Committee Business Summary:

Hearing: HB 40 and HB 56

Executive Action: HB 40 and HB 56

HEARING ON HB 40

Opening Statement by Sponsor:

REPRESENTATIVE HARRIET HAYNE, HD 86, from Dupuyer, presented HB 40. She stated that this is a bill repealing the termination of the tax checkoff for the agriculture in Montana schools (AMS) program. This bill will reinstate the AMS checkoff line on the state income tax forms. The AMS did not raise \$20,000 per year and this is the reason that it was terminated. This is strictly a volunteer program without the use of any state or federal funds.

They work by donations, grants and the money given by the state income tax checkoff. The goal of AMS is to give Montana students a greater awareness of the contributions of agriculture to their lives and to the national economy and society so that they can become better informed citizens. The major purpose of AMS is to provide free, factual teaching tools to Montana teachers.

Proponents' Testimony:

Leo Giacometto, Department of Agriculture (DOA), stated that a key point is that this is the only program in the DOA where the administrative costs are not taken out. The department assists in the program without charging administrative costs. They work hard to promote AMS.

Marie Hoveland, President of AMS, read her testimony of a short history and overview of AMS (Exhibit 1). A folder of information was handed out (Exhibit 2).

Maureen Cleary-Schwinden, representing Women in Farm Economics, stated that they support HB 40.

Lorna Frank, representing the Mt. Farm Bureau, stated that they support HB 40. They are hoping that in the following year they can do some advertising for AMS through their department.

REPRESENTATIVE JOHN "SAM" ROSE stated that he strongly supports HB 40.

Mike Murphy, Mt. Water Resources Association, stated that they support HB 40.

Bob Stephens, Mt. Graingrowers Association, stated that they support SB 40.

Jennifer Hill, representing the Mt. Stockgrowers Association (MSGA) and the Mt. Woolgrowers Association stated that they support SB 40.

George Paul, representing the Farmers Union, stated that this program gives information to the urban communities and the nonagricultural audience. As a portion of the AMS budget the checkoff is very important.

Candace Torgerson, Mt. Cattlewomen's Association stated that they support HB 40.

Cork Mortensen, representing the Board of Livestock stated that they support HB 40.

Opponents' Testimony:

Mick Robinson, director of the Department of Revenue, stated that it is a good program, but they are not in favor of the tax checkoff line being the means of fundraising. The \$20,000 threshold was set because of the administrative fee and the history of this program has been that not a lot of money was raised. In 1994 the amount that came in was \$7,752 and the fee was \$2,850. The tax checkoff is not a very efficient way to fund raise.

Questions From Committee Members and Responses:

SENATOR LINDA NELSON asked **Mr. Robinson** what percentage does the state receive of the money. **Mr. Robinson** replied that they try to identify the direct costs of the checkoff up to a maximum of \$3,000. This one was \$2,850.

SEN. NELSON asked Marie Hoveland how many schools are actually using AMS? Ms. Hoveland stated that AMS sends the materials to the schools and it is up to them to use them and they are not sure how many schools are using the program.

SEN. NELSON asked Ms. Hoveland do you have 10 volunteer teachers that go out in the state? Ms. Hoveland replied that there are 3 teachers that go out and teach a course that is a college credit course. They have worked with around 1,200 teachers.

SEN. NELSON asked Ms. Hoveland why the contributions have lessened since 1993 and does AMS have a plan to increase the amount of money that they are receiving? Ms. Hoveland replied that 1992 was a bad year for everyone. She replied that they have tried to advertise, including word of mouth.

SENATOR GERRY DEVLIN asked Ms. Hoveland if they have tried to get free radio time? Ms. Hoveland replied that it might not be heard by very many people because it is on late at night.

SENATOR DON HARGROVE asked **Mr. Robinson** if they had thought of another way to fund raise for the program. **Mr. Robinson** suggested that AMS take the \$2,850 and spent it in direct mailing fundraising perhaps they would get a better response.

SEN. HARGROVE asked Mr. Giacometto if he had any alternatives to the tax checkoff method? Mr. Giacometto replied that AMS is a program that the DOA will assist with however they receive their money. They do not charge the administrative fee. There are other ways to get money and this might not be the best, but they need it.

SENATOR REINY JABS asked Mr. Robinson if the program brought in over \$20,000 would a fee still be \$3,000? Mr. Robinson stated that this was correct.

SENATOR GREG JERGESON asked Mr. Robinson of the 400,000 tax returns anticipated each year what is the number of farmers, ranchers or agricultural employees? Mr. Robinson replied that he did not know. Mr. Giacometto replied that there are approximately 23,000 farms and ranches in Montana. SEN. JERGESON asked if there were 900 of the 23,000 that utilized the checkoff. Mr. Giacometto said that this was true.

SEN. JERGESON asked Mr. Giacometto why several people have seen the checkoff line on the tax return and why are there so few people that know of the program? Mr. Giacometto stated that the DOA is trying to promote all the programs and they will continue to help them. He stated that it is because most people have a CPA do their taxes and they do not even see the checkoff line on the form.

Closing by Sponsor:

REPRESENTATIVE HAYNE stated that the program was strictly voluntary and they will try to do more advertising in order to raise more money.

HEARING ON HB 56

Opening Statement by Sponsor:

REPRESENTATIVE JOHN "SAM" ROSE, HD 87, from Choteau, presented HB 56 and stated that HB 56 was to delete the requirement of the Department of Livestock to develop a staggered brand recording and rerecording system. The equipment would be very costly and it is likely to add two more staff members.

Proponents' Testimony:

Cork Mortensen, representing the Board of Livestock, read his
written testimony (Exhibit 3).

Jennifer Hill, representing the Mt. Stockgrower's Association and the Mt. Woolgrowers Association stated that they support HB 56.

REP. ROSE stated that he was in support of the bill and urged the committee to support it also.







Mr. Chairman and members of the committee, for the record my name is Cork

Mortensen and I am the Executive Secretary to the Board of Livestock. The Board and

Department of Livestock support this legislation and urge you to support House Bill 56

for the following reasons:

- 1. This is a time of economic restraint for the livestock industry and for its agency the Department of Livestock. We do not feel that we can afford the extra expense of implementing a staggered re-record system, as it would necessitate the hiring of at least one and possibly 2 full time personnel. In addition, the change in our computer programming for the brand mortgage system would need to be altered. (This alone could cost approximately \$15,000).
- 2. As to Section 81-3-107, subsection 2, the legislative auditor has suggested that in order to be in compliance of certain deposit requirements, we should change our statutes to allow a reasonable time for depositing the recording and rerecording fees. We have therefore added this to avoid potential problems with the auditor's office.
- 3. Lastly, under 81-3-107, subsection 1, we have inserted <u>or the board</u> to allow the Board of Livestock the authority to declare an emergency situation should the need arise for the board and department to have to spend more than 10% of the net rerecording fees in any one year. This is because of the uncertain times we live in. We don't know what might happen which would necessitate this kind of declaration, but you have merely to look at the Yellowstone Park bison situation to see that there could be circumstances arise which would force us to put more personnel in that area and, in

order to keep the rest of the industry properly serviced we might need to hire additional personnel, etc.

Thank you for your time and consideration in this matter. Once again, the Board and Department of Livestock urge you to support this legislation. If you have any questions or need more information, I should be happy to respond.
