Committee Business Summary:

Hearing: HB 28 and HB 34
Executive Action: HB 28 and HB 34

HEARING ON HB 28

Opening Statement by Sponsor:

REP. STELLA JEAN HANSEN, House District 57, Missoula, said to
become a licensed sanitarian, a person has to pass a written

examination as well as an oral interview. **REP. HANSEN** said she would like the committee to strike the language "and an oral interview" from the bill. Section 2 reads that a sanitarian licensed in another state is allowed to come in and practice their profession in Montana. The Sanitarian Board feels these people should be registered with the National Environmental Health Association before they submit their application for a license in Montana. **EXHIBIT 1**

Proponents' Testimony:

Joanne Chance, Registered Sanitarian and Chairman of the Sanitarian Board, said the requirement for an oral interview was placed into law during the last legislative session to administer the interview orally, but were advised by the board's attorney that they couldn't ask the candidates any questions that would be considered discriminatory so it became a meaningless requirement. The written exam is very thorough and technical, and covers all bases. **Ms. Chance** said section 2 did not thoroughly explain what they wanted as far as national testing requirements. The National Environmental Health Association has the same exam and the same educational requirements that are required in Montana for licensing. The Sanitarian Board feels that if the sanitarians are nationally registered then they should not have to take the state level test.

Questions From Committee Members and Responses:

REP. SONNY HANSON asked **REP. HANSEN** why she felt the language in section 2 should be stricken from the bill. He felt the board should have the option if they want an oral or written examination. **REP. STELLA JEAN HANSEN** said the national register requires the licensees to take the oral examination which is the same one in Montana, and they shouldn't have to do it again.

REP. LARSON asked **Joanne Chance** if taking the language out was taking the flexibility away from the board? **Ms. Chance** said they cannot use an oral examination. It is not supportive in court, because they cannot ask questions that would discriminate or be unfair.

REP. STELLA JEAN HANSEN asked **Lance Melton**, Legal Counsel on Board of Sanitarians, Department of Commerce, if the language was taken out, would it still allow the board to call these people in and talk to them? **Mr. Melton** said if that language was struck, it would take authority away from the board to discipline, suspend or refuse to renew a license once an individual is licensed.

REP. COCCHIARELLA asked **Lance Melton** what would happen if the

oral exam language was taken out? Mr. Melton said he agreed it should be taken out. He said there are problems with requiring a subjective oral examination under the reference of the Americans With Disabilities Act. He said there would have to be legal counsel at each of the interviews to make sure the parameters of the questions were appropriate.

Closing by Sponsor:

REP. STELLA JEAN HANSEN closed.

HEARING ON HB 34

Opening Statement by Sponsor:

REP. ERVIN DAVIS, House District 34, Charlo, said HB 34 is at the request of the home-bound and the handicapped. He said they wanted to know why they can no longer have the services of a cosmetologist or a manicurist to come into their home. HB 34 addresses those concerns and will allow the request to be taken care of through a licensed cosmetology shop/salon. EXHIBIT 2

Scott Stekly, member of Cosmetology Board, said sanitation is enforced in public establishments and is not enforced in homes.

Mary Brown, member of Cosmetology Board, said she supports Mr. Stekly's comments. She said there wouldn't be any governing if a cosmetologist was allowed to go into a home.

Closing by Sponsor:

REP. DAVIS closed urging the committee to pass HB 34. This is for the handicapped and the elderly who need these services.

HEARING ON HB 49

Opening Statement by Sponsor:

REP. ED DOLEZAL, House District 34, Great Falls, said HB 49 will revise the cosmetology laws and redefine certain terms. He said HB 49 will reduce the number of hours for professional teachers training which is required annually of active teachers.

Proponents' Testimony:

Scott Stekly, Board of Cosmetology, said he supports the bill.

Mary Brown, member of Cosmetology Board, stated her support for HB 49.

Questions From Committee Members and Responses:

REP. LARSON asked Scott Stekly if a high school diploma is necessary to practice cosmetology when it is already permitted under MAPA? Mr. Stekly said it isn't.

Closing by Sponsor:

REP. DOLEZAL closed.

EXECUTIVE ACTION ON HB 28

Motion: REP. STELLA JEAN HANSEN MOVED HB 28 DO PASS.

Discussion: REP. LARSON asked Lance Melton if the board has the authority to control the admission standards and investigation procedures under MAPA? Mr. Melton said under MAPA there is a discovery process. In order to reach that process, there has to be a lot of action taken. The board has to find probable cause, and if they get into a contested case hearing, it is time consuming and expensive. He said in section 3, it states a board may require an oral or written examination which is above and beyond what is required of MAPA. He said it would allow the board to get through the process quicker than relying on general provisions of the Montana Administrative Procedures Act.

REP. STELLA JEAN HANSEN moved to adopt an amendment on page 2, section 2, line 12, strike "or" and insert "and". She said this issue is not an either-or-situation.

REP. COCCHIARELLA said the amendment is creating an old problem that existed before when people were coming into the state and had to take the same exact test. She wanted to wait to take action until she knew what the other states required and what the National Environmental Health Association required. These people are having to take both the written test and the oral exam.

REP. STELLA JEAN HANSEN said the National Environmental Health Association has sanitarians that work in their hospices that are not attached to a state. She said if the sanitarians want to move to Montana to work they should be able to work if they

belong to the National Environmental Health Association. The change in her amendment will say they also have to be a licensed sanitarian.

REP. COCCHIARELLA asked Paul Verdon, Legislative Council, if "and" is substituted for the word "or", will it make the requirement state these people need to be registered from another state? Mr. Verdon said it does the opposite of what REP. HANSEN intended for it to do. He said no one is licensed by the National Environmental Health Association, and if her amendment is put in, no one will be able to work in this state as an sanitarian.

REP. STELLA JEAN HANSEN withdrew her amendment.

REP. DAILY moved to adopt an amendment to leave the language in section 2 and 3 the way it is currently in the statutes, and adopt the language in section 1. The question was called. Roll call vote was taken. Motion CARRIED unanimously. EXHIBIT 3

Motion/Vote: REP. DAILY MOVED HB 28 DO PASS AS AMENDED. The question was called. Voice vote was taken. Motion carried unanimously.

Vote: HB 28 DO PASS AS AMENDED. Motion carried 18 - 0.

EXECUTIVE ACTION ON HB 34

Motion: REP. BACHINI MOVED HB 34 DO PASS.

Discussion: REP. COCCHIARELLA asked Paul Verdon if the language is necessary? She said it duplicates subsection (i). Mr. Verdon said under existing law it can be done. REP. COCCHIARELLA asked if the word handicapped is still used? Paul Verdon said she was probably right, but the language did pass legal and editorial review from the Council and wasn't changed.

REP. PAVLOVICH said this bill isn't necessary because they can do this now.

REP. BRANDEWIE said he is in agreement with REP. PAVLOVICH. If this bill is to be passed, language will need to be inserted stating a licensee can be called to go out and do the job.

REP. DOWELL said there are two licenses: one for the establishment; and one for the individual. The assumption is being made that when a licensed person leaves a licensed establishment, the unsighted inspection goes with them. He said once a person leaves their shop this language is necessary to cover the situation.

Lance Melton was asked to respond. He said in order for an

individual to go out and provide services as a cosmetologist to a handicapped person at home, the cosmetologist has to be sent from a licensed cosmetology salon which is subject to inspection by a board inspector. Under the proposed change, the cosmetologist could be employed at a salon or at home and be called by an individual to perform cosmetology at their home.

Motion/Vote: The question was called. Voice vote was taken. Motion CARRIED 13 - 5 with REPS. BRANDEWIE, LARSON, WAGNER, PAVLOVICH AND CHAIRMAN BENEDICT voting no.

Vote: HB 34 DO PASS. Motion carried 13 - 5.

EXECUTIVE ACTION ON HB 49

Motion: REP. DOWELL MOVED HB 49 DO PASS.

Discussion: REP. DAILY said he is concerned if this legislation is passed that a person who is now practicing cosmetology does not have a high school diploma or its equivalent. If this bill is passed, these people may not be able to practice.

Paul Verdon said in section 4, it states that before a person can practice he/she shall obtain a license. It states further that the applicant must be no less than 18 years of age, etc. Mr. Verdon said the existing license would probably be grandfathered.

Lance Melton said this legislation would not be retroactive, unless there is specific language in the legislation to make it so. This bill will apply only to the people receiving their license after passage of this bill.

REP. BACHINI moved to adopt an amendment to strike every area where high school diploma appears and restore the two-year high school equivalent for a cosmetologist. Roll call vote was taken. Motion carried 12 - 6 with REPS. DOWELL, TUSS, STELLA JEAN HANSEN, PAVLOVICH, COCCHIARELLA AND DAILY voting no. EXHIBIT 6

REP. SIMON moved to adopt an amendment to include a manicurist to have the equivalent of a two-year high school diploma. Roll call vote was taken. Motion carried 12 - 6 with REPS. DOWELL, TUSS, STELLA JEAN HANSEN, PAVLOVICH, COCCHIARELLA AND DAILY voting no. EXHIBIT 7

REP. SIMON moved to adopt an amendment to strike the requirement that the cosmetologist and manicurist courses have to be done in a certain required time limit. He wants language to say the courses must be completed to receive a license.

CHAIRMAN BENEDICT said unless there is a real compelling reason he was uncomfortable about changing this language, because the committee does not know the reasons why the former legislators

placed this language in the bill in the first place.

REP. WAGNER asked Scott Stekly if the test that is given now is the same one that was given 10 years ago? Mr. Stekly said there are changes that take place constantly, but it is based more on technique than the written test.

REP. SIMON moved to postpone further discussion on HB 49 until he had more information. CHAIRMAN BENEDICT agreed to dismiss further action until the committee had more information.





Subject: House Bill 28

Dear Chairman and Committee Members:

Please accept this written testimony in support of House Bill 28 on behalf of the Montana Board of Sanitarians. The Board of Sanitarians apologizes for not being personally present for this committee hearing. The board members learned of the date for this hearing yesterday, and were unable to attend.

House Bill 28 enacts a couple of necessary changes in the existing legislation of sections 37-40-302, 303, & 311, MCA. The first change that the Board supports is an amendment to section 37-40-302 and 311. Under the existing statute, an applicant for licensure needs to pass an oral interview to become licensed. This requirement was added in the 1991 legislative session. At the time, this requirement seemed sensible. In practice, however, the board believes that the oral interview is too subjective a test to adequately review an applicant's knowledge. The Board of Sanitarians respectfully requests that this requirement be stricken, as called for in House Bill 28.

The second change that the Board supports is an amendment to section 37-40-303. Under the existing statute, reciprocity is extended only to individuals licensed or registered in another state. It has come to the board's attention, however, that the following states neither license nor register sanitarians:

South Carolina, Iowa, Maine, Alabama, Delaware, Alaska, Georgia, Colorado, Hawaii, South Dakota, Vermont, Wyoming, Virginia, New Mexico, New Hampshire, Mississippi.

Some individuals in these states, however, do obtain registration with the National Environmental Health Association (NEHA). NEHA has registration requirements that are virtually identical to the licensure requirements under the Board of Sanitarians. A copy of the NEHA registration requirements is attached. In light of the similarity of NEHA's registration requirements, the Board believes that it is appropriate to extend reciprocity to individuals registered with NEHA.

Again, the Board of Sanitarians apologizes for not having a member personally present at this hearing, and respectfully requests that this committee support passage of House Bill 28.

EXHIBIT 1DATE 1/5/93SB 28**ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS FOR REHS/RS**

An individual has the opportunity to become a Registered Environmental Health Specialist/Registered Sanitarian by meeting the eligibility requirements for registration by examination (I), registration with an "In-Training" status (II), or registration without re-examination (III).

I. NATIONAL REGISTRATION BY EXAMINATION**TRACK ONE**

- A. A Bachelor's degree in Environmental Health from a college or university curriculum approved by the National Environmental Health Science and Protection Accreditation Council (NEHAC) or from a college or university accredited by a nationally recognized accreditation agency.
- B. No experience is required.

TRACK TWO

- A. A post-baccalaureate degree (Master's or Ph.D.) in Environmental Health from a college or university curriculum approved by the NEHAC or by a nationally recognized accreditation agency.
- B. No experience is required.

TRACK THREE

- A. A Bachelor's degree which includes:
 - 1. an algebra course or higher level math course,
 - 2. 30 semester hours/45 quarter hours in the basic sciences, i.e., courses in biology, chemistry, physics, other physical sciences, or sanitary engineering.
- B. Two or more years of experience in environmental health are required.

II. NATIONAL REGISTRATION WITH "IN-TRAINING" STATUS

If you meet the Track Three education requirements, but do not yet have the required experience, you may apply for an "In-Training" status registration. Please follow the application instructions below. Upon passing the examination and attainment of the "In-Training" status registration, you will have three (3) years to acquire the necessary experience to transfer your registration to full-credential status. If you do not acquire the necessary experience in three years, your "In-Training" status will be dropped and you must take the examination again (see Track Three) to be awarded the credential.

Application Instructions

If you meet one of the eligibility tracks above, please submit:

- 1. a completed and notarized application (including proctor information),
- 2. official college transcript(s) (photocopies cannot be substituted); please note on application if transcripts are being sent separately,
- 3. the application review fee (please see FEES).

Proctor for the Examination

THE NAME AND ADDRESS OF A QUALIFIED PROCTOR MUST BE INCLUDED ON THE APPLICATION. A qualified proctor shall be a person employed by/for one of the following (listed in order of preference below):

- Civil Service or State Merit System Personnel Department,
- College Continuing Education Department (includes community colleges),
- Military Reservation or Base Testing Officer from the Uniformed Services,
- Official State Registration Board,
- Corporate Continuing Education Dept.
- Civil Service Continuing Education Dept.

III. NATIONAL REGISTRATION WITHOUT RE-EXAMINATION

All applicants who seek the distinction of becoming a Registered Environmental Health Specialist/Registered Sanitarian without re-examination must meet one of NEHA's educational and experiential tracks described in Section 1. In addition, the applicant must send or have sent to NEHA the following:

1. a completed and notarized application.
2. official college transcript(s) (photocopies cannot be substituted); please note on application if transcripts are being sent separately.
3. verification (original documents required) from the State Registration Board/Committee of:
 - a. current state registration with expiration date included,
 - b. a raw percentage score of a least 70% on the national Professional Examination Service (PES)

"Registered Sanitarian" exam. The total number of correct answers and total number of exam questions must be included.

PES may provide exam results if results are unavailable from the state (PES telephone number 212-870-3161).

4. application review fee (please see FEES).

CREDENTIALING MAINTENANCE

The continuing education of the environmental health work force enables the professional to keep abreast of rapidly changing conditions. Therefore, to remain registered, an environmental health specialist/sanitarian must accumulate 24 contact hours of Continuing Education (C.E.) in environmental health every two years. The NEHA Credentialing Board determines what continuing education activities are appropriate for maintaining registration. These activities may be NEHA's self-paced learning modules, seminars, workshops or technical sessions on environmental health offered at our conferences, or similar environmental health oriented functions from other organizations.

It is the individual's responsibility to advise NEHA of any continuing education experience by submitting a completed NEHA C.E. Approval Form with documentation. This enables NEHA to maintain up to date C.E. records at no additional cost to the NEHA credentialed professional.

FEES

Separate fees have been established for the application review and the registration examination. The application fee must accompany the application. The registration exam fee is due when candidates receive notice of approval to sit for the examination. The fees for candidates are listed below.

THEY WERE NOTIFIED THAT CURRENT LAW PROHIBITS THAT PRACTICE - THAT OF A LICENSED COSMOTOLOGIST GOING INTO A PRIVATE HOME (OR REST HOME) AT THE DIRECT REQUEST OF THE HANDICAPPED INDIVIDUAL; BUT THE REQUEST MUST COME THROUGH A LICENSED COSMOTOLOGY SHOP/SALON.

HB 34 ATTEMPTS TO ADDRESS THAT CONCERN. HB 34 WOULD ALLOW A CURRENT LICENSED COSMOTOLOGIST TO GO TO A REST HOME OR THE HOME OF A HANDICAPPED INDIVIDUAL -- AT THE REQUEST OF THAT INDIVIDUAL.

THOSE OF YOU WHO HAVE SPENT TIME WITH OR AROUND HOME-BOUND OR HANDICAPPED INDIVIDUALS KNOW HOW DIFFICULT IT IS FOR THAT INDIVIDUAL TO GET TO A BARBER SHOP OR BEAUTY SALON - ESPECIALLY DURING INCLEMENT WEATHER.

HB 34 ADDRESSES ONLY THE HOME-BOUND AND HANDICAPPED INDIVIDUALS - NOT OTHERS WHO ARE PHYSICALLY CAPABLE OF GETTING TO THE BEAUTY SHOP.

I'LL RESERVE THE RIGHT TO CLOSE.
