The proration shall be based on the ratio 15 16 between the number of special pupils per class and the number of requiar pupils per class and any other relavant 17 factors. 18

19 (f) Maintenance of plant: salaries, benefits. 20 replacements and parts, contracted services--the superintendent of public instruction shall make regulations 21 fixing a ratio for maintenance spending per full-time 22 special pupil to such spending per current year's regular 23 The proration shall be based on the ratio between the 24 ANB. 25 number of special pupils per class and the number of regular ł pupils per class and any other relevant factors. (g) School food services--the amount allowed for 2 budget purposes per full-time special pupil may not exceed 3 the amount budgeted per regular ANB for the current year. (h) Student body and auxiliary services; salaries and other expenses--the amount allowed for budget purposes per 7 full-time special pupil may not exceed the amount budgeted per regular ANB for the current year. (i) Other current charges; insurance, rental of land and buildings, and other expenses: (i) rental of land and buildings, when such premises meet all requirements of the board of public education and

12 13 the department of health and environmental sciences--no such 14 costs may be charged to the special program without specific 15 authorization from the superintendent of public instruction 16 unless the land and buildings are shared between the special 17 and regular pupils, and the amount of the total cost that 18 may be charged to the special program may not exceed 19 whatever proportion the number of special full-time pupils are to the total enrollment of the school district of the 20 previous year. shared between the special and regular students, and the
amount of the total cost that may be charged to the special

program may not exceed whatever proportion the number of

4 (iv) other--the amount allowed for budget purposes may

In compliance with a written request received <u>January 31</u>, 19, 77, there is hereby submitted a Fiscal Note for <u>House Bill 624</u> pursuant to Chapter 53, Laws of Montana, 1965 - Thirty-Ninth Legislative Assembly. Background information used in developing this Fiscal Note is available from the Office of Budget and Program Planning, to members of the Legislature upon request.

DESCRIPTION OF PROPOSED LEGISLATION:

House Bill 624 revises special education laws by broadening allowable travel costs for special education personnel, providing special equipment for school buses, mandating transportation for special education students, and striking numerous existing provisions from the statutes.

ASSUMPTIONS:

- 1. The fiscal note provides estimates for only two provisions of the proposed legislation: bus equipment and travel for special education personnel. Costs associated with the other provisions are indeterminable.
- 2. Three (3) percent of the 1,400 school buses in Montana would be converted or replaced by buses equipped for special education.
- 3. The additional special education costs for buses would be \$1,500 per bus.
- 4. There are 25 special education administrators and 1,500 teachers in the state.
- 5. Administration would attend one out-of-state meeting and five in-state meetings per year. Teachers would attend one state meeting per year.

CONCLUSION:

Based on the estimates provided, enactment of House Bill 624 will result in additional 1979 Biennium expenditures of \$410,100. However, the provision on line 2 of page 8 which provides for transportation expenses for special education personnel could entail costs far in excess of those estimated since there is no limiting language.
