HEARING ON HOUSE BILL 342

Presentation and Opening Statement by Sponsor:

REP. DARKO: House District #2. This bill is a simple bill. It
was brought to me out of concern from gun owners and
collectors. What they discovered was there are no minimum
caliber restrictions for state hunting regulations. With
exception of shotguns. This bill will establish a minimum
caliber for hunting big game animals. It was inappropriate
to use anything other than large caliber on a big game
animal.

Questions From Committee Members:

REP. RANEY: Why are mountain lions were exempt from this? MR. MARCOUX: Usually when hunting for mountain lions. Dogs are used. This is usually because the animal is taken for the pelt. REP. RANEY: What about the collector rim fire guns that are of high caliber? They are quite powerful. MR. MARCOUX: There is more than one type of rim fire ammunition. The Dept. does have some experts in this field, we could provide the Committee with additional information at your request.

REP. DEMARS: What is the definition of "legal ammunition"? MR. MARCOUX: The term refers to a killing shot when an animal is down, but not dead.

REP. EUDAILY: What does the definition of "big game" consist of as stated in the statutes? MR. STERNBERG: Read the text and noted that mt. lion would be excluded under this bill. MR. MARCOUX: Some states do list rabbit as game animals. There is always a possibility that Montana may.

REP. KELLER: How do you feel about including an amendment for hunting bear with dog? MR. MARCOUX: Bear is not usually hunted with hounds. The Dept's preference would be not to modify.

REP. BLOTKAMP: How would the law would be enforced? MR. MARCOUX: In most cases individuals would have to be watched, or an actual observation the kill by Dept. personnel. REP. BLOTKAMP: What is the penalty? MR. MARCOUX: (Deferred to Mr. Kent of the Dept.) MR. KENT: The penalty would most likely be a minimum of \$50.00 with a maximum of \$500.00. REP. BLOTKAMP: Are there were any provisions that would protect the person in case of an emergency type situation? MR. KENT: Each case in this type of situation would be judged on its own merit.

REP. DEMARS: Would bobcats be included? MR. MARCOUX: Bobcats are not a game animal.

REP. EUDAILY: What about the effectiveness of guns verses bow hunting? MR. MARCOUX: I am not fully informed in regards to that, I don't feel that I could answer your question.

Closing by Sponsor:

REP. DARKO: This bill addresses a valid concern. Two avenues are possible, this could go through the Fish and Game Commission or through legislation. In most cases this group that originally brought the bill to me, felt that the problem was

lack of education. In the type of ammunition used in hunting big game. This bill could clarify that problem and prevent fewer injured animals.

HEARING ON HOUSE BILL 307

Proponent Testimony:

Mr. Howard Thompson: It is an inconvenience to travel to cast a ballot. Many of the outfitters in the industry are small operators, alot of them are unable to hire help to fill their place. During the spring and winter season alot of the outfitters are elsewhere promoting their business.

Mr. Paul Roos: The floating industry over the years has experienced a tremendous increase in business. The process that was used when the council outfitter members were elected represented not one fishing industry person. I is my understanding that approximately 40-45% of the outfitters are fishing and floating outfitters. Alot of these outfitters are a one-horse show and have a personal relationship with their clients. In order to get to cast their votes they must either lose a client or not vote.

Questions From Committee Members:

REP. RANEY: Is there not presently a method in place whereby any outfitter can vote by proxy? MR. HOFFMAN: Because I am not directly involved in the organization, I am unsure as to the reasons why they requested the bill. Perhaps the problem could have been due to the fact that alot of the outfitters were not sure as to their vote prior to attending the meetings. MR. BRADSHAW: The limitation of the proxy is that the attending outfitter at the meetings can only bring one proxy. Therefore it appears to be a very limited proxy.

REP. RANEY: Is there a mail in proxy in place? MR. BRADSHAW: There is no such provision for a mail in ballot.

REP. ELLIOTT: Do you feel that increasing the number of proxy votes to each outfitter would help the situation? MR. BRADSHAW: It would be difficult to answer that question from the standpoint that it would vary form region to region depending on the attendance. In some circumstances it might help. The practical difficulty is the overall attendance now is so low, whether that will work or not is problematic. REP. ELLIOTT: Do you know exactly how many outfitters there are in the state? MR. BRADSHAW: There are about 600 currently. With 3/5 in hunting and 2/5 in fishing and floating. MS. BRUNNER: Many outfitters are involved in both aspects of the industry.

REP. KASTEN: I am concerned about the language in the bill referring to the "majority vote". If a majority vote does not happen then will the committee have another election? And another? MR. HOFFMAN: The nominee who receives the most ballots will be on the board. The one that receives the second most will be the alternate. REP. KASTEN: Again, I question the language.

REP. REAM: It is my understanding that the language referred to the existing board members. What they are trying to do is narrow it down to two people whose names are forwarded for appointment by the Governor.

REP. KASTEN: They want it to read this way. They are trying to amend it to read this way for a purpose. MR. HOFFMAN: The important thing for the outfitters is the opportunity to the procedure. If there are changes that could provide a better opportunity then I am sure the outfitters will agree with the content. It is important that all have the opportunity to vote. REP. KASTEN: What percent of the outfitters vote now? MR. HOFFMAN: Less than 30% voted in his area, about 15% of the total controlled the vote. REP. KASTEN: Is that true for most areas? MR. HOFFMAN: The total for the state was 40%. If you could get 40% to the meetings then getting an additional 10% vote would not be a problem.

REP. HANSON: What if you just said the people attending the meeting would be able to vote? MR. HOFFMAN: That is the way the voting is conducted now. And that is the problem.

Because getting to the meetings is the problem. We just want to make an allowance for the absentee vote.

REP. EUDAILY: It appears that you are seeking more input from the outfitters in the state. But I see that you are going to try to do that by mail ballot. In a form and manner prescribed by the council. It states that the council might change that method of voting. If you want it this way then you should have some sort of provision for that. MR. HOFFMAN: The intent was different. The reason for the language is that if you do require a 50% majority, then you may run into a problem. So the council notes the highest number of votes.

REP. DAILY: What is the exact number of licensed outfitters in the state? MR. MARCOUX: That information is listed with the Dept. of Commerce, not with the Dept. of Fish, Wildlife and Parks.

Closing by Sponsor:

REP. HOFFMAN: The issue being addressed is a matter of fairness, these outfitters are only asking for an equal opportunity to be heard. I can see some need for repairs on this bill. And I think that it can be done. The main intent of this bill is that all outfitters have a fair opportunity for input.

DISPOSITION OF HOUSE BILL 307

Motion: Rep. Cohen: motioned a "do pass".

Discussion: Rep. Eudaily: I have a conflict with some of the language of the bill. Mr. Bradshaw: That language is dealing with the quorum issue. It would be a good idea to have a quorum present, but the idea of the bill is to have the election more accessible. We are willing to take out the sections that confuse the language. The intent is simply to allow for access.

Amendments, Discussion, and Votes:

Rep. Daily: Suggested several amendments (Refer to Standing Committee Report) and made the motion for a "do pass on amendments". The amendments were voted on and passed.

Opponent Testimony:

All testimony is listed by the Exhibit numbers respectfully, with exception of those listed below:

Ms. Kim Spurzem: We stand to oppose this bill in its' entirety. There has never been a problem in the past, why bring this up? Fish and Game should be there to regulate this. It is a wedge that has been driven, we all are bow hunters.

Mr. Steve McGee: What we need is more education. I do this for a living. This equipment has help prevent less wounding when harvesting an animal. I do not understand why some archers want to dictate to other archers what equipment they should use. The harvest ratio since this equipment has been around has not changed the percentage of animals harvested. Because you use this equipment does not guarantee that you will harvest an animal. It still takes your hunting skill to harvest.

Mr. Ray Pellin: I invite all of you to come to our range to become more familiar with the sport of bowhunting.

Mr. Ron Marcoux: As you can see from the testimony this is a

complex issue. The Dept. has little data that indicates that archery modification with equipment is necessary. Recognize, the more sophisticated the equipment becomes the greater the potential for harvesting. Result from any legislation that is passed should be enforceable. There are some concerns regarding enforcement, you might consider as an option to afford the Fish and Game Committee the authority to spend time to research and find a resolution on this problem. We would be willing to work with the groups to provide options.

Questions From Committee Members:

REP. KASTEN: How would the Dept. of Fish, Wildlife and Parks go about enforcing this bill? REP. ELLIOTT: (Deferred to Mr. Irv Kent/ Dept. Fish, Wildlife and Parks) Enforcement would be a problem.

Closing by Sponsor:

REP. ELLIOTT: Some amendments would be in order. (See Exhibit #14)

Testimony presented by Ron Marcoux, Department of Fish, Wildlife and Parks.

The department supports HB 342 prohibiting the use of rimfire ammunition for hunting big game. It should be noted that most states have some form of firearms or caliber restrictions for big game hunting.

We also support the provisions to continue allowing the hunting of mountain lions and dispatching downed big game with rimfire ammunition.

We believe this legislation will assist in reducing unnecessary wounding of our big game species.

Mr. Chairman and members of the committee, my name is Stan Bradshaw. I am testifying on behalf of the Float Fishing Outfitters Association of Montana (FFOAM) in support of H.B. 307.

Under the current law, the Board of Outfitters, which is responsible for regulating the outfitting industry, is elected by a series of elections held in each of five districts. On the day the election is held, the outfitters must appear at the designated place and cast their ballot. Each district is quite large, and in some instances, outfitters may face a round trip of 200 to 300 miles to cast their ballot. As a result, the turn out for the vote has been quite low - as low as 28% in the last election.

H.B. 307 simply changes the method of balloting to require that balloting be done by mail. It also requires that a majority of the outfitters within the district must vote in order for an election to be valid. The underlying intent of this bill is simply to improve the accessibility of the electoral process to outfitters. On an issue as fundamental to the outfitting business as the election of the board which oversees the licensing of outfitters, it seems only fair to make the balloting process as accessible as possible.

Therefore, I respectfully urge you to vote for the passage of H.B. 307.

At the time the outfitter law was changed to create the Board of Outfitters and place the administrative responsibility with the Department of Commerce, the provision for the election of the board was incomplete. The new law did not specify how the election would be conducted or by whom. The system put in place by the Department resulted in a board composed of members elected by a minimum of the eligible voters.

The figures I have indicate that in at least one case less than 30% of those eligible to vote were represented. This means that 15% could control the election. The reason for this low number was not a lack of interest, it was the absence of the opportunity. The procedure adopted by the Department of Commerce dictated that an outfitter must either be present or have a representative outfitter at a meeting place and time set by the department. This procedure did not provide equal opportunity for all the outfitters to vote. For some it involves a 200 mile drive while for others only a walk across the street. The election in my district was held at a time when some of the fishing outfitters were on the river.

This bill allows for equal opportunity of all to vote. It is my understanding that it also will result in a cost savings to the Department of Commerce by eliminating the need for local meetings for voting purposes. Absentee voting is routine whenever directors, officers, or board members are selected via election.

For the above reasons we would recommend a favorable vote on this bill.

MOGA opposes this effort to change the method of nomination or election of outfitters to the Board of Outfitters and Montana's Outfitters Council, and the elimination of the annual district meeting for election purposes.

We've heard discussion on the inconvenience district meetings are to outfitters and guides. Having never attended a district meeting, I can't tell you just how much of those meetings are fun and game, time wasters, but I do know from the MOGA meetings I have attended a great deal of business is accomplished. Those who attend, whether they are on the Board or not, have been exposed to every aspect of every subject that is broached. I have to assume, from discussing this with outfitters and guides, that a related format is used at the majority of district meetings. In other words, other business, pertinent to the wellbeing of the industry, such as policy making, workshops, general interests discussions are accomplished at a district meeting that are beneficial to those in attendance. And in all honesty, I have to say that conflict comes more often from lack of understanding on any given issue than from any other reason. Understanding of any given issue is difficult enough when you listen to and participate in a discussion. 2nd and 3rd hand word of mouth, even amongst such an astute body as the Outfitters and Guides tends to be less accurate.

This bill, in our opinion, will provide one more excuse for not attending and participating in a district meeting, leading to more confusion, a lack of accurate information of various programs discussed, and consequently the ensuing frustrations that so often follow.

We have a concern that, despite efforts to the contrary, people may find means to load voting. With a proxy vote, your only problem is trusting the person you gave the vote to.

If a licensed outfitter is interested in only placing his candidate on the board--this bill is probably a good method as any to pass the buck.

Elections are very important to the MOGA, but the need for active attendance and participation at the district meetings should be recognized as a means to keep the members and aware of the issues. MOGA consistly encourages participation by its members at all levels, and this bill allows the members another excuse for not attending the vital and important decision making meetings.

If there are circumstances that will absolutely not allow attendance the present proxy vote system is provided.

MOGA opposes passage of HB307.

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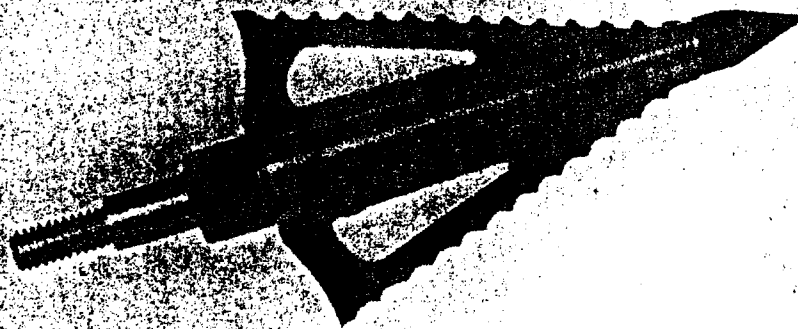
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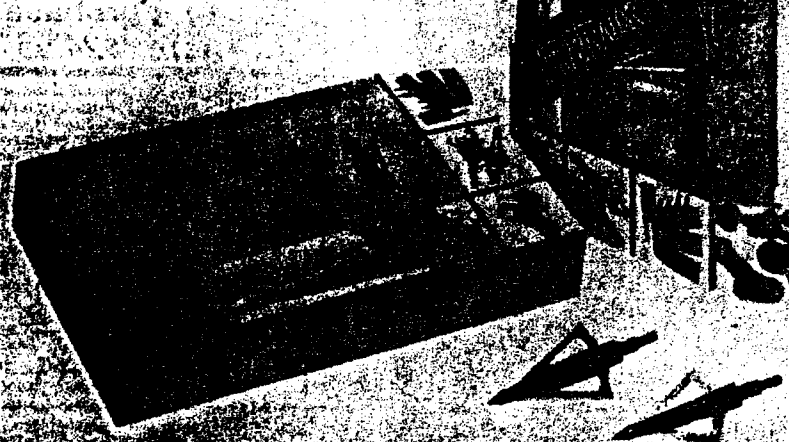


The Terminator Double Cut broadhead features a serrated edge that adds more than 30 percent to the cutting surface of each blade without adding weight or losing strength.

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ing by flattening the trajectory. Antelope are not particularly big, heavy boned animals, so broadheads in the 125-grain and under class are a good choice.


Range estimating on the open prairie can be very difficult to the untrained eye. Compact rangefinders such as the Ranging 50/2 or the Bushnell Sportview can eliminate the guess work, though using them involves movement and the chance of spooking game. If you have good range estimation skills already and will take the time to practice them in the open, by all means stick with your own two eyes or at least be ready to rely on them when their isn't time to consult an optical rangefinder on your belt or in your pocket.

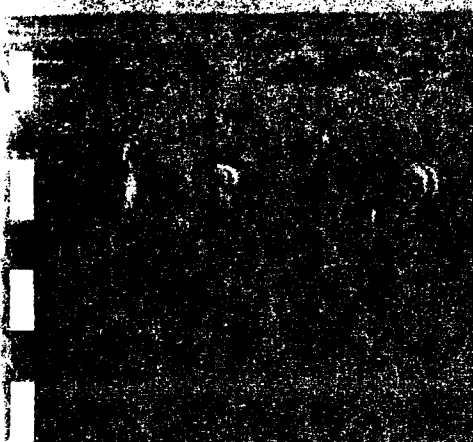
Some experts would argue this point, but with ample practice an archer with modern, flat shooting combos can become quite deadly on antelope in the open. The antelope hunter should frequently practice shooting at the longer ranges, between 40 and 60 yards, if he is to be successful. Long ranges such as these may seem the outer limits of a bow and

arrow, but with a bit of practice and accurate range judging skills you will find it much easier than you ever thought before.

Sure, hunting over water holes is still the most productive and easiest way to bow bag an antelope, and the new fad of using an antelope decoy sometimes fools an occasional goat. Often, however, the hunter can't get the upper

hand that way. Rain can kill the action at waterholes, or others may have them staked out when you arrive.

Or again, you may just want the most challenging antelope hunt possible. Try stalking for a change. I guarantee you will not be bored. Who knows, you might never sit at a water hole again!

Suggested Amendments to Bill #379

DATE 1/31
HB 379

1. It is unlawful to attach any electronic sighting device to a bow or to have any electronic device attached to an arrow while hunting game animals.
- ★ 2. It is unlawful to hunt game animals with any arrow, including broadhead, weighing less than 400 grains.
3. The following restrictions apply to the hunting of game animals with broadhead arrows:
 - a. Broadhead may not be less than 7/8 of an inch wide;
 - b. Broadhead blades may not be barbed;
 - c. Broadheads must have a completely closed back with a smooth, unbroken surface starting at a maximum blade width, forming a smooth line toward the nock end of the shaft. The line may not angle toward the point.
 - d. Broadhead may not be of an expanding style.
4. It is unlawful to hunt game animals with a bow that has:
 - ★ a. less than 40 pounds of pull measured at peak draw weight or at archers full draw;
 - b. greater than 70% reduction in ~~pull~~ peak draw weight.

I represent a group of Sporting Goods Retailers, which number 171 member stores. This buying group was founded in Montana and is based in Lewistown. Nineteen (19) of these stores are in Montana and are privately and locally owned and operated. All of these retailers are opposed to HB 379.

I manage the Archery Department at Capital Sports and Western here in Helena. This bill was introduced without the concern of everyone involved in the sport of Archery. It was aimed at the use of overdraws on bows. It will not only affect this group of shooters but many others including children, women and men that have shorter draw lengths.

Line 10 of this bill ... Archery Equipment Restrictions would eliminate lighted pins which are on the very end of the sight pin and have a bulb that lights up, enabling the shooter to see his sight better. Would this give him an added advantage? NO, it doesn't help him shoot better but it does make him see his sight pin better. The product LIGHT ALLS which fit on the top of your sight assembly and works much like a flashlight, to light up all of the pins that are below it. Again this does not help in his shooting, but does help him to see his sight pins on an overcast or cloudy day.

Lazer sights (which I do have a picture of to show you) will enable a person to have a red dot of light to light his target. It will not help him shoot better, you can only sight in for one yardage. The shooter has to compensate for what ever the distance is if the animal is not standing at the exact distance he set the Lazer sight in for. So its like shooting with one pin on his sight. Why not have lighted pins, light alls or lazer sights? These increase your accuracy by enabling you to see your sights better.

I have looked through many catalogs from Archery Manufacturers trying to find a broadhead that falls short of Line 17..restricting use of broadheads under 1" diameter. I have not found a broad head that is under 1" diameter. I have 8 pages of Broadheads from the catalogs of different archery manufacturers here to show you. We do not need a law that will not effect anything.

Line 25 says poundage has to be over 45lbs and an arrow length of 28". This will effect a bigger group than it was intended for. I believe this was written for those shooters that use overdraws on their bows, however it effects children, women, and those men with shorter draws. This would hurt sales and also beginners in the sport. If you have a child with a 24" draw he should not be required to shoot a 28" arrow. With a 28" arrow the child would have a slower arrow which is not what most archers are striving for. Actually, they are trying to have flatter, faster shooting bows. The reason for this is the flatter your arrow flies, the less your arrow drops so you take some of the guess work out of shooting. The more accurate you shoot then the less misses and

Dear Representative Ream;

One must certainly question the advisability or necessity to pass HB 379. I am confident that you will make those favoring the bill prove to you that it is both necessary and desirable.

It appears that Section one, (1), is really directed to eliminating the usage of electrically powered sights. If so, the bill should say sights. If this is true, are the bill sponsors sure there now exists a real problem or problems with these devices? I am not so sure that improved sights would not contribute to a reduction in wounding loss through improved accuracy. I would refuse to pass a law prohibiting use if this could later turn out to be true.

Section 1, (2), places a restriction on minimum arrow weight. What is the proof this is necessary or desirable? It appears to be directed at new technology such as graphite based arrow shafts and shorter arrows used by "overdraw" bows. As an "old" archer, I was involved in a fight against aluminum and fiberglass arrow shafts in another state. Today, these newer shaft materials are far more widely used and superior to the cedar arrow shafts I formerly favored. Too, there are two schools of thought. One favors the higher velocity light arrow and the other favors the lower velocity heavy arrow. Both, as you know, have their merits. Don't make a law and "cast in stone" something you may be asked to change later. It may well be that the lighter arrows may cut wounding loss through flatter trajectory and, thus, improved potential accuracy. Does a problem (or problems) exist today that requires a law? If you pass one, you will make it necessary for game wardens to carry grain weight scales to enforce the law.

In Section 1, (3), (a), it states that broadhead blades may not be less than one inch wide. I believe this should be stated in term of broadhead maximum cutting width. Also, one of the more popular and effective broadheads today, the Razorbak 5, has a maximum cutting width of about 7/8 inch. Is a law regarding this really necessary?

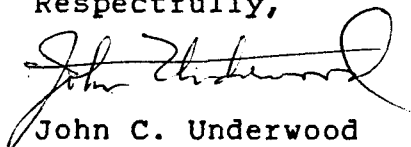
Section 1,(4),(a),deals with establishing bow minimum pull weight. If this is really necessary, it should be stated both in terms of bow peak pull weight (in case of a "compound" bow) or pull weight at the archer's draw length (long or recurve bow). Although I do favor a minimum pull weight, I am not sure what it should be.

I do know that 35lb. pull weight was sufficient for me to kill whitetail deer (with no wounding loss) before I "graduated" to a much heavier bow. If a law is necessary, I would lean to a 35 lb. minimum to keep from eliminating some weaker archers from the sport. Lets face it, most adult men will continue to use 60 lb. or heavier bows regardless of a lower limit. If you do make a law, game wardens may be forced to carry bow weight scales with them for enforcement purposes.

In Section 1,(4),(b),"compound" bows having a reduction in holding weight, at full draw, greater than 65% would be prohibited. I am not convinced that a regulation on this is necessary or desirable. I do know that the holding weight reduction percentage on all compound bows has a tolerance. Some "65%" bows may actually be 75% or 55%, for example. Be certain that greater than 65% weight reduction will not assist a reduction in wounding loss "somewhere down the road" before making a law that you will be asked to later change. In order to enforce such a law, wardens may have to carry bow weight scales and a calculator to figure reduction percentage.

In conclusion, please strongly question the real need for passing into law any part of HB 379. As a bow hunter for 34 years, I have a lot of "trouble" with HB 379.

Mr. Chairman;

I am writing in response to House Bill 379. I will attempt to respond on a point-by-point basis to explain why I feel this bill should not be passed. It was obviously formulated by someone with very little real knowledge of actual functioning of modern archery equipment. Those of us who have been bowhunting for over thirty years are aware of many such archaic laws as the "minimum bow weight." Most of these regulations are unenforceable and superfluous. Which is why they were removed in the first place.

Section 1. (1) Sight attachments such as lighted sight pins make such a slight difference to most hunter as to be completely ineffective. However, in some cases such as close-in vision problems, they can be absolutely essential. I know of at least one hunter who can clearly see the animal but is unable to see his sight pin. Under this law, he would have to quit bowhunting. I'm sure there are many more like him. One manufacturer in Bozeman sells a mounting device to attach a video camcorder to the bow. This law would make that illegal. While there may be some equipment now or in the future which I could agree to ban, I see no reason for such a broad definition which will affect so many of the items now available such as lighted pins which have been used for over ten years with no impact on the sport.

(2) This proposal is ludicrous. Arrow weight by itself has absolutely no bearing on the penetration or killing power. With enough speed, any arrow will perform, and with the proper speed all arrows are exactly equal. Penetrating ability, basically, is determined by mass weight times the square of the velocity. To determine if any hunter's arrows were sufficient would involve such equipment as to once again make the law unenforceable. It would be like telling a hunter with a 300 magnum he can no longer use 150-grain bullets because they no longer kill animals.

(3) (a) Once again, this section is unnecessary. If there is a broadhead on the market with a cutting edge of less width I am unaware of it. However, even if it exists, if it is razor-sharp it should still be effective and I can see no serious objection to it. A poor blood trail comes from a bad shot rather than a small blade. A well-placed hit can kill without blades. It is the poor shot and/or the poor tracker who cause the problems. What we really need is legislation requiring all bowhunters to pass a shooting proficiency test.

(3) This is the one aspect to which I can agree. However, I dislike the definition in part (c) which I feel may be too complex. I should like to see this section amended to: Broadheads must have a completely closed back which must angle from maximum blade width toward the nock end of the shaft.

(4) (a) This law was taken off the books years ago. The reasons are simple. The law difficult to enforce, it can be unfair and discriminatory, and modern equipment is becoming efficient enough for a lighter bow to perform well enough in many cases. For instance, a compound bow with a long draw and short string height can deliver more energy at 35 pounds than one with short draw and long string height at 45 pounds. Light bows may be sufficient under

the right circumstances. It simply requires an understanding of the limitations of your equipment. This is one of the purposes of the Bowhunter Education program conducted by the Fish and Game dept. and the MBA. Under this type of law we could scrap the program and tell the youngsters to wait until they grow up.

(4) (b) Since the recent ruling by the National Pope and Young Club to limit records to animals taken with bows having 65% or less let-off, manufacturers of compounds throughout the industry have generally agreed to make bows within this area, making this section unnecessary as well as unenforceable.

It is very important to note that most of this type of legislation is being drawn up by a small but vocal group of shooters using primitive and relatively inefficient equipment. They seem to perceive modern equipment as a threat simply because they don't understand it. Their main goal is to re-shape the sport to fit their own parameters. One MBA representative who shoots a light bow and small arrow (who, incidentally, is a successful elk hunter) was totally opposed to this bill in it's original form. This opposition was ostensibly not a personal matter but was because of all the small people, including women and children, who would be affected. Yet as soon as this individual was assured of a compromise of 40lbs. and 400 grains, all objections were removed. This hunter's equipment now just fit the requirements. What happened to the noble cause of the women and children? I am ready to pick up the banner where this MBA rep dropped it. While this bill may be detrimental to a great many bowhunters, I can see no benefit whatever to the sport, to the department, or to the State as justification.

In closing, I would like to say I cannot believe that by going backward to such archaic and unenforceable laws we can accomplish any positive results for bowhunting. Even worse, a great many bowhunters would simply ignore it rather than change their equipment. This, on the other hand, could have a generally negative effect and cause even further dissention within our ranks. I feel this bill should not be passed in any form.
