HEARING ON HOUSE BILL 83

Opening Statement by Sponsor:

REP. NORM MILLS, House District 90, Billings, opened for sponsor, REP. ELLEN BERGMAN, House District 26, Miles City. He stated that this bill eliminates the regulation of the vitamin and mineral content of flour and bread. Federal requirements are now much more stringent and these regulations serve no purpose. There has never been a prosecution under the statute being repealed.

Proponents' Testimony:

Bob Robinson, Director, Department of Health and Environmental Sciences, said this bill was one of a package of bills proposed by the department after looking at ways to absorb across-the-board reductions, eliminating requirements that didn't need to be on the books. He reiterated that elimination of the present statute posed no threat to public health as Food and Drug Administration requirements were sufficient.

Opponents' Testimony:

None.

Questions from Committee Members and Responses:

REP. WANZENRIED asked if the department would have other like bills before the end of the special session. Mr. Robinson said the department had three other bills: one dealing with elimination of licensing requirements for septic tank pumpers, and one dealing with certificate of need, and one dealing with mattress requirements. He said that these bills were part of an ongoing commitment on the part of the department to come back to the 1995 session with some proposals to streamline the department.

CHAIRMAN ZOOK asked if the septic tank pumper bill was going to be sent to Appropriations. Mr. Robinson said it was.

REP. BARDANOUVE asked what these four bills had to do with balancing the budget. He stated that the salary Mr. Robinson received for sitting waiting to testify was more than these bills saved. Mr. Robinson said that the bills were more symbolism than anything, showing that the department was trying to identify areas where cuts could be made and laws taken off the books. He said that each of the bills probably represented two or three weeks work on somebody's part during the year that would be eliminated with the passage of the bills.

Closing by Sponsor:

REP. MILLS closed by saying that people had often asked him to

cut government and get rid of unneeded laws. He felt this bill was a step in that direction.

HEARING ON SENATE BILL 23

Opening Statement by Sponsor:

REP. JOHN COBB, House District 42, Augusta, opened for sponsor, SEN. CHRIS CHRISTIAENS, Senate District 18, Great Falls. He stated that the fiscal note explains the bill. SEN. CHRISTIAENS said that this bill was merely a clarification, cleaning up some omissions from the regular session, and was extremely important to foster parents.

Proponents' Testimony:

Hank Hudson, Director, Department of Family Services, testified in favor of the bill.

EXECUTIVE ACTION ON HOUSE BILL 75

Motion: REP. MENAHAN MOVED TO TABLE HB 75. Motion carried 17-1 with REP. WANZENRIED voting no.

EXECUTIVE ACTION ON HOUSE BILL 71

Motion: REP. KASTEN MOVED TO TAKE HB 71 FROM THE TABLE.

Discussion: REP. KASTEN said she felt one of the chief problems

with the bill was that agencies that were not appropriate would be allowed to have a lump sum appropriation. She stated her intention to offer an amendment that the agencies would be Administration, Transportation, Revenue, and Military Affairs.

REP. BARDANOUVE said he felt the bill should sleep peacefully where it was.

REP. GRADY said he felt the lump sum issue should be discussed on the floor of the House.

<u>Vote</u>: TO TAKE HB 71 FROM THE TABLE. Motion carried 10-8 with REPS. BARDANOUVE, JOHN JOHNSON, KADAS, MENAHAN, NELSON, PECK, QUILICI, and WANZENRIED voting no.

Motion: REP. KASTEN MOVED HB 71 DO PASS AS AMENDED.

Motion: REP. KASTEN MOVED AMENDMENTS EXHIBIT 1.

<u>Discussion</u>: REP. KASTEN asked REP. GRIMES to explain. REP. GRIMES said the first amendment is intended to specify four agencies to be used as somewhat of a pilot program. The second amendment is to include the university system.

REP. BARDANOUVE asked what "agencies identified in HB 2" meant. REP. GRIMES said that language was intended to specify four agencies for pilot projects.

REP. NELSON asked why those particular agencies were selected for this program. Jane Hamman, OBPP, said the agencies were chosen for their diversity.

REP. BARDANOUVE said the Senate wouldn't even look at this bill.

<u>Vote</u>: AMENDMENTS EXHIBIT 1. Motion carried unanimously.

Motion: HB 71 DO PASS AS AMENDED. Motion carried 10-8 with REPS. BARDANOUVE, JOHN JOHNSON, KADAS, MENAHAN, NELSON, PECK, QUILICI, and WANZENRIED voting no.

EXECUTIVE ACTION ON HOUSE BILL 39

Motion: REP. BERGSAGEL MOVED TO TAKE HB 39 OFF THE TABLE.

<u>Discussion</u>: REP. KADAS asked why REP. BERGSAGEL wanted to take the bill off the table. REP. BERGSAGEL said he had amendments that clarified that the sale of the state fleet would not come before entering into a leasing agreement, and required the department to issue a request for proposal.

REP. QUILICI didn't think this bill belonged in the special session and wanted to wait for the results of the Governor's task force.

- REP. BERGSAGEL said all that is being asked is for DOT to send out an RFP to determine the cost-effectiveness of this program.
- REP. WANZENRIED asked if the department could do what is being proposed without this bill. REP. BERGSAGEL said they had the authority to do that, but needed to be encouraged.

<u>Vote</u>: TO TAKE HB 39 OFF THE TABLE. Motion carried 10-8 with REPS. BARDANOUVE, JOHN JOHNSON, KADAS, MENAHAN, NELSON, PECK, QUILICI, and WANZENRIED voting no.

Motion: REP. COBB MOVED HB 39 DO PASS.

Motion: REP. BERGSAGEL MOVED AMENDMENT hb003901.ash, EXHIBITS 2 and 3.

<u>Discussion</u>: REP. QUILICI said this bill was ill-conceived, ill-drafted, and ill-thought of. He felt this would just take a lot of time in the House, and the Senate would kill it. REP. BERGSAGEL said a lot of time had been spent on the bill, and there was no question it would save money.

- REP. MENAHAN wanted to know how the bill would save money and for how long a time. REP. BERGSAGEL said there were a number of options in the bill. The state could provide the gas; the leasing company could provide the gas. Those issues and others will be worked out in the RFP.
- REP. PECK called attention to page 3 of the fiscal note which said, "However, the following factors suggest that privatization may be more costly than a state-operated motor pool." He agreed that privatization would be more costly.
- REP. BERGSAGEL quoted from the amended bill, EXHIBIT 3, which said, ". . . determine . . . the most cost-effective means . . . to lease passenger vehicles. . . " He said the fiscal note was not accurate.
- REP. FISHER said that the state could use its own plates and also self-insure. Each and every item would need to be examined and compared.
- REP. WISEMAN said that the Great Falls school system has contracted out school buses for years.
- REP. PECK asked if the Great Falls school system had ever run its own buses. REP. WISEMAN didn't know, but REP. PECK said it had never run its own buses. He stated that was the lazy way to do things, and that service cost money.
- REP. ROYAL JOHNSON pointed out that the RFP would try to determine all these factors.

Motion: REP. COBB MOVED AMENDMENT EXHIBIT 4. Motion carried 17-1, with REP. BARDANOUVE voting no.

Motion/Vote: REP. COBB MOVED HB 61 DO PASS AS AMENDED. Motion carried 11-7 with REPS. BARDANOUVE, JOHN JOHNSON, KADAS, MENAHAN, PECK, QUILICI, and WANZENRIED voting no.

MISCELLANEOUS DISCUSSION

REP. COBB said he didn't think a bill was needed, but he would like to move consideration of certain budget items around in the subcommittees. He would like environmental sciences out of his subcommittee to REP. DEBRUYCKER'S subcommittee. He would like to move some of REP. GRADY'S mental health programs into his Human Services Subcommittee. He said the budgets of Pine Hills and Mountain View in his subcommittee should go to REP. GRADY'S subcommittee.

CHAIRMAN ZOOK said he thought perhaps the Finance Committee should consider those suggestions. REP. PECK said he felt that REP. COBB had put a lot of work in and come up with some good ideas that would be appropriate for the Finance Committee to consider.
