DISPOSITION OF HOUSE BILL HJR 12

Motion: Rep. Johnson moved DO PASS as amended.

Amendments, Discussion, and Votes: Rep. Johnson went through each amendment to HJR 12.

Rep. Pavlovich asked Rep. Johnson if subpoena powers were still available to the legislature? Paul Verdon, researcher, said the legislative council, by statute, has subpoena power for all study committees. It is not necessary to enact this. This is a study resolution, it is not a law, you can't put substantive law into a resolution. The existing subpoena power of the council is sufficient. Rep. Kilpatrick asked what a resolution does over a law? Rep. Pavlovich said that if it is passed out of committee it goes to both Houses and is passed, it is then put on a list with all study resolutions. Depending on how much money is appropriated to the legislative council to for interim studies, the council polls the legislators to prioritize the studies to decide which ones they want to study. During the interim a committee will be appointed, they conduct the study and recommend to the next legislative session what they want done and a bill is drafted to this effect. are four members from each house on each interim committee.

DISPOSITION OF HOUSE BILL 464

Motion: Rep. Johnson moved <u>DO PASS</u> on the bill and moved the amendments.

Amendments, Discussion, and Votes: Rep. Johnson went over the amendments to the bill. The amendments DO PASS. Rep. Bachini asked the chairman of the sub-committee if they felt the concerns were addressed by the wholesaler? Are they happy with the bill or do they think there is still problems with it? Rep. Johnson said they feel there are still problems with the bill. Rep. Bachini asked what areas? Rep. Johnson said the bill regulates more closely and they do not feel it can actually be done because the opportunity for free trade disappears in a sense.

Rep. Simon said we have had a law similar to this on the books for a long time dealing with sales below cost and so forth. The department of commerce can tell you that the law is virtually unenforceable and a nightmare for the department to deal with. They get complaints, they don't know what to do with them, they are having a difficult time even knowing where to start to try to enforce these laws. I think Rep. Bradley's intentions are laudable. I think it will just create more problems for the department of commerce to try to deal with the complaints. They have no real solid mechanism to deal with them.

Rep. Bachini said he made some calls to his area and there were no complaints from his area at all. In one area if it had not been for the company coming in and taking over a particular station there would have been jobs lost. We have a company operated station and the independent stations are operating and they are doing all right. I think the issue needs to be studied first if they want to do something. I think there is too many problems right now with this bill.

Rep. Thomas suggested that if we are going to send the resolution out, that we don't need to send this bill out to the floor. It is my suggestion that we table the bill here.

Recommendation and Vote: HB 464 DO PASS motion failed 9-7.

HEARING ON HOUSE BILL 476

Presentation and Opening Statement by Sponsor:

Rep. Grady, House District 47. This bill establishes the board of taxidermy; transfers the licensing of taxidermists from FWP to the department of commerce; establishes licensing criteria, examination requirements, and fees for the practice of taxidermy; grants rulemaking authority to

the board of taxidermy and department of commerce; provides penalties; provides an exemption from the sunrise law; repeals Section 87-4-201, MCA; and provides an immediate effective date. A lot of the outfitters and people involved felt the bill went too far. There are too many amendments proposed to amend the bill so a gray bill has been drafted. The gray bill leaves the licensing authority with FWP and the fee will be the same \$15, it grandfathers all existing taxidermists in that have a license now. The only thing we are talking about is that a new individual who comes to the department to get a license will have to take a test. The department will set up the testing. The bill sets up a mechanism to be able to charge the fee for administering the test. This is essentially what the gray bill does.

Proponent Testimony:

Mr. Thomas went over his exhibits 1 and 2.

Mr. Welch said that the test in the gray bill will be written by the licensed taxidermists in Montana and an assistant in FWP will help write the test and give the test. Current license holders will be excluded from the test. The gray bill grandfathers in current license holders. The test will be written to test basic taxidermy skills and knowledge.

Mr. Kenney said consumers will be protected by knowing the taxidermist is qualified and licensed. The intent of this bill is to help create some qualifications and criteria for the taxidermy industry.

Mr. Tutwiler said the gray bill has merit. Because as a hunter, outdoorsman, and concerned citizen I am very concerned about the reputation that this industry gives the state. Montana is in a very unique situation, the quality of our hunting, due to the great resource we have, the fine management of FWP. We have maintained, in fact, increased the premium value of fishing and hunting in Montana. At a time when that is not the case in many other states. The supply of quality hunting and fishing is right here in Montana. That creates a great demand. We are seeing that demand not only in terms of our residents, but also from the

demand from out of state. When you create a quality situation and the demand goes up there is certainly an opportunity for additional related industries such as outfitting and guiding and taxidermy. With the increase in opportunity to make a profit and to complement recreational outdoor business there is also the opportunity, without some prudent licensing and guidance, for the minority to take advantage of the situation and commit acts, or provide a service that is not of the well-known quality and reputation that Montana deserves. I think it is important with the increased profile and visibility we are going to have in this state for years to come, that we take steps to ensure that our industries are reputable and complement the quality of outdoor experiences.

Ms. Thomas said this bill would be good to bring out-ofstate money in to our state. Out-of-state hunters will
leave their work here to be done if they know the
taxidermists are tested and licensed by the state. They
know they will get good work, not shoddy work. We want to
better the taxidermy business, there are professional people
in the business and we want taxidermists treated as
professionals. There is no reason for a person who has
studied taxidermy not to take and pass a test like
attorneys, hair stylists, nurses, or doctors, these people
have to qualify. Taxidermists are no different, they should
qualify to do taxidermy. Just because it is an animal they
work with doesn't mean it is not important work.

Mr. Walker said he is a concerned consumer not a taxidermist. I believe a taxidermist should be qualified and tested. I had a bear trophy done by a shoddy taxidermist and he ruined my trophy. This bill doesn't keep a person from being an apprentice taxidermist as some have said in previous testimony. This bill is set up to protect the consumer as well as the taxidermist. I am in full support of HB 476.

Closing by Sponsor: Rep. Grady said he apologizes to the opponents because they were not able to see the gray bill. This gray bill just came up in the last 24 hours. It has been made clear that a lot of people were not aware of the gray bill. It is entirely different from the original bill and as far as the committee is concerned, until we take action to amend the original draft we are talking about the original bill. The proponents were talking about the gray Taxidermy is a big industry, something that is going to grow in Montana. Montana's wildlife industry is growing tremendously. We have the largest elk and deer herds, we have everything the outdoor sportsmen want. This is why they are coming to our state. Out-of-state licenses have been raised tremendously, and the sales have not slowed down. We are probably as lax as any other state for a taxidermist to get into the business. All they have to do is pay \$15 for a license. We are going to protect the consumer with this bill, \$110 - \$350 to mount a buck deer head, bull elk head mount is \$450 - \$1,000. These are average prices. Just because a taxidermist has mounts on the walls of his shop doesn't mean he has done them and he does good work. An average taxidermist can gross \$40,000 to \$50,000 a year. The consumer should have some protection, we are talking about minimum protection here with HB 476. hope the committee will delay any action until some of the opponents can see the gray bill.

HEARING ON HOUSE BILL 553

Presentation and Opening Statement by Sponsor:

Rep. Grady stated that this bill would appropriate money to the department of fish, wildlife, and parks to be used to match money obtained from other sources to organize, promote, and conduct the Montana Governor's Cup 500-Mile Sled Dog Race. This bill redirects \$40,000 from the facility use tax proceeds to FWP for the biennium to be used for providing grants to match money raised from other sources. This will be used to promote the Governor's Cup Sled Dog Race.

Testifying Proponents and Who They Represent:

Proponent Testimony:

Mr. Van Hook said this is the longest sled dog race in the lower 48 states. The race has grown each year and the interest is growing and drawing more and more people into Montana to see and participate in this sport. This year ESPN television station will tape the race and it will be show nation wide. The legislative council at the request of Rep. Jan Brown investigated some of the legislative activities in Alaska in regards to sled dog racing. determined that appropriations are being made for the promotion of racing events there. Financial assistance is given for development and promotion of the race, development and maintenance of the trails. Last year the investment was in excess of \$150,000 in Alaska for their sled dog races. Our event is on a volunteer basis and we have hundreds of people volunteering their time for this race. HB 553 is a formula for cost sharing. This bill requires the race to first obtain sponsorships before any state funds are invested, there is a limit of \$40,000 on the state's investment, and there is a limit of 2 years on this investment appropriation. The use of bed tax funds has generated some questions about similar proposals that may come from other events in Montana. We believe that if any thing this program can, over 2 years, demonstrate how such a cost sharing venture might be designed in the future.

Rep. Mark O'Keefe is in support of HB 553. I also support the bed tax. We have a tax out there that the members of our body feel we have no control over the spending of. There is some resentment of that in the House and the Senate. I know it is important for the innkeepers and travel promotion people to control that as long as possible. But, I also put to you that at some point, someone is going to tap the bed tax. Maybe this bill could be the basis for broadened discussion on how that money is spent, what kind of control you are going to allow the industry to keep on the bed tax. This is good for the innkeeper's industry that this race go, that it is good for the chambers of commerce, that it is good for the people in travel promotion.

Mr. Metzger wants to appeal to the committee to let this race grow, with your help in getting the financing, we can see this event grow.

Mayor Van Arsdale stated that the sled dog race has been very successful and he doesn't know why they are asking for money. Once we open the door to the bed tax money, other folks will want to dip into these funds.

Mr. Sitter stated that the innkeeper's association is not in support of HB 553. This race does not bring in tourists or visitors. The bed tax fund's primary purpose is to bring people in to Montana.

Mr. Ingels said his association does not support this bill.

Mr. Norwick stated that the Missoula chamber opposes this bill.

Questions From Committee Members: Rep. Blotkamp asked Rep. Grady how they arrived at the \$40,000 figure? Could you break that down for me? Rep. Grady referred this to Mr. Van Hook. He said the race currently has \$30,000 budget. We are comparing ourselves to the John Beargrease race in Minnesota. Their race has a budget of \$80-100,000 right now, \$40,000 is set aside for the winner's purse, that is why they attract a large number of mushers. We would use these funds, if the bill is passed, either for the purse or for producing the race.

Closing by Sponsor: Rep. Grady said all we are trying to do is redirect some funds with this bill. The time has come when we need to look at redirecting some of these funds. All the money is going for advertising, the funds are going for brochures, advertising, lots of times purchased from out-of-state, money going to large out of state advertising agencies. It's Montanan's paying that tax. We pay it on every accommodation in this state. We need to look at this, use the money to advertise our home state.

HEARING ON HOUSE BILL 557

Presentation and Opening Statement by Sponsor:

Rep. Bachini, House District 14, stated that this bill will allow the police officers of Montana to assess themselves .5 percent of the base income of a new patrolman. The purpose of this assessment is to provide group life insurance premiums for the police officers.

Proponent Testimony:

Mr. Ramsey said he represented not only his department but policemen across the state of Montana. This bill will not effect all of the police in all Montana cities. The officers want life insurance; this idea has been going through their ranks and Montana can't afford to supply us with life insurance policies. This is a self-help bill, and it will not cost the state one cent. We have excluded the chiefs, assistant chiefs, and captains at their request. We have left it open to them if they decide to come into the program.

Mr. Garner stated that only 7 other states in the country offer this sort of benefit as a state pay program to the officers in their respective states. In Montana what we would like to do as an association, it will only affect our association members, is to give this program to our members and pay for it ourselves. We are willing to do this because it is important to us and our families. All of the officers in my department supports this bill.

Mr. Williams was representing the Butte police department and said they are all in full support of this bill.

Mr. Allison stated that the officers in his organization here in Helena support this bill.

Mr. Clader said he is representing the Missoula police officers and they support this bill and ask the committee to give the bill a do pass.

Mr. Shanks said he is here on behalf of the Great Falls police officers. They would like the opportunity to provide for themselves a life insurance policy.

the cities involved are Class I city retirement systems,
they are the cities that originally formed the Police
Association. We leave our doors open to any police
department around the state of Montana. If they desire,
they can join our association.

Rep. Steppler asked Officer Ramsey if an officer would be required to join the organization before they could purchase the policy? Officer Ramsey said they would.

Rep. Nelson asked if a police department is participating in the program and one officer wished not to participate would he be able to do this? Would he have to contribute? Officer Ramsey said the officer would have to go to his local association and they in turn would go to the state association to get it okayed for the officer not to participate.

Closing by Sponsor: Rep. Bachini said there was 100 percent participation in this. It is helping no one but the officers themselves, city, county, or state will not be involved in the cost and I would appreciate a do pass on the bill.

FACT SHEET

EXISTING STATUTES

Dear Legislator,

To be a licensed taxidermist in the State of Montana one must:

- Item 1 Pay \$15.00 to the Department of Fish Wildlife and Parks.
- Item 2 Your real name is not required, nor is an application required.
- Item 3 No testing is required.
- Item' 4 There are no requirem ants to know the Department of Fish, Wildlife & Parks' game laws that regulate your license.
- Item 5 The only requirement for being issued a taxidermist license is to pay a \$15.00 fee.
- **Item 6** Present licensing procedures are threatening to the consumer's personal welfare, health and safety.
- Item 7 A taxidermy license holder is in no way qualified by the State of Montana!
- Item 8 This is a deceptive licensing practice by this State, which leads the unsuspecting consumer to believe that the license holder is qualified by the State of Montana.
- Item 9 The Fish, Wildlife & Parks Department does not have the authority to implement a system of qualifications for the licensing of a taxidermist.

Proposed Statute Changes (Gray Bill)

- Item 1 A licensing fee will be required. Projections of an increase in the fee amount remain small, due to the fact that the Department of Fish, Wildlife & Parks will implement the licensing system.
- Item 2 An application will be required to identify the applicant and his/her qualifications as a commercial taxidermist.
- Item 3 A test will be required to demonstrate adequate knowledge and techniques of taxidermy.
- **Item 4** Through the testing procedure an applicaant will be required to become familiar with the game laws of the State of Montana and the laws related to the profession of taxidermy.
- Item 5 The requirements to become a licensed taxidermist will be as follows:
- Item 6 Guarantees better taxidermy procedures to insure the health and safety of the consumer and the taxidermist.
- Item 7 Consumer will be protected because the license holder has been qualified and has a knowledge of taxidermy.
- 1tem 8 The license holder will be qualified by the State of Montana before receiving a license to practice taxidermy.
- Item 9 The Department of Fish, Wildlife & Parks will have the authority to implement a system of qualificationns for the licensing of taxidermists.

HB 476 February 9, 1989

Testimony presented by Ron Marcoux, Department of Fish, Wildlife and Parks.

HB 476, as amended, would provide for the development of application forms, examinations, and re-examination forms for all initial taxidermist licensees. Examination procedures would be implemented by the Department of Fish, Wildlife and Parks, with the actual examination being developed by representatives of the taxidermy industry and officials from the department.

This bill allows charging fees necessary to cover the expenses related to testing and record keeping requirements.

The Department of Fish, Wildlife and Parks supports the concept of establishing industry standards in the practice of taxidermy and supports HB 476 in its amended form. However, I would like to point out that any further industry standards and review processes, as well as insurance requirements, would more appropriately be handled by another agency that directly regulates business or professional standards.
