### HEARING ON HOUSE BILL 56

Opening Statement by Sponsor: Representative Cocchiarella, HD 59, explained House Bill 56 and said it would provide mandatory approval for a child to attend a school outside the home district if certain conditions were met corrects a prior bill. On the bottom of page one they put language back into the bill so it did not mess up the payment situation. Tuition arrangements have been ongoing and they did not want to mess them up for children who are closer to another school which is not in their district.

<u>Proponents' Testimony</u>: Don Waldron, MREA (Montana Rural Education Association) said the study committee has taken care of problems and this bill does the job they are expected to do.

Loren Frazier, Montana School Administrators, said we sat here and put the bills together last spring. These are the things that sort of fell out and we now support the amendments because that was the intent at the time we put the bills together.

Lynda Brennan, Montana Association of School Business Officials, said they support this because it is clean up language that makes the bill easier to administer

Bob Anderson, Montana School Boards Association, said they also support this bill.

Opponents' Testimony: None.

Informational Testimony: None.

Questions From Committee Members and Responses: Senator Blaylock asked if this bill would clean up problems with the other bill and Ms. Cocchiarella said she could not guarantee it would not be visited again, but these were the two hot items that came to the surface in the task force that we need to deal with immediately. The task force will continue to meet to address any other problems in the bill.

Closing by Sponsor: Representative Cocchiarella said she closed.

### EXECUTIVE ACTION ON HOUSE BILL 56

<u>Motion/Vote</u>: Senator Brown moved House Bill 56 be concurred in. Motion passed unanimously by those present. Senator Blaylock to carry the bill.

### HEARING ON SENATE BILL 46

Opening Statement by Sponsor: Senator Klampe explained the bill and said it repeals the section of law that deals with bonus payments for consolidation or annexation of schools. We pay schools incentive payments to consolidate or annex and it is based on \$450 per student per year in the class one and class two schools and \$750 per student per year for three years in a smaller district. He said this number adds up pretty fast. He said there is a generalized bonus payment and a transportation bonus payment. This bill strikes those statutes and has a savings clause which allows those schools receiving their bonus payments to continue doing so. He said if you are of the theory that consolidation will save money, you should probably vote against this bill. He said the in talking to schools that have annexed you will find that it does not save money in Montana, but usually costs money.

Proponents' Testimony: None.

Opponents' Testimony: None.

Informational Testimony: None.

Questions From Committee Members and Responses: Senator Brenden asked if the bill goes through and there is an annexation and you eliminate the schools payments, could some kids be cut services they were getting before. Senator Klampe said if it is because they don't have the money they had before, it is conceivable. One of the reasons for giving the money is to help these schools through the transition.

Senator Wilson asked if this is not happening are we putting money into something that is not happening. Senator Klampe said it is happening now in three schools and is costing us about \$65,000 a year. He said the three schools are in Big Horn County, Flathead County and Gallatin County. He said the Clyde Park one is completed, it has gone through the three year cycle.

Chair Blaylock said to try to get more districts to consolidate he had "sweetened the pot". A school district in the valley consolidated with the Helena schools and did cost us a pot of money, but there has not been a rush to consolidate. He said if two schools want to go together, there may well be additional expenditures, especially in the first three years.

Senator Stang asked if this would affect any schools that have consolidated and are using this money now and Senator Klampe said no, there is a savings clause in the bill so those who are doing it now would continue getting their money for the three year period.

Senator Wilson asked why no proponents or opponents today. The faces are here, but no one has testified.

Bob Anderson, MSBA, said if he had not been out of the room he would have testified as a proponent of the bill. It was considered in the Schwinden proposal and is part of the recommendation from our organization.

Senator Wilson asked what kind of savings are we talking about and said there has not been a fiscal note on this because there is no way of knowing how many consolidations or annexations might occur.

Senator Stang asked if this bill would impact the current unifications that are taking place in Missoula county and Senator Klampe said it wouldn't because that is not an annexation, it is a unification of boards.

Closing by Sponsor: Senator Klampe said he had closed.

### HEARING ON HOUSE BILL 64

Opening Statement by Sponsor: Representative Kadas, House District 55, said under current law an elementary district can levy one mill for adult education and a highschool district can levy two mills for adult education. A unified district can levy two mills for adult education. This is a disincentive for unification because if they stayed separate they could levy three mills, unified only two mills and this bill would allow a unified district to levy three mills for adult education.

<u>Proponents' Testimony</u>: Don Waldron, representing a taxpayer in Missoula county, school district one. This was one of the discussions when we talked about unification and a group was against unification for this very issue because we were throwing out money we could not put back into adult education.

Loren Frazier, School Administrators, said they support this bill. He believed at the fast rate we are growing as far as need to retrain employees, that adult education is going to play a strong part in that and believed districts should have the ability to do this.

Eric Feaver, MEA, said we support this bill.

Carl Sandell, Adult Education, Missoula County Highschool, said he wished to go on record as being in support of the bill.

Opponents' Testimony: None.

Informational Testimony: None.

<u>Questions From Committee Members and Responses</u>: Senator Stang asked if they had to do this with a vote of the people, or can they do it permissively. Representative Kadas said all of the mills currently are permissive.

Senator Stang asked if he thought the people in Missoula County would have voted differently if they had thought we would bring a bill in that would let them raise the mill levy one more mill under unification and Representative Kadas said for Missoula County they will have to reduce the mill levy one mill because of the unification.

Senator Stang said if we pass this bill they can bring it back up and asked if he thought they would have voted for unification if they had known. Representative Kadas said he did not think this particular issue had a lot to do with the debate for the voters. It concerned more of the people on the board who were more involved in trying to figure out what to do.

<u>Closing by Sponsor</u>: Representative Kadas thanked the committee for the hearing.

### **HEARING ON HOUSE BILL 59**

Opening Statement by Sponsor: In the absence of Representative Benedict, Senator Klampe explained House Bill 56. He said the bill has the potential of reducing the number of districts from 495 to 293 without forcing anything on anyone. It requires a vote in the affected school districts this coming year and every 10 years after that.

<u>Proponents' Testimony</u>: Bob Anderson, MSBA, (Montana School Board's Association), spoke in support of HB 59. He said a year ago he had talked to Ted Schwinden about doing a study on school consolidation because the MSBA had adopted a resolution which said "recognizing the importance of the debate on consolidation and unification, MSBA will develop a proposal to submit within 12 months to the Legislature, after consideration and feed back from individual districts and other interested parties". He said Mr. Schwinden published his report at the end of April 1993. Mr. Anderson and Mr. Schwinden traveled around the state to discuss his findings and recommendations. In August Bruce Mohr and Mr. Anderson visited 11 more communities to discuss the report and recommendations. MSBA met with a total of 21 communities to explain the report and take input. In Aug of this year MSBA delegate assembly supported the concept supported in this bill and reaffirmed their report in October. This is a serious attempt to let Montanans determine the future of their elementary and highschool districts.

Rick Bartos explained HB 59. He said two concepts have been explained, and one is an annexation which deals with two elementary districts. He said in the April '94 election will decide whether they will remain independent and continue as an elementary district or annex with an elementary district that has a highschool building located in it. Because the larger elementary district with a highschool in it would have the curriculum consistent with the kids that will be going from the elementary into the highschool, it makes sense to try to annex the smaller districts into the larger elementary districts. said on bonded indebtedness, these folks will decide whether they will pay the old bonds by themselves and not assume the bonded indebtedness of the big district, or continue to pay their bond and assume the bonded indebtedness of the annexing district. said concept number 2 is unification of county highschools. There are five county highschools remaining in the state and this would propose using existing state law but mandate that the county hospital electors decide it is time to put the county highschools to bed and join with the elementary district where the highschool building is located and create a K-12 unified district. Bonded indebtedness would be paid by those who voted for the old bond, the elementary would continue to pay for it's own bonded indebtedness. He passed out two sheets showing a

summary and comparison information. (exhibit 1 and 2)

Don Waldron, MREA, (Montana Rural Education Association) said this is the only kind of consolidation bill we have talked on. They believe this does give districts the right to vote. His only question was the length of time as 10 years.

Loren Frazier, School Administrators, said their association has studied consolidation for at least 3 years and HB 59 represents the closest consensus of what the Association has come up with. It does give the people a chance to vote.

Lynda Brennan, Montana Association of School Officials, said they support the bill for all of the reasons already given.

Opponents' Testimony: Eric Feaver, MEA, said this is a bill that should not have come out of the House, and should not have been in the call. This bill does not save any money, and would seem to have a local vote to approve a state action. He said the vote happens every 10 years and believed the vote is premature for this spring. For school districts that feel the impact of what this special session and 1995 will do to them, they would suggest a good starting date for the first vote by mandate from this Legislature would be the spring of 1996. Ten years is an eternity in school funding now, and he believed every three years thereafter would be more appropriate. He said this is an anticonsolidation bill and by voting this into law it will have declared the Legislature is opposed to state wide school district reorganization. He pointed out problems in the bill on joint assumption of bonded indebtedness and what the County Superintendent can do. He believed definitions of unification, consolidation etc. should be more explicit, double negatives should be removed and a decision on this bill should not be made in a special session.

Informational Testimony: None

Questions From Committee Members and Responses: Senator Wilson asked Mr. Frazier on the benefit of annexation, what is the point and what is the purpose of it. Mr. Frazier asked if he could refer this to Mr. Bartos. Mr. Bartos said consolidation meant both districts have to vote as to whether they will consolidate. If both districts vote yes, they will both be dissolved and are no longer legal entities, and you create a new district. In answer to a question he said this dealt with two elementary districts. Annexation does the same thing. It consolidates school districts but in the larger district (the one with the highschool located in it), the Board continues so you have continuity of governance. The administration continues. You dissolve the Board and move all the geographic property of the small district into the larger district. The teachers of the smaller district are assumed within the larger district, there is less disruption, an identity of an existing district which

remains the same except that they inherit more kids, more buildings, equipment etc. In an annexation they do not both vote and only the district which has everything to lose will be able to vote. In an assumption of bonded indebtedness, the smaller district being annexed has to pay for their old debt. They vote as to whether they assume bonded indebtedness with annexation and do not have to pay for the existing debt of the big district unless they vote to do so.

Senator Wilson asked how often trustee elections come up and Mr. Bartos said every year. Senator Wilson asked why the ten year interval and Mr. Bartos the ten year interval was a recommendation made through the Delegate Assembly of the Montana School Board's Association. He said the school trustees can vote on this proposition voluntarily every year if they want to.

Senator Brown asked if there wouldn't there be a more clearly perceived need to annex in 1996 than in 1994 and if they vote in 1994 they might make a hasty decision which would be difficult to reverse later on. He asked if there would be any problem with changing the timing of the first election. Mr. Bartos deferred to Mr. Anderson on the question. Mr. Anderson said originally their intent was to have it during the '96 year, but were not allowed to introduce this bill into the session because it had no impact on this biennium. The Rules Committee made the decision that if the date was moved up to '94 it would fit within the call. He said he did not think it an unreasonable time because if the people and the Governor are ready to reinvent government they are ready to do so. He said if this bill were amended to '96 somebody is going to suggest it not be dealt with in this session.

Chair Blaylock said he had been dealing with this for a long In his area there are schools which lie within his Senate District or close to it. Between Laurel and Billings lies a stand alone elementary district which is very rich. He named other schools in the area and asked how they would be convinced they wanted to unify with School District 2. There has been no one in that area that has ever told him they would want to unify. He asked what makes MSBA believe that this bill will work and something will actually happen. Mr. Anderson said as we emerge from the session it looks like there will be a major cut to education. He believed there would be a sense among the educational community and the people who pay for that educational system, that we need to look at our hole card. He believed that might give some impetus for those people to look at a bigger picture. He assumed some districts would want to remain the way they are now and others are not.

Senator Blaylock said Mr. Anderson had gone through the schools who have already done this, and schools have been able to do what is proposed in this bill, but it has been sparse in Montana, particularly with elementary schools wanting to go into the larger system. Since they can do it already, what is the

difference, except that they have to go through a vote.

Closing by Sponsor: Representative Benedict asked the committee to think about what they just heard. A reduction in school districts from 495 to approximately 293 falls in line with what many have been saying is a huge number of school districts for this state. He discussed the cost savings in duplication of services, benefits to teachers, and the extra's kids would receive in service. This bill does nothing to anyone in your district that they do not want to do to themselves.

Senator Blaylock said he believed the only way to get consolidation would be through a state wide vote but it would not happen by district.

A list of elementary schools in the state was given to the secretary and is included in the minutes. (exhibit 3)
