## SCHOOL INSTRUCTION AND SPECIAL PROCEANE.

Cross-References

Duty of Superintendent or principal to recommend course of instruction, 20-4-402.

Enrollment in private school providing equivalent instruction as grounds for failure to enroll in public schools. 20-5-102.

Nonpublic school requirements for compulsory enrollment exemption, 20-5-109.

20-7-112. Sectarian publications prohibited and prayer permitted. No publication of a sectarian or denominational character shall be used or distributed in any school or be included in the school library. Instruction shall not be given in sectarian or denominational doctrines. However, any teacher, principal, or superintendent may open the school day with a prayer.

Mr. Chairman, Members of the Committee. For the record I am Rep. Linda Nelson, District 19 from Medicine Lake.

I come before you today as the chief sponsor of HB . This is a simple bill that I am carrying for MASBO (Montana Association of School Business Officials).

It removes unnecessary information required on school district warrants (an example is provided for your perusal.

The reasoning is as follows:

- A. This portion of law is outdated and unnecessary as the county treasurers have no use for the appropriation item of a fund.
- 1. If there were a question concerning an audit trail I do not feel there is any problem there because clerks' documents, including the claims which are permanent records, and auditors have these documents which tie the warrants to the codes at their disposal.
- 2. Evidently at one time treasurers did have to concern themselves with the appropriation items in a budget. However, the only school budget line items they now use have to do with revenues. They use only the fund totals in regard to the expenditure portion of the budgets.
- B. At present several of the school business software programs do not provide for the appropriation item to be printed on warrants only the Fund numbers. Therefore technically the schools using these programs are in violation of the law.
- C. With the adoption of the new accounting codes several years ago several things have occurred which make the

typing of the line items a problem and even the room involved on a warrant for the line items a problem:

- 1. The codes themselves have more digits, consequently appropriation line items take up more room on a warrant;
- 2. More schools are on computer and some software combines several funds on one warrant - hence more line items;
- 3. Auditors, perhaps knowing the great flexibility of computers and the line items available are requiring and clerks are complying the use of more account codes to ensure more accurate coding, also causing a greater number of line items for printing.

This really is a housecleaning bill and I would ask for a "do Pass" from the committee.
