HEARING ON HOUSE BILL 614

Presentation and Opening Statement by Sponsor: Diana Wyatt, Representative from House District #37, Great Falls, advised that this piece of legislation was brought to her by many constituents from around Montana who have hearing impairments of various degrees. The bill would make available telephone lines and communication devices on loan to people in their business, in homes, at fire departments or police departments so in cases of emergency they are able to communicate. It provides for a ten cent charge on all telephone lines, which money will be used to form a privatized situation where hopefully some company will bid on this project and be able to provide this service statewide.

Testimony:

- Maggie Bullock, Social and Rehabilitation Services, stated she is appearing in support of HB 614. According to Ms. Bullock, the program is being supported by the Administration because it is seen as a primary example of privatization. The program would be administratively attached to SRS, and would be contracted out to organizations around the state who would be interested in providing the types of services proposed. Another thing it does in terms of privatization is eliminate the need for FTEs. Extra personnel will not be required at this time. She requested the committee's support, adding she feels this is a fine system to provide communication devices to people who are not currently able to take advantage of regular type equipment.
- Tom McGree, representing U. S. West Communications, stated he also is in support of HB 614. He stated his company has been working with Representative Wyatt and others prior to the start of the session. They think it is a good piece of legislation. He pointed out that a universal services system has always been something his company has been interested in. Some impaired people are not able to use the existing telephone service. This legislation would enable impaired people in Montana to be able to utilize phone service the same as unimpaired people. He urged a do pass recommendation. A handout illustrating a telecommunications device for the deaf was distributed (Exhibit #1).
- Questions From Committee Members: Senator Hager mentioned that Mr. Havdahl is now one of those persons who has a hearing problem, and he sets a little device on the table to pick up testimony in a committee.
- Senator Himsl asked for clarification of the ten cents service charge. He asked if that money will buy equipment that would be given to the handicapped who qualify, and then would they pay their own service charges. Mr. McGree stated that was correct. He added there would be a fee of ten cents on all subscribers in Montana, collected by U. S. West Communications, sent to the state on a quarterly basis, and the monies would be used to (1) finance the equipment, and (2) used for dual party relay system. This system would be set up under this legislation to allow a person who is hearing impaired to talk to a person of normal hearing. There would be a centralized location set up to handle calls

from the impaired person.

- Senator Himsl asked how much would the administrative costs be for U. S. Communications. Mr. McGree stated there is some funding already available. Senator Himsl asked if only approved equipment can be used, would the contract be with SRS. Mr. McGree stated U. S. West would collect the money, give it to the state for them to focus on the equipment, turn it over to the Department of Revenue where it would be put in an earmarked account for this program. The equipment would not be provided by U.S. West Communications, nor would they have to approve it. The only requirement is that the equipment be able to work on normal telephone lines. A committee would decide on the type of equipment to be purchased.
- Senator Pipinich asked if it would require training for people to use this equipment. Representative Wyatt stated there would be no training required because of the simplicity of operation. She added that a handicapped person would approach the committee and request the service, and the equipment would be given on loan to that individual. She added that the most important part of this legislation is regarding the two-party relay, wherein all emergency facilities would have access to this piece of equipment.
- Senator Pipinich pointed out that this bill would cost 3/4 of 1% of the total charges billed. Senator Himsl interjected and stated that raised the question of why this bill was in the Public Health Committee since it appears to be an appropriations bill.
- Senator Lynch had questions regarding the fiscal note, and asked where the fiscal note is derived from. He also asked how the ten cent fee was derived at, and if this program does not cost as much as projected, what happens to that money.
- Mr. McGree stated he would attempt to clarify by stating that the fee is fixed at ten cents. If the legislation is approved and the plan is put into effect, and the amount collected is higher than needed, then the legislature would be revisited in 1991 and perhaps reduce it. He stated at this point they do not know what the dual party relay system will cost or what the selected terminal devices will cost. It has been set at ten cents in other states.
- Senator Lynch asked if the amount is in excess, where will the excess money go. Ms. Bullock stated that usually

in earmarked accounts the money does not automatically revert.

- Senator Lynch stated that he was concerned that the bill did not put a limit on the ten cent charge.
- Representative Wyatt stated they did not wish to underfund this project at the start. They would come back to the Legislature if it was overfunded.
- Senator Himsl stated he has no quarrel with the bill, but feels that HB 614 should be moved to the Finance and Claims Committee.
- Senator Hager asked if the Governor's office is aware of this statutory appropriation. Representative Wyatt replied affirmatively.

Closing by Sponsor:

DISPOSITION OF HOUSE BILL 614

Discussion: Senator Rasmussen stated it does not effect the General Fund so why would Appropriations need to see it. Senator Himsl said they are voting on a tax. Senator Lynch agreed with Senator Himsl. He added that if the Public Health Committee did pass this bill, eventually Finance and Claims should have a look at it.

Amendments and Votes: None

Recommendation and Vote: Senator Himsl made a MOTION THAT HOUSE BILL 614 BE MOVED TO FINANCE AND CLAIMS. Senators in favor, 5; opposed, 1 (Rasmussen).

EXECUTIVE ACTION ON SENATE BILL 270

Chairman Hager called for action on SB 270: Chairman Hager advised that SB 270 got out on the floor without the amendments that the Committee recommended. It must be moved back to Committee, and then the Committee must pass the corrected report.

Discussion: None


