HEARING ON HB 53

Opening Statement by Sponsor:

REP. STEVE BENEDICT, House District 64, Hamilton, stated HB 53 would allow the Board of County Commissioners to establish the office of county superintendent of schools as a part-time office without altering the statutory duties of the position. A

determination would have to be made by the Board that the full array of duties of the position could be performed in the context of part-time. The Board must also pass a resolution of intent, conduct a hearing, and issue an appropriate order. Full-time incumbent positions at the present time would not be affected. REP. BENEDICT stressed this piece of legislation would allow for local control and could possibly affect sixteen counties in Montana. An amendment proposed by the County Superintendent's Association was submitted by REP. BENEDICT. EXHIBIT 1

Proponents' Testimony:

Steve Powell, Ravalli County Commissioner, supported the bill based on the experience of Ravalli County which consolidated their superintendent's position with that of county clerk and recorder in 1981. Testimony from the acting county superintendent was provided. EXHIBIT 2

Gordon Morris, Executive Director of the Association of Counties, asked for favorable consideration of the bill.

Sue Olson, Mussellshell County Commissioner, spoke in favor of HB 53. She explained the work load in Mussellshell County does not nécessitate a full-time superintendent of schools. She offered the success of the consolidation of part-time county attorney positions in Mussellshell and Golden Valley Counties into one position as a frame-work for the possible consolidation of county superintendent positions between two or more counties.

Larry Stolfus, President Montana Association of County School Superintendents, provided written testimony. EXHIBIT 3

Rachel Vielleux, Missoula County Superintendent of Schools, provided written testimony. EXHIBIT 4

Fleda Brammer, Broadwater County Treasurer/County Superintendent of Schools, supported the amendment presented by REP. BENEDICT.

Karl Roosa, Powell County Superintendent of Schools, suggested to amend section three of the bill. The amendment would allow the Board of Commissioners the option to change the proportion of a part-time office during the term of office with the agreement of the county superintendent.

Rick Bartos, Montana Association of County of School
Superintendents, offered an amendment to define the term "parttime" (to be inserted on page 3, line 8) as: "part-time office
means an office whose hours are less than eight until five every
day, except holidays and except Saturdays, but no fewer than four
hours per day every day except holidays and except Saturdays," to
enable the office to be open for at least four hours per day
without compromising the flexibility of the Board of County
Commissioners.

Loran Frazier, School Administrators of Montana, expressed his concern for students who attend rural schools or are homeschooled. He suggested they may be left without services if this piece legislation is passed. Mr. Frazier asked the committee to consider how the potential change would fit in with the whole picture of education in the state.

REP. ELLIS, House District 84, Red Lodge, presented a letter from the Carbon County Board of County Commissioners in support of this bill. EXHIBIT 5

Opponents' Testimony: None.

Questions From Committee Members and Responses:

- REP. SIMPKINS asked Rick Bartos if the proposed definition to be inserted in section 1 conflicted with the requirement the office be open from 8:00 a.m. until 5:00 p.m. (section 2). Mr. Bartos replied there was a conflict, but without the definition the offices could be open without anyone in attendance. By defining the term part-time, the county commissioners would have the authority to close those offices for four hours each day.
- REP. SIMPKINS asked if the statement in the brochure distributed by Mr. Bartos with regard to the responsibility of the superintendent to provide general supervision of the public schools in the county (exhibit 3, 2 of 2) was a matter of law. Mr. Bartos replied it was.
- REP. WALLIN requested that someone from counties with already consolidated offices to note whether they did so with authority and how a schedule would work for someone from two different counties. Ms. Olson replied authority for consolidation was given and that the consolidated attorneys in Mussellshell and Golden Valley Counties set their schedules according to the needs of each county.
- REP. SPRING asked Ms. Vielleux about her comment regarding outlying schools and whether the students were indeed not presently getting the services usually provided by a school superintendent. Ms. Vielleux responded some students were not receiving the attention they need. She said the treasurer/superintendent for a school in her county with which she was familiar was not able to accomplish any duties beyond that of treasurer.
- REP. BRANDEWIE asked Mr. Morris how the amendment proposed by Mr. Bartos fit the bill. Mr. Morris said he believes the definition for part-time is redundant.

REP. SIMPKINS referenced the establishment of county superintendents in the Constitution under Article 11, section 3, and questioned whether there were laws prohibiting this article of the Constitution from being fulfilled. Mr. Morris stated there were no such laws, but that HB 53 was a new approach to the "part-time" option with consolidation.

Closing by Sponsor:

REP. BENEDICT explained the bill would return to the local governments and to the people the ability to determine what is in the best interest of their county. REP. BENEDICT said he believed there was no need to amend the bill further. He maintained it was a cooperative effort between county superintendents who had plenty of opportunity to amend the bill. He stressed HB 53 could assist many counties in this time of fiscal strain.

Honorable Committee Members:

I urge your most careful consideration of House Bill 53, (establishing a procedure for part-time County Superintendents of Schools). As president of the Montana Association of County Superintendents (MACSS) and speaking for that association bring forth the following points for your consideration:

- 1. A criteria be established to determine when the reduction to a parttime position could be considered.
- 2. That the financial status of a county should not be the basis for a deduction when a full time work load is present.
- 3. When the duties of the position can not be fully completed on a parttime basis, where does the responsibility for the remaining duties lie?
- 4. That a part-time opinion not be used to eliminate particular individuals.
- 5. That other elected offices be included in this statute, as the merit of part-time maybe found in other areas.

We support the concept of government responsible to the local taxpayer and can support H.B. 53 only if that high level of local responsibility is maintained.



Re: Part Time County Superintendent Bill

In 1981 the office of Clerk & Recorder and County Superintendent were combined. I was hired in mid 1982 to serve as Acting County Superintendent, and have done so ever since. I set my own schedule at 1,040 hours/year, for half of what the elected Superintendent would receive in salary and benefits.

This has been a satisfactory arrangement for Ravalli County and for me, although I believe the position should be elective, rather than appointive as in my case. I would strongly oppose such a position at less than half time. There would be no benefits, and that combined with the low salary would almost assuredly preclude competent people willing to do the job.

I also believe that the continuance of the County Superintendent's office is critical to the maintaining of positive contact between the schools and the people. No district could perform all the various tasks in a multi-district county, and there continue to be a variety of disagreements between various districts and parents or students or teachers that need various types of mediation. The local understanding would be lost if a state agency attempted to perform this service.



MONTANA ASSOCIATION OF COUNTY SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENTS

ADMINISTRATIVE

Carry out duties prescribed by the Legislature, Board of Public Education and the State Superintendent of Public Instruction. As a county government official and county school officer, provide general supervision of public schools in the county.

Assist trustees with school supervision.

Advise and direct teachers on instruction pupil discipline and other duties of the teacher.

Visit schools at the request of the trustees.

Consult with the trustees on all school matters that may be found during the observation of the school or may otherwise come to their attention.

Provide for supervision to any school with an enrollment of fewer than 150 students and not under the supervision of a district superintendent or principal.

Administer oaths of office to trustees.

Provide other services to districts that fall within the scope of state statutes.

Promote educational growth and improvement.



LEGAL

Hear and decide all matters of controversy arising as a result of decisions of the trustees of a district in the county.

TO:

At a time when local governments are suffering under the constraints of I-105, it makes good sense to allow them the flexibility to reduce some positions to part-time whether that be a county superintendent, a clerk of district court or a surveyor. I do have a concern about the initial MACO resolution which prompted the introduction of this bill. It was predicated on the fact that we have a decreasing number of rural schools. While it is true that the county superintendent is very important to those schools, that does not consume the majority of our time. Often, part-time county commissioners do not appreciate or understand the full scope of the county superintendent's duties and act strictly on the basis of dollars. In Garfield County, for example, there is no one filling the role of county superintendent even though they have ten widely scattered rural schools.

The job of the county superintendent has grown far beyond the horse and buggy days. We perform a vital function in the continuum of school services; in view of the potential cuts in state government, the county superintendents may be called upon to expand this role even further to assume some duties now performed at the state level. It is important that county's have the ability to provide those services whether it be through contracting for services or through election of a part-time county superintendent.
