 19 capital construction projects on private industry; and

20 WHEREAS, the loss of a healthy private business because
 21 of unnecessarily strict occupational and health standards
 22 leads to the loss of jobs for Montanans, declining revenues
 23 for local and state government, and ultimately to a lower
 24 standard of living for the state's citizens.

1 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE AND THE HOUSE
 2 OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE STATE OF MONTANA:

3 That the Congress of the United States, the
 4 Environmental Protection Agency, and the Occupational Safety
 5 and Health Administration are all encouraged to consider the
 6 enormous impact of national occupational and health standard
 7 laws and regulations and insure that the implementation of
 8 national goals of occupational and health standards do not
 9 cripple regional and local business.

10 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Congress of the United
 11 States, the Environmental Protection Agency, and the
 12 Occupational Safety and Health Administration are encouraged
 13 to fully investigate local economic, social, health,
 14 geographical, topographical, and climatic conditions before
 15 recommending or implementing restrictive occupational and
 16 health standards.
