HEARING ON HOUSE BILL 17

Presentation and Opening Statement by Sponsor: Rep. Squires, District 58, stated that the bill was requested by the City of Missoula to enable cities and towns to appropriate monies received from federal and state government in the same manner as the counties were authorized in 1974.

Testimony:

- Chuck Stearns, City of Missoula, indicated that this bill would enable city councils to appropriate money especially grants received throughout the fiscal year. This would eliminate the problem of anticipating receiving funds and including them or not receiving them, or waiting until the next fiscal year to budget for them.
- Alec Hansen, Montana League of Cities and Town, stated that his organization supported the bill for the same reasons cited by Mr. Stearns.

<u>Closing by Sponsor:</u> Rep. Squires reiterated that since the counties have had this flexibility for some years that it is a good idea for the cities and towns to have it as well.

HEARING ON HOUSE BILL 41

Presentation and Opening Statement by Sponsor: Rep. Gilbert, House District 22, stated that HB 41 was requested by the City Fire Department and the City Attorney over a problem experienced in Eastern Montana and drought areas throughout the state. The bill will enable local governments to enter into mutual aid agreements that allow agencies to coordinate their emergency medical services and fire protection services for their mutual advantage.

Testimony:

- Alec Hansen, Montana League of Cities and Towns, stated they are in favor of granting local governments the legal authority to enter into mutual aid agreements between agencies.
- Henry Lohr, Montana Volunteer Firefighters Association, stated his organization is in support of this bill.
- Tim Bergstrom, Montana State Firemen's Association, requested permission to ask the sponsor of the bill a question. Upon recommendation of Chairman Darko, Mr Bergstrom's question was asked by Rep. Hansen. Mr. Bergstrom agrees with the concept but expressed concerns over Section 7 of the bill. He was concerned that Montana cities would absolve themselves of the responsibility of providing services that would now be covered by a mutual aid agreement with another agency.
- Questions From Committee Members: Rep. Hansen asked if the City can absolve itself of Section 7-33-4101 and go outstate and purchase such protection. Rep. Gilbert stated that he did not believe that the city could absolve itself of Section 7-33-4101 but asked Mr. Heiman to clarify. Mr. Heiman agreed that the duty to provide is not absolved since the services are provided by state law. It simply provides that towns can dispatch their services to others and still have coverage for their own town because of these mutual aid agreements. Rep. Hansen asked Mr. Bergstrom if his concerns were satisfied. Mr. Bergstrom replied affirmatively and asked that he be considered a proponent of HB 41.
- Rep. Good asked if other states have such agreements and about the liability if one of the participating agencies made a mistake. Rep. Gilbert stated that he was unsure if other states had such agreements and that the purpose of the bill was to settle liability questions since many agencies are cooperating but without the benefit of mutual agreements.
- <u>Closing by Sponsor:</u> Rep. Gilbert stated the bill did not include an effective date and requested the bill become effective upon passage to enable such agencies to negotiate such agreement as quickly as possibly.

DISPOSITION OF HOUSE BILL 41

Discussion: None

Amendments and Votes: Rep. Gould moved to amend to provide that the bill become effective upon passage and approval. Rep. Johnson seconded.

Recommendation and Vote: Rep. Gould moved HB 41 DO PASS. Rep. Good seconded and it CARRIED unanimously. Rep. Gould made a motion that the bill DO PASS AS AMENDED and Rep. D. Brown seconded. The bill CARRIED unanimously.



- 5. Sponsors will be allowed to close at the end of the questioning period.
- 6. All discussion will be directed through the chair.
- 7. Amendments to be presented must be written and preferably coordinated through our staff attorney.

CITY OF MISSOULA CHUCK STEARNS TESTIMONY ON HOUSE BILL #17

The City of Missoula supports House Bill #17 in order to give cities the same budget flexibility for appropriating federal and state funds, especially grants, that are received during the middle of the year, after the City Council has adopted the budget.

Counties in Montana have had this ability since 1974 and it is codified as Section 7-6-2218 MCA, a copy of which appears on the back of this sheet. While it has been interpreted by the Department of Commerce that this law should also apply to cities, it is not in the Administrative Rules of Montana. In order to prevent possible audit opinions, we prefer that explicit authority be granted to cities, as it has been granted to counties.

A specific example where this authority would be most helpful is in the area of Community Development Block Grants from the U.S. Government. Currently there are three grant application deadlines each year: September 16th; March 17th; and July 14th. The award notifications usually follow three months after the application deadline, so only the March 17th date allows for the City Council to include it in the next budget. Being able to appropriate and expend the money soon after the grant is awarded would speed up governmental processes and be more efficient.

The City of Missoula appreciates your consideration of this bill and Representative Squires efforts on the behalf of cities.

7-6-2217. Administration of relief received from federal agencies. In any county where aid is received from the reconstruction finance corporation or any other similar agencies, the county commissioners of such county shall be authorized to employ the necessary help and incur such expenses as are necessary in the administration of such relief; and in so doing the board may appropriate such funds as are necessary from the general fund of said county. Such appropriation shall be held and deemed legal and valid notwithstanding the provisions of the budget act.

7-6-2218. Appropriation of state and federal money by county. (1) The board of county commissioners of any county in Montana shall have the power and authority to appropriate, by formal resolution, money received from the federal or state government, regardless of the time the money is received. The expenditure of said funds shall be according to federal require ments specified in the federal act or state requirements specified in the state legislation. The money appropriated under this section may include federal revenue sharing funds granted to Montana conservation districts organized under Title 76, chapter 15.

(2) The resolution shall state the source of the money, the expenditure program for the funds, and the effective date of the appropriation.

(3) (a) Subject to restrictions in federal or state law granting federal of state funds, in addition to appropriations for county use, an appropriation may be made under this section to the following entities for that entity's governmental purpose:

(i) utility districts authorized in Title 7, chapter 13;

(ii) fire services authorized in Title 7, chapter 33.

(b) If the entity receiving an appropriation under subsection (3)(a) provides a service that is less than countywide, the appropriation resolution sharequire that the entity repay the county the amount of the appropriation. The appropriation resolution may provide any method of repayment, except that full repayment must be made within 5 years of the date of the appropriation resolution. The appropriation resolution may require that interest be paid of the appropriation.

7-6-2219. Authorization to establish capital improvement fund. The governing body of any county in Montana may establish a capital improvement fund for the replacement and acquisition of property, plant, equipment costing in excess of \$5,000 with a life expectancy of 5 years more, provided a capital improvement program has been formally adopted by said governing body.

7-6-2220. Levy for capital improvement fund. Money for the capital improvement fund is to be derived from the multiple levies authorized
