HEARING ON SB 389

Opening Statement by Sponsor:

SEN. LARRY BAER, SD 38, BIGFORK introduces the bill as an act establishing tax credits to offset the effects of the 1996 property tax reappraisal. This bill doesn't apply unless the other property tax relief bills fail to neutralize the increase threatened by the reappraisal. This allows for an income tax credit. The fiscal note numbers don't reflect that they are used based upon their assumption that SB 195, SB 319, SB 211 and others are all going to fail, leaving us with the total assessment tax increase falling on this bill. He refers to the bill as the "property taxpayer's preservation insurance bill."

Proponents' Testimony:

Alex Hansen, Montana League of Cities and Towns thinks SEN. BAER is on the right track with this bill. This bill connects authority and responsibility; the relief in this bill goes to the taxpayers. The idea of a tax credit is one element of the tax system that deserves to be studied and considered.

Opponents' Testimony: None

Questions From Committee Members and Responses:

SEN. DOROTHY ECK asks if a vacation home would be eligible. SEN. BAER responds the second home should also receive an offsetting credit. SEN. ECK then asks regarding rental property. SEN. BAER says the renter can anticipate an increase in rent; if this bill passes the renter won't have to worry about an increase.

SEN. GLASER inquires of Mr. Hoffman, Department of Revenue, if I-105 was written in such a way that the increase in appraised value is exempt from I-105. Mr. Hoffman agrees that is correct. SEN. GLASER asks for clarification on the fiscal note, stating we need to be sure about it. Mr. Hoffman states he's not sure.

SEN. BOB DEPRATU asks **SEN. BAER** how this would affect new construction. **SEN. BAER** indicates new construction is not exempted.

SEN. MIKE SPRAGUE wonders if this bill applies only to <u>real</u> property. SEN. BAER indicates that's true.

SEN. ECK asks if an apartment house owner living out of state gets the credit. SEN. BAER answers in the affirmative.

Closing by Sponsor:

SEN. BAER closes stating this bill is just like insurance - it's better to have it. This is a safety mechanism; the people of Montana will thank you for your support.

Jeff Martin explains the amendments don't include the proposed amendment to change the effective date. These amendments ensure that someone who purchases a vehicle/trailer out of state and brings it in state will not be entitled to the change in the manufacturer's year being the designated model year.

DISCUSSION:

SEN. DOROTHY ECK has a problem with the concept of taxing at such a low rate on vehicles that are so expensive.

SEN. BOB DEPRATU comments most of the people in his area who own expensive motorhomes go to Oregon to get licensed to save money.

SEN. MIKE SPRAGUE asks what is the effect of July 1 with the vehicles. Mr. Martin responds the effect of this bill will not be felt until 2-3 years.

CHAIRMAN GERRY DEVLIN is concerned about the effective date being in the middle of the year. Mr. Martin refers to 1-2-201 (1) (c) which takes care of the issue.

SEN. BARRY STANG agrees with CHAIRMAN DEVLIN.

SEN. GLASER won't support the bill; he's tired of "angry" legislation.

SEN. SPRAGUE believes "angry" can be good; it's society's prerogative.

MOTION/VOTE: SEN. MIKE SPRAGUE MOVED THE AMENDMENTS 44402 WITH THE EFFECTIVE DATE BE CHANGED TO JANUARY 1. MOTION CARRIED 7-1 with SEN. DEVLIN voting no and SEN. VAN VALKENBURG not voting.

MOTION/VOTE: SEN. WILLIAM GLASER MOVED HB 444 BE TABLED. MOTION CARRIED 6-2 with SEN DEPRATU and SEN. SPRAGUE voting no and SEN. VAN VALKENBURG not voting.
