HEARING ON HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION 3

Presentation and Opening Statement by Sponsor:

The chairman recognized Representative Jan Brown who addressed the committee by explaining the importance of the measure. She said breast-feeding in Montana saves the state money and is a nutritious alternative for infants.

Proponents' Testimony:

The chairman called for testimony from proponents of the measure.

The first witness to testify in favor of HJR 3 was Pat Hennessey, representing the Montana Women, Infants and Children program. See Exhibit # 1 for a copy of her testimony.

The second witness to testify in favor of HJR 3 was Cindy Lewis, representing the Montana Dieticians Association. See Exhibit #2 for a copy of her testimony.

The third witness to submit testimony in favor of HJR 3 was Judy Garrity, representing the Montana Coalition of Healthy Mothers, Healthy Babies. See Exhibit #3 for a copy of her testimony.

There being no further testimony in favor of HJR 3 the chairman called for testimony from opponents of the measure.

Opponents' Testimony:

There being no testimony in opposition to the measure, the chairman called for questions from the committee.

Questions From Committee Members:

Senator Pipinich asked Representative Brown what the purpose of the measure was.

Representative Brown responded that the measure was introduced because it would help educate the public on the value of breast-feeding which is sometimes a cultural trend.

Chairman Eck commented that all counties should have a Women, Infants and Children program and that she thought there was proposed legislation being drafted to assist with the effort.

Representative Brown responded in the affirmative and said the bill draft was still in the Legislative Council.

Closing by Sponsor:

Representative Brown closed by saying the measure passed the full House with only three dissenting votes. She said at this time she did not have a senate sponsor but would turn the file over to the chairman.

There being no further public hearing business Senate Burnett moved to adjourn the meeting. There being no objection the motion carried.

EXECUTIVE ACTION ON SENATE BILL 66

Motion:

Senator Towe made a motion that his Amendments 1 through 4 be adopted (Exhibit # 4).

Discussion:

There was no discussion by committee members.

Recommendation and Vote:

The motion made by Senator Towe carried unanimously.

Motion:

Senator Towe made a motion that his Amendment #5 be adopted.

Discussion:

Senator Hager asked if anyone in the room had concerns about the amendment. There were none.

Recommendation and Vote:

The motion made by Senator Towe carried unanimously.

Motion:

Senator Towe made a motion that his Amendments #6, #7, #8, #9, and #10 be adopted. See Exhibit #4 for a copy of the amendments.

Discussion:

The chairman asked for comments on the amendments and recognized Dr. Nancy Aagenes, N.D., Legislative chairman of the Montana Naturopathic Association. She commented that the amendments would add more stringent requirements in the bill.

Amendments, Discussion and Votes:

Senator Pipinich moved to adopt the amendments.

Recommendation and Vote:

The motion made by Senator Towe carried unanimously.

Motion:

Senator Towe made a motion that his Amendments #11 and #12 be adopted. See Exhibit #4 for a copy of the amendments.

Discussion:

The chairman asked for comments and recognized Dr. Nancy Aagenes who explained the amendments. The chairman recognized Senator Hager who asked Mona Jamison, representative of the Montana Physical Therapists Association, about the impact on mid-wives. Ms. Jamison responded that she has no problems with the amendments and the legislation addressing mid-wives would be introduced shortly.

The chairman recognized Senator Burnett who asked about naturopathic physicians using the term 'doctor'.

The chairman recognized Senator Towe who said the naturopathic physicians use the term 'Naturopathic Doctor' not 'Medical Doctor'.

Chairman Eck compared the usage of the word 'doctor' to other professions who use the same term.

Amendments, Discussion and Votes:

The chairman called for further discussion on the amendments. There was none.

Recommendation and Votes:

Chairman Eck moved for adoption of Amendments #11 and #12. Senator Franklin voted in opposition to adoption, Senator Jacobson was absent and all other committee members voted in favor of adoption. The motion carried.

Motion:

Chairman Eck made a motion to adopt her Amendment #1 which would strike the word "or" and insert the word "and" on page 2, line 25 of Senate Bill 66.

Discussion:

The chairman talked briefly to the committee about the issues involved in accreditation of naturopathic colleges. She recognized Dr. Aagenes who further explained that she had no problem with the amendment.

The chairman recognized Senator Franklin who commented about accreditation and said she was concerned about where the checks and balances are in the accrediting activities of naturopathic

colleges.

Recommendation and Vote:

Senator Rye moved for adoption of Amendment #1 from Senator Eck. The motion carried unanimously.

Motion:

Senator Pipinich made a motion to adopt Senate Bill 66 as amended.

Discussion:

The chairman recognized Senator Frankin who said she was opposed to the motion because there were too many issues that had not been discussed and she had no clear picture of the scope of practice for naturopathic physicians.

The chairman recognized Dr. Aagenes who stated that it was the practice of medicine using natural therapies.

Senator Franklin responded that the title should be changed to Natural Practitioner. Dr. Aagenes disagreed and stated she was not a practitioner but a doctor, just as a nurse is not a practitioner but a nurse.

Recommendation and Vote:

The chairman said the question had been called and asked for a record vote. The motion to adopt Senate Bill 66 as amended passed with Senators' Hager, Pipinich, Rye, Towe and Eck voting in favor of adoption and Senators' Burnett and Franklin opposed to adoption. Senator Jacobson was absent.

EXECUTIVE ACTION ON SENATE BILL 90

Motion:

Senator Burnett made a motion to adopt Senate Bill 90

Discussion:

Senators' Franklin and Towe objected because they had amendments to the measure. The motion by Senator Burnett is denied.

Motion:

The chairman recognized Senator Franklin who explained her Amendment 1 and 2 to SB 90. See Exhibit #5 for a copy of the amendments.

Discussion:

The chairman recognized Senator Hager who asked the legal counsel for the Montana Dental Hygienists Association to respond to the amendment.

The chairman recognized John Shontz who said they were not in opposition to the amendment as long as it pertained only to local anesthesia.

Recommendation and Vote:

Senator Franklin moved for adoption of Amendments 1 & 2. There being no objection the motion carried.

Motion:

Senator Burnett moved for passage of Senate Bill 90 as amended.

Recommendation and Vote:

The roll call vote was Senators' Burnett, Franklin, Hager, Jacobson, Pipinich and Eck voting in favor of adoption and Senators' Rye and Towe voting in opposition. The motion carried.

EXECUTIVE ACTION ON SENATE BILL 54

Motion:

Senator Franklin made a motion to adopt Amendments #1, #2, #3, #4 and #5. See Exhibit #6 for a copy of the amendment language.

Discussion:

The chairman recognized Senator Towe who stated that the amendments represent more than the physical therapists would like to see and less than the occupational therapists would like to have. He continued by saying the bill will sunset in two years, that these are merely interim measures. He said that through the administrative rulemaking process the board will define the types of modalities that are acceptable pursuant to the Administrative Procedures Act. He continued by saying that through the hearings process an occupational therapist can justify their education and experience and physical therapists will have the opportunity to contest the education and qualification put forth.

The chairman recognized Senator Hager who said he is drafting a bill that would combine the occupational and physical therapy professions.

Recommendation and Vote:

Senator Franklin moved to adopt Amendments #1 through 5.
The motion carried with 7 senators in favor of adoption and
Senator Hager in opposition to adoption. The motion carried.

Motion:

Senator Towe moved to adopt SB 54 as amended.

Discussion:

No discussion by committee members.

Recommendation and Vote:

The motion carried unanimously.



Honorable Chairwoman Eck,
Honorable Senators:

I am Pat Hennessey, a Registered Dietitian with the Montana State Health Department and assigned to the Supplemental Food Program for Women, Infants and Children -- WIC.

Health professionals have a responsibility to provide services designed to optimize the health of their clients. One such measure which has been shown to have significant advantages for infants and for the new mother is the encouragement of breastfeeding.

The nutritional and immunologic components of human milk and the physiological, psychosocial, hygienic and economic benefits of breastfeeding make it the optimal way of nurturing for infants. And lactation, a continuation of the reproductive process, also facilitate the return of the pre-pregnant state for the mother.

We have established a model program of breastfeeding care in the more than sixty (60) local WIC clinics statewide. The model include breastfeeding promotion, management/care, support and follow-up. It is preventive and positive. It is consistent and valid. It is cost efficient and cost saving. A study done by Rita Bradley, R.D., Butte, assessed ten studies that were reported in medical literature in relation to expected savings from exclusively breastfeeding. Bruce J. Collings, Ph.D. Mathematical Sciences, MSU, worked out a formula for computing the information. His conclusion was, "It is easy to believe that breastfeeding could save as much as \$500-\$600 per baby over the first two years of life at current cost levels."

During October, 1990, the Montana WIC Program served 979 women who were not breastfeeding. A 13-ounce can of iron-fortified formula costs an average of \$2.00. WIC issues 31 cans per infants per month for the non-breastfed infant, so we spent \$60,698 for formula in October 1990.

We believe it is the right of all our citizens to be well-informed consumers, particularly in the area of health.

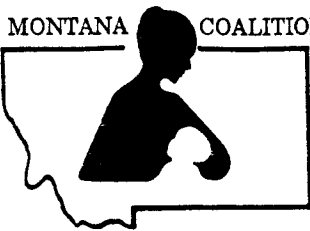

Healthy Mothers, Healthy Babies has a primary interest in promoting breast-feeding as the best nutrition for infants and as a way of enhancing the bonding between mother and child. One of the many projects of Healthy Mothers, Healthy Babies is focused on educating health professionals, community leaders and the public on the values and benefits of breastfeeding.

Research indicates that human milk is the best nutrition for infants as long as the mother is not ingesting harmful substances into her body. This human milk increases the infant's immunity to illnesses and decreases the likelihood of diarrhea which can be fatal to babies.

When an infant is breastfed, the child must be held closely to the mother's body. Studies indicate that such physical nurturing develops a sense of safety and trust in the young child, leading to further development of a healthy sense of self.

Benefits to the parents are social as well as economic. Breast-feeding is sanitary, requires no refrigeration nor the complications or expense associated with infant formulas.

Many mothers would be willing to breastfeed their infants but need encouragement and support to do so. Your support of this initiative will help focus awareness on the health, social, and economic benefits of breastfeeding.
