite time required to conduct a quality survey.

Another method of comparison showed that although Montana has 17.0 percent of the regional workload, the State has only 9.9 percent of the total FTE positions approved in the six State Survey Agency budgets.

I hope this additional explanation will be helpful to you. It is strongly recommended that additional staff be obtained since adequate onsite time is an absolute necessity for the conduct of quality surveys.






ADMINISTRATIVE & SUPERVISORY TIME (89.2%)

SUBJECT: Bureau staffing - 1987

The workload estimate for 1987 is 19,450 on-site survey hours. These hours were doubled to provide required time for pre-survey preparation and post-survey documentation resulting in 38,900 surveyor hours required.

1,840 hours were utilized as available work time for 1 F.T.E. surveyor, resulting in a need for 21 F.T.E.s.

We are requesting six F.T.E. surveyors in addition to those already approved, plus two clerical support staff.

This will provide 18 surveyors and two building consultants who, together can perform Life Safety Code and physical plant surveys for a total of the equivalent of 19 surveyors.
