HEARING ON SJ 25

Opening Statement by Sponsor:

SEN. ETHEL HARDING, SD 37, opened stating this resolution was based on I 118. She stated the different bills introduced this session, in regard to the initiative, were conflicting and had created some complications. She stated she had talked with her staffer and had come to the agreement that this interim study of the initiative would be one solution. She stated this study would help iron out some of the problems in a nonpartisan way and they could bring it back in two years to the session to be voted on. She urged the committee's support of the resolution.

REP. DENNY asked if they would be looking at other bills that were along the same lines as the initiative and tie them together during the interim study.

SEN. HARDING stated these things had been studied in the past. She didn't feel as though that would fit into this study of I-118.

HEARING ON SJ 22**Opening Statement by Sponsor:**

SEN. VIVIAN BROOKE, SD 33, opened stating this resolution was in order to congratulate the University of Montana Grizzly basketball teams for their accomplishments over the past year. She stated the teams and staff represented a great deal of Montana and the Lady Griz team was number eight in the nation for attendance. She passed out an article from a news paper highlighting the teams' accomplishments. **Exhibit 1.**

He pointed out that four of the members of the Lady Griz basketball team had been appointed to the All Big Sky First Team. He stated this is a great honor for the teams. He said the teams are unique in the fact that such a great percentage of the players are from Montana and the staff was from Montana and also played for state teams while in college and high school.

Questions From Committee Members and Responses:

REP. SUSAN SMITH asked why they refer to the woman's team as the "Lady Griz" in the resolution and they don't refer to the men's basketball team as the "Gentlemen Griz".

SEN. BROOKE stated those were their names. Oftentimes the men are the dominant ones and the women's teams came later. As they began to excel in their games they often took on a feminine description of the name for themselves. She stated this is very common even in high school teams.

Closing by Sponsor:

SEN. BROOKE closed stating that they usually look at athletics as being dispensable. She stated they should be awarded for their accomplishments and she urged the committee's favorable consideration of the bill.

HEARING ON SJ 23**Opening Statement by Sponsor:**

REP. DENNY deemed the title being read in the absence of SEN. DEL GAGE and moved on to proponents.

Proponents' Testimony:

Lois Menzies, Department of Administration, stated under the Administration Department they take care of such duties as accounting and personnel along with others. She stated this is a resolution that would help find the problems with the current ways things are being done. She stated most of the programs were made up during the 1970's. She stated at the time they were a leader in their administrative tasks. However, they have become more aware of the limitations with the systems they are currently using. She stated they have used the "band-aid" approach up until now, patching things together and hoping they work. She stated this would encourage managers of different departments to look at the ways they are doing things currently and find a new, better way of doing them. She urged the committee's support of the resolution.

Bob Peirson stated he had worked with SEN. DEL GAGE in drafting the bill. He stated there are many issues tied to this resolution. He stated these issues run from policy making to the implementation of the different systems. He stated in order to support policy making they need to look at the management systems and find the best possible way of doing things. He said with things being a "patch work quilt" as they are now it provides for a lot of confusion and frustration along with a lot of added work. He believed this was a significant resolution and urged the support of the committee. He stated this would provide the opportunity to improve the operation of state government.

REP. MATT BRAINARD asked what it would cost for the updates to these systems.

Mr. Peirson stated it is not going to be an inexpensive procedure. He said that the reason for this resolution was to make a specific game plan to present during the next legislative session. He said they needed to look at both the expenses of doing this and also the benefits it will reap when it is

implemented. He said he couldn't give him an answer as to how much it would cost at the present time because they hadn't looked at the proposal in that much detail.

REP. JAY STOVALL asked if there would be any coordination with this resolution and the reorganization of state government.

Mr. Peirson stated there would be a coordination of the two and now would be a good time for both of them. He stated this resolution might make tradition reorganization irrelevant. He stated the systems need to be improved and this resolution would be a good start for doing that. He said if they don't get involved it would be like "shutting the barn door after the horse is already out".

REP. DENNY asked if the software they were currently using was written by the staff or were "canned purchases".

Ms. Menzies stated they have many different forms of software. Some is written by programmers they have hired, other programs are bought off the shelves and installed. She stated it depends on the need of the agencies which type of software they use.

REP. DENNY asked if they would be looking at what other states have done.

Ms. Menzies stated it would be critical for them to look to other states for guidance in this area. She stated the vendors of software would also play a role in what they will do. She stated there would be a lot of resources that they would look to in order to get an idea of what might work best.

Lady Griz found all right answers

For every question, the Lady Griz had an answer. And there were plenty of questions, particularly back in October when Montana coach Robin Selvig was wondering how he would replace the leadership Kelly Pilcher and Ann Lake provided the previous season's team.

Selvig questioned who would step into the big sneakers left behind by a pair of seniors who nearly took Montana into the Sweet 16. He questioned how the team would respond to a tough non-conference schedule that included the likes of then-No. 1 Tennessee. And he questioned how much of a contribution he could count on from a largely untested bench, particularly after guard Carla Beattie went down with a season-ending Achilles tendon injury just three games into the season.

The Lady Griz had been down this road before. A team doesn't play in 10 of the last 13 NCAA tournaments without having players step up. The 1994-95 season was no different. "I certainly thought there were a lot of questions this year and a lot of things that had to get answered," Selvig said in repeating the preseason theme. "This team, as much as any I've had, played up to its potential."

The questions didn't stop coming when the season tipped off. Senior power forward Lora Morast chipped a vertebra in her neck during an exhibition game against Portland AAU. Morast's uncertain status coupled with the loss of Beattie three games later forced Selvig to keep true freshmen Angella Bieber, Allison Turner and Katie McElmurry on the active roster, rather than giving them a redshirt season.

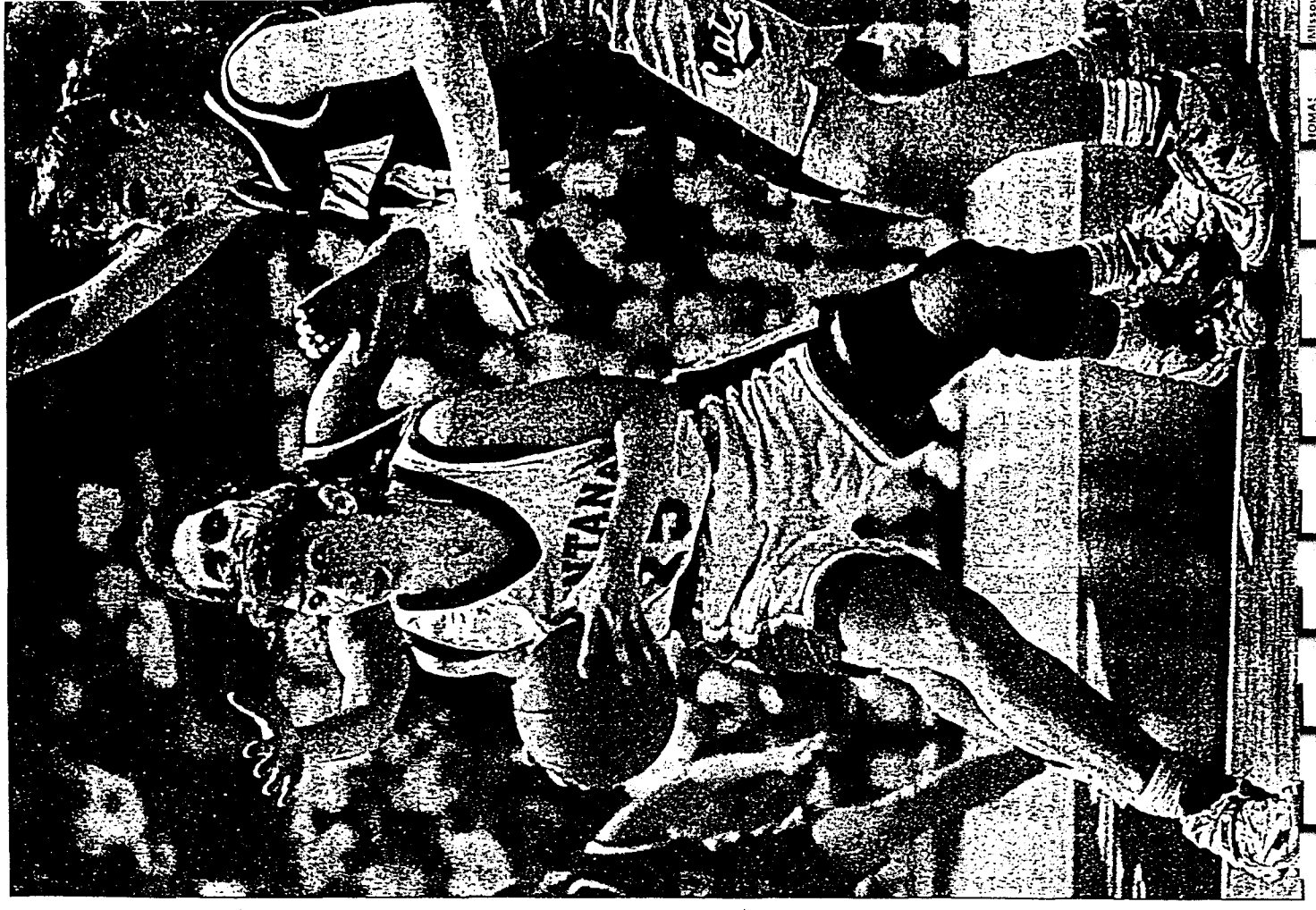
But the answers weren't long in coming either. The Lady Griz knocked off Oklahoma, which went on to make the NCAA tournament, in the first round of the inaugural preseason NIT, setting up a home date with then-No. 12 Vanderbilt.

Beattie went out early in that game and redshirt freshman sensation Skylia Sisco followed her to the training room with a sprained ankle. Senior center Jodi Hinrichs collected 19 points and 10 rebounds and junior Sherri Brooks put on a first-half shooting clinic to keep Montana ahead until the final minute. With the help of a couple of late breakdowns, the Commodores escaped with a 69-65 win.

"After the Vanderbilt game I said we've got us a team

Notable:

- Sherri Brooks set the single season steals mark with 115, breaking the mark of 94 set by Cheri Bratt in 1981.
- Montana led the nation in fewest points allowed at 54.2.
- The Lady Griz won their 11th Big Sky regular season title and 10th postseason tournament title.
- The 26-7 campaign marked Montana's 15th straight 20-win season.
- Montana posted a 2-5 record against the seven teams they faced that earned NCAA tournament berths, including narrow losses to No. 1 seeds Vanderbilt and Tennessee. The other losses were to Purdue, Utah and Duke. The wins were over Oklahoma and San Diego State.
- Four Lady Griz — Jodi Hinrichs, Kristy Langton-Schlimgen, Sherri Brooks and Skylia Sisco — were named first team all-Big Sky. Brooks was a unanimous pick while Langton-Schlimgen became just the fourth player to earn the honor three times. Sisco was Montana's first freshman to earn the recognition and also the first non-starter ever named first team all-Big Sky.
- Coach Robin Selvig picked up career win No. 400 on Feb. 9 in a 75-57 victory over Weber State and career loss No. 100 in the season-ending loss to

(continued) here," Selvig said.

Selvig was able to see beyond the injuries and the disheartening loss. He saw the two healthy seniors — Hinrichs and Kristy Langton-Schlingmen — providing behind-the-scenes leadership. And he saw Brooks leading by example.

"The reason I thought leadership was important is that last year's team was a Kelly Pilcher and Ann Lake-led team," Selvig said. "Kelly played almost every minute and her personality was what the team assumed. Lake gave us a tough physical presence inside and that was huge."

"We needed people to step up and I thought Jodi and Kristy, particularly early in the year, set the tone for us. The other real key in terms of leadership — not necessarily vocal — was Sherri Brooks. From the first day of practice until the end, she had a great year."

Those leaders helped convince the likes of Sisco and sophomore Greta Koss, who started all 33 games, the Lady Griz could compete with the top teams in the country.

"It's not every year we can take (an NCAA) No. 1 seed and have a chance to win in the final minute," Selvig said of the narrow loss to Vandy and a five-point loss to Tennessee. "Many years, there's a real separation between a team like us and the top teams in the country. That showed me a lot about these kids."

"I'd be lying if I said I wasn't afraid we'd lose by 30, but we showed everybody we had a team to be reckoned with."

Selvig didn't have a lot of time to savor the good taste left by the Vanderbilt game. The Lady Griz lost by 40 points to Duke their next time out, the worst loss ever suffered by a Selvig-coached Lady Griz team.

"We were hurt because, off the bench, we didn't have what we had had in the past," Selvig said of a game which saw the Lady Griz shoot just 27 percent from the floor. "For the true freshmen, that was their first-ever road trip, we weren't shooting the ball well and there weren't any strings to pull."

Montana bounced back the next night to shoot 52 percent in a 76-55 win over Syracuse, touching off a string of nine games in which Montana's only loss was to No. 1 Tennessee. The road split in the Old Dominion Classic answered some more questions.

"We bounced back and showed real grit, we showed the kinds of things a coach wants to see," Selvig said. "It stirred their competitiveness. It was the first real negative thing that happened to these kids and they stepped up and answered."

The sequence repeated itself later in the year when the Lady Griz shot poorly in a 26-point loss to Utah. They followed that up with their best shooting performance of the season (58 percent) in a blowout of Northern Arizona. Two other regular-season losses were followed by blowout wins.

"That was a positive aspect of this team," Selvig said. "They dealt with adversity and injuries well. We had some bad losses, which quite honestly nobody had experienced. Most teams do get beat badly sometimes, but we hadn't experienced that."

Selvig couldn't have been too upset; then, when Montana's last regular-season loss came at Eastern Washington on the final weekend of the season. The Lady Griz had already insured that the Big Sky postseason tournament would be held in Missoula the following week.

True to form, Montana bounced back to beat Eastern Washington and Montana State in the tournament to earn its 10th trip to the NCAA tournament.

Montana's top-rated defense forced San Diego State into a horrendous shooting night in a first-round NCAA win in San Diego. But for the third time in four years Montana dropped its second-round NCAA matchup, this time by 11 points to a Purdue team that earned a berth in last year's Final Four.

The five-month season usually leaves Selvig drained. But not this year.

"It was as fun as any year I've had in coaching," said Selvig, who picked up career win No. 400 in early February. "I didn't have to worry about these kids in any way, shape or form. When I got back from San Diego, I was ready to get back into the gym."

Of course, the next time he does, it will be without seniors Langton-Schlingmen, Hinrichs and Morast, all starters this season.

Brooks will return as a proven team leader and Beattie should be recovered from her injury. The only other senior on the team will be Malia Kipp, who will be counted on to provide a presence in the middle.

"It's exciting in a nervous type of way," Selvig said of the prospects for next year's team. "We lost our inside starting lineup, but we do have a lot of young kids coming back. I'm optimistic, yet a lot of things have to be proven. There are lots of questions."

There's that word again. But next year's team will have a cheat sheet to work from.

"(Purdue coach) Lin Dunn said it pretty well when she said you can't let up on these kids," said Selvig, describing what set this season's team apart from the rest in his mind. "They were going to give everything they had down to the end, and that turned out to be a lot."
