## Presentation and Opening Statement by Sponsor:

Rep. Schye, House District 18, opened by stating this bill for essential air services had been before the Committee earlier to see if the Committee Members would approve a draft to make this bill. Rep. Schye stated this will be sent to Congress, our congressional people, Secretary of Transportation, our Governor, and the President of the United States, that Montana is in support of continuing essential air service for our state. When Congress funded this, legislation had backed out because of lack of funds. Rep. Schye commented on the eight communities that would be affected and how it would also affect Big Sky. Rep. Schye stated that Mike Ferguson from Mt. Aeronautics Div., was here to answer any questions the Committee might have.

#### HEARING ON HOUSE BILL 506

Presentation and Opening Statement by Sponsor:

Rep. Darko, House District 2, opened by stating the purpose for the bill. Rep. Darko stated this bill requires flashing lights on road construction, and road maintenance equipment and on implements of husbandry. Rep. Darko stated this bill covers a large scope of machinery and urged strongly for the Committee's support.

Noponents: Beate Galda, Attorney Dept. of Highways

- Noponent Testimony: Ms. Galda stated the Highway Dept. neither supports nor opposes this legislation, but they do see a few problems concerning this bill. Ms. Galda distributed copies on specifications the Highway Commission put on contract equipment. Ms. Galda stated the Highway Dept. does not have rule making authority under the statutes that have been amended 61-9-228. Ms. Galda stated the Highway Commission imposes specifications through contracts, so the only type of equipment that could be subject to the control of the highway commission are things engaged in state highway contracts. Ms. Galda stated the general rule making authority for title 61, chapter 9 is the Dept. of Justice, not the Highway Commission. Ms. Galda stated there is no authority for the Dept. of Highways to regulate implements of husbandry under any method because of lack of rule making authority. She stated they cannot regulate private contractors or other public agencies while they are using any kind of equipment. Ms. Galda stated she had prepared a set of amendments that put implements of husbandry in a new subsection on page 2, sec. 2, following line 15 with rule making authority for implements husbandry lights with the Dept. of Justice. In other equipment on section 3 of this bill, makes it a crime to operate equipment unless they comply with the specifications adopted by the Dept. of Highways. Ms. Galda said the standards adopted by the Highway Commission deal with construction projects only. The dept. does not have control when equipment is traveling down a road and not working. See Exhibit 1.
- Questions From Committee Members: Rep. Westlake asked Rep. Darko will this bill be a requirement or law for all roads or just roads under the jurisdiction of the Highway Dept.? Rep. Darko replied that under the proposed amendment by the dept. it would be for public roads.
- Rep. Steppler asked Rep. Darko if this would apply to all farm vehicles, tractors or equipment the tractors are pulling? Rep. Darko stated that she wanted it for tractors mainly.
- Rep. Patterson asked Rep. Darko if this also applied to fire trucks, e.g., Dept. of State Lands? Rep. Darko stated they are not classified as road construction equipment and are probably considered emergency vehicles under different statutes.
- Rep. Zook asked Rep. Darko how many accidents in the last five years that have involved farm equipment because of no flashing lights? Rep. Darko stated she did not have that information.

Closing by Sponsor: Rep. Darko closed stating the rule making

#### HEARING ON HOUSE BILL 419

# Presentation and Opening Statement by Sponsor:

Rep. Koehnke, House District 32, opened stating his bill concerns hayhaulers. Rep. Koehnke stated the reason for this bill is because of new equipment that is being used makes longer bales than what they used to be and they make a hayload wider than the 9' that is allowed under current law. Rep. Koehnke stated the language for the round bales has already become law. Rep. Koehnke stated that the hayhaulers want 120 inches allowable. Rep. Koehnke stated he has spoken with the Highway Dept. and they will have an amendment for this bill.

## Proponent Testimony:

- Mr. Kitto stated as a grain hauler and producer and on behalf of his community are in favor of this bill. Mr. Kitto stated this bill would allow small square bales to be 10 feet wide. Mr. Kitto stated they prefer to haul their bales in a arrangement that is described on exhibit 2. See Exhibit 2.
- Mr. Hahn stated the amendment that Rep. Koehnke introduced is acceptable for his company. Mr. Hahn stated as with all trucking companies, extra freight means extra income, and hay haulers charge by the delivered ton and would like to be able to haul up to gross which is 80,000 lbs. Mr. Hahn stated a average 48" bale weighs 90 lbs. loaded on a average 45' semi trailer using no rail bales, you can only haul 426 bales a load which comes out to be 19.7 tons. The same stack with rail bales average 510 bales per load averages 22.95 tons. The freight difference using an average 20 ton freight bill is \$75.60 and stated that was enough to buy 3/4 of the fuel on a four hundred mile round trip.

Noponent: Jess Munro, Acting Dir. Dept. of Highways

- Testimony: Mr. Munro stated they are not for nor against this bill, but have some amendments to offer to the bill: 1) Mr. Munro stated this will help clear the language by removing the word "must" and insert the word "may". Mr. Munro stated this will allow the Dept. of Highways to be consistent with all their GVW laws. Mr. Munro stated if the word "must" is in there the dept. has a trouble with federal law because permits are to be discretionary and the word "must" overrules the federal law. 2) On page 2, line 20, strike l20" and insert 114". Mr. Munro stated this would allow the hay haulers to haul 9½ foot loads 24 hours a day.
- Questions From Committee Members: Rep. Stang asked Mr. Munro if this bill was for short hauls only. Mr. Munro stated it is statewide, but they would have to have a permit because of being in excess of the 8½ foot federal width law. Rep. Stang asked Mr. Munro if it would affect the weight for the bridge formula if they were overweight? Mr. Munro stated this bill only applies for the width, and if they are overweight they will be ticketed.
- Rep. Steppler asked Mr. Munro what the reason is for changing the width from 120" to 114"? Mr. Munro replied they have never allowed 10 foot wide reducible loads on the road and there are a lot of highways in Montana that are not fit for those kinds of loads.
- Rep. Stang asked Mr. Munro if loggers were to come in and want  $9\frac{1}{2}$  foot bunks on their trucks by special permit where would that put the highway dept.? Mr. Munro replied that if the Committee passes this bill, they would have a hard time saying no, but at this time the loggers are allowed 9 foot bunks.
- Rep. Stang asked Rep. Koehnke if the effective date needed to be added in this? Rep. Koehnke replied he needed it upon passage and approval and the reason is, so the haulers would be able to uses it as soon as possible because they haul hay every month of the year.
- <u>Closing by Sponsor:</u> Rep. Koehnke closed stating the haulers will accept the 114" by the Dept. of Highways and the haulers ask for the Committee's support of this bill.

HEARING ON HOUSE BILL 162

- The hearing on HB 162 was heard earlier in Committee, but Rep. Stang had asked at that time of the hearing if someone could come back in to the Committee with this information. While in between bills Mr. Galt gave this information:
- Dave Galt, Assist. Enforcement Bureau Chief, spoke to the Committee regarding HB 162 that had been heard in Committee on Jan. 26, 1989. Rep. Stang asked Mr. Galt if he would go over the requirements if the loggers were to fall under the

control of the PSC and have to go through inspections and turn in their log books. Mr. Galt started with information on the log books. A vehicle hauling intrastate only is allowed 200 mile radius from the base station before he is required to keep a log book. Mr. Galt stated that vehicles traveling over 100 miles from base station have to keep a log book. Mr. Galt stated it isn't really PSC regulations that requires the log books but how far they have to drive. If they are required to have a log book then they have 15 hours a day on duty and driving time, 10 hours a day driving time. If a loader broke down trying to load the truck, that time waiting for repairs would be considered on duty time, but would not be considered driving time.

- Rep. Steppler asked Mr. Galt if the 200 miles is total driving time in a day or is it radius? Mr. Galt stated it is 200 miles from their base operations before they have to keep a log book, they could travel the 200 mile radius as many times as they wish during a day.
- Rep. Stang asked Mr. Galt if the loggers were regulated would it lower the GVW weight and lose the bridge formula? Mr. Galt stated they work with regulated and unregulated vehicles, the bridge formula sets maximum weights for farm vehicles that are not regulated as well as regulated vehicles, and just because they became regulated does not mean it will affect their bridge formula.
- Rep. Patterson asked Mr. Galt what the fines would be if a logger calculated his hours wrong. Mr. Galt stated that having a fictitious log book at this time is punishable by a \$500 fine, and the fine for a person who exceeds the 15 hours in a day is \$250.

(iii) however, nothing in this subsection prevents the department from constructing and erecting signs on the remaining primary highways before July 1, 1991.

(2) Except as provided in subsection (3), the welcome and farewell signs must be:

(a) (i) on the interstate system, approximately 20 feet high and 38 feet wide; and

(ii) on the primary system, approximately 8 feet high and 16 feet wide;

(b) of substantial timber and plank construction, similar to those shown in the design dated July 16, 1962, and formerly in use at Montana's borders with the inscriptions:

(i) at each entrance to Montana:

"The Gate is Open Welcome to MONTANA"; and (ii) at each exit from Montana: "So Long! Come Again to MONTANA".

(3) Notwithstanding the provisions of subsection (2), welcome or farewell signs in place on the interstate highway system on [the effective date of this act] and required to be replaced under the provisions of [this act] must be utilized at locations on the primary highway system as long as those signs remain serviceable. When those signs are no longer serviceable, they must be replaced on the primary systems with signs described in subsection (2).

NEW SECTION. Section 2. Department authorized to accept and expend funds for welcome and farewell signs. The department may accept money from other state agencies, federal agencies, or private persons for the purposes of [this act] and may expend the money received for those purposes.

(3) Temporary Pavement Markers. Temporary pavement markers shall meet the following requirements:

- (a) Type I Temporary Pavement Markers shall have white reflectorized tape on only one side and shall have a white body.
- (b) Type II Temporary Pavement Markers shall have yellow reflectorized tape on both sides and shall have a yellow body.
- (c) Type I and Type II Temporary Pavement Markers shall be extruded polyurethane at least 3 1/2 inches high and 2 inches wide, and shall have at least 1/4 inch reflectorized tape across the top. The reflectorized tape shall have a reflectance of at least 1800 candlepower per square foot at 1/10 degree observation and 0 degree entrance angles. An adhesive strip at least 3/4 inch wide and 1/8 inch deep at the bottom of the marker body shall be provided for adhesion to the pavement surface.
- (d) The body of the marker shall be provided with a cover which will protect the body and the reflectorized strip, and which will not come off under traffic until the cover is removed after seal coat asphalt has been applied.

(4) Advance Warning Arrow Panels. Advance warning arrow panels (Arrow Boards) shall meet the requirements of MUTCD Section 6E-9, except that each arrow board shall have at least 25 lamps. Arrow boards mounted on striping units and shadow vehicles shall be Type "B", 36"x72". All other arrow boards shall be Type "C", 48"x76".


(5) Warning Lights. All vehicles, hauling units, and mobile construction equipment operating within the project limits and in potential conflict with the travelling public shall be equipped with amber flashing or strobe lights visible from all directions for a minimum distance of 0.4 mile during daylight and clear weather conditions.

<u>C. ACCESS TO ROADWAYS.</u> Proposals for temporary breaks in interstate access control or right of way fences for the convenience of the Contractor shall be submitted in writing to the Engineer for approval.

Proposals shall contain the following information:


- (1) Intended use of the access break.
- (2) A sketch showing the location of the proposed access approaches, and sight distances.
- (3) Proposed traffic control.
- (4) Security measures for access and right of way control.
- (5) A statement by which the Contractor assumes full liability for restoration of the area, including the access or right of way controls.
- (6) Any other information pertinent to the use of the break.

Copies of the drawings in these provisions may be used with appropriate additions and stationing.






BALE IN CENTER


