Announcements/Discussion: Senator Hammond indicated the meeting would be a joint hearing between the House and the Senate Education Committees.

HEARING ON SENATE BILL 7

Presentation and Opening Statement by Sponsor:

Senator Mazurek, Senate District 23, opened stating that SB 7 was the second bill, on equalization and funding, that had been heard in this Special Session. He stated that the bill presented good options and asked the Committee Members to not think that they were at a stalemate during this session. Senator Mazurek stated that prior to the last session, he had met with several education groups in Helena. He acted as a mediator as they tried to determine how to properly address the testing problem, according to the Supreme Court decision. Senator Mazurek stated that the Supreme Court decision was focused on per pupil spending disparity across the state of Montana. He stated that the mechanism in this bill was the best way to equalize and pass the Supreme Court test. The issue was not access to money, but per pupil expenditure. Senator Mazurek stated that the Supreme Court focused on the excess reliance on both voted and permissive levies. He said that the only way to overcome this problem of equalizing, was to place more state dollars into the Foundation Program. Senator Mazurek stated that the most important issue in SB 7 was that it kept 100% of 1988

expenditures or current level. Since 1985, there had only been a 1% increase in building a base for 1991. Senator Mazurek stated that music courses, college prep courses, and athletics courses had already been dropped in a lot of the schools in Montana. He said the state needs to try to maintain the funding that the schools have now. He stated that current level is probably not being used to its full capacity for education. Senator Mazurek stated that mill levies cannot be reduced without replacing it with some state dollars and they could not be reduced from 165 to 120 (SEE EXHIBIT 1). He stated that retirement would be funded at 100% of actual cost in a separate fund for the purpose of the caps; 70% of the PL 874 money would be in the base; the transportation schedules would be funded fully, and the FY 1990 schedules would be incorporated into the base. The general fund of the districts would be made up of the old general fund comprehensive insurance fund and special ed. The caps would be at 117% above the statewide average. Those districts over 117% would be frozen at that level. Senator Mazurek stated that GAAP would be in and mandatory kindergarten would be out. Senator Mazurek stated in order to fund this program, 120 mandatory statewide mills would be required. Lottery revenue would be transferred and it would require continuation of the 10% surcharge for two Funds would come from the Park Acquisition Flow, the Education Trust Flow, and 15% of the Coal Tax interest. Senator Mazurek discussed the impact on the extractive industries and proposed a flat tax rate similar to that in Ramirez/Kadas's bill with exception to; rebate the money back to the counties dollar for dollar. (This was Senator Gage's amendment). The revenue neutral rate for the extractive industries was 8.63%; gas was 14.13% and coal Senator Mazurek proposed to go to 5% on coal, 15.25% on gas and 9% on oil. He stated that this bill is expensive, but any long term solution would be expensive. Senator Mazurek stated that with the capping mechanism in the bill, it was the only bill that would bring per pupil expenditures within an acceptable range of the court mandate. (SEE EXHIBIT 2).

Proponent Testimony:

- Superintendent Keenan stated her support of SB 7, and felt that Senator Mazurek had covered the issues in detail. She stated that this bill was designed to meet the court test and provide quality. This bill has the least impact on the school districts. She reminded the Committee that the court stated that there had to be a plan by July 1, but it did not have to be in effect at that time.
- Mr. Brown stated that in his time around Legislature, the equalization problem was the most complex and toughest issue, he has seen. Mr. Brown offered some advice to the Legislature to hire a legal council at this time, to represent the state of Montana. He said when they do find a plan, they can receive legal opinions before it was presented to the Supreme Court. Mr. Brown presented three important issues that have to be met for the Supreme Court 1.) Fiscal Problems are not justification for ignoring the Constitutional mandates of the education article, 2.) The high spending districts are not spending their money on frills, but on educationally relevant programs, and 3.) The Corvallis' of this world could not be ignored. Mr. Brown said, "The Constitution exists to protect the rights of the minority, and if Corvallis's trustees do not want to tax themselves at the local level, why should we worry, but the Supreme Court said that does not matter because the Constitution guarantees the quality of educational opportunity."
- Mr. Mockler stated that Senator Mazurek has included the gross proceeds at 5% of value instead of 45% of the coal (times) the mill levy. Mr. Mockler stated that as an industry, they were willing to ingest \$724,000 for the opportunity to stabilize at 5%.
- Mr. Anderson stated that a 9% raise, would bring their tax to \$5.1 million and the net proceeds tax to \$8.5 million. He stated that the result would be that a 9% would be equivalent of 120 mills, an increase of \$1 million in tax. Mr. Anderson stated that the composite tax rate on the industry in Montana is 12.7% which is the second highest in the United States. He stated that this would have a

- definite affect on the capabilities of the industries to bring investment in from outside the state of Montana.
- Mr. Melby reiterated everything in previous testimony and stated that he enthusiastically supported the bill.
- Ms. Morton stated that the nature of education was patience. She stated that the ultimate result of a program that equalizes, would be better to have in place now in cement then to rush in and solve it all in ten days.
- Mr. Waldron stated his support of SB 7, and the administrators of Montana thanks the Committees for putting SB 7 in place.
- Ms. Minow stated her support of SB 7. She stated that this bill does not equalize downwards, but the Montana Federation of Teacher's are concerned about the caps and the lack of the cost of living escalator.
- Mr. Bilodeau stated that this bill has the strong support, united and consensus support of the entire educational community.

 He urged the Committee to give the bill a do pass.
- Ms. McKenna stated that this bill was a compromise of; educators, legislators, rich school districts and poor school districts. She expressed her support for SB 7.
- Mr. Cotton stated that as one of the Plaintiffs of the underfunded lawsuit, SB 7 was the best of all the bills he has seen, since the lawsuit started 4 years ago.
- Ms. Fallan stated that she represents 400 independence and major oil companies operating in the Rocky Mountain states. She stated that all of those states have to compete for the same dollar. She said Montana has to remain competitive, because the decisions for the money are made outside of Montana. She stated that Senator Mazurek had helped the companies with SB 390 in 1985, that established a flat rate gross proceeds on oil and gas produced from wells drilled after July 1, 1985. She reiterated the testimony of Mr. Anderson and Mr. Mockler regarding the flat rate adjustments. She stated that an amendment for SB 7, would help maintain revenue neutrality which was very important to an industry, that was just beginning to recover from bad times.
- Mr. Williams reiterated Mr. Mockler's testimony and thanked Senator Mazurek for incorporating the flat tax for gross proceeds on coal. Mr. Williams urged the Committee to adopt the amendments and to resist any efforts to raise the rate above the 5%.
- Mr. Harris stated that education resources to maintain an quality education are more important than the mineral resources, agricultural resources, and the forestry resources for the

eliminate the potential of disparity." He felt that there would be no problem.

- Representative Grinde asked Senator Mazurek to explain the "Park Acquisition Flow", and what the fund was and why was it going into this bill? Senator Mazurek stated that it was taking the soft side of the Coal Tax and it would be diverted it into this bill to fund education. Senator Mazurek stated that Park Acquisition flow was maintenance, etc.. He stated that the flows are being used to fund equalization.
- Representative Daily asked Mr. Groepper about the expenditures compared to budgets, are the reserve funds considered an expenditure? Mr. Groepper stated that the way the school districts treat their reserves was by taking from the reserve to use as an expenditure.
- Closing by Sponsor: Senator Mazurek closed stating that there was mention of substantial reductions for many business interest in the western area. He said that there would be substantially more, if the mills in SB 7 were lowered. He explained that it would create a higher demand for additional general fund dollars and new revenue, the more the mills were reduced.
- A break was taken at 3:50 p.m. so the Senate Education Committee Members could go to their floor. The House Education Committee stayed on to hear several bills and do executive action.

- Representative Schye testified in favor of SB 7. He stated that SB 7 was the same as his bill, HB 28. He stated that the important issue here was equalizing up and having good quality education for the students in Montana.

- Questions From Committee Members: Representative Simpkins asked Senator Mazurek if the 10% surcharge was \$53 million for one year? Senator Mazurek stated that was not correct. It was two years of collections to fund the beginning of this bill.
- Representative Simpkins asked Senator Mazurek if the 10% surcharge goes on forever? Senator Mazurek replied that it could and if it wasn't continued, the next biennium will be short \$53 million. Senator Mazurek stated that the issue that needs to be taken care of was a "phase-in" plan so all the particular pots of money would not be short.
- Representative Gervais asked Senator Mazurek about the PL 874 money. He stated that HB 39 and SB 203 had left the PL 874 funds out but this bill includes it. Representative Gervais asked Senator Mazurek if he anticipated any problems with the Secretary of Education or the districts that derive from these funds? Senator Mazurek stated that he did not think so, because of the level of equalization. He said, "If 100% was used of the 1988 expenditures and with the caps to
