#### EXECUTIVE ACTION - HB 100

Senator Jergeson presented an amendment regarding the votech collaboration pilot program. He said this amendment was a pared down version to accomplish the same thing. He pointed out that the students wanted this upgrading and the 2 mil levy had passed. (Exhibit #1)

Senator Regan said the Regents are charged with the development of policy and determining programs. She felt that more time was needed on the proposal before coming to the committee.

Senator Jenkins pointed out that the vo-tech's were under the state control and under the Board of Regents. He said this plan would be setting up criteria for five community colleges. He said it deserves consideration as a pilot project because it would share administrative costs.

Senator Van Valkenburg asked if it would have any adverse

- affect on accreditation on programs of the 6 university units.
- Senator Jergeson said it did not affect accreditation.

  These credits would be actually put on Northern's transcript for some of these classes so they would be transferrable. (200) Not every class offered at Great Falls Vo-Tech would be included as being transferrable.
- Senator Van Valkenburg pointed out that the university system is already short of money to do its job so why should something else be started.
- Senator Jergeson pointed out that a 2 mil levy was passed for the support of the vo-tech's. He said this was the beginning of the forging ahead of a new direction as justification of the acceptance of the 2 mil levy.
- Senator Himsl noted that this issue had not been acted upon by the Board of Regents.
- Senator Jergeson said that the Board of Regents had passed a resolution that said they would work towards some sort of affiliation between the units and the vo-techs.
- Senator Himsl said it was premature to accept this amendment if the Board of Regents had not had time to design. He said that some action was needed to encourage this type of approach but this may not be the answer.
- The question was called. The motion failed 9-9 on a roll call vote.
- Senator Jenkins moved to reconsider the first amendment of #1 on Senator Van Valkenburg's amendment.
- Senator Van Valkenburg commented that this would be a waste of time since it was a punitive action on the part of the House of Representatives and (363). If collaboration is going to occur between vo-tech's and the Board of Regents then they need the time to talk about it.
- The question was called. The motion failed.
- Senator Boylan offered an amendment regarding scientific research matching funds (Exhibit #2).
- Mr. Ken Nordvedt (442) explained the amendment. He said that the National Science Foundation EPSCAR Program was

started in the state in the early 1980's. He said the Foundation is responsible for making sure that the science and engineering infrastructure of the nation is sound. They are interested in ensuring that this is serving economic competitiveness, he said. successful proposal was submitted to EPSCAR, s experimental program to stimulate competitive research and were awarded a program that ran for a number of The funds were used to get new research programs started and has been very successful. Foundation is now in the second phase of the EPSCAR Program. Montana is eligible to submit a new proposal to the National Science Foundation for up to \$3 million over a five year period. The criteria is the willingness of the state to provide local match. amendment is for this biennium's installment on a one dollar state for a two dollar National Science Foundation match asking for \$600,000 this biennium and would only be spent if successful in the competition. He pointed out that the match was not absolutely necessary but was one of the criteria in picking proposals. Mr. Nordvedt explained that he was associated with the National Science Foundation as a board member. He pointed out that they held two perceptions of Montana. One is that there are many well established creative scientists and engineers. Second, the level of support from the state is not up to what other states do.

Mr. Nordvedt explained that if the contingent match is supported then he has found the funds and even a bonus for this. He identified some tax credits that were on the books that are called the 50 percent tax credits for investments in Montana capital corporations. analyzing the use of these credits and their economic justification, the 3 million dollar a biennium drain on the general fund is not giving the state a proper reward for that kind of expenditure, he said. A bill that reduces these back passed third reading in the He said it would trim the credits back, the issuing of new credits from \$3 million per biennium to \$1.5 million per biennium or an added revenue source to the state of 1.5 million per biennium. Out of the next biennium that is a revenue source (590). The \$600,000 asked for in the contingent match in the amendment would be supplied and the revenue base for an on-going basis for the entire five years of the program.

Mr. Nordvedt pointed out that this would help many scientists expand their research programs. It would also revise the economic vitality of the state. It could make an important contribution to the economy and

the state educational system through its research programs and a revenue source has been provided.

Senator Regan pointed out that a bill just passed that allowed the university system to keep indirect costs for the purpose of scientific endeavors. She made a substitute motion to have the LFA work up language that says indirect costs gained through research may be used as a grant for the National Science Foundation purpose.

Senator Jenkins asked about the indirect cost bill.

- Mr. Nordvedt replied that there were hundreds of researchers in the system and all the indirect costs would be concentrated on serving these programs. He said this is not the best way to commit all the indirect costs.
- Senator Keating said if the indirect costs are tapped into then that would widen the gap of the unfunded portion of the university budget.
- Ken Nordvedt (916) replied that they recommended in January to increase the return of the indirect costs to the university the clear intention was not to supplement the university budget. He said this accomplishes nothing. The idea was to make sure it was earmarked to go back to the campuses to expand research activities.

The question was called on the substitute motion. The motion failed 9-9 on a roll call vote.

The question was called on Senator Boylan's motion. The motion failed 7-11 on a roll call vote.

#### (Tape 1-B)

- Senator Regan offered an amendment that would reduce the housing allowance paid to the superintendent of the School for the Deaf and Blind. She pointed out that the superintendent received a salary and benefits on top of that. She said the state owns 48% of the house and the Foundation the rest. She said this reduced the housing allowance to reflect what the state has paid in previous years to other superintendents. She moved the amendment. (Exhibit #3)
- Senator Hammond pointed out that the Foundation owns half of the house and did not collect rent.
- Claudette Morton, Executive Secretary for the Board of Public Education, explained how the rent and benefits were figured in. She said the bar across the street

had been a quiet neighborhood bar but the owners changed their philosophy and put in heavy metal music six nights a week. She said the Board in good faith hired Mr. Prickett with the idea that they would provide him a house. When the house became impossible, the board trying to find out how to do just the housing allowance. The income tax system does not allow for any employer to give a housing allowance separate from the salary. She noted that the Board was making an effort to get out of supplying housing for anyone, however the agreement was made with Mr. Prickett in good faith.

The question was called. The motion failed 8-10 on a roll call vote.

Senator Nathe presented amendments regarding the Board of Public Education (Exhibit #4, 4a). He explained the first amendment would add \$4000 to the Board's budget for travel. The second amendment was for NASBE dues which the Board feels is an important connection. The third amendment is for electronic subscriptions for research information.

Representative Peck noted that the subcommittee added extra for per diem and travel already.

Senator Nathe made a substitute motion to separate the 3 items and have the LFA correct the totals.

The question was called on the first amendment. The first amendment failed 8-9.

The question was called on the second amendment. The motion failed 3-15 on a roll call vote.

Senator Nathe pointed out that it was very important for these people to stay in contact and the electronic subscription really helps.

Representative Peck said that there was no additional money put in the third item by the subcommittee.

The question was called on the first part of the third amendment. The motion failed 9-9 on a roll call vote.

Senator Manning (492) offered an amendment that would increase the Student Services Program and Education Program which is required due to a Montana Supreme Court decision. (Exhibit #5) He also distributed a

letter from Attorney General Marc Racicot to Claudette Morton (Exhibit #5a).

Representative Peck said this was presented to the subcommittee but they would not act on it until the opinion of the Attorney General was completed.

Senator Nathe asked for clarification.

Joe Williams, OBPP, replied that (558) he discussed the problem with the Labor Relations Bureau. He said the Mountain View School teachers had a similar problem that was settled by redefining the school days through collective bargaining. This included 180 teaching days, 5 PIR days and 10 holidays and prorated annual leave. This was done at no additional cost to the school.

Senator Regan asked Claudette Morton if the number of days could be extended at the School for the Deaf and Blind.

Claudette Morton replied that their school year is about 185 days. If the contract was extended they would be there with nothing to do. There would be a problem in terms of the settlement of the contract. There should be an effort to honor the Attorney General's opinion, she stated.

The question was called. The motion passed 10-8 on a roll call vote.

Senator Jacobson offered an amendment regarding OPI indirect cost pool reclassifying to a proprietary fund. (Exhibit #6)

Sandi Whitney, LFA, explained that the money was appropriated in the budget. This amendment would allow them the authority to take it out of that area and move it into their proprietary fund and spend it from there.

The question was called. The motion passed with two no votes by Senators Boylan and Hammond.

Senator Jacobson presented an amendment regarding OPI consolidating office space into one building (Exhibit #7).

Senator Boylan asked if this would allow them to move any place in Montana or just Helena.

Senator Keating asked how much was being paid for space now.

Mr. Groepper replied (968) that OPI had four buildings, three of which are state owned and one is private. The budget amount for the state owned building if \$3.19 square foot. The privately owned building is about \$8 a square foot.

The question was called. The motion failed 3-15 on a roll call vote.

Senator Himsl offered an amendment regarding the moving of other state special revenue into state special revenues. This impacts sections A, B, C, D, and E. He said this was a bookkeeping approach to moving these other special revenues into these state special revenues (Exhibit #8). He moved the amendment.

The question was called. The motion passed unanimously.

#### (Tape 2-A)

- Senator Manning offered an amendment that was coordination instruction if HB 100 and SB 128 are both passed. He moved the amendment. (Exhibit #9)
- Julia Robinson, SRS, explained that the amendment moves the money from HB 100 to HB 128. The reason that was done was because there was a debate in the House whether to leave the project work programs running at all. Representative Cobb first took out the funding then put it back because the food stamp program was in jeopardy. The compromise put the money in HB 128 so there would be funds available for the program. She said that SB 101 should not be implemented until January. The reason for this is that it cuts the program for general assistance to a mandatory 4 month program. The original program was to start in October. If the program works that would put people who had not worked for years out on the street in the coldest period of the year and the least likely period to find jobs.
- Senator Van Valkenburg pointed out the problems in putting language in HB 100 treated as substantive law. He said when HB 100 is used to amend other bills it can cause future problems.

Senator Manning withdrew his amendment.

Senator Regan moved to reconsider action in adopting Senator Boylan's amendment the other day dealing with 2.5 FTE

for daycare licensing personnel. She said it came to her attention that he had been given some bum information.

- Taryn Purdy described the problem. She said the action taken yesterday delayed hiring of 2.5 FTE daycare personnel to take advantage of potential federal funds that would be available October 1. The funds have been statutorily allocated by Congress but have not been appropriated and may not even be available at all.
- Senator Regan said if the committee reconsidered this then she could offer language that says that should federal funds become available they would replace general fund.

The question was called on the motion to reconsider. The motion passed unanimously.

- Senator Regan presented an amendment with the cleanup language (Exhibit #10).
- Bob Mullen, DFS, commented the FTE's were needed regardless of HB 200. He said there were presently 3 FTE's responsible for licensing and inspecting approximately 1000 day cares statewide.

The question was called. The motion passed with two no votes.

- Senator Aklestad presented an amendment regarding SB 70. He noted that there was a lapse before the WINN program went into effect and during that lapse the project would not be funded (456). He said the staff was not available after hours to get this information but he would get the figures and plug that portion back in. (Exhibit #11) He moved the amendment.
- Senator Van Valkenburg said the subcommittee had considered this at some length and made a decision about implementing this program.
- Representative Bradley explained (491) that the welfare reform effort purpose was to decrease welfare dependency. The best approach would be to change the date on SB 70 so it meshes with HB 100. This amendment would postpone everything from triggering in to a year from this coming July because federal mandate allows it. She pointed out that the favorable match is ready for the program to start. The subcommittee decided that the appropriate thing to do was to start the

program. She said that was why the favorable match 2.5 FTE's for the daycare program was needed. She said it was a question of whether to make a commitment to start now or later. She said that there was a small overlap with in the WINN programs in four communities. The amendment would have those four programs with a nine month gap where nothing was going on at all then start it all up next summer.

- Senator Nathe asked why the interim committee selected a delay date.
- Senator Aklestad said the committee felt it would take some time to implement these new programs and they did not want to use extra general fund for that start-up cost. (548) When the federal funds come through then the state can start up. He clarified that the WINN program would be funded and he would get those figures and calculate them back in. If the Jobs Program does not start October 1, then the WINN Program must be continued.
- Lois Steinbeck, OBPP, explained what the amendment would do. She said the amendment would remove money for other mandatory benefits that must be offered under federal welfare reform. She said there are several benefits with several effective dates. Beginning April 1, 1990 the state must fund transitional child care and it is not child care that is associated with the federal jobs program. SB 70, effective date is April 1, and the funds that are being removed from the bill will take that funding and the state will not be able to fund transitional child care. The only funds that were in that are federal funds that would be transferred to the Department of Labor. The general funds is for a match for benefits that are mandated to begin April 1, 1990.
- Julie Robinson (591) noted that a lot of time had been spent on the programs because they are difficult to see how they are pieced together. Montana does not have to get involved in these federal programs until April 1, 1990. There are a series of dates after that kick in where requirements have to be met. She noted that the reason the dates had been suggested of October 1 for the jobs program was to pick up the 90 percent match for the pilots that are currently being funded with JEPCA money. This money is administrative money which will run out at the end of September. If the match is not picked up then those programs will close.
- Senator Keating asked how much general fund was needed for the WINN Program.

- Lois Steinbeck, OBPP, said it was about \$579,000 federal funds and requires a 10% match. The 10% match can be provided at the state or local level per year.
- Senator Story pointed out that this amendment should be done on the Senate floor since it still needed to be amended.
- Senator Aklestad withdrew the amendment.
- Senator Aklestad offered an amendment that would reduce the projected caseload for general assistance by 25 percent each year as a result of changes in eligibility.

  (Exhibit #12) He moved the amendment.
- Julie Robinson said that SRS project caseload (819) next year with no change in general assistance would be 1,982. The subcommittee projected that they would be 1,900 for a cut of 82. That is a savings in general fund already that has been taken out of general assistance of \$210,576. In the following fiscal year the caseload projection is 2,061 and the cut was made based on the idea that the work programs would be working down to 1,950. That was a general fund savings of \$285,048. She discussed the seasonal aspects of the program. (979)
- Senator Keating asked if the assumed counties were paying 25% more in benefits and if there were any equality.
- Julie Robinson said the issue that saves a lot of money in the unassumed counties was presumptive eligibility and mandatory work. She said when they come in the door it is presumed they are eligible and they can go directly to a work site. Instead of getting a check for doing no work, they have to work for two weeks. She said this was very effective in eliminating transients that just want to take a check.
- Representative Bradley (054) commented that this would take the caseload total down and it may be a very high risk. She said it was not her impression that there were huge numbers that were transients to justify a decrease in the caseload. She pointed out that the department may need more flexibility in the GA just because of the other cuts made in other programs.

The question was called. The motion failed 4-14 on a roll call vote.

- Senator Jenkins offered an amendment that would restore funding for the Clark Fork Coordinator position in the Governor's Office. He said he found out that this was funded through RIT funds. (Exhibit #13) He moved the amendment.
- Evan McKinney explained that this position was in the Governors Office and the funding was in the Department of Health. He said the funding needs to be put in the Department of Health budget.
- Senator Jergeson pointed out that the Governor's Office had an Environmental Contingency account of \$175,000 per biennium of RIT interest income. He felt that if the Governor's Office really wanted this coordinator position that they should fund it out of the environmental contingency account.
- Senator Van Valkenburg pointed out that this fund was to be used to help in the event of environmental disaster.
- (Tape 2-B)
  The question was called. The motion passed with 3 no votes.
- Senator Keating offered an amendment on the State Library in section D. (Exhibit #14) He said the Library is funded with coal tax severance money and with general fund. The coal tax money declined and so general fund is increased. The last phrase on line 21 says "the additional funds are appropriated" which means it is an open end coal severance tax appropriation. If the coal severance percentage exceeds the appropriation then that money flows into the library. If the State Library money is appropriated properly with fixed amounts then if there are additional coal tax severance money that should revert to the general fund to offset the increase in general fund to fund this appropriation. This amendment only adds "the additional funds revert to the general fund." This merely caps the coal severance tax appropriation. He moved the amendment.
- Mr. Miller, State Librarian, commented that the extra money was sent out to six libraries in the federation and does not go into the State Library budget.
- Senator Bengtson said she was opposed to the amendment. She pointed out that the federations were being cut back due to reductions in the coal tax. They depend heavily on the appropriations from the coal severance tax.

Libraries struggle for money.

- Senator Nathe asked if there was any language or policy saying that the money goes to the six federations.
- Mr. Miller replied that there was no language in there but that they were willing to have it put in.
- Senator Keating pointed out that the library budget was up 23% because of a healthy push from the feds but the coal tax went down so the state general fund was used to offset that severance tax. He said if the money was appropriated to the library in set amounts like all the other departments it would be prudent to have the extra coal tax severance money go back into the general fund.

The question was called. The motion failed 9-9 on a roll call vote.

Senator Nathe made a substitute motion using the same sheet of paper (223) page 2, insert on item 2, "the additional funds shall be appropriated to the library federations". He pointed out that this would solve some of the concerns about an open ended appropriation.

The question was called. The motion passed with 2 no votes.

With the committee's permission the counsel's language will be used.

- Senator Van Valkenburg offered an amendment concerning agency reorganization in boilerplate. (Exhibit #16) He pointed out that this would make it easier the next biennium in determining current level. He moved the amendment.
- Senator Aklestad asked if there would be a fiscal impact for them to keep track of this information.
- Bob Kukenbrod, OBPP, said they would like to see fiscal years 1988, 1989, and 1991. The base year would be 1990. That is the year they would be working off of for the next budget.

The question was called. The motion passed 15-3 on a roll call vote.

Senator Hofman offered an amendment in Section C, Department of Commerce, regarding a portion of coal severance tax

- local impact grants account to be diverted from the coal board to the general fund. (Exhibit #17) He said the 14 miles of Highway 314 in Big Horn County need to be built.
- Senator Weeding (458) commented that Treasure County did not have a lot of money for secondary road funds. He said the road was a priority. He pointed out that if the road gets built with coal money it will be serving coal counties.
- Senator Keating asked what other highways had pending grant requests.
- Senator Weeding presented a list of priority status road construction projects for Coal Board Funds (Exhibit 17A).
- Senator Keating pointed out that the amendment would catch the ground water monitoring because the Big Horn Decker Highway and the Eastern Task Force was exempt from the amendment. There may not be enough money in there for the Sarpy Creek construction.
- Senator Regan asked what the status of the Sarpy Road construction.
- Newell Anderson, from the Department of Commerce, pointed out that there were other programs that were being line itemed in that bill that were not being considered by the amendment. He said the Sarpy Creek Road would not have adequate funds (607).
- The question was called. The motion failed 5-13 on a roll call vote.
- Senator Devlin presented an amendment on Department of Commerce. He segregated the amendment. He moved #1 (#18) regarding the Board of Passenger Tramway in response to HB 258.
- Mr. Kimbell said this was in regards to gross receipts tax on ski lifts.
- The question was called. The motion passed with 2 no votes.
- Senator Keating commented that the establishment of this board relieved the state of some liability with regards to inspection. Mr. Kimbell replied that it would help.

- Senator Story commented that there was a time when the board was not doing anything and the Legislature got rid of it.
- Senator Devlin moved #2 (#18). He said this was in regards to implementing 5 professional and occupational licensing bills with state special revenue. He moved the amendment.
- The question was called. The motion passed with 5 no votes.
- Senator Devlin moved #3 (#18). He said the amendment increases the proprietary fund in professional and occupational licensing bureau due to the workload due to the passage of bills.
- The question was called. The motion passed with 5 no votes.
- Senator Devlin moved #4 (#18). He said this was a technical amendment.
- Jane Hammond, OBPP, explained that the Professional and Occupational Boards are funded with state special revenue from the license fees. The staff in the bureau is under a proprietary account. They need indirect authority for the pay plan.
- Senator Jacobson asked if this had anything to do with indirect cost pools and if not would it get an audit exception.
- Jane Hammond said this amendment would add authority through the proprietary account for the pay upgrade consistent with the pay plan.
- Senator Van Valkenburg asked why this was needed when it doesn't apply to other agencies.
- Jane Hammond replied that the pay plan bill includes the state special revenue fund for each one of the boards but it cannot be spent unless there is proprietary authority.
- Carolyn Dooring, from Management Services Department of Commerce, explained that the pay plan bill funds pay increases. There are the boards and the administrative pool. The administrative pool has to charge the board for the 27 people that are in the pool. If the authority is put in the board's budget, then the

authority to pay the people is needed in the pool budget so there has to be a double appropriation special and proprietary. The same would be with the indirect cost pool, the direct costs management services charge all the programs in Department of Commerce to fund the programs. If there are pay increases, they have to have the authority to pay the management services in the directors office.

The question was called. The motion passed unanimously.

Senator Devlin moved #5 (#18). He explained this was due to SB 303 licensure of escrow agents.

The question was called. The motion passed with 2 no votes.

Senator Devlin explained that #6 had to be held, since HB 200 was waiting to be heard in a committee.

Senator Devlin moved #7 (#18). He said that money was needed to run the mule racing.

The question was called. The motion passed with 2 no votes.

Senator Devlin said that #8 had to be handled different so he would hold it.

Senator Devlin offered an amendment regarding the adjustment of indirect charges to the programs in the Department of Commerce to fund Management Services and the Director's Office. (Exhibit #19)

(Tape 3-A)
The question was called. The motion passed unanimously.

Senator Devlin moved to reconsider the action taken on the 6 FTE Highway Patrol Officers. He pointed out that the Department of Justice ended up with communication technicians, and 8 additional FTE's that were not in their budget. He moved to delete the 6 Highway Patrol Officers.

Senator Van Valkenburg said that when actions were reconsidered on the vacancy savings issue this would be the potential of 14 more officers on the road.

The question was called on the motion to reconsider. The motion passed.

The question was called on the motion to delete 6 Highway Patrol Officers. The motion passed unanimously.

Senator Jergeson moved to reconsider action in approving the \$56,000 a year clerical position plus pay upgrade in the Governor's Office. (144) He said the newspaper came out with a story that said the Governor was willing to give up his plane and staff raise.

Senator Aklestad noted that they should be given the opportunity to present what they want and that could be done on the Senate floor.

Senator Hammond pointed out that there were problems in legislating from a newspaper article. He said that he read the newspaper many times the day after and wondered where he was the day before.

The question was called on the motion to reconsider. The motion failed 6-12 on a roll call vote.

Senator Boylan moved to do pass HB 100 as amended. The motion passed with 2 no votes by Senators Nathe and Aklestad.

Dear Ms. Morton:

I have your letter of March 20, 1989, in which you ask for a legal memorandum on the question of whether the teaching personnel at the Montana School for the Deaf and Blind ("MSDB") are within the coverage of the holding in Mountain View Education Association v. Mountain View School, 44 St. Rptr. 1089, 738 P.2d 1288 (1987). In that case, the Montana Supreme Court held that the teaching personnel at the Mountain View School were entitled to the same vacation and sick leave benefits as other state employees. The decision turned on the effect of an exception to the definition of the term "employee" in section 2-18-601(2) which exempted from the coverage of the statutes providing leave benefits for state employees persons who were "school-teachers". Since the term "schoolteacher" was not defined in Title 2 of the Code, the court looked to the definition of the term "teacher" in section 20-1-101(20), MCA:

"Teacher" means any person, except a district superintendent, who holds a valid Montana Teacher certificate that has been issued by the superintendent of public instruction under the provisions of this title and the policies adopted by the board of public education and who is employed by a district as a of member instructional, supervisory, administrative orstaff.

Because the teachers at Mountain View were not employed by a school district but rather were employees of the Department of Institutions, the Court concluded that they were not "schoolteachers" under the exception in section 2-18-601(2), MCA, and were accordingly entitled to all leave benefits provided under Title 2, Chapter 18, Part 6 of the Code.

The teachers at MSDB, like the staff at Mountain View are not employed by a school district. It therefore appears clear that they, like the Mountain View teachers, are entitled to claim the full measure of leave benefits available to other employees of the State.
