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BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MONTANA:

ENCOURAGING DEVELOPMENT.

Section 1. Urban undeveloped lot district — license fee. (1) The governing body of a local government may by ordinance create an urban undeveloped lot district within the jurisdictional area of a city-county planning board and in a contiguous area zoned for residential or commercial purposes.

- (2) The governing body may impose an urban undeveloped lot license fee on all undeveloped and vacant lots on which no buildings or other structures exist in an area designated as an urban undeveloped lot district as provided in (1) above.
- (3) The governing body shall provide a method of collection. The amount of the undeveloped lot license fee may be entered on tax notices to be collected with other taxes. If the urban undeveloped lot license fee is not paid by the property owner, it becomes a lien on the property.

1 (4) The governing body may provide a license fee 2 schedule that escalates yearly on the potentially 3 developable lots, as a means of encouraging development. In 4 no case may the license fee be imposed until 2 years after 5 the creation of the urban undeveloped lot district.

In compliance with a written request received <u>February 16</u> , 19 77, there is hereby submitted a Fiscal Note

DESCRIPTION

This bill provides for the creation of an urban undeveloped lot district and authorizes an urban undeveloped lot license fee as a means of encouraging development.

ASSUMPTION

This bill only affects local governments. Therefore, there is no impact on state revenue or expenditures.

EFFECT ON LOCAL REVENUE

This bill may increase local government revenues, but the amount of the increase depends on the decision of the local government.

TECHNICAL NOTE

It appears that there is a potential legal conflict. Cities can go 4 1/2 miles beyond the corporate limits for planning purposes. The legal question would be whether cities can assess license fees on properties outside their corporate limits.
